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Homestead Exemption

Living on a fixed income during retirement is challenging. For those wishing to stay in their homes, upkeep and rising taxes may prove to be an even bigger challenge. The Homestead Exemption program is one tool in assisting these individuals to stay in the homes they love. This program provides seniors and disabled Ohioans a way to reduce their property tax. This program has the following requirements:

- 1. The individual must own and occupy the home as their primary residence as of January 1 of the year in which they are applying.
- 2. The individual must:
 - a. Be 65 years old or turning 65 by December 31 of that year, or
 - b. Be permanently disabled as of January 1 of the year in which they are applying, or
 - c. Be the surviving spouse of an individual who was receiving the Homestead Exemption at the time of death when the surviving spouse is at least 59 years old on the date of that spouse's death.
- 3. Individuals must have a total adjusted gross income of less than \$34,200 per year. If the individual applying is married, the income is based on that of both spouses.

Those who have applied for and received this benefit in past years do not need to reapply unless there is a change in status or move from the home. The Montgomery County

The **Distinguished Budget Presentation** Award is presented to governmental entities that publish a budget document, which meets program criteria as a policy document, an operations guide, a financial plan and a communications medium.

Dear Fellow Kettering Residents,

This spring, all registered voter households in the City of Kettering will receive a postcard in the mail that lists salary and benefit information for a small number of City of Kettering employees.

An amendment to the City Charter requires that in odd numbered years, the City must create a document that provides salary and benefit information for the top, middle and lower 15 full time City employees by earnings; and,

mail it to all registered voter households in Kettering. A group of Kettering residents secured enough petition signatures to place this amendment on the ballot, and Kettering voters approved it in November 2016.

Charter Section 10-12 states that the mailer "shall contain no other information or statements other than specifically provided for herein". In other words, the Charter amendment prohibits the City from providing any context to the figures on the postcard.

The figures used for the mandatory postcard represent total compensation, including employee salary, as well as benefits. Some employees rise to the top of the earnings list as a result of overtime or retirement benefits, which are included in total compensation calculations.

It is important to me that the Kettering community knows that a complete and searchable database of salary information for ALL City employees—not just the handful on the postcard, as well as a searchable database of all City expenditures, is posted on the City's website at www.ketteringoh.org.

I would like to thank our residents, businesses, school systems and employees for their continued dedication, compassion and love for this City. This past year has been very difficult for everyone; but as a City, we have come together to support each other and thrive as a community. Your 2020 City of Kettering Income Tax Return is due on April 15, 2021

Our Tax Division recently mailed the 2020 City of Kettering Income Tax postcard. In an effort to reduce costs related to paper, printing, and postage, please note that **NO TAX FORMS WILL BE MAILED TO YOU.** Forms are available on our website at **www.ketteringoh.org** or you may utilize one of the alternative filing methods described below. To avoid late filing fees, your 2020 return must be received in our office or postmarked by April 15, 2021.

Who Must File

All residents (including part-year residents) of the City of Kettering who are 18 years of age and older are required to file an annual income tax return. A return is required regardless of income or employment status. Please note: Active duty military personnel and individuals with no reportable income or loss for the current year are subject to the mandatory filing requirements.

Non-residents of the City of Kettering who have income or loss, earned or derived from within the City, and from which Kettering tax was not fully withheld, must file a return.

Exceptions to Mandatory Filing Requirement

Permanently retired/disabled individuals with only non-taxable sources of income or loss (such as social security, pension, interest and dividends) <u>may</u> qualify for exemption. If you feel you qualify for an exemption, please complete the Declaration of Exemption return (available on our website) and submit it to our office with all required documentation as specified on the form.

Filing Methods

There are several convenient options for filing your city income tax return. Electronic filing and fillin forms are available on the City of Kettering website at www.ketteringoh.org

Individuals with only wage income reported on Form W-2 are eligible to file electronically. All other individuals may utilize the fill-in forms.

Additionally, you may visit the Income Tax Division office, located at 3600 Shroyer Road, Kettering, OH 45429, to obtain forms or have your return prepared by one of our staff members.

City of Kettering income tax return preparation is a free service, and no appointment is necessary.

Visit our office before April 1 for the fastest service.

Required Documents

As required under state law, the Federal Form 1040 must be attached to the City of Kettering Income Tax Return at the time of filing.

Additional supporting documentation that is required to be attached to the City of Kettering Income Tax Return includes (but is not limited to): Form(s) W-2 (if applicable), Federal Schedules C, E, F or K-1, Form(s) 1099-NEC and Form(s) W-2G. Part-year residents should also include pay statements reflecting year-to-date figures relating to the period of time you resided within the City.

Online Payment System

An online payment system is available for the payment of tax balances, estimated tax payments and payment plan payments via electronic check, credit card or debit card. Please note, a convenience fee will be added to all credit and debit card payments.

Spring is an ideal time to accomplish projects that improve your home's curb appeal. Here is a checklist of projects that can make a big difference:

Clear out landscape beds and put down fresh mulch. Mulch and compost are
available free for Kettering residents in the spring at Indian Riffle Park.

- ☐ Trim trees and shrubs. Remember that they may not overhang sidewalks or streets. Remove overgrown and invasive shrubs. Yard debris may be placed in your Rumpke cart for collection on your regular trash day or it can be taken to the Yard Debris Center beginning March 1.
- Repair broken, cracked or deteriorated siding or trim.
- Repaint areas with cracked and peeling paint.
- Seal doors and windows to improve energy efficiency and prevent drafts.
- Check the roof for peeling or missing shingles and loose flashing.
- Check gutters and downspouts for debris. Repair any leaks or damage.
- Dispose of unlicensed or inoperable vehicles.
- Mow the grass and weed the landscaping on a regular basis. Grass must not exceed a height of 8".
- Regularly remove trash and yard debris and clean up after pets.
- Avoid erosion by seeding bare spots in the yard.
- Check fences and sheds, replace and repair broken or rotting sections. Repaint as necessary. Clean up areas along your property that are adjacent to public streets and alleys.
- Don't store household furniture or appliances outdoors. Keep items meant to be stored outdoors in a neat and orderly appearance.
- Replace or repair missing or damaged entry doors and garage overhead doors.
- Check hinges or latches on windows and doors to ensure they function properly.
- Check for loose or cracked mortar joints in brickwork.
- Make sure steps and walkways are in good condition, free from debris, cracks, holes and flaking concrete.
- Check house foundation and walls for cracks or breaks.
- Check windows and doors for broken glass, torn screens and deteriorated or loose frames, sills or sashes.

You should annually evaluate the condition of your property to identify needed repairs. A lot of money can be saved by correcting problems before they become major repairs.

If you need financial assistance with the cost of making repairs to your home in Kettering, we may be able help. The City of Kettering has programs to assist low and moderate income families with emergency repairs, minor repairs and comprehensive rehabs. To qualify, your household must meet established income limits; and, typically your home should have some built-up equity. Water & Sanitary Lines in Kettering

The City of Kettering itself is almost 70 years old, and some of our neighborhoods are nearly 100 years old! Like anything that has been around this long, we have places that are starting to deteriorate. In many areas of town, bridges, water mains and gas lines are aged to the point that they need complete replacement.

The same goes for the service line that connects your home to the water main at the street and the sanitary drain that connects to the sewer under the street. The major difference is that if these service lines break or collapse, the repair or replacement is the responsibility of the property owner. This is not an inexpensive project. We are encouraging homeowners to reach out to their insurance agents to discuss options

for protecting yourself with a service line policy, or to ensure that you are saving for the potential occurrence of this significant disruption. Unfortunately we know that each year your neighbors are finding themselves faced with this burden; and, though we certainly hope it never happens to you, in an established community like all of those in the Dayton suburbs, it is possible and there is a way to be prepared.

It is important for Kettering residents to understand that your water service and all maintenance of water mains are the responsibility of your county, not the City.

Except for a very small portion of the city located in Greene County, Kettering residents receive their water from Montgomery County.

Questions about water/sewer billing and accounts should be directed to Montgomery County Environmental Services at **937-781-2688**, Monday – Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

When you need to report a water main break, sewer backup, other water/ sewer emergency or you want information about discolored water or boil advisories; please call the Montgomery County Environmental Services 24/7 emergency line at 937-781-2678.

> Montgomery County Environmental Services created the Foundation Drain Disconnect Program to help protect homeowners against sewer backups and prevent "clean"

storm water from entering the sanitary sewer system. The program provides up to \$4,000 in financial assistance for plumbing upgrades to help protect your home from sewer backups. Homeowners who have a living area or basement located below ground level may be eligible for the program.

Typical eligible plumbing work and improvements may include installing plumbing and valves to prevent backups; disconnecting all downspouts, stairwell, floor, foundation and sump drains from the sanitary sewer; or installing a sump pump and wet well.

Let's Prepare for Spring!

Severe Weather Preparedness

Severe thunderstorms and high winds can damage above ground power lines and turn unsecured objects into hazardous flying debris. Here are safety tips to follow before, during and after severe weather events.

Before High Wind Event:

- Secure all outdoor items like patio furniture, grills, trash cans, etc.
- Keep trees trimmed and free of weak or damaged limbs.

During High Wind Event:

- Remain in a protective structure away from windows and flying debris.
- Report any damaged wires from utility poles to DP&L.
- Call 911 to report any fires or arcing wires.

After High Wind Event:

- Stay away from wires that have fallen and report to DP&L.
- Call 911 to report any fires or arcing wires.
- Treat any wires as if they are energized.
- Contact a licensed, professional to clear fallen or unstable trees or large limbs.



Disaster Preparedness Kit

Thunderstorm and tornado season is quickly approaching. An important step in being prepared for a disaster is having a supply kit to help navigate through it. City of Kettering Volunteers and the Cities of Service Committee assembled disaster supply starter kits to help Kettering families be better prepared for a disaster. These starter kits include a flashlight, city map, basic first aid kit, towelettes, pen/paper, waterproof document bag, safety whistle and a checklist to complete the disaster kit. Curb, Sidewalk & Driveway Approach Repair Program

As the City of Kettering ages, it is our responsibility to ensure that appropriate maintenance is scheduled to preserve the safety and appearance of our infrastructure, roadways and sidewalks. Each year, the City's Engineering Department conducts a sidewalk, curb and drive approach repair program.

The program calls for a different section of the City to be inspected and appropriately maintained each year. The goal is to cover every area of the City within a 20 to 25 year period. This year the Indianola neighborhood and some streets directly south of Indianola will be part of the sidewalk, curb and drive approach repair program.

Along with most communities, Kettering property owners are responsible for the sidewalk, curbs and drive approaches



abutting their properties. In Ohio, state law provides for this practice on the premise that property owners get the most benefit from these items because they are available for their use, and it enhances the value of their property.

The City Engineering Department inspectors review sidewalks, curbs and drive approaches and mark the sections that must be replacedbased on established criteria. After the marking is completed, an explanation of the markings, a copy of the required work, an estimated cost and the options for completing the work are mailed to the affected property owners.

If there is a disagreement between the inspector and the property owner regarding replacement orders, the City Engineer will re-examine the curb, sidewalk or drive approach in question and make the final determination.

The two options for repairing the sidewalks and curbs are:

1. The property owner may hire a contractor. The contractor must obtain a right-of-way construction permit to replace the sidewalk, drive approach and/or curbs. The contractor has 30 days from the time the permit is issued to complete the work. The contractor must post a performance bond which will remain on file with the City for a period of 12 months. The contractor must also provide proof of insurance, listing the City of Kettering as an additional insured. The work must also have a final inspection from the City inspector. You may contact the Engineering Department at 937-296-2436 to check on contractor's bond and insurance status.

2. The contractor the City hires may complete the work. In the spring of the year the work is to be performed, the resident receives a letter stating the estimated cost. The City pays the contractor for the actual cost of the work. Once the work is completed and a final letter is sent to the property owners, the property owner may either pay cash to the City for the work or have the actual cost plus interest, and a County collection fee assessed to their property taxes.

Sidewalk, curb and drive approach repair is a vital part of neighborhood pride, as well as overall community spirit. If everyone does their part, improvements will be a lot easier. East Kettering Health Center to Open in 2021

Kettering Health Network (KHN) broke ground at 1745 East Stroop Road in August of 2020, to build a multi-million dollar medical office building that will focus on senior care and bring more than 30 jobs to Kettering. The East Kettering Health Center at the corner of Mayfield Avenue will serve an increasing aging population in Montgomery County's most-populated suburban city. Nearly 18.5% of Kettering's estimated 54,800 residents are 65 or older. Projected to open in the summer of 2021, the structural steel framed building on a previously vacant 1.45-acre lot will represent a \$5.6 million investment by Kettering Health Network. Eight physicians and advanced practice providers, one behavioral health specialist and 20-25 support team members will offer primary care/internal medicine, behavioral health and educational classes. The site will include X-ray and lab areas with more than 20 exam rooms. The \$3 million facility will have a capacity of 232 in 14,316 square feet of space.

Landscape Design Projects Complete Bridges

We can probably agree 2020 was a year we're not exactly heartbroken to leave behind. The Parks Division has been dedicated to maintaining Kettering's parks and green spaces, especially during this pandemic, to continue to provide people with outdoor space and nature.

As we dig into 2021, the Parks Division has their vision on the future with two important landscape design projects adjacent to recently updated bridges in Kettering.

Schantz Avenue Bridge landscape design plan

You may have seen the gorgeous new decorative steel artwork at the Schantz Avenue Bridge over South Dixie Avenue. It was a labor of love for several City departments to bring to fruition, and the icing on the cake is now to create sustainable landscaping to aesthetically complement the existing landscaping on both sides of the bridge.

The landscape design includes a variety of perennials including Sedum, Black-eyed



Susans and Sage to add color, along with Hydrangeas and Feather Reed Grasses throughout. There will also be tiered stone hardscaping embedded into the hillside with hearty Sumac ground cover to deter erosion.

The project is slated to be completed in late spring to mid-summer, so make it a point to drive over the bridge to see this unique combination of art, nature and transportation.

The Parks Division is also working closely alongside the Engineering Department to create a landscape design to accompany the newly replaced Ridgeway Road Bridge over Dorothy Lane.

Although the landscape design is not as far along as the Schantz Avenue plan, it will encompass the same conceptsustainable landscaping to enhance a vital piece of infrastructure. The projected installation date for the refreshed landscaping is fall of 2022.

As you drive through Kettering and see these plans, we hope you enjoy and appreciate not only the new bridges, but also the purposeful greenery that helps make our city so attractive and welcoming.

Rosewood Gallery Rises Above the Challenge

When the COVID-19 pandemic began in early 2020, Rosewood Gallery didn't back down from the challenges posed by lengthy facility closures and uncertainty in the world. Thanks to a supportive community of artists and a Kettering team willing to think outside the box,

Rosewood Gallery shines as an example of creative thinking over adversity.

In March 2020, exhibitions by ceramic artist and inaugural Rosewood Artist in Residence Arthur Kettner and by painter Mark Flake of North Carolina were on view. As Ohio's stay-at-home order took effect and facilities closed their doors, PRCA staff scrambled to provide quality parks, recreation and cultural arts opportunities in a virtual format. Rosewood Gallery Coordinator Paula Kraus took images of each

gallery show, which were added to a new virtual gallery page on www.playkettering. org. As the closures extended into the spring and summer, more exhibitions were featured exclusively online - work by the Western Ohio Watercolor Society, Us, It, Them by painter Samantha Simpson, The Nature We Create by ceramicist Deana Bada Maloney, and the popular The View juried landscape exhibition..

Rosewood Arts Centre and Rosewood Gallery reopened in July 2020, with reduced hours and other safety measures in place. However, staff recognized that a significant portion of the population was not comfortable leaving their homes for non-essential trips. To give everyone a chance to enjoy the artwork, Rosewood Gallery has continued to create both an inperson and a virtual viewing experience.

To round out 2020, the gallery was pleased to host Cleveland-based artist Lori Kella for a FotoFocus-sponsored exhibition, entitled Erie: Lost and Found. Although the FotoFocus biennial at large was canceled due to public health concerns, the exhibition still received support from FotoFocus and was a success both in person and online. The final exhibitions of 2020 were The Only Way We're Going to Get Through This is

Together by Oakwood artist Erin Holscher Almazan and Density: The Presence and Silence of It by Kate Snow of Cleveland. The themes of both exhibitions were very timely for the atmosphere in 2020 - during a year when connection was at the forefront of everyone's mind, Almazan's work focuses on women's

> connections with the world and each other. Snow's work delves into notions of controlling the uncontrollable, something we all grappled with during an uncertain time in history.

Although 2020 is over and 2021 looks brighter, uncertainty lingers and the effects of the pandemic continue. **Rosewood Gallery** remains committed to supporting working artists, a community hit especially hard economically by

agenda, Earth Transformed features fourteen of the most innovative and skilled ceramic artists from Ohio and its surrounding functional objects and sculptures, these renowned artists transform clav through a diverse range of techniques, ideas and intentions.

From imagined insect-like specimens to representations of the human condition, they push the boundaries of what is obtainable with clay while maintaining the highest levels of craft and precision.

The artists in *Earth Transformed* reflect their shared landscape — connected by the Ohio River — in their creative practice and in concept. Participating artists include Tom Bartel, Juliellen Byrne, Scott Dooley, Peter Christian Johnson, Carrie Longley, Brandon Lowery, Geno Luketic, Kelly and Kyle Phelps, Joann Quiñones, Shoji Satake, Brad Schwieger, Justin Teilhet, Steven Thurston and Matt Wedel.

An exhibition of new work by emerging artist Nicki Strouss will accompany Earth Transformed. Created during her 2020 Artist in Residence at Rosewood Arts Centre, Strouss' large-scale, mixed-media installations and ceramic sculptures are playful abstractions of the human body.

Although we were proud to help the show go on last year with exclusively virtual content, we're delighted that Samantha Simpson and Deana Bada Maloney's exhibitions have been rescheduled for 2021 and will appear this spring in person at Rosewood Gallery. "We are so thrilled to have Simpson and Maloney in the gallery this year," Kraus wrote, adding that the level of detail in the pieces is well worth an in-person viewing.

Leading us into the summertime will be the 27th annual *The View*, which also returns to an in-person format after being exclusively virtual in 2020. We plan to
