
Sharing Summer with Brood X

The largest brood of periodical cicadas, Brood X will be emerging after 17 years underground, flying around and buzzing noisily mid-May and June this year. Don't worry cicadas are harmless, to humans and pets, they don't sting, bite, or carry diseases. When they enter the house or car somehow, they're easy to scoop up and put back outside because they are awkward fliers. If you would like to participate in the mapping of these amazing creatures the app Cicada Safari was developed by researchers at Mount St. Joseph University in Cincinnati to track this largest emergence of cicadas in the country. Not to worry Cicadas die just four to six weeks after emerging.

Help for Eye Care Costs Available at the Kettering Connection

In the midst of the pandemic, there are a lot of healthcare checkups that have been neglected. For many, annual eye exams and updating glasses were put on hold. For many individuals, affording these costs is normally a struggle; but, with the loss of income and insurance caused by the pandemic, we are finding more and more people who are skipping these exams and potentially putting their eyes in danger.

The Kettering Connection is proud to partner with Prevent Blindness to offer eye care vouchers for a free exam and/or eyeglasses for those who qualify. There are



 The individual cannot have insurance that covers eye care. This includes insurance access to care through state and federal programs such as Medicaid or employer insurance. 2. The individual must have an income at or below 200% of the poverty level. That is up to \$25,760 per year for an individual and up to \$53,000 per year for a family of four.

The qualifying individual will be given a voucher to use at a participating eye doctor; and if that doctor determines the need for glasses, the client will be eligible for a free pair. Certificates for glasses can

only be provided for those who have eye glasses if insurance pays for the exam and not the glasses. Vouchers can also

be provided for those who have broken a pair of glasses and they have proof that the insurance company refuses to provide replacement.

Roadway Construction

Ridgeway Road Bridge

The new Ridgeway Road Bridge is taking shape, and construction will continue into summer. The contractor and the City's design team have been coordinating the details of the bridge and artwork to provide a seamless outcome. The bridge is scheduled to open in August. We appreciate your support, which made this project a reality. Funding for the bridge is being provided through the Ohio Municipal Bridge Program (\$2,000,000) and the Ohio Public Works Commission (\$400,000 grant and \$400,000 loan).

Traffic Signal Replacements

Kettering was awarded nearly \$1,200,000 in federal funds to reconstruct traffic signals at six intersections. This project is about 50% complete. Locations include:

- 1. East Dorothy Lane at Powhattan Place
- 2. East Dorothy Lane at Valleywood Drive
- 3. Woodman Drive at Adventure Drive
- 4. Woodman Drive at Aragon Avenue
- 5. Woodman Drive at Forrer Boulevard
- 6. Forrer Boulevard at Culver Avenue

Far Hills Avenue Resurfacing

Resurfacing of Far Hills Avenue began in early May, and should be complete in July. Preparatory work has been performed for the past three years. This includes Vectren gas main replacement, Montgomery County water main replacement, curb ramp reconstruction, and repair to drainage inlets. The project limits are from David Road to the corporation boundary with Oakwood. The Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) will administer the project, and will fund up to 80% of the costs.

County Line Road Widening

Construction work to widen County Line Road is planned to begin in early summer and will be completed in 2022. Because this project borders two counties and two cities, coordination has been, and will continue to be very important. Upon completion of this project, the corridor will provide two travel lanes in each direction for more than ten miles from Moraine to Beavercreek. The increased traffic capacity will support continued business growth at Research Park. The project was awarded nearly \$2,500,000 in federal funds.

Vectren Gas Main Replacements

Vectren is planning eight gas main replacement projects in Kettering this year. Several of the projects are underway, with more to begin soon. Because the work involves restoration of pavement and yards, Kettering requires Vectren's contractor to obtain permits for each location of work in the right-of-way.

BBQ Grill Safety

Summer is not complete until you have enjoyed some tasty food from a BBQ grill. Here are some tips to keep you and your family safe this summer when cooking on your propane, charcoal, or wood pellet grill.

- Propane, charcoal, and wood pellet barbecue grills must only be used outdoors.
- Place the grill well away from siding and deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches according to the manufacturer's instructions. Do not store or use a grill on a porch or balcony, including any porch or balcony on an upper level of the building.
- Periodically remove grease or fat buildup in the tray(s) below the grill so it cannot be ignited by a hot grill.
- Light a propane grill only with the cover open. If the flame on the propane grill goes out, turn the grill and gas off and wait at least 5 minutes before relighting.

- Never use gasoline or any other flammable liquid except charcoal starter or lighter fluid to start a charcoal fire.
- Keep children and pets away from the grill area. Have a 3-foot "kid-free zone" around the grill.
- Use long-handled grilling tools for plenty of clearance from heat and flames when cooking.

only after they are cool.
Empty the coals into a metal
container with a tightfitting lid that is used only
to collect coals. Place
the container

outside
away from
anything
that can
burn. Never
empty coals
directly
into a trash
can.



Recreational Fires

Recreational fires are permitted in the City of Kettering. However, these fires must meet a few criteria to prevent unfriendly fires or a neighborhood nuisance. All of these requirements can be found in the Ohio Administrative Code 1301:7-7-03.

- Permission must be received from the owner of the property where the recreational fire is taking place.
- Recreational fires shall not be conducted within 25 feet of a structure or combustible material.
- If the fire is contained in an approved container such as an outdoor fireplace, barbecue pit, etc. the fire must be at least 15 feet from a structure or combustible materials.
- Fire shall be constantly attended until the fire is extinguished. A portable fire extinguisher with a minimum of a 4A rating or garden hose, bucket of sand or other suitable means for extinguishing the fire must be provided.
- The total fuel area shall not exceed 3 feet in diameter or 2 feet in height.
- Fuel shall only consist of clean dry firewood. (No yard waste or rubbish materials or prohibited materials defined by the Ohio Administrative Code may be burned at any time).
- Fire shall not create an offensive or objectionable situation to neighboring property owners

Fire Hydrant Inspections

KFD will be inspecting half of the fire hydrants in Kettering this summer. During these inspections, hydrants will be checked for any damage or defects. Also, KFD members will be flowing water from these hydrants to help ensure that they will operate effectively in the event of a fire.

This water flow could disrupt sediment within the water delivery system causing a brown discoloration of the water. This discoloration poses no threat to health or safety although, these deposits could discolor laundry. We suggest residents check the clarity of their water prior to washing laundry. If brown water is observed, simply run cold water until it clears. Residents are being asked to wash clothing after 5:30 PM Monday thru Friday or anytime Saturday or Sunday

by brown water. If clothing becomes discolored it is suggested to wash clothing again using a rust removing detergent prior to drying.

The Code Red Community
Alert system will be used
to inform residents when
hydrants will be inspected
in their area. Residents will be

given at least 24 hours of notice prior to inspections. Miami Valley Research Park Building Awarded Funding

The City of Kettering approved an Economic Incentive Grant for the Modernization of 1900 Founders Drive on Tuesday, February 22, 2021.

"The investment in this property will allow us to market the site to businesses and site selection consultants as a premier office location," said Chris Semarjian, Industrial Commercial Properties Owner. "We're grateful for the support from Kettering,

JobsOhio, the Dayton Development Coalition and their vision for the site."

The building, one of the first in the

Miami Valley Research park, was built in 1986 and has been vacant since 2018. The renovation work would help bring the building back up to Class A office space.

"By facilitating ICP's improvements and property renovation, we strengthen the City's opportunities for economic development, as well as redevelopment. This, in turn, promotes the potential for new employment opportunities within our City," stated Mayor Don Patterson. "Therefore, the City offered ICP economic development incentives in the form of a reimbursable grant."

After improvements, the site would be primed for defense contractors looking for space near Wright-Patterson Air Force Base,

corporate headquarters or regional offices. Large Class A office space is rare in the region as there are no other

sites with more than 25,000 Square feet available in the East Dayton market.

The project will also receive support from the JobsOhio Site Inventory Program (OSIP). The program offers grants and lowinterest loans to support speculative site and building development projects with no identified end user. The primary goal of OSIP is to fill gaps in Ohio's real estate inventory with properties targeting near-term sector wins to ensure our state is more competitive for reactive site selection projects.

"Investing in 1900 Founders Drive will revitalize a building that has been vacant for too long," said J.k P. Nauseef, JobsOhio president and CEO. "With assistance from the Ohio Site Inventory Program, 1900 Founders Drive will be a premier site with a large space near Wright-Patterson, making it ideal for innovation companies that are looking to grow."

"Over the years, companies have told us that when they choose another region over Dayton, it's often because we didn't have an appropriate site," said Julie Sullivan, the DDC's Executive Vice President of Regional Development. "OSIP and the Kettering Economic Incentive Grant allow the region to build an inventory of sites so we are ready to seize these opportunities. We believe once the work is complete, 1900 Founders will be an attractive site for a growing company."

Years Ahead Health Center Opening in Late June

Kettering Health Network is opening a new Years Ahead Health Center to give Kettering's senior community members more access to health care services. The new location will be the second Years Ahead location for the network.

Located at 1745 E. Stroop Road, the one-story, 18,800 square foot building is expected to open in late June and will feature patient-centered care with facility design and educational programs tailored for those 65 and older. Services offered will include:

The new location will have a care team of eight medical providers, including physicians, advanced practice providers, behavioral health support specialists, and more than 20 support team staff members. The facility is a \$5.6 million investment in the community, continuing Kettering Health Network's commitment to providing high-quality care for local residents.



Solicitation and Door-to-Door Sales

While door-to-door solicitation is permitted in the City of Kettering, residents can take action to reduce unwanted solicitors.

Residents are able to discourage doorto-door solicitors by posting a sign which is at least 3" x 4" in size that says "No Solicitors". If an unwanted solicitor approaches your property ignoring the sign, it is your responsibility to call the Kettering Police Department to report the incident.

Compliant "No Solicitors" signs are available at the reception desk at the Kettering Government Center.

For individuals or businesses wishing to conduct door-to-door solicitation, we suggest contacting the Kettering Police Department to inform them what areas of the city you will be in so they are aware of your activities.

If at any time you feel your safety is in danger as a result of a door-to-door solicitor, please call 911.

What Fiber Optic Network Phase II Means for Kettering Residents

In 2018, Kettering joined with six other Miami Valley Communications Council (MVCC) member cities to construct a regional fiber optic network that would save cities money on phone and internet service, help solve crimes by increasing the ability of police departments to share intelligence data, and invite business growth by increasing the availability of high speed, low cost technology services these businesses depend on.

The cities of Kettering, Centerville, Miamisburg, Moraine, Oakwood, Springboro and West Carrollton completed construction of Phase 1 of the network in 2019. Phase I cost \$1.14 million and involved installation of more than 17 miles of new fiber and reuse of excess fiber strands in cities' existing traffic signal fiber networks. The result was that the government centers of all seven cities are now directly connected via a 10gb municipal fiber network.

The Miami Valley Educational Computer Association (MVECA) provides network management and internet service to the connected cities. As a non-profit, MVECA provides telecom services at a much lower cost than forprofit internet providers. As a result, the seven cities are now enjoying cost savings on internet service through MVECA.

Phase II of the project began in March 2021 and will install new high capacity fiber optic cabling along all portions of the network where limited capacity, existing traffic signal fiber had been used previously. MVCC partnered with Independents Fiber Network, a private telecom carrier, who is funding the entire \$1.8 million cost of Phase II. Upon completion of Phase II, MVCC and IFN will split the available fiber and conduit assets from both phases equally. Through this partnership, Kettering and the other cities have successfully attracted a new telecom service provider to

a competitive alternative for businesses needing high speed communication services, at no additional cost to the taxpayers.

MVCC and its member cities are actively working to attract residential Fiber-to-the-Home internet providers to the region and are in near constant discussions with other neighboring municipalities, townships, school districts and other governmental agencies to find opportunities to utilize the fiber network to reduce government expenses throughout the entire Miami Valley.

During the past 12 months, we have felt the impact technology has on the way we live and function as a society at any age. Now, more than ever, having access to high-speed, reliable, competitively-priced internet service is no longer a luxury, it is a necessity.

Construction on Phase II of the GATEway Public Fiber Network is scheduled for completion by September 2021.


Consider Public Office in Kettering

Applicants must either live or work in Kettering to apply. The application is available at www.ketteringoh.org or by contacting the Volunteer Office at 937-296-2433.


The deadline to submit an

Mayor's Award for Volunteer Service

The Mayor's Award for Volunteer Service was created in 1983 as a way to honor outstanding volunteers who are making valuable contributions to the community through volunteer service in a wide variety of categories. Recipients of this award must either be a resident of Kettering or the volunteer service should be performed in Kettering. In celebration of National Volunteer Week, Mayor Patterson honored both a youth and an adult volunteer with this most prestigious award.

Youth volunteer, Tahjey Lawson resides in Kettering with his grandmother and grandfather, George and Tammy Lawson. Tahjey attends Kettering Middle School (KMS) and he is in the eighth grade. Tahjey's volunteer efforts are extensive and they address a host of needs in our community spanning a variety of generations. His efforts include servina the homeless by collecting and making blankets; collecting coats and masks; boxing personal care items for front line workers at local nursing homes and hospitals, as well as hospitals and first responders in New York; collecting and donating baby items and diapers for Hannah's Treasure Chest;

packing bags with hand sanitizer and snacks for the Kettering Police Department; creating and donating get well cards for those at the VA hospital; and he personally raised over \$1,000 for the PTA Walkathon at KMS which helped supply snacks during state testing. In addition, Tahjey served as Secretary to the Junior Optimist Club at KMS. Most recently, Tahjey was elected Governor of the Ohio District for Junior Optimist International, Tahiev's nominator stated, "Tahjey has had obstacles throughout his life but he still finds the time to give to others. I cannot think of any other youth in our community who would be more deserving of this award."

The adult recipient of the Mayor's Award for Volunteer Service is Sue Solvig. Sue began volunteering for the City of Kettering in October of 2019. Until the pandemic, Sue's volunteer service included assisting at special events, receptionist's duties; helping with the nutrition program; and scheduling rides for seniors as part of our senior transportation program at Lathrem Senior Center.

In March of 2020 the senior center closed due to the pandemic. During this time, Sue and other volunteers rose to the challenge by making phone calls to homebound seniors to ensure their wellbeing. As the pandemic continued, Sue offered to return to help with the senior transportation program. After making some

After making some safety modifications to the office area, she returned in July to assist with this essential program. Typically, the center enlists the help of five different volunteers, one each day from 8 – noon. Sue stepped up to help every day from 8 – 10 a.m.

Sue's nominator had this to say about Sue, "One of the most amazing things about Sue is her ability to truly bond with the clients, listen to them and make feel safe. She spends hours on the phone talking through pandemic related fears and other issues regarding isolation. She also talks with family members

regarding their loved one's transportation needs. She clearly and patiently explains our program to new clients. She is so well liked that many callers are disappointed when a staff member answers the phone—they want to talk with Sue!"

Sue's nominator also explained that Sue is gifted with a servant's heart. With the changes thrust upon us at the onset of the pandemic, Sue did not hesitate to offer help with needs in our community demonstrating what "community" is all about!

No matter how you choose to celebrate Independence Day this year, we want you to stay safe and have fun! Check out our top tips for avoiding preventable accidents and injuries over the holiday weekend.

Stay Hydrated and Sun Safe

Having a healthy, happy 4th begins with drinking plenty of water. If you are going to be outdoors in the heat, getting enough liquid is essential. Provide a cooler or pitcher with water at picnics, and bring a large, refillable water bottle along with you to events. When spending time outdoors slather on the sunscreen and reapply often

according to package directions. Wear light-colored clothing (red, white, and blue, of course!), a hat and sunglasses.

Respect the Fireworks

What's the best way to handle fireworks? Leave them to the pros! "The only firework products permitted in Ohio for use are designated "trick and novelty" — such as smokes, sparklers, snaps and snakes," said Kettering's Fire Service Specialist, John Moore. "Even trick and novelty fireworks can cause serious injury." (All fireworks, including 'trick and novelty' and sparklers are prohibited at Go 4th!)

"Sparklers burn at 1,200 degrees and can cause third-degree burns," Moore said.
Don't firework at home — join us instead for one of the area's biggest and best

displays set to an amazing soundtrack!

Food Safety is a Must

We all love a July 4 picnic, but spending July 5 sick with food poisoning? No, thanks. Warm weather creates ideal conditions for foodborne bacteria to thrive, so keep hot foods hot (above 140°) and cold foods cold (below 40°). If you'd rather skip the food prep worries, we're planning a roundup of food vendors at *Go 4th!*

Be Water Wise

Backyard pools, public pools, natural waterbodies — these do a lot to make our parties more fun. They also add a serious need for safe behavior, especially when children are at the party. Designate someone to watch the water at all times and rotate the position among the adults. Be sure everyone who goes into the water is comfortable there and has the needed safety equipment such as life jackets. If you're heading to Delco Park, keep a close eye on small children around the pond.

Keep Public Health Guidelines in Mind

Be mindful of all COVID-19 guidelines. Keep six feet of social distance from those not in your household, clean your hands frequently, and bring your mask for when social distance can't be maintained.
