

The Kettering Police Department continues to grow and evolve. We are finishing up the building renovation and continuing with our


recruitment efforts. We have implemented our new Computer Aided Dispatch/Records Management System which allowed us to combine 14 individual computer programs.



K9 TEAMS EXCEL AT CERTIFICATION COMPETITION









City of Kettering Police Department K9 Teams (Disalvo/Nash, Maloney/Jax and Harrison/Ox) completed certification in 2020 through the United States Police Canine Association (USPCA) in Narcotic Detection, Patrol Functions and Tracking. The Narcotics Detection phase consisted of vehicle searches and room searches using the four primary drug odors. All three teams finished with excellent scores (no more than 2 points lost), with Sgt. Disalvo and K9 Nash taking top score of 199 out of 200 possible points.

The Patrol Functions consists of obedience, agility, evidence search, suspect search and apprehension with and without gunfire. Our three teams did a good job, easily certifying with high scores across the board.

The Tracking portion consists of a 300 yard track that is aged 30 minutes with multiple turns and three articles/evidence on the track. All three teams completed their tracks with ease earning nearly perfect scores from the judges.

These certifications require dedication, attention to detail and a lot of long hours to show proficiency. All three teams should be commended. They without a doubt represented the City of Kettering and the Kettering Police Department extremely well. Truly outstanding work!

Special thanks to Ptl. D. Matt and Ptl. J. Kramer for helping with repairs of our K9 training equipment over the past few weeks which allowed the City of Kettering to host these certifications.



DISPATCH CENTER

The Communications Center consists of 14 full-time dispatchers and one part-time dispatcher who are cross trained to dispatch for Police, Fire and EMS. Last year, they answered 19,088 emergency (911) calls and 54,079 non-emergency calls.




COURT

The Kettering Police Department provides security for Kettering Municipal Court. The Uniformed Deputy Bailiffs and Court Security Officers are responsible for maintaining security within the court building.

JAIL

The jail is a five-day facility that processes incoming arrests and provides housing and prisoner care until the initial court appearance. The jail is staffed by five full-time and two part-time jailers. The Kettering Jail is accredited and operates in compliance with state and national standards at an exemplary professional level.



FAREWELL TO BRIX



Kettering Police Department K9 Brix

It is with heavy hearts that we announce the passing of K9 Brix. K9 Brix passed away during the night of May 4, 2020 with Lt. Brad Lambert by his side. K9 Brix was imported from the Czech Republic and purchased from Shallow Creek Kennels in 2008. Lt. Lambert and K9 Brix completed an intensive 280 hour Patrol and Narcotics K9 certification at the Middletown Police K9 Academy.

After achieving certification, the K9 team began serving the City of Kettering and surrounding jurisdictions; accumulating an unbelievable career as one of the most dependable tracking, apprehension and narcotics K9 team in the region. K9 Brix and Lt. Lambert were also assigned to the Kettering Regional SWAT team, deploying with the team on numerous operations.

K9 Brix and Lt. Lambert competed at multiple regional and national

certifications. K9 Brix won numerous awards and was named "Top Dog" for the United States Police Canine Association in 2012 and the Ohio Law Enforcement K9 Association. In 2010, K9 Brix earned Top Dog honors, scoring 450 points; the second place K9 team was 250 points behind. Competing at this level takes a tremendous amount of time, sacrifice and determination but Lt. Lambert and K9 Brix excelled.

A further testament to K9 Brix and Lt. Lambert's hard work was the number of successful street tracks, apprehensions and narcotics finds during their tenure as a Kettering K9 team. Most of these uses were self-initiated, showing the dedication, drive and selflessness of the K9 team.

K9 Brix retired from service in 2015. K9 Brix and Lt. Lambert remain one of the best K9 Teams in Kettering history. K9 Brix will be greatly missed by the Kettering K9 Unit, Kettering Police Department and K9 teams across the region. Please keep Lt. Lambert and his family in your prayers.


