Gity of Kettering, Ohio – Government



One of the most unique and highly valued services the City of Kettering offers residents is free curbside collection of leaves each fall. Leaves are picked up by City crews and taken to the City's leaf composting center where leaves will be converted to mulch and compost, then offered free of charge to residents each spring. The City will begin in District 1 on Monday, October 18, and will continue leaf pickup until early December. Please note that all leaves should be raked to the curb by Monday, November 29, for the final pass for

Please remember the following tips for leaf pickup:

fall collection.

 Know your leaf collection district. Reference the above map to find your district or visit www.ketteringoh.org and enter your address in the My Services tab on our home page.

Don't wait until our crews are near your district to rake leaves.
 As leaves begin to fall, rake piles to the edge of your lawn. We

will make several passes through each district for collection.

• Call 937-296-3255 (FALL) or check the Kettering website to determine the current location of leaf pickup crews.

Prior to collection, rake your leaves to the edge of your lawn, but not into the street where they will block traffic and cause a hazard to storm drains. Do not block storm drains or waterways.

- Do not bag your leaves.
  - Make sure leaves are not under, between or around parked cars.
- Don't rake anything except leaves to the curb for pickup. Branches, sticks, grass and other yard waste clog the machinery and throw the crews off schedule. Leaf piles containing branches, grass, etc., will not be collected. You may take your tree

branches and brush to the City's Yard Debris Drop-Off

Center located on Woodman Center Drive or put them in your Rumpke cart for pickup on your normal trash collection day.

# Traffic Signal Replacements

Kettering was awarded nearly \$1,200,000 in federal funds to reconstruct traffic signals at six intersections. This project is nearly complete. Locations include:

# Roadway Projects for 2021

# Far Hills Avenue Resurfacing

Resurfacing of Far Hills Avenue was completed this summer in time for the Holiday at Home Parade. The Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) administered the project and funded approximately 80% of the costs.

# **County Line Road Widening**

Construction work to widen County Line Road started in June and is scheduled for completion in summer/fall 2022. Because this project borders two counties and two cities, coordination has been, and will continue to be, more involved. Upon completion of this final link, the corridor will provide two lanes in each direction for over ten miles from Moraine to Beavercreek. The increased traffic capacity will support continued business growth at Research Park. The project was awarded nearly \$2,500,000 in federal funds.

# CenterPoint (Vectren) Gas Main Replacements

Vectren is planning eight gas main replacement projects in Kettering this year. Several of the projects are underway, with more to begin soon. Because the work involves restoration of pavement and yards, the City of Kettering requires CenterPoint's contractor to obtain permits for each location of work in the right of way.

# Ridgeway Road Bridge

The Ridgeway Road bridge over West Dorothy Lane has reopened to traffic and the public art features have been installed. A permanent vandal prevention fence will be installed on both sides of the bridge near the end of September. In the meantime, a temporary vandal fence is in place on the bridge sidewalks until the permanent fence is installed.

The City of Kettering appreciates the strong support from residents that made this project a reality. Funding for the new bridge was provided through the Ohio Municipal Bridge Program and the Ohio Public Works Commission.



# **Assistance for Kettering Renters**

In response to residents who need assistance with rent, Montgomery County has a new program to provide relief for rental expenses resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic. The county is working with United Way of the Greater Dayton Area to take initial applications. To apply, call the United Way Helplink at 211.

Montgomery County received \$15.8 million from the U.S. Treasury for the Emergency Rental Assistance Program. To be eligible, households must meet income guidelines. To determine eligibility, applicants can either use their 2020 household income or current monthly income at the time of application.

To be eligible, one or more individuals in the household must:

- Have qualified for unemployment benefits or attest by writing that they have experienced financial hardship due to the pandemic
- Be at risk of becoming homeless (past due rent, eviction notice, or unsafe or unhealthy living conditions)

 Have a household income below 50 percent of area median income (\$37,850 for a household of four)

United Way will be taking basic information, and Montgomery County is working with other partners to process applications for those in need. Catholic Social Services, Goodwill Easter Seals, Homefull and the Salvation Army will help individuals through the application process.

# **Kettering Court Offers New Programs**



New initiatives are being offered at the Kettering Municipal Court (KMC) with the goal of improving court services and access to justice giving many a fresh start while saving taxpayer funds. Among these new programs, the KMC will offer an amnesty week for court fees and fines, landlord/ tenant mediation, record sealing assistance, a customer service center for information on assistance and legal resources and an alternative to traffic citations.

#### Court Fee/Fine Amnesty Week

Anyone currently owing either court costs and fines or both, can receive a 50 percent amnesty discount during the KMC's Amnesty Week, October 18 – 22, at Kettering Municipal Court, 2325 Wilmington Pike, between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., or call 937-296-2461. Fifty percent of the court costs and fines must be paid in full to be eligible to receive amnesty for the remainder. For more information, visit www. ketteringmunicipalcourt.com

#### Landlord/Tenant Issue Mediation

Through the Dayton Mediation Center, the office of the Clerk of Court will be

offering tenants and landlords the ability to participate in optional mediation on any issues without resorting to an eviction at no additional cost. Additionally, the service will be available after an eviction is filed up to the court hearing date.

#### Advanced Record Sealing

Another service being offered is through the National Expungement Database Center (NEDC). The NEDC will ensure that requests for sealed records at KMC will be removed from all credit bureaus, private databases and other services. More information can be found at www.nedcenter.com.

#### Help Center

Kettering and Montgomery County Clerks of Court have partnered offering a Help Center providing legal information and access to programs and resources. The center does not provide legal advice. 

Ohio collected 43,475 lbs. during the April take back which was 19.3% of all pills collected in the United States.




#### Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety

What's the difference between smoke alarms and carbon monoxide (CO) alarms? Why do I need both?

Smoke alarms sense smoke well before you can, alerting you to danger. In the event of fire, you may have as little as two minutes to escape safely, which is why smoke alarms need to be in every bedroom, outside of the sleeping areas (like a hallway) and on each level (including the basement). Do not put smoke alarms in your kitchen or bathrooms.


Carbon monoxide is an odorless, colorless gas that displaces oxygen in your body



before you even realize something is happening to you. Without vital oxygen, you are at risk of death from carbon

> monoxide poisoning in a short time. CO alarms detect the presence of carbon monoxide and alert you so you can get out, call 9-1-1, and let the professionals


check your home.



Choose an alarm that is listed with a testing laboratory, meaning it has met certain standards for protection. Whether you select a unit that requires yearly changing of batteries, or a 10-year unit that you change out at the end of the 10 years, either will provide protection.

CO alarms also have a battery backup. Choose one that is listed with a testing laboratory. For the best protection, use combination smoke and carbon monoxide alarms that are interconnected throughout the home. These can be installed by a qualified electrician, so that when one sounds, they all sound. This ensures you can hear the alarm no matter where in your home the alarm originates.

# Kettering Health Opened New Facilities



#### **On-Demand Care**

Kettering Health opened a new On-Demand Care location in Kettering to give the community more access to walk-in primary care. The new location will be the fourth On-Demand Care location for the network.

Located at 424 E. Stroop Rd., the onestory, 3,200-square-foot building opened in early June. Some imaging services and treatment for minor illnesses and injuries, including headaches, rashes, cough and strains, will be available at the new location.

This location will be the first health care tenant at the Town and Country shopping center, which is owned by CASTO and Skilken|Gold.

The new location will employ six fulltime positions and is a \$1.2 million investment in the community.

#### Years Ahead Health Center

Kettering Health opened a new Years

Ahead Health Center in Kettering to give senior community members more access to health

care services. The new location will be the second Years Ahead facility for the network.

Located at 1745 E. Stroop Rd., the one-story, 18,800-square-foot building opened in late June and will feature patient-centered care with facility design and educational programs tailored for those 65 and older. Services offered will include primary care, lab and imaging services and educational and support programs

The new location will have a care team of eight medical providers, including physicians, advanced practice providers, behavioral health support specialists and more than 20 support team staff members. The facility is a \$5.6 million investment in the community continuing Kettering Health's commitment to providing high-quality care for local residents.

# **Volunteers Returning**


