Neighborhood Block Party

Having a block party is a terrific way to meet or get acquainted with your neighbors, build a sense of neighborhood pride, and celebrate

The City of Kettering allows block parties on selected residential streets. You can submit a block party application to the Engineering Department for review. If it is approved, the Engineering Department will properly notify the Street, Fire and Police Departments of all block party street closures.

One day before your scheduled block party, the City's Street Department will deliver barricades to a designated location for residents to set up the next day.

The form should be emailed to ketteringengineering@ ketteringoh.org or dropped off to the Engineering Department at the Kettering Government Center, 3600 Shroyer Road. Please submit the block party request at least two weeks before the planned event to allow Traffic Engineering time to review the application for selected residential streets. Door-to-Door Sales and Solicitation

Door-to-door solicitation is permitted in the City of Kettering; however, property owners are able to discourage solicitors by posting a sign which is at least 3' x 4' in size that says "No Solicitors" or by affixing a "No Solicitors" window cling. If an unwanted solicitor approaches your property ignoring the sign, it is your responsibility to call the Kettering Police Department to report the incident.

For individuals or businesses wishing to conduct door-to-door solicitation, we suggest you contact our Kettering Police Department to inform them what areas of the city you will be in so they are aware of your activities.

If, at any time, you feel your safety is in danger as a result of a door-to-door solicitor, please call 911.

Soliciting or peddling on this property is prohibited pursuant to Kettering General Offenses Code Section 642.10(a)(5) enacted by Ordinance No. 4228-14. Whoever violates 642.10(a)(5) is guilty of peddling, an unclassified misdemeanor with a maximum fine of \$1,000.00.

SUSTAINABLE STRIDES

Help Fight Storm Water Pollution

Anything that enters a storm sewer system eventually flows untreated into lakes, streams and rivers; and, because of the risk of pollution, it can disturb the ecosystem. Water from rain, melting snow or lawn watering flows along curbs in to our storm sewers. Along the way, it can collect and transport soil, pet waste, salt, pesticides, fertilizer, oil, litter and other pollutants. These often toxic substances make their way directly to a lake, stream, river, wetland or coastal water.

What are some ways you can help reduce pollution in our streams and rivers?

Lawn Care:

- Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly.
 When use is necessary, use these chemicals in the recommended amounts.
- Use organic mulch or safer pest control methods whenever possible.
- Compost or mulch yard waste. Sweep up grass clippings and tree trimmings from pavement. Kettering residents can drop off their yard trimmings for free at the Yard Debris Center located at 1840 Woodman Drive, Monday through Friday from 3 – 8 p.m. and Saturday from 9 a.m. – 3 p.m.
- Don't overwater your lawn. Consider using a soaker hose instead of a sprinkler.
- Don't leave yard waste or leaves in the street or sweep into storm drains or streams

Auto Care:

- Use a commercial car wash that treats or recycles its wastewater, or wash your car on your yard so the water infiltrates into the ground.
- Repair leaks and dispose of used auto fluids and batteries at designated dropoff or recycling locations.

Pet Waste:

- When walking your pet, remember to pick up the waste and dispose of it properly.
- Flushing pet waste is the best disposal method. Leaving pet waste on the ground increases public health risks by allowing harmful bacteria and nutrients to wash into the storm drain.

Electric Vehicle Charging Stations in Kettering

The City of Kettering recently installed two electric vehicle charging stations at Delco Park and two at the Kettering Recreation Complex near the Adventure Reef Water Park main entrance.

Kettering received funding for these installations through the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission and the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency. Funding came about using the Volkswagen Diesel Mitigation Grant funds.

The City applied for funding to install additional stations in the north lot of the Government Center near Fraze. These next-level, fast-charging stations will only require 30 minutes to charge a

vehicle. These stations are required to be within a mile or two of a main arterial road and must be within a half mile from shops or restaurants. Shops and schools are eligible to apply for stations on their own.

A fee of \$0.30 cents per kilowatt-hour will be charged to cover costs and to keep the line moving for drivers waiting to charge their vehicles. Both the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency, which provided grants for new stations across the state, and the installer recommended charging per kilowatt hour. The fees will help recover the costs of maintenance expenses for the equipment.



- **Kettering Recreation Complex:** The altafiber Wi-Fi network will feature 20 access points throughout the 152,000-square-foot facility that includes a lap pool, spa, ice arena, gymnasium, and meeting rooms. Completion date expected to be late 2022.
- **Delco Park:** The altafiber Wi-Fi network will feature 9 access points across the complex. Completion date expected to be late 2022.

"Our partnership with altafiber allows the City of Kettering to offer state-of-the-art technology to residents, visitors, and patrons," said Mark Schwieterman, Kettering's City Manager. "Connectivity is essential, and this collaboration will expand and enhance that capability."

altafiber has a long history and progressive experience in providing and managing large and complex wireline and wireless projects. As the leading supplier of fiber-based services in Greater Cincinnati, altafiber has invested more than \$1 billion into expanding its fiber network across the region.

altafiber is committed to building fiber beyond its traditional operating area. 



Mail Fraud Alert



Jurisdictions all over the country have recently seen an increase in check thefts from post office drop boxes, and Kettering has seen the same trend. In 2022, KPD

has responded to 12 incidents where a check was stolen from a USPS drop box, forged and used to purchase items or deposited for cash. If you use USPS to deliver your filled out checks, there are a few things you can do to protect yourself from becoming a victim. KPD suggests that instead of using the stand alone drop boxes, usually located in the parking lot of most USPS location, walk your check inside the post office and drop your mail with an employee. Once a check is in the mail, consider tracking the transaction through your bank to ensure that the check was deposited for the appropriate amount and by the intended person/company. If a check never reaches the intended party, is deposited for the wrong amount or by the wrong person, please contact KPD at 937-296-2555 to report the incident.

Congratulations to Firefighter/Paramedic A.J. Bacon who was named 2021 Firefighter of the Year. Firefighter/Paramedic A.J. Bacon came to the Kettering Fire Department from the Dayton Fire Department in 2017.

The following nomination was submitted by a fellow firefighter:

Throughout his five years here at the Kettering Fire Department (KFD), FF/P A.J. Bacon has demonstrated knowledge and experience in the fire service with great passion and dedication. FF/P Bacon has continually been instrumental in teaching and preparing trainings in multiple disciplines in the fire service here at KFD. FF/P Bacon has demonstrated the characteristics needed to be considered for this distinguished award. He is early to work, dedicated, knowledgeable and always has a ready-to-work attitude. FF/P Bacon has been a fire instructor for many years both here at KFD and Sinclair Community College. He is always ready to have meaningful conversations regarding the fire service any time of the day, sometimes late in the night at the firehouse kitchen table.

Many firefighters, including me, consider A.J. a mentor, which says a lot about his character. Any time, on shift or not, I can call him with questions or advice and he is always prepared to answer or assist in any way. Not only does he give instruction or advice to fellow firefighters, he is also not afraid to ask the same of his fellow firefighters. This says a lot about how he strives to be the best firefighter he can be. Some of his duties include: Region 3 Strike Team, Fire Instructor, Fire Investigator and hydraulics instructor. FF/P Bacon has been instrumental in the testing and future implementation of an improved high rise load. He continually expresses passion, love and dedication for this job and the Kettering Fire Department. He is deserving of this great award.

A.J. has received letters of recognition for his work on a trench collapse in Sugarcreek Township and for his actions on a RTA bus crash, both in 2019. Also, in 2019 A.J. was the recipient of the department's Life Saving Award.

Fire Hydrant Inspections

KFD will be inspecting half of the fire hydrants in Kettering this summer. During these inspections, hydrants will be checked for any damage or defects. Also, KFD members will be flowing water from these hydrants to help ensure that they will operate effectively in the event of a fire.

This water flow could disrupt sediment within the water delivery system causing a brown discoloration of the water. This discoloration poses no threat to health or safety although, these deposits could discolor laundry. We suggest residents

check the clarity of their water prior to washing laundry. If brown water is observed, simply run cold water until it clears. Residents are being asked to wash clothing after 5:30 p.m. Monday thru Friday or anytime Saturday or Sunday to avoid the risk of stains caused by brown water. If clothing becomes discolored it is suggested to wash clothing again using a rust removing detergent prior to drying.

The Code Red community alert system will be used to inform residents when hydrants will be inspected in their area. Residents will be given at least 24 hours of notice prior to inspections. Kettering residents are encouraged to sign up to receive these notifications by visiting the City of Kettering website at www. ketteringoh.org/code-red-emergency-incident-community-alerts/. Tornado Sirens

The City of Kettering owns and operates nine disaster warning sirens located throughout the city limits. These sirens emit two types of warnings, constant and Hi-Lo tones. The constant or nonoscillating tone is used for disaster (i.e. tornado warning) and the Hi-Lo tone for civil defense issues. An operational test of these sirens is conducted at Noon on the first Monday of each month. Here are a few common questions we receive concerning these sirens.

Will you activate them again for the "All Clear"?

No, it is assumed that you will tune into local emergency broadcasts for further information. During an emergency of long duration (i.e. long storm), they may be activated more than once.

When I am indoors, the sirens do not seem loud enough, can you turn them up?

No. The siren warning system is designed to notify people outdoors of impending danger in order to seek shelter.

The siren near my house is very loud, can you turn it down?

No. Each siren covers a specific area; if you live close to one it will be louder to you than someone further away. If we turn them down, citizens that live farther away may not hear.

The 13 entrepreneurs who participated in the program represented a variety of industries from restaurant/food service to financial planning and personal services like hair care and spa treatments. Get ready to see these businesses doing great things throughout Kettering by opening new locations or expanding services at their current sites.

This Technical Business Series was designed to help residents overcome challenges with opening or operating a business. This educational initiative was offered in conjunction with a Minority Business Micro-Enterprise Grant program that the City created to help historically disadvantaged racial minority groups obtain business capital.


which is defined as a business with five or fewer employees, one of whom is the owner of the business. Eligibility

is also contingent upon income limits. See chart for details.

The technical series included sessions on writing a business plan; working with City Staff; attracting funding sources and hearing from minority business owners on how to succeed. All sessions were presented by local experts from the Small Business Administration, Small Business Development Center, Minority Business Partnership and City of Kettering Staff.

In addition, those who completed the entire series will receive a paid one-year membership to the Kettering-Moraine-Oakwood Chamber of Commerce and will receive an additional 15 points added to any City of Kettering business loan or grant application.

When the good news came that she was cancer free, Chloe, again, found a way to pay it forward. Chloe received blood transfusions during her treatments. When she learned about the critical need for blood due to shortages, she responded by helping to organize blood drives. Parks, Recreation and Cultural Arts Projects are Still Going Strong

We kicked off 2022 by announcing a number of long-anticipated projects. It was a busy spring as these needed upgrades to our parks and facilities got underway. Here's what we've completed so far:

At Rosewood Arts Center, the newly renovated north wing of the building includes a new main entrance, a lobby area with an adjacent administrative suite, and a relocated gallery and youth arts studios. These areas are expected to open by the end of the summer.

The youth arts studio continues Rosewood's tradition of offering quality visual arts programs with more space for our activities, plus new furniture and finishes. Rosewood Gallery will continue to serve contemporary artists from across the country with new exhibition systems, as well as foster art appreciation in all audiences. The gallery's exhibitions and programming remain free and open to everyone!

Phase 2 of the Rosewood renovation will include relocating and upgrading the ceramics classrooms and studio program, offering participants additional space, equipment and opportunity for creativity. A specialized metals and glass studio are also underway and will include equipment for soldering, lampworking and more.

The Rosewood Arts Center upgrades are being carried out in phases to create as little disruption as possible to Rosewood's

programs and patrons. The facility remains open for business with classes and programs ongoing.

The landscaping for the new Ridgeway Road Bridge and at Lincoln Park Civic Commons continues. At Lincoln Park Civic Commons, the first phase of installation, which includes raised landscape beds, is well underway and is expected to be finished before the Fraze season kicks off.

The landscape design is also coming to life at the Ridgeway Road Bridge with anticipated completion by early summer.

Have you heard that our J.F. Kennedy Park pickleball courts are getting a major upgrade this summer? The courts will remain under construction for the summer for resurfacing, new fencing, and expansion from six courts to twelve courts total. Groundbreaking on the project is planned for early June. These upgrades were made possible in part by the support of community members through the Kettering Parks Foundation, as well as through the generosity of the Lathrem family.

Beavertown Cemetery is also getting some love with the entire driveway path currently being repaved! This project is ongoing, and we anticipate the cemetery to reopen by June.

We hope you'll stop by this summer to see our progress and enjoy the brand-new facilities and landscapes we've created for you to enjoy!
