

Leaf Collection Begins October 17!



One of the most unique and highly valued services the City of Kettering offers residents is free curbside collection of leaves each fall. Leaves are picked up by City crews and taken to the City's leaf composting center where leaves will be converted to mulch and compost, then offered free of charge to residents each spring. The City will begin in District 1 on Monday, October 17, and will continue leaf pickup until early December. Please note that all leaves should be raked to the curb by Monday, November 28, for the final pass for fall collection.

Please remember the following tips for leaf pickup:

 Know your leaf collection district. Reference the above map to find your district or visit www.ketteringoh.org and enter your address in the My Services tab on our home page.

 Don't wait until our crews are near your district to rake leaves. As leaves begin to fall, rake piles to the edge of your lawn.
 We will make several passes through each district for collection. Call 937-296-3255 (FALL), check the Kettering website or follow us on Facebook to determine the current location of leaf pickup crews.

Prior to collection, rake your leaves to the edge of your lawn, but not into the street where they will block traffic and cause a hazard to storm drains. Do not block storm drains or waterways.

- · Do not bag your leaves.
- Make sure leaves are not under, between or around parked cars.
- Don't rake anything except leaves to the curb for pickup. Branches, sticks, grass and other yard waste clog the machinery and throw the crews off schedule. Leaf piles containing branches, grass, etc., will not be collected. You may take your tree branches and brush to the City's Yard Debris Drop-Off Center

located on Woodman Center Drive or put them in your Rumpke cart for pickup on your normal trash collection day.

FEMA Flood Mapping Updates

Summary

FEMA is updating flood mapping documents in Montgomery County, including the City of Kettering. The FEMA mapping documents for the portion of Kettering in Greene County were completed this past spring. The maps and related information are used to reduce flood impact and to assign risk for insurance purposes. The primary impact to certain Kettering property owners will be potential development restrictions and possible requirement of flood insurance by mortgage companies. The specific documents updated are the Flood Insurance Study and Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs).

Constanting Watershed Line Watershed

Explanation

Kettering drains in two directions: to the Great Miami River on the west and to the Little Miami River on the east. The Great Miami Watershed is under study, and maps may be updated in the next several years. The Little Miami Watershed has been studied, and final maps will become effective on October 27, 2022.


The new maps were created using more advanced and accurate technology to determine the land form. The analysis identifies waterways and projected elevations during flood events. The four key technical terms when evaluating flood maps are floodplain, floodway, flood fringe and base flood elevation.

The floodway can be understood as a waterway swelling up to overflow the banks. Development in the floodway is essentially prohibited by the City's Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance.

The floodplain can be understood as the area where stormwater overtops the banks of the waterway, including the floodway, and floods the surrounding lowlands as shown in the graphic below. The flood fringe portion of the floodplain is an essential part of the waterway that stores substantial amounts of water until the flood waters recede. The floodplain is determined by identifying a storm of certain magnitude (a severity of storm with a one percent chance of happening in any one year) and then calculating the anticipated height of flood waters—the base flood elevation. To determine this storm event, historical storm information is applied with the intensity and duration of the precipitation. The term 100-year storm was previously used, but this nomenclature has been abandoned by FEMA due to confusion on the perceived frequency of significant flooding events.

Development in the flood fringe is permitted with the restrictions that it will neither cause a substantial negative impact to the flow of flood waters nor cause significant damage to a structure.

Characteristics of a Floodplain



To protect their investment, mortgage companies typically require flood insurance for properties with structures in the floodplain. The rates for flood insurance vary by risk. To put this in perspective, the average cost for flood insurance in Ohio is \$1,099 per year. For properties in low-risk areas, the cost can be as low as \$200 per year.

Kettering participates in the National Flood Insurance Program Community Rating System. This effort reduces risk for flood damage and, in return, qualifies property owners for discounts on flood insurance.

The maps, which were created with more accurate information and modeling techniques, show modified floodway and floodplain areas for certain neighborhoods in Kettering. Some properties that were not previously shown in the floodplain will be soon, and vice versa. If a property is newly classified in the floodplain, the property owner may wish to hire a surveyor to determine the lowest adjacent grade at the structure and compare that to the base flood elevation. If the lowest adjacent grade is higher than the base flood elevation, the property owner would typically apply to FEMA for a Letter of Map Amendment (LOMA). Upon receiving the approved LOMA, a mortgage company is likely to waive its requirement for flood insurance. The property owner can still obtain flood insurance, but likely at a reduced rate.

If an owner does not have a mortgage or other type of loan against the property, then flood insurance may not be immediately required if it is located within the floodplain. However, when the owner goes to sell the property or attempts to obtain an equity loan from a bank, obtaining flood insurance would likely be a condition of the mortgage or loan.

FEMA has requested Kettering assist with communicating this map updating process to the community and particularly impacted property owners who may not be aware of the flood hazard to their structures.

Engineering (937-296-2436) and Planning and Development (937-296-2441) staff regularly assist property owners with flood plain concerns and will continue to do so as the new flood maps become effective. A similar update to the FEMA flood maps last occurred for Montgomery County and Kettering in 2005.

To research flood risk at a specific property, go to msc.fema.gov/portal/search.

Shopping for Electric

Since June 1, we have all added the increase in electricity rates to our list of worries. Because Ohio is a de-regulated state, every utility goes to auction annually. As the 2022 auction closed for AES Ohio, we learned rates would increase as a result. The City of Kettering has been working to mitigate the potential financial impact this could have on residents.

In anticipation of the news that AES intended to increase their rates, the City of Kettering immediately began looking into alternatives to help residents. We are currently exploring the benefits of using larger buying power by partnering with surrounding municipalities to negotiate a better energy price for residents. We are cautious in our search to ensure the terms and conditions attached to these alternatives are beneficial, as well. Always remember to read the fine print.

For now, we encourage residents to research electric suppliers to find the one most suitable for

their needs. The Apples-to-Apples resource from the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio can help you compare prices between providers. Please visit energychoice. ohio.gov/ApplesToApplesCategory. aspx?Category=Electric to get started. Meanwhile, be assured that the City of Kettering has made this a top priority, and is working with surrounding communities to find the resource that will best serve everyone. Kettering Residents Benefit from City's Partnership with Day Air Credit Union

More than 31 Kettering residents have benefited from two programs the City implemented in partnership with Day Air Credit Union to help residents achieve affordable homeownership and also complete home rehab improvements.

First-Time Homebuyer Assistance Program

Under the First-Time Homebuyer Assistance Program, renters and low to moderate income households can reduce the financial burden of obtaining their first home. The program provides up to 10% down payment and cover closing costs up to \$20,000 when paired with a Day Air Mortgage product. Day Air has agreed to provide special financing and terms for the remainder of the program.

Elom Dossa – pictured here with Mayor Lehner – was one of the first participants in the program when she closed on her new home this past February; since then, 14 additional applicants have taken advantage of this program.





Home Improvement Assistance Program

Program funds can be put toward a large list of exterior and interior home improvements as approved by the City of Kettering. Kettering residents utilizing this program will get a special low rate home improvement loan from Day Air in addition to a forgivable loan of 40%, up to \$20,000.

Mail Fraud Alert



Jurisdictions all over the country have recently seen an increase in check thefts from post office drop boxes, and Kettering has seen the same trend. In 2022, KPD

has responded to 45 incidents where a check was stolen from a USPS drop box, forged and used to purchase items or deposited for cash. If you use USPS to deliver your filled out checks, there are a few things you can do to protect yourself from becoming a victim. KPD suggests that instead of using the stand alone drop boxes, usually located in the parking lot of most USPS location, walk your check inside the post office and drop your mail with an employee. Once a check is in the mail, consider tracking the transaction through your bank to ensure that the check was deposited for the appropriate amount and by the intended person/company. If a check never reaches the intended party, is deposited for the wrong amount or by the wrong person, please contact KPD at 937-296-2555 to report the incident.

KPD's Newest Emergency Response Vehicle

With the help of Miami Valley Communications Council, member cities including Kettering, Oakwood, Moraine, Centerville, West Carrollton, Miamisburg, Springboro and Germantown, welcomed the arrival of the Lenco BearCat G3, the newest member of the Kettering Regional Special Response Team's vehicle fleet. This armored vehicle will help ensure the safety of the regional SWAT team members and the citizens in the communities they serve. The BearCat G3 provides Lenco's proven armor system in a ruggedized, offroad platform. The G3 utilizes the same body design, interior features and tactical options as the G2, but it comes standard with a heavier duty upgraded suspension and off-road tires, rims and run flats to provide enhanced off-road performance. The increased ground clearance and robust suspension allows for emergency response in rural regions and natural disaster scenarios where standard armored SWAT vehicles would experience challenges.



Fire Prevention Week

Fire Prevention Week is October 9-15, 2022.

This year's campaign is "Fire Won't Wait. Plan Your Escape™". It works to educate everyone about simple but important actions they can take to keep themselves and those around them safe from home fires.

Today's homes burn faster than ever. You may have as little as two minutes (or even less time) to safely escape a home fire from the time the smoke alarm sounds. Your ability to get out of a home during a fire depends on early warning from smoke alarms and advance planning.

It is important for everyone to plan and practice a home fire escape. Everyone needs to be prepared in advance, so that they know what to do when the smoke alarm sounds. Given that every home is different, every home fire escape plan will

Have a plan for everyone in the home. Children, older adults and people with disabilities may need assistance to wake up and get out. Make sure that someone will help them!

Smoke alarms sense smoke well before you can, alerting you to danger. Smoke alarms need to be in every bedroom, outside of the sleeping areas (like a hallway) and on each level (including the basement) of your home. Do not put

smoke alarms in your kitchen or bathrooms.


Choose an alarm that is listed with a testing laboratory, meaning it has met certain standards for protection.

For the best protection, use combination smoke and carbon monoxide alarms that are interconnected throughout the home. These can be installed by a qualified electrician, so that when one sounds, they all sound. This ensures you can hear the alarm no matter where in your home the alarm originates.



- Draw a map of your home. Show all doors and windows.
- ☐ Visit each room. Find two ways out.
- All windows and doors should open easily. You should be able to use them to get outside.
- ☐ Make sure your home has smoke alarms. Push the test button to make sure each alarm is working.
- Pick a meeting place outside. It should be in front of your home. Everyone will meet at the meeting place.
- Make sure your house or building number can be seen from the street.
- Talk about your plan with everyone in your home.
- Make sure everyone in your home knows how to dial 911 or your local emergency number.
- Practice your home fire drill!
- Make your own home fire escape plan using the grid provided on page 2.

Recreational Fires

Recreational fires are permitted in the City of Kettering. However, these fires must meet a few criteria to prevent unfriendly fires or a neighborhood nuisance. All of these requirements can be found in the Ohio Administrative Code 1301:7-7-03.

- Permission must be received from the owner of the property where the recreational fire is taking place.
- · Recreational fires shall not be conducted within 25 feet of a structure or combustible material.
- If the fire is contained in an approved container such as an outdoor fireplace, barbecue pit, etc., the fire must be at least 15 feet from a structure or combustible materials.
- Fire shall be constantly attended until the fire is extinguished. A portable fire extinguisher with a minimum of a 4A rating or garden hose, bucket of sand or other suitable means for extinguishing the fire must be provided.
- · The total fuel area shall not exceed three feet in diameter or two feet in height.
- Fuel shall only consist of clean dry firewood. (No yard waste or rubbish materials or prohibited materials defined by the Ohio Administrative Code may be burned at any time).
- · Fire shall not create an offensive or objectionable situation to neighboring property owners.

Kettering Businesses Awarded Micro-Enterprise Grants

The City of Kettering's Community Development Division has awarded grants to four Kettering business owners as part of the Minority Business Micro-Enterprise Grant program. Applications continue to be accepted for eligible businesses at this time, with eligibility criteria expected to be expanded later this fall.

Grants were awarded to Lopez & Associates, which provides IT services; Jolorah's Beauty which provides luxury hair extensions and custom hair color services and products; DFL Nutrition, which offers açaí bowls, meal replacement shakes, cold pressed juice, energy boosters and vegan snacks; and Mackbrand Clothing, an online shop for t-shirts, hats, hoodies and jogger sets.

According to Angela Rahman, the City's Community Development Manager, the grant recipients can use the funding for

business equipment, inventory, necessary fixed assets, marketing and business promotion or other necessary business improvements.

To be eligible for the grant, applicants must be: located in Kettering; a registered taxpayer and current on their tax payments; and a designated microenterprise which is defined as a business with five or fewer employees, one of whom is the owner of the business. Eligibility is also contingent upon income limits (see chart for details) and the businesses location having no property maintenance violations.

Due to strong interest in this program, the City will continue to accept applications from eligible minority-owned businesses at this time and then also expand the program later to include eligible women-owned businesses, veteran-owned businesses and disabled-owned businesses.

Ten Years Later: How the Wilmington Pike Improvement Plan Drives

Investment in Kettering

If you're traveling in Kettering to shop, dine, work or even run a quick errand, it's likely that Wilmington Pike will be part of your commute. This important commercial corridor stretches four miles throughout our city, linking travelers to various amenities not only in Kettering, but to our neighboring communities like Dayton and Centerville, making this corridor one of the most heavily traveled in all of Montgomery County.

More than ten years ago, City leaders noticed disinvestment along Wilmington Pike and decided it was time to act. Some sections of this corridor had poor land values, undesirable property appearances, vacancies and were home to low-rent businesses. In August of 2012, the City formed a committee of business owners, City Council and Planning Commission members, and city staff to come up with a plan to reverse the disinvestment. Chartered as the Wilmington Pike Improvement Committee, this group was tasked with coming up with a plan to spark redevelopment and encourage economic development.

While there is still more work to do, since that first meeting over 10 years ago, Kettering has seen some success as a result of this initiative.

The first major investment came through the City's capital improvement program, as street improvements, improved pedestrian and bike path connections, new street lights and landscaping were added to the corridor. The City also demolished old buildings that had outlived their utility, taking down sites like the former Wonder Bread bakery and Crawdaddies Pub. The demolition of these lots made way for vacant lots at 3701 and 3613 Wilmington Pike, sites that are owned by the City and available to be purchased and developed. City leaders are optimistic that these properties will be developed soon, as the City has received a number of inquiries that would work well on those sites.

The Wilmington Pike Improvement Committee also enacted policies to incentivize the private sector to re-invest in properties. Known as a "public-private partnership", the grant programs reimburse property owners with a City grant to offset the cost of improvements made to their properties.

The Wilmington Pike Demolition Program, provides funding to commercial and residential property owners to assist in the demolition of structures and clearance of

sites to be redeveloped or to remove nonconforming structures or blight. Property owners can enter into an agreement with the City and be reimbursed for up to 50 percent of the demolition cost, up to \$25,000.

Meanwhile, the Wilmington Pike Façade and Site Improvement Plan, which is available for exterior building façade or site improvements to bring buildings and site into conformance with the Kettering Zoning Code. Commercial and residential land owners are eligible to be reimbursed for up to 50 percent of improvement costs, up to \$25,000.

Numerous businesses and property owners have taken advantage of the Façade & Site Improvement grant program over the past ten years including:

In some cases, City grant funds have sparked additional investment. Kettering has seen construction of new projects along Wilmington Pike, such as the Dayton Metro Library location, the Key Terrace Apartments, and renovations to buildings like Sky Asian and others.


Neighborhood Pride Program

Three Fairmont High School students, chosen from a pool of 21 applicants from across the Miami Valley, apprenticed with Gagnet and helped to paint the mural. The apprentices were Fairmont High School 2022 graduates Yara Chaouali and Haley Franklin and rising senior Lily Rueckhaus.

Gagnet is an artist and mural painter with over a decade of experience. Her notable murals are numerous and include commissioned works with the Levitt Pavilion, the Downtown Dayton Partnership, ArtWorks Cincinnati, and the Gem City Market.

Rueckhaus enjoyed: "Learning about the process involved in painting a mural, overcoming my fear of ladders, and learning to paint with a broken elbow. It was really great to see professional artists at work, since that is the field I want to pursue in the future. Both were amazing to work with! I am really grateful to be a part of this group and work on this project!"

"Working on this mural has been an amazing experience!" Chaouali agreed. "It feels really great to be able to contribute and do something for everyone in the City of Kettering. The constant encouragement of people going into Rosewood made this all worth it. I never

I am so grateful to have had this opportunity and experience, and can't wait to see it with the completed renovation of Rosewood!"

"The connection to the community the mural brought was a great experience," Franklin said. "It was so cool to see people walk by and watch us, encourage us and our work ethic, and the mailman who would stop by every single day and watch us paint. Some of the younger campers who would leave during the day loved watching us paint. The coolest memory was when Atalie asked a little boy, who sat with his grandma and watched us for a while, if he would like to help. Now let me tell you, seeing his face light up painting a yellow square was so heartwarming to The mural was officially completed on Thursday, June 30, 2022! The mural is titled 'Blooming through the Waves' and was named by Chaouali. "...I feel like it encompasses both parts of the wave and the flowers. It shows the flowers blooming through the colorful waves," she said. "... like the flowers bloomed in the waves despite the adversity it faced. Kind of like a community together." Everyone who has passed through Rosewood's doors since has enjoyed its colorful, vibrant presence. Landscaping and site cleanup will take place throughout the next few months. During this time, Rosewood will also be preparing for Phase II of the renovation process.
