## **2023 Construction Projects**

#### Resurfacing of Wilmington Pike (Stroop to Beaverton) and Woodman Drive (Wilmington to Stocker)

Kettering was awarded federal funds (\$593,000 and \$465,000, respectively) to assist in resurfacing the asphalt pavement on these busy thoroughfares.

#### Curb, Sidewalk and Drive Approach Repair Program

The first of two phases of work in Newcom Knolls begins this year. The construction includes repair to concrete curb, sidewalk and drive approaches, as well as resurfacing of the asphalt pavement.



#### Asphalt Overlay Program

Asphalt resurfacing will be performed on the following streets: Southern Boulevard (Stroop Road to Big Hill Road), Patterson Road (Dayton to Woodman Drive) and Hempstead Station Drive (Stroop Road to David Road). Sections of several neighborhoods, including Van Buren and south of Walther Park, will be resurfaced, as well.





#### **CenterPoint Gas Main Replacements**

CenterPoint is planning gas main replacement projects in Kettering this coming year. Because the work involves restoration of pavement and yards, Kettering requires CenterPoint's contractor to obtain permits for each location of work in the right-of-way.

#### Golf Club Estates – Phase 1 ⊢

Kettering is coordinating with Montgomery County Environmental Services and CenterPoint Energy to make significant infrastructure investments north of Kettering Medical Center. Both Montgomery County and CenterPoint will be replacing water and gas lines, respectively. When that work is complete, Kettering will replace bottleneck storm sewer sections to alleviate roadway flooding. The work will also include repair to curb, sidewalk and drive approaches (by assessment), as well as resurfacing of the asphalt pavement surface.



#### Concrete Repair Program

Windemere, a concrete street, will see continued repairs in Phase 2 this year. Deteriorating medians on Research Boulevard are being replaced ahead of a future resurfacing project.

# **Capital Improvement Projects**

The City of Kettering Engineering Department manages the implementation of the Capital Improvement Program (CIP) as it relates to streets, drainage, sidewalks and bridges. The proposed 2023 CIP outlay is \$10.5 million, of which \$2.4 million will be funded by outside grants and reimbursements.

### Time to Winterize!

### **Portable Generator Tips**

Ice storms and heavy snow falls can cause downed utility lines that can lead to power outages. Portable generators are a temporary solution to power your refrigerator or freezer to keep foods safe. It's important to know that portable generators emit carbon monoxide (CO), a poisonous, deadly gas.

#### Use these tips to avoid CO exposure:

- Do not use a portable generator in an attached garage, even with the door open.
- Use portable generators outdoors in wellventilated areas at least 20 feet from all doors, windows and vent openings. Direct exhaust away from any openings.
- Make sure to install carbon monoxide alarms in your home. Follow manufacturer's instructions for correct placement and mounting height. Visit www.ketteringoh. org/fire-prevention/ for more information and tips.
- Do not refuel a generator while it is hot. Turn off the generator and let it cool down before refueling.
- Waterproofing Your Home

- Store fuel for the generator in a container that is intended and labeled as such. Store the containers outside of the building.
- When plugging in items, make sure they are plugged directly into the generator or a heavy duty outdoor-rated extension cord. Check cords for cuts, tears and that the plug has all three prongs.
- Generator outlets and should have groundfault circuit-interrupter protection for personnel identified for portable use.

Portable generator exhaust is toxic and deadly. If you can smell it, you are inhaling it.

#### Avoid Freezing Water Lines

Extreme cold can cause water pipes in your home to freeze and sometimes burst. When extreme cold is expected some tips on keeping you water lines flowing:

- Leave water lines flowing with a slight drip.
- Make sure the spaces near pipes are warm – such as opening the doors under kitchen sinks.
- If your pipes do freeze thaw them slowly with a hair drier.
- In an emergency —if no other water is available— snow can be melted for water. Bringing water to a rolling boil for one minute will kill any organisms present, but won't remove pollutants sometimes found in snow.



Take a look at the outside of your house and look for areas that need caulking. Polyurethane caulking is a good choice for sealing your home from drafts and leaks to save energy, as well as keeping out the elements. Locations include: gutter and downspout seams, plumbing and furnace vent pipes, flashing seams between roof and siding, around door and window frames, along siding joints, around dryer vents and at wire entrances.

Check that your gutters and downspouts are clean and getting water away from your home. Water can cause a lot of damage if left unchecked.

Take a look at your doors and windows for weather stripping that needs to be replaced or repaired.

Check your furnace. Along with periodic maintenance and changing the filter, consider having a qualified repair person inspect the fuel lines, safety items and burners. Your utility may also offer this service.

## Medicare Open Enrollment

Medicare is a complex program that offers older Americans and disabled persons medical insurance at retirement or when they can no longer work due to their disability. Like all federal programs, there are many rules and regulations governing the system causing enrollment to be confusing. Having a professional that understands the system can help you get the most out of your Medicare.

Individuals approaching 65 should start considering Medicare. The initial enrollment period is three months before your birth month, your birth month and three months after the year you turn 65. If you do not enroll during that time, you will pay penalties for the months that you do not sign up unless you have coverage from your employer or your spouse's employer.

Even after you are initially enrolled in Medicare, the choices continue to change. Each year, Medicare plans can change, and it is important that you know what changes have been made and how they affect you. The annual open enrollment period is October 15 through December 7. During this period, beneficiaries may change their Medicare plans for the coming year to keep up with those changes. Your health care needs change from year to year, and it is important to make appropriate changes during open enrollment to suit your needs for the following year. With hundreds of choices, it is even more important to seek help from someone who knows those changes.

> You can schedule your individual consultation with a Medicare-trained professional at the Kettering Connection during open enrollment. These appointments are free and open to Kettering residents, Kettering volunteers and Lathrem Center members only. Appointments will be scheduled on a first-come, first-serve basis. The staff will follow all CDC precautions to prevent the spread of COVID-19, and video or phone counseling sessions are also available.

### **Mail Fraud Continues**



Jurisdictions all over the country continue to see an increase in check thefts from post office drop boxes, and Kettering is experiencing the same activity. In

2022, KPD has responded to 54 incidents where a check was stolen from a USPS drop box, forged and used to purchase items or deposited for cash. If you use USPS to deliver your filled out checks, there are a few things you can do to protect yourself from becoming a victim. KPD suggests that instead of using the stand alone drop boxes, usually located in the parking lot of most USPS location, walk your check inside the post office and drop your mail with an employee. Once a check is in the mail, consider tracking the transaction through your bank to ensure that the check was deposited for the appropriate amount and by the intended person/company. If a check never reaches the intended party, is deposited for the wrong amount or by the wrong person, please contact KPD at 937-296-2555 to report the incident.

## Candles



December is the peak time of year for home candle fires. Nearly one-third of home candle fires started in the bedroom. You can follow these tips below to reduce the risk for a candle fire in your home.

- Blow out all candles when you leave the room or go to bed. Avoid the use of candles in the bedroom and other areas where people may fall asleep.
- Keep candles at least 12 inches away from anything that can burn.
- Use candle holders that are sturdy, and won't tip over easily.
- Put candle holders on a sturdy, uncluttered surface.
- Light candles carefully. Keep your hair and any loose clothing away from the flame.
- Don't burn a candle all the way down and put it out before it gets too close to the holder or container.
- Never use a candle if oxygen is used in the home.
- Have flashlights and battery-powered lighting ready to use during a power outage. Never use candles in the event of a power outage.
- Never leave a child alone in a room with a burning candle. Keep matches and lighters up high and out of children's reach, in a locked cabinet.



### Carbon Monoxide

The Kettering Fire Department cannot emphasize enough the importance of having functioning carbon monoxide (CO) monitors in your home. Many people have heard of carbon monoxide but are not aware of what it is, how it affects you and what causes it. Carbon

monoxide is a colorless and odorless gas commonly referred to as the "silent killer". This gas is the result of incomplete combustion of fuels that are commonly used in households. Common sources of carbon monoxide include

all gas appliances (furnaces, ovens and water heaters), wood burning stoves and fire places. The effects of this gas on the human body include headache, weakness, lightheadedness, dizziness, confusion and long-term exposure may kill you. If any of these symptoms occur, please call 911 to have the department ensure that a carbon monoxide leak is not present. The Kettering Fire Department encourages everyone to include these detectors in their homes, as well as periodic maintenance to ensure they are in working order. detectors in

your homes and the upkeep of them. We recommend changing the batteries in your CO detectors twice per year — when it's time to change the clocks in the spring and fall. Also, you should test the detector monthly. If you currently do not have

one in your home, we suggest purchasing a combination detector at any local hardware or home improvement store which functions as a smoke detector and carbon monoxide detector all in one.

### **Space Heaters**

As we begin to feel the temperatures drop, we begin thinking of ways to heat our homes. One common method of heating is the use of space heaters. Here are just a few tips to keep in mind if you choose to use a space heater in your home.

- Keep things that burn at least three feet away from a space heater like blankets, furniture, clothes, pets and people.
- Plug heater directly into wall outlet, not an extension cord.
- Only use a heater with an automatic shut-off to ensure that the heater will turn off if it is tipped over.
- Turn heater off if you leave the room or go to sleep.





# **Brand New Spaces for 2023**

Ensuring that Kettering has a variety of sites and office space available for businesses that want to grow or locate here will continue to be a priority for City Council and staff in 2023. And because the City is fortunate to be the home of two premier business parks, we expect to see continued private sector investment next year and beyond.

Miami Valley Research Park (MVRP) remains an attractive location for business thanks to the new ownership and rebranding of our office buildings along Research Drive now known as Sixth River. And with the revitalization of the building at 1900 Founders Drive, the City now has new inventory of Class A office space available. The 1900 Founders Drive project was partially funded through incentives provided by the City of Kettering and JobsOhio and will be a key location for organizations that need guick access to Wright-Patterson Air Force Base. There are also vacant parcels of land still available at MVRP for companies that need to build based on specific requirements.

# **Greenmont Village Turned 80!**

Earlier this year, Mayor Peggy Lehner offered the City's congratulations to Greenmont Village in recognition of the community's 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary as a mutual housing corporation. The certificate was presented by Council Member Lisa Duvall during a ceremony held in the Greenmont

Village Event Hall & Community Center. The event also included State Representative Andrea White who presented a certificate of congratulations from the Ohio House of Representatives.

Greenmont Village a unique residential community of 137 acres with 500 units of various sizes, tucked into a serene neighborhood which borders on Woodman Drive, Forrer Boulevard, Patterson Road and Culver Avenue in east Kettering. The community has a variety of floor plans at affordable rates.

According to local historians, Greenmont Village was one of eight residential communities built by the Mutual Ownership Defense Housing Division in 1941-1942. The concept of these residential communities was facilitated by President Roosevelt's New Deal program in response

to the defense housing emergency in 1940.

The Kettering Business Park is also primed for additional investment in 2023. The business park – which is already home to various health care, research and logistics companies – has new renovated space available in the former Synchrony buildings. This site is currently under renovation and being marketed to potential tenants. In addition, 12 acres of City-owned land are still available for future development.



### Kettering Celebrates Its Manufacturers

Manufacturing is an important industry, especially in Ohio with our tradition for making things that make life easier (like a pull-tab can) and more enjoyable (imagine hot summer days without Freon).

National Manufacturing Day – held on the first Friday of October – is traditionally a day for manufacturers to open their doors and bring in students to foster interest in manufacturing careers. This year, the City of Kettering wanted to add a new twist by thanking our local manufacturers for their contributions in creating jobs and driving our economy.

Kettering is home to dozens of manufacturers in the aerospace, defense, medical, food production and automotive industries, among others. To thank them, on October 7, City staff delivered treat bags to more than 20 manufacturers and organizations that support manufacturing in our region. These businesses were located throughout the city and represented everything from very small tooling shops to international automotive parts suppliers.

# **Keeping Up With Kettering Businesses**

As 2022 draws to a close, Kettering congratulates the many business owners who opened their doors in our city this past year. Thanks to the entrepreneurs who chose Kettering as the location for their American dream, it was a banner year for ribbon-cuttings. The Mayor, City Council and staff participated in 13 ribbon cutting events so far in 2022, and we're hoping to add a few more to this total before the year officially comes to a close.

Connecting with local businesses – particularly new start-ups and small businesses – is an important aspect of the City's economic development efforts. This past year Kettering's Community Development and Economic Development Departments worked on a new program to provide new opportunities to reach our small businesses. The City implemented the Microenterprise Loan Program which featured classes, networking, and loans for microenterprises. More than 20 businesses participated in the business technical classes which featured topics on business plans, financing, opportunities for loans and grants and working with City staff. Meanwhile many small businesses were eligible for microenterprise grants and forgivable loans that allowed them to purchase supplies and equipment, update their facilities, market their company, and purchase inventory, among other investments.

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In another effort to reach out to our small businesses, the City partnered with Montgomery County to host a Business Walk in the area of Marshall and Stroop Roads in September. This event featured groups of city and county staff who made brief visits to businesses to find out more about their needs and offer information about local services.

The City hopes to build on these efforts in 2023, and is seeking new opportunities to highlight small businesses for their contributions to our City.
