### **Proper Disposal of Yard Debris**

Yard debris, including leaves and other organic plant materials like shrubbery trimmings and grass clippings, is a significant source of stormwater pollution and should be disposed of properly. Please consider the following options when disposing of your yard debris.

Rumpke Regular Trash Collection	Yard debris is collected by Rumpke along with your regular household trash. Simply place your yard debris in your trash cart for collection on your regular service day. Yard debris must fit inside your cart and does not need to be bagged. Rumpke will not collect separate bags or bundles of yard debris left next to your carts unless it is in Rumpke overage bags. Extra carts are also available from Rumpke. For further information about Rumpke's program, please call 1-800-828-8171.		
Montgomery County Yard Debris	Clean, separated organic material in loose/bulk form or in paper yard bags is accepted. Any yard waste in plastic bags or mixed in with trash will be charged a disposal fee.

### A Note from the City Manager

This spring, all registered voter households in the city of Kettering will receive a postcard in the mail that lists salary and benefit information for a small number of City of Kettering employees.

An amendment to the City Charter requires that in odd numbered years, the City must create a document that provides salary and

benefit information for the top, middle and lower 15 full time city employees by earnings; and, mail it to all registered voter households in Kettering. A group of Kettering residents secured enough petition signatures to place this amendment on the ballot, and Kettering voters approved it in November 2016.

Charter Section 10-12 states that the mailer "shall contain no other information or statements other than specifically provided for herein". In other words, the Charter amendment prohibits the City from providing any context to the figures on the postcard.

The figures used for the mandatory postcard represent total compensation, including employee salary, as well as benefits. Some employees rise to the

top of the earnings list as a result of overtime or retirement benefits, which are included in total compensation calculations.

It is important to me that the Kettering community knows that a complete and searchable database of salary information for ALL city employees--not just the handful on the postcard, as well as a searchable database of all city expenditures, is posted on the City's website at www.ketteringoh.org.

Many thanks to Kettering residents, businesses, school systems and employees for their dedication, compassion and love for this city. Together, we continue to persevere and support one another to remain a thriving community we are proud to call home. # Your 2022 City of Kettering Income Tax Return is Due on April 18, 2023

The Tax Division recently mailed the 2022 City of Kettering Income Tax postcard. In an effort to reduce costs related to paper, printing and postage, please note that **NO TAX FORMS WILL BE MAILED TO YOU.** Forms are available on our website at **www.ketteringoh.org**, or you may utilize one of the alternative filing methods described below. To avoid late filing fees, your 2022 return must be received in our office or postmarked by April 18, 2023.

#### **Who Must File**

All residents (including part-year residents) of the City of Kettering who are 18 years of age and older are required to file an annual income tax return. A return is required regardless of income or employment status. Please note: Active duty military personnel and individuals with no reportable income or loss for the current year <u>are still subject</u> to the mandatory filing requirements.

Non-residents earning income from which Kettering tax has not been withheld at the correct rate of 2.25% must file a return. Income includes salaries, wages, compensation or profits which result from work performed, services rendered, business transacted or activities located within the City of Kettering.

#### Exceptions to Mandatory Filing Requirement

Permanently retired or permanently disabled individuals with only non-taxable sources of income or loss (such as social security, pension, interest, and dividends) may file for a permanent exemption from the mandatory filing requirement by completing the Declaration of Exemption Return found on our website.

#### **Filing Methods**

There are several convenient options for filing your city income tax return. Electronic filing and fill-in forms are available on our website at **www.ketteringoh.org**.

Individuals with <u>only</u> wage income reported on Form W-2 are eligible to file electronically. All other individuals may utilize the fill-in forms.

Additionally, you may visit the Income Tax Division office, located at 3600 Shroyer Road, Kettering, OH 45429 to obtain forms or have your Kettering return prepared by one of our staff members. **This service is free of charge and no appointment is necessary**. Note that you must bring with you the required documentation referenced below in order for your return to be prepared. The Tax Division is unable to print information from your phones, laptops or other electronic devices.

#### **Required Documents**

As required under state law, the Federal Form 1040 must be attached to the City of Kettering Income Tax Return at the time of filing.

Additional supporting documentation that is required to be attached includes, but is not limited to, Form(s) W-2 (if applicable), Federal Schedules 1 and C, E, F or K-1, Form(s) 1099-Misc, Form(s) 1099-NEC and Form(s) W-2G.

Part-year residents should also include pay statements reflecting year-to-date figures relating to the period of time you resided within the City.

#### **Online Payment System**

An online payment system is available for the payment of tax balances, estimated tax payments and payment plan payments via electronic check, credit card or debit card. Please note, a convenience fee will be added to all credit and debit card payments.



# Spring Spruce Up Checklist



٦	Clear out landscape beds and put down fresh mulch. Mulch and compost are
	available free for Kettering residents in the spring at Indian Riffle Park.

- Trim trees and shrubs. Remember that they may not overhang sidewalks or streets. Remove overgrown and invasive shrubs. Yard debris may be placed in your Rumpke cart for collection on your regular trash day or it can be taken to the Yard Debris Center beginning March 6.
- Repair broken, cracked or deteriorated siding or trim.
- **Repaint areas with cracked and peeling paint.**
- Seal doors and windows to improve energy efficiency and prevent drafts.
- Check the roof for peeling or missing shingles and loose flashing.
- Check gutters and downspouts for debris. Repair any leaks or damage.
- Dispose of unlicensed or inoperable vehicles.
- Mow the grass and weed the landscaping on a regular basis. Grass must not exceed a height of 8".
- Regularly remove trash and yard debris and clean up after pets.
- Avoid erosion by seeding bare spots in the yard.
- Check fences and sheds, replace and repair broken or rotting sections.
   Repaint as necessary. Clean up areas along your property that are adjacent to public streets and alleys.
- Don't store household furniture or appliances outdoors. Keep items meant to be stored outdoors in a neat and orderly appearance.
- Replace or repair missing or damaged entry doors and garage overhead doors.
- Check hinges or latches on windows and doors to ensure they function properly.
- Check for loose or cracked mortar joints in brickwork.
- Make sure steps and walkways are in good condition, free from debris, cracks, holes and flaking concrete.
- Check house foundation and walls for cracks or breaks.
- Check windows and doors for broken glass, torn screens and deteriorated or loose frames, sills or sashes.

You should annually evaluate the condition of your property to identify needed repairs. A lot of money can be saved by correcting problems before they become major repairs.

If you need financial assistance with the cost of making repairs to your home in Kettering, we may be able help. The City of Kettering has programs to assist low and moderate income families with emergency repairs, minor repairs and comprehensive rehabs. To qualify, your household must meet established income limits; and, typically your home should have some built-up equity. 
### Kettering Amenities Help With Outdoor Cleanup!

The Kettering Yard Debris Center is open every Saturday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Beginning March 6, the facility will open Monday through Friday, 3-8 p.m. and Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Mulch and compost will be available April 10 depending on the composting process.

Spring leaf pickup will begin Monday, April 17, and crews will complete a single pass through the city. Residents should have their leaves at the curb prior to that date to ensure pickup. Leaves accumulated after spring pickup should be properly disposed with household trash, at the Yard Debris Center or taken to the Montgomery County Solid Waste site.

### **Permits Serve Important Purposes**

The City's building code carries out the laws that ensure structures in our community are safe and sanitary. In order to do this, City professionals will review building plans and construction projects. Below are a few examples demonstrating how these important disciplines come together to add an extra layer of health and safety to your dream project.



Architecture: Reviews structural items to prevent things like deck collapse, improper insulation causing higher energy costs and poor accessibility.



**Engineering:** Ensures that sites have adequate drainage for rainwater without negatively impacting neighboring properties.



**Plumbing:** Checks to make sure drains are installed correctly to prevent odors and flooding, as well as ensuring drain pipes are large enough to avoid water backups in basements.



Mechanical: Ensures heating and cooling systems provide adequate service to a space and are properly ventilated to release fumes. Gas lines are often checked for possible leaks, as well.

**Electrical:** Ensures there is adequate power for the needs of the structure, protective devices installed and properly installed wiring.



**Fire Prevention:** Ensures that "exit" lights work properly, fire alarms are functioning and extinguishers are charged and ready in case of an emergency.

### **Mail Theft Continues**



Jurisdictions all over the country continue to see an increase in check thefts from post office drop boxes, and Kettering is experiencing the same

activity. In 2022, KPD responded to 54 incidents where a check was stolen from a USPS drop box, forged and used to purchase items or deposited for cash. If you use USPS to deliver your filled out checks, there are a few things you can do to protect yourself from becoming a victim. KPD suggests that instead of using the stand-alone drop boxes usually located in the parking lot of most USPS location, walk your check inside the post office and drop your mail with an employee. Once a check is in the mail, consider tracking the transaction through your bank to ensure that the check was deposited for the appropriate amount and by the intended person/company. If a check never reaches the intended party, is deposited for the wrong amount or by the wrong person, please contact KPD at 937-296-2555 to report the incident.

### **Meritorious Service Award**

On August 2, 2022, crews were sent to Wilmington Pike and Imperial Avenue on a suspicious persons call. Officer Kim arrived first and located the subject. As he approached, he observed the subject stabbing himself in the neck with a knife and falling to the ground with life-threatening injuries. Officer Kim advised backup units of the extent of the situation and began applying pressure on the wound even as the subject resisted help. Officer McCoy arrived and utilized the medical bag in his cruiser and inserted a nasal pharyngeal airway while Officer Wager and Officer Browne assisted with care until medics arrived. The subject was transported to the hospital where he made a full recovery. The quick response by Officer Kim to immediately begin first aid after making the scene safe, even with resistance from the subject, and Officer McCoy's utilization of the medical equipment on which he was recently trained with the assistance from Officers Wager and Browne likely saved the subject's life.

# **Severe Weather Preparedness**

Severe thunderstorms and high winds can damage above ground power lines and turn unsecured objects into hazardous flying debris. Here are safety tips to follow before, during and after severe weather events.

#### **Before High Wind Event:**

- Secure all outdoor items like patio furniture, grills, trash cans, etc.
- Keep trees trimmed and free of weak or damaged limbs.

#### **During High Wind Event:**

- Remain in a protective structure away from windows and flying debris.
- Report any damaged wires from utility poles to AES-Ohio.
- Call 911 to report any fires or arcing wires.

#### After High Wind Event:

- Stay away from any wires that have fallen and report to AES-Ohio.
- Call 911 to report any fires or arcing wires.
- Treat any wires as if they are energized.
- Contact a licensed professional to clear any fallen or unstable trees or large limbs.



# **Tornado Sirens**

The City of Kettering owns and operates 9 disaster warning sirens located throughout the city limits. These sirens emit two types of warnings, constant and Hi-Lo tones. The constant or non-oscillating tone is used for disaster (i.e. tornado warning) and the Hi-Lo tone for civil defense issues. An operational test of these sirens is conducted at 12:00 p.m. on the first Monday of each month. Here are a few common questions we receive concerning these sirens.

### Will you activate them again for the "All Clear"?

No. Upon hearing the sirens, residents should tune into local emergency broadcasts for further information.

# **In Memoriam**

Members of the Kettering Fire Department announced with deepest regret and sorrow the line-of-duty death of Firefighter/ Paramedic Tracy Leach.

Tracy passed away on December 24, 2022, after succumbing to occupational cancer. Tracy served the Kettering Fire Department with distinction with more than 21 years of service. During an emergency of long duration (i.e. long storm), they may be activated more than once.

### When I am indoors, the sirens do not seem loud enough, can you turn them up?

No. The siren warning system is designed to notify people outdoors of impending danger in order to seek shelter.

### The siren near my house is very loud, can you turn it down?

No. Each siren covers a specific area; if you live close to one it will be louder to you than someone further away. If we turn them down, citizens that live farther away may not hear.





More than 1,600 times per year, Kettering Fire Department responds to an incident where someone has fallen. These falls can result in serious injury and even death. Many of these falls can be prevented by taking basic steps to de-clutter passage ways in the home. These passage ways could also serve as a means of egress in the event of a fire and guicker entry for fire department members in the event of an emergency. Excessive clutter also becomes additional fuel when a fire starts in a home. Below are a few basic steps you can take to eliminate potentially hazardous conditions in vour home.



• Keep hallway floors and stairs free of storage and clutter. It is recommended to maintain at least 36"-wide pathways through your home. This will allow an ambulance gurney to pass easily through the home in case of a medical emergency.

• Keep areas around doors or windows free of furniture or other items. Any of these openings could serve as emergency exits. Don't store anything behind a door that prevents it from opening fully.

• Keep bathroom and kitchen floors clear of clutter and loose rugs to prevent trips and falls.

• Do not store items that could burn next to heating equipment like a furnace, water heater, oven, or space heater.



### Internship Assistance for Kettering Export Businesses

The City of Kettering is looking to help match-up businesses that need exporting assistance with highly motivated college students who have taken export-focused coursework. If your business is interested in exporting your products, contact the City's Economic Development office for possible recommendation to the Ohio Export Internship Program. If your business is selected for this program, the Ohio Department of Development will place an intern at your company and provide 50 percent reimbursement for the intern's wages. This program is open to small to medium-sized businesses.

The program is a partnership between the Department of Development and various state-affiliated universities in Ohio. Internships will run from May to August 2023.

The internships have a track record of helping businesses achieve export success. According to the Department of Development, in the 12 years of the program, 411 student-company matches were created, resulting in 136 internship extensions, 69 new job positions, and 400 new international markets, distributors, or customers. The City would like to see Kettering businesses be a part of this successful initiative.

# **Energy Aggregation Update**

Kettering is among nearly 18 communities throughout the region taking measures aimed at providing residents better gas and electric rates through the power of collective negotiations.

As of June 1 2022, AES Ohio's price became 10.91 cents per kilowatt-hour (kWh), up from its "standard offer" price of 4.805 cents. A kilowatt-hour is how much energy you need to run a 1,000-watt appliance for an hour. A 100-watt bulb takes 10 hours to use a kilowatt-hour of energy. A 2,000-watt appliance takes 30 minutes.

Under aggregation, communities negotiate with suppliers on behalf of eligible households, nonprofits and small businesses to save money on bills by grouping together. Kettering residents and small business owners will have the opportunity to opt out of the program. Once legislation requirements are met and a quote and market rate is approved, Kettering residents and business owners will begin to receive information about the program. It is expected that those who participate will receive their first bill as part of the aggregation program in August 2023. It is important to note that the rates for electricity in an aggregation program are not guaranteed; but, the freedom to opt out of the program will be available.

As the City of Kettering continues to work with surrounding communities, we encourage residents to research electric suppliers to find the one most suitable for their needs. The Apples-to-Apples resource from the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio can help compare prices between providers. Please visit energychoice.ohio. gov to get started. We will report updates in our publications and on social media to keep you informed.

### Miami Valley Research Park Welcomes New Office Workers in 2023

The City of Kettering will see an influx of office workers at Miami Valley Research Park in 2023, thanks to a new project recently announced by Industrial Commercial Properties, which owns the 1900 Founders building. As was announced in late 2022, some civilian and active-duty employees from Wright-Patterson Air Force Base will soon be moving to the 1900 Founders building while on-Base remodeling of their current offices takes place.

The City of Kettering has been a partner in helping bring jobs to this site, offering an economic development grant for the construction of a parking lot at east end of the 1900 Founders building to accommodate the workers. JobsOhio previously offered a grant to assist with the remodeling of the building.

According to Kettering City Manager Matt Greeson, bringing more workers to Miami Valley Research Park provides two benefits to the city. Additional workers will bring more income tax revenue, but also new energy to the park. "We're excited to see this opportunity unfold and hope to see more tenants at Miami Valley Research Park in the future," Matt Greeson said.



## Seven Local Entrepreneurs Complete Kettering's Technical Business Series

The City of Kettering congratulates seven business owners who completed a four-week Technical Business Series in November 2022. Overall in 2022, the City provided \$101,553 in CDBG assistance to 10 historically disadvantaged microenterprise businesses during the spring and fall funding rounds. These entrepreneurs represent a variety of industries including childcare, restaurant/food preparation and personal services.

By participating in this four-week series, these business owners were able to submit early applications for the Microenterprise Forgivable Loan program.

According to Angela Rahman, Community Development Manager for the City of Kettering, this program often represents the first interaction these small businesses have with government agencies or funding resources. "This program allows qualified business owners to experience applying for funding right here in Kettering, and we provide the level of service to make it a positive, meaningful experience," she said.

Initial feedback from funding recipients demonstrates that this is the case. One participant stated, "I can't thank Kettering enough." City staff received a letter and hand-drawn picture from the son of another participant expressing his gratitude for the funding that helped with upgrades for his mother's Kettering studio. "Positive feedback, hand-drawn pictures and witnessing how invested these business owners are reconfirms the value of this program," Rahman said.

Another objective of the program is to help entrepreneurs grow their businesses and support job creation.

Those who completed the entire series also received a paid, oneyear membership to the Kettering-Moraine-Oakwood Chamber of Commerce. Membership in the Chamber will provide these business owners with year-round mentoring opportunities and cost-saving programs for their businesses.

# Come See the Fresh Look in Our PRCA Facilities and Parks

Last year was a busy year for Parks, Recreation and Cultural Arts! We're excited to have made significant progress on several major park and facility upgrades over the past year with much more on the horizon this coming spring.

Thanks to a generous donation from the Doug Lathrem family, the Charles I. Lathrem Senior Center has enjoyed some big improvements. The CIL is sporting comfy new furniture, upgraded technology, new restrooms, a swanky billiards room and many more interior updates. Further improvements are coming in 2023, including two new vans for our Senior Transportation Program and more changes to the building's interior.

The Rosewood Arts Center renovation made some major progress last year and remains in full swing. One of the most significant updates to Rosewood in 2022 was the opening of the new main entrance and parking lot. In addition, a new lobby, gallery, administrative suite, youth arts studio, dance studio and restrooms are now open. Renovations now underway include Rosewood's new ceramics, metals and glass studios, darkroom and community meeting room, scheduled to open in April and summer 2023. The renovation of the painting and drawing studios, theater, printmaking studios and artist spaces are scheduled for completion by fall 2023, with a celebration planned soon after!

The renovation of the J.F. Kennedy Park pickleball courts is also nearing completion. The project includes expanding the current six-court area to 12 courts. A shelter and new pathways to the courts from the park will be added as well. The courts are expected to be finished and ready for play this spring!

The renovations for the playground at Indian Riffle Park are also moving along. Based on the results of a community survey, we selected equipment for ages 2 through 5 and a variety of inclusive equipment for all ages.

Additional planned improvements for 2023 include parking lot and playground resurfacing at J.F. Kennedy Park and several paint updates throughout all of our parks. Updates are also planned for the outdoor area adjacent to the CIL, including an open lawn, gardens and

an open air shelter. We look forward to adding a variety of recreation options for the community with this renovation. Parks also plans to landscape the exterior lawn beds and front entrance of Rosewood, which will complete Phase 2 of the Rosewood renovation.
