KETTERING CITY COUNCIL REGULAR MEETING MINUTES January 24, 2023

The Council of the City of Kettering, Ohio, met in regular session on Tuesday, January 24, 2023, at 7:30 p.m. in Council Chambers at the Kettering Government Center South Building, 3600 Shroyer Road. Mayor Lehner presided and the Clerk of Council, LaShaunah D. Kaczynski, recorded. This meeting was telecast live on the cable access channel and streamed live at mvcc.net.

Council Members Absent: Duke (Excused)

Total Members Present: Six (6)

Mayor Lehner led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance and gave the invocation.

Mayor Lehner introduced the Miami Valley Communications Council TV Operator Mike Sopronyi. She thanked him for his assistance.

Mayor Lehner mentioned Mr. Duke has an excused absence.

Mayor Lehner called on Mr. Klepacz for a motion to amend the agenda.

Mr. Klepacz mentioned that at last night's Sister Cities Committee meeting a discussion was held concerning the planned agenda resolution item number twelve. Last week, Al Fullenkamp who is the chairperson of the Sister Cities Committee was in contact with Kelli Watt who is the Mayor of Kettering, England and she requested that Kettering City Council hold off on voting on a resolution until she had a chance to discuss reconsideration by her town council. In March of 2022, Kettering, England notified the Kettering, Ohio Sister Cities Committee that Kettering, England no longer has a sister cities committee. The Kettering, Ohio Sister Cities Committee is hopeful a relationship can be re-established with Kettering, England. The two communities have been sister cities for 45 years, but for the past several years there has been no relationship. The Kettering, Ohio Sister Cities Committee has requested that the resolution be removed from the agenda this evening until this matter can be sorted out with Kettering, England.

Mr. Klepacz made a motion to amend the agenda by removing item number twelve the resolution regarding the sister city link. Mrs. Hall seconded the motion. Mrs. Fisher reported that she reviewed the above minutes and moved the minutes be approved. Mr. Klepacz seconded the motion of the above minutes and there being six (6) yea votes and no (0) nay votes for the January 10, 2023 Council Meeting & Workshop Minutes, the motion was declared carried followed by a roll call vote.

Presentation- Greater Dayton RTA Update

Brandon Policicchio, Chief Customer and Business Development Officer for Greater Dayton RTA made the presentation this evening. Mr. Policicchio mentioned he is here this evening to give a brief overview of the happenings at RTA. The Greater Dayton RTA is very proud of the community bus series which Kettering is part of. This series is taking part throughout Montgomery County and the City of Kettering bus will run for the life of the bus which is anticipated to last until 2028. RTA currently has over 500 employees and over 65 percent of customers are traveling to jobs such as healthcare and educational opportunities. RTA is currently looking for over 100 drivers and paid CDL training is provided. This year, RTA is celebrating 50 years of service to the Greater Dayton Area and there will be activities and events for customers throughout the year for this celebration. Over the past several years, RTA has implemented a new system called tap pay. This is a new system that had ended the traditional payment system. The reason why tap pay is better for customers is because it provides a more equitable way to pay. The previous traditional system ended up leading toward customers spending more money who may have been low income, unbanked or underbanked. Tap pay allows customers to never pay more than the daily max rate as well as the monthly max rate which allows customers to hold on to their money longer and be able to have that savings. In addition, it has

allowed customers to have family accounts which can be managed under one account. This system is also available through multiple retail outlets where customers can take money and load onto their tap pay card or smartphones. Later this year, RTA will be implementing contactless payments. RTA is currently running 18 bus routes throughout Montgomery County and Western Greene County. There are over 2,500 bus stops and three connect programs. Recently, same-day service has been implemented which is offered seven days a week. No matter what day you travel, the same service will be out on the street. The connect program provides different options depending on areas or transportation needs. The on-demand program is available in four areas throughout Montgomery County. Currently, on-demand is not a program that is offered in the Kettering area but that is due to there are a lot of bus services in the Kettering area. On-demand is offered in areas where there may have not been a lot of bus service or no bus service at all. The program allows customers to connect to bus route service. 70 percent of customers are traveling in these on-demand zones to connect to bus route services. Customers either use Uber, Lyft or RTA to access this on-demand service. This service is free and is open to the public. Project Mobility is a service where customers become eligible either because they have a physical or cognitive disability that prevents them from using the bus route services. This service is available countywide to eligible customers. The 5310 Program was introduced in 2022. This program allows any customer or resident in the Montgomery County area who is 65 or older who has disability transportation to and from doctor's appointments, grocery stores and the pharmacies for five dollars per trip. Customers are allowed to bring one travel companion with them at no charge. This has allowed RTA to have 100 percent access to anyone within Montgomery County who may be 65 or older with disability. Route 6 is a service that is currently running in Kettering which was formerly known as route 14. Also routes 7, 11, 12, 16, 17, 18, 19 and 55 run in Kettering. On Monday, RTA will be releasing their Transit System Redesign Program. This program began in 2018 but due to the pandemic things changed. RTA will be going back out to the public to get feedback on the new redesign to address changes that happened as a result of the pandemic. Also, RTA will be analyzing economic development and residential development in communities such as Kettering to provide feedback on using a broader system. One new feature will be allowing customers not to travel downtown when they need to transfer routes more within their communities through an advance connector service.

Mayor Lehner thanked Mr. Policicchio for his update and mentioned City Council had a chance to preview his presentation and overall she is very excited with the new changes being offered by RTA. There are a lot of great services that will be coming to the Kettering community.
