

Leaf Collection Begins October 16!



One of the most unique and highly valued services the City of Kettering offers residents is free curbside collection of leaves each fall. Leaves are picked up by City crews and taken to the City's leaf composting center to be converted to mulch and compost, then offered free of charge to residents each spring. The City will begin in District 1 on Monday, October 16, and will continue leaf pickup until early December. Please note that all leaves should be raked to the curb by Monday, November 27, for the final pass for fall collection.

Please remember the following tips for leaf pickup:

- Know your leaf collection district. Reference the above map to find your district or visit www.ketteringoh.org and enter your address in the *My Services* tab on our home page.
- Don't wait until our crews are near your district to rake leaves. As leaves begin to fall, rake piles to the edge of your lawn.
 We will make several passes through each district for collection.

Call 937-296-3255 (FALL), check the Kettering website or follow us on Facebook to determine the current location of leaf pickup crews.

Prior to collection, rake your leaves to the edge of your lawn, but not into the street where they will block traffic and cause a hazard to storm drains. Do not block storm drains or waterways.

• Do not bag your leaves.

• Make sure leaves are not under, between or around parked cars.

• Don't rake anything except leaves to the curb for pickup. Branches, sticks, grass and other yard waste clog the machinery and throw the crews off schedule. Leaf piles containing branches, grass, etc., will not be collected. You may take your tree branches

and brush to the City's Yard Debris Drop-Off Center located on Woodman Center Drive or put them in your Rumpke cart for pickup on your normal trash collection day.

Help Fight Storm Water Pollution

Rainwater falls and flows along curbs into catch basins and directly into the storm sewer system in the Kettering. Anything that enters a storm sewer system eventually flows untreated into lakes, streams and rivers of the Miami Valley. Because of the risk of pollution, it can disturb the ecosystem. While not much can be done to prevent water pollution on a societal level, all of us can drastically impact both the quality and quantity of storm water that flows off our individual property.

Disturbed earth, pet waste, salt, pesticides, fertilizer, oil, litter and yard debris are the primary culprits among the many household pollutants that leave a property and affect our collective waterways.

What are some ways you can help reduce pollution in our streams and rivers?

Lawn Care:

- Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly. When necessary, follow recommended amounts and use at appropriate times when compared to the weather forecast.
- Collect rainwater in a rain barrel or redirect downspouts to • landscaped areas.
- Plant trees, shrubs and ground cover to help rainwater soak • into the ground
- Use organic mulch or safer pest control methods whenever possible.
- Finish yard projects quickly to ensure disturbed earth does • not simply erode away in the next storm. Plant ground cover or establish other erosion control measures.
- Compost or mulch yard waste, keeping it out of the street. . Refer to the matrix below for proper disposal of yard debris.
- Pick up pet waste and dispose of it properly. Leaving pet • waste on the ground increases public health risks by allowing harmful bacteria and nutrients to travel elsewhere.
- Keep open drainage ditches clear of debris or things that • could clog or pollute the system.





Auto Care:

- Use a commercial car wash that treats or recycles its wastewater, or wash vehicles in the yard so the water infiltrates into the ground. Detergents as low as 0.1 ppm can harm wildlife.
- DO NOT pour used oil, antifreeze, paints or other household chemicals down the storm sewer or into drainage channels.
- Spots on the driveway or street indicate the engine, transmission or radiator is leaking. Do not hose leaks from brake fluid, oil, grease and antifreeze into the street. Use kitty litter or other absorbent material to absorb and place in the trash. Dispose of auto fluids and old batteries at designated drop-off or recycling locations.
- Keep vehicles serviced. Regular tune-ups reduce the amount of hydrocarbons, nitrous oxide and other pollutants which impact our water and air.

Fiber To The Home

Various companies are currently installing communications infrastructure throughout the Kettering community. This infrastructure will provide residents and businesses with options for ultra-fast internet connections and additional services. The common nomenclature for these companies is "Internet Service Providers" (ISP).

The City of Kettering is not providing internet services but administers work within the public right-of-way where much of the construction occurs.

Residents should expect to see construction teams and equipment throughout the City completing necessary aerial and underground work. To date, the construction work has been minimally intrusive and yard restoration has been satisfactory.

Construction work in neighborhoods should not disrupt residents' utility services. Residents should contact their utility provider immediately if there is a disruption in service. Call 911 immediately if there is a danger that threatens life or health.

What can residents expect?

Public agencies and utility companies have the right to work within the public right-of-way and associated easements. The line between private property and public right-of-way is often located 10 to 15 feet behind the edge of pavement. On a street with curb and sidewalk, this is often located at the edge of the sidewalk on the house side. When in doubt, residents can contact the Engineering Department for general questions, or hire a surveyor to determine the exact location of the property and easement lines. Residents who subscribe to the ISP's service are permitting the company to construct the connection to their house.



Residents with an invisible fence line or irrigation pipe in the public right-of-way or utility easement should indicate that location with flags, paint markings or markers to identify the underground line/pipe.

Construction times vary greatly based on a variety of factors. The construction area typically will be restored within a few days after work is complete.

What happens if a resident does not want service?

Communication companies have the right to access the public right-of-way to build their citywide fiber-optic network in Kettering. You are not obligated to use their services. As with other utilities (electric, gas, etc.), the goal is to make this service as widely accessible as possible; however, there is no requirement for any home to sign up for their service.

Who should residents contact for damage complaints and installation concerns?

Crews do their best to minimize the impact to property. However, accidents do occur. Please note that construction is temporary and the impact to property should be limited as most infrastructure lines will be underground.

Contact the fiber installation company to report concerns.

How will residents know when ISPs are coming to their area?

Fiber companies should send advance notification to let property owners know when crews will be in the neighborhood. This is typically done by leaving door hangers. A good indication that work is imminent is the appearance of underground utility markings appearing on the pavement and ground in the form of dotted lines in spray paint or small plastic flagging. Different colors indicate the presence of different utilities.

Should residents remove the ISP flags?

Please do not remove the flags as they show where the other utilities are located. ISPs are legally required to have other utilities located and marked/flagged during construction to eliminate hitting electric, cable or gas lines. Once construction work is completed on your property, the construction crew will remove the flags.

Why is this so exciting?

Many consider broadband internet service to be a public utility like water and electricity because of the vital role it plays in American life. Economists say high speed internet is no longer just a luxury – it is now a necessity for good schools and a thriving economy. Kettering is in a unique position to receive the installation of a valuable public utility – one that will strengthen our future.

How do residents sign up for service?

ISPs will be in contact with you with service opportunities.

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Collaborative Electric Aggregation



Miami Valley Communications Council (MVCC) led the charge for electric aggregation. As a participating community, Kettering residents and small businesses could save an average of \$340 each year on energy bills.

Energy Harbor was awarded a 28-month supplier contract for residential and small commercial customers at a rate of 0.0657 cents/kWh. This is significantly lower than the current AES Ohio rate of 0.1081 cents/kWh.

Electric aggregation gives communities better bargaining power through economies of scale. The 14 communities participating in the MVCC program represent more than 80,000 electric meters belonging to households and businesses.

Eligible customers received an opt-out letter in the mail with simple instructions and answers to frequently asked questions. The letter can also be found at www.energyharbor.com/ communityaggregation.

All customers who do not opt-out will be added to the program. Customers can optout at any time with no termination fee or can join the program when existing supplier contracts expire.

Gas Aggregation

The City is currently looking into the feasibility of gas aggregations to further save residents and small business owners money.

Customers also have the option of paying a slightly higher rate – \$0.0697 cents/kWh – to purchase 100% green energy from Energy Harbor. This is offered as an opt-in rate running concurrently with the standard opt-out program.

Residents and small businesses in the voluntary aggregation programs will continue to receive monthly invoices and distribution services from AES Ohio. If they have a power outage, those customers will still call the local utility company that is providing distribution services. By participating in the aggregation program, residents and business consumers are simply choosing an alternative supplier.

Communities participating in the MVCC electric aggregation program include Brookville, Centerville, Clayton, Eaton,

Englewood, Fairborn, Germantown, Kettering, Miamisburg, Moraine, Trotwood, Union, Vandalia and West Carrollton.


Participants will receive their first energy bill with prices reflecting the aggregation program in September.

Double Check your AES Bill

For those currently under contract with a third party energy provider, double check your bill to compare your current rate with the 0.0657 cents per kilowatt hour being offered through electric aggregation. Ensure there are no penalties associated with canceling the agreement.

K9 Jax Retires

In the fall of 2015, the Kettering Police Department selected K9 Jax from Shallow Creek Kennels to be the 14th Police K9 in Kettering K9 history (36 years), and Ptl. Devin Maloney was selected as his handler. Ptl. Maloney has the distinction of being the youngest handler in Kettering K9 history at the time of his appointment to the position.

Ptl. Maloney and K9 Jax have consistently been a high quality asset to the Kettering Police Department and for the City of Kettering, in general, not only because of their success, but also because of their positive and enjoyable personalities. Their success will constantly be referred to as goals for achievement for all future teams. This legacy was built by becoming the longest serving K9 team (almost eight years), most utilized K9 team (almost 800 uses), over 20 firearms removed from the street, over 80 criminals located through patrol uses and in excess of 400 arrests (from patrol and

narcotic uses). These numbers are the highest obtained by any previous or current K9 handler in KPD K9 history.

In 2017, they attended the United States Police Canine Association (USPCA) Detector Dog Nationals. While competing against the best trained narcotics detection K9 teams nationwide, Ptl. Maloney and K9 Jax finished in eighth place overall. After a long and illustrious career, K9 Jax is enjoying retirement effective June 30, 2023. The exemplary team of Ptl. Maloney and K9 Jax will be missed but not forgotten

> as the many things they have taught this department and the other K9 teams will live on forever. We are a better K9 unit and police department because of their service.

Cooking Safety Starts with YOU

Cooking is the leading cause of home fires and home fire injuries. The most common cause of fires in the kitchen is unattended cooking. Here are a few steps you can take to prevent fire and injury while you are cooking.

- Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, boiling, grilling, or broiling food.
- If you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly and stay in the home.
- Always keep a lid nearby when cooking. If a small grease fire starts, slide the lid over the pan and turn off the burner. Leave the pan covered until it has cooled.
- Keep anything that can catch fire away from your stovetop.
- Loose clothing can hang down onto stove burners and catch fire. Wear short, close-fitting, or tightly rolled sleeves when cooking.
- Have a "kid-free zone" of at least 3 feet (1 meter) around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried.

Recreational Fires

Fall is a popular time for recreational fires as the temperature begins to cool. Here is a list of rules that the State of Ohio has set for recreational fires or open burning.

- The only authorized fuel source is clean dry wood. (No yard waste or rubbish material)
- If the fire is confined to an approved container such as an outdoor fireplace, barbecue pit, etc. the fire must be at least 15 feet from a structure or combustible materials.
- For an open fire not contained, the fire must be at least 25 feet from a structure, wood fence, neighboring structure, or combustible materials. Conditions that could cause a fire to spread within 25 feet of the fire must be eliminated before ignition of a fire.
- An outdoor fire, where the fuel being burned is not contained in an outdoor fireplace, must have a fuel area of fewer than 3 feet in diameter and fewer than 2 feet in height.
- The fire must be constantly attended while burning and must be extinguished if it is not attended.
- A portable fire extinguisher with a minimum of a 4A rating, garden hose, bucket of sand, or other suitable means for extinguishing the fire must be provided.
- The fire must not create an offensive or objectionable condition that interferes with the neighboring residents' use and enjoyment of their property. If this occurs, the Fire Department is required to order the person responsible for the fire to extinguish the fire.
- The Fire Department is required to extinguish fires which create hazardous conditions.

Often complaints are received from neighbors when a recreational fire is not conducted following these rules, or when a recreational fire produces smoke that migrates off of the property and into the residence of neighboring properties. Persons with chronic breathing problems can often be affected by these conditions.

Another issue that commonly comes up associated with recreational fires, is noise and disturbance of the neighborhood when these events extend late into the evening. These matters will be dealt with by the Kettering Police Department. If you have any questions concerning the Ohio Open Burning Regulations, please contact the Kettering Fire Department Bureau of Fire Prevention at (937) 296-2489. Is Your Business Eligible for Grant Funding?

The City of Kettering's Economic Development Department is looking to connect with local businesses that are owned by underrepresented populations such as minorities, women, veterans and those with disabilities. Owners who hold certain certifications could be eligible for state, federal and private sector grant dollars. A short conversation with the City's Economic Development staff can help determine whether your business meets program criteria.

In addition, Kettering businesses that are located in the 45439 zip code are encouraged to call the City to explore eligibility for a JobsOhio Inclusion Grant. A number of Daytonarea businesses have previously been awarded inclusion grants over the past few years, and City staff would like to make sure that Kettering businesses are aware of the opportunity.

The Inclusion Grant provides support for eligible projects in distressed communities and/or for businesses that are certified

as WBE or MBE or veteran or disabled owned. Grant decisions are based on several project factors, including but not limited to company location, company ownership, jobs created and/or retained and investment of assets to get your business project underway. Support is intended for small to medium-sized companies with annual revenues of no more than \$25 million for the JobsOhio Inclusion Grant.

> Typical eligible businesses include those engaged in manufacturing, logistics and distribution, financial services, research and development, and IT. Retail, tourism, hospitality, public sector and healthcare operations are not typically eligible for this program.

Qualifying projects must include new capital investment on things such as land, buildings, leasehold improvements, machinery and equipment, site development, employee training, IT including hardware and industry-specific software. The grant requires the funds be utilized over a three-year period and normally include a new job commitment.

The primary goal of the Kettering Leadership Academy (KLA) is to build a resource of community leaders on a continuing basis. The Academy is designed to identify, educate and develop potential community leaders; expand leadership potential; enhance the quality of life in our community; and provide access to leadership and personal growth opportunities.

In September, the class members began their KLA experience with an overnight retreat comprised of classroom activities, outdoor learning experiences, leadership development and team building exercises. Participants met once a month to learn about local government, education, health care, volunteering, public safety, history and our business community. Participants were required to design and complete a project addressing a need in our community.

The Academy was created in 2003 by Councilman Bruce Duke and administered by Volunteer Office staff. An important part of KLA is to recruit a diverse group of participants to provide a variety of perspectives on the challenges our community faces, and this fund will help ensure this remains true. Rosewood Renovation Enters its Final Phase

The third and final phase of Rosewood's renovation is officially underway! Updates to the painting and drawing studios, the theater and the establishment of a community printmaking studio are coming soon.

The Rosewood darkroom is now complete and re-opened over the summer! Accessibility improvements were made to the space. To celebrate the reopening, Rosewood hosted a very special Darkroom Photo Camp for ages 12 – 14. Participating youth learned to take photos using 35mm film cameras, as well as process film and print from their own negatives in the Rosewood darkroom.

A newly dedicated glass and metals studio is expected to open by December 2 with programming starting in January 2024.

Also scheduled for December 2 is A Rosewood Holiday Arts Festival! During the event from 11 a.m. - 3 p.m., we will prepare for the opening of our community print studio by hosting Leesa Haapapuro, an Artist in Residence. Haapapuro will host a variety of workshops around the local area for community members to help create a work of art entitled 'Passages,' based on William Carlos Williams' epic poem Asphodel, That Greeny Flower. Through ongoing community workshops and open studio hours in Rosewood's forthcoming community printmaking studio, the poem will transform into an ongoing visual artwork displayed along the halls of Rosewood Arts Center through the spring of 2024. We hope you'll attend A Rosewood Holiday Arts Festival to lend a hand – all are welcome!

The new community accessible printmaking studio will offer year-round programs and activities and engage new ways to appreciate, see, make and learn about prints and printmaking. Led by a team of professional printmakers, the studios will be outfitted with specialty equipment for intaglio and relief printing, as well as silk screens. Knowledgeable faculty and staff round out the Rosewood print studio experience as they provide in-class

instruction and assist those wishing to start from scratch or improve their existing skills.

Our community print studio, painting and drawing studios and artist studios are anticipated to be complete by the end of 2023. We can't wait to unveil these new spaces and share

them with everyone. The theater renovation is underway with walls, a new stage and accessible fixed seating under construction! The theater is also expected to be complete by the end of the year. Rosewood's outdoor spaces are being finalized as well. Landscaping for the Rosewood entrance will be finished this fall. We will be incorporating a new public artwork into this landscaping, with artwork installation scheduled for spring 2024.

If you're planning to head out to Rosewood this fall (and we hope you are!), please take note of the following renovation-related closure dates. The Rosewood facility will be closed for construction from August 28 to September 10 and again from November 1 to December 1. 
