YEAR IN REVIEW

In 2024, the City of Kettering Parks, Recreation and Cultural Arts Department celebrated a transformative year marked by record participation, facility completions and exceptional community programming. This review highlights the key achievements and developments that shaped our year, demonstrating our continued commitment to providing quality experiences that make Kettering home.





































AQUATICS

The Kettering Recreation Complex's aquatics facility continues to serve as a community hub for swimming instruction, fitness programs and recreational activities.

Over 1,200 people enrolled in swim classes and more than 1,700 residents purchased annual passes for regular access.



ARTS EDUCATION

Rosewood Arts Center's renovation reached full completion in 2024, showcasing upgraded studios and enhanced accessibility features. The center flourished with comprehensive programming throughout the year, welcoming participants to state-of-the-art facilities designed for creative exploration.





More than **9,000 participants** engaged in arts education programs at Rosewood, which offered over **300 class offerings** in ceramics, dance, theatre, music, the humanities, photography, painting, printmaking, drawing, jewelry, glass and more. Over **50 artists and creative professionals** led these diverse offerings.

PUBLIC ART

The City of Kettering's public art initiative underwent a significant rebranding in 2024, transitioning from CitySites to Art in Public Places. This transformation included refining the program's nearly 25-year-old mission, vision and goals to better align with the City of Kettering's updated Strategic Plan.

Notable achievements included commissioning artist Sujin Lim to create a unique permanent installation that was installed in April of 2025 at the entrance of Rosewood Arts Center.





The program also showcased its commitment to preserving existing public art through professional maintenance of the limestone sculptures from the 2002 Kettering Rocks! Stone Symposium – the first cleaning in over 20 years that restored the sculptures to their original appearance.

KETTERING HEALTH GALLERY AT ROSEWOOD ARTS CENTER

Kettering's professional exhibition space presented an impressive array of programming throughout 2024, featuring works from regional and national artists across diverse media. The gallery hosted **eight solo exhibitions** and **three juried exhibitions**, showcasing **153 artists** from Ohio, Virginia, Pennsylvania, Georgia, Indiana, Texas, Michigan and Kentucky.



FRAZE

Fraze Pavilion hosted **30 events** and sold more than **51,000 tickets**. The season featured **7 first time artists**, including Joey Fatone, Ludacris, Wilson Phillips, Debbie Gibson, Crowder, Brantley Gilbert and Dylan Scott. PepperFest added to the list of free community events.

ICE ARENA

The Kettering Ice Arena continued to serve as home to the nationally recognized Learn to Skate USA Program, offering instruction for participants of all ages, skill levels and abilities. More than **850 people** participated in Ice Arena programs throughout 2024.

The Ice Arena Pro Shop maintained strong sales throughout its operation, offering figure skating supplies, hockey equipment and skating accessories to support the local skating community.



PARKS

The Parks Division's excellence was recognized statewide in 2024, earning an **OPRA Excellence Award** in the capital improvement category for Gentile Nature Park. The long-awaited 19-acre naturalized neighborhood park includes playground areas, a walking path, two ziplines and more.

The division continued its commitment to urban forestry, earning the 42nd consecutive Tree City USA award and a third Growth Award in the past four years.

Staff accomplishments included professional certifications, with Tabitha Baer earning her CPRP certification and ISA Certified Arborist credentials, while both Tabitha Baer and Tim Pifer achieved ISA Tree Risk Assessment Qualification.

The program's excellence was recognized at the state level, earning a first place OPRA Excellence Award for EcoFest in 2024.

ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION

The environmental education program continued to make a significant impact through the Land Lab Nature Program with Kettering City Schools and comprehensive programming at the Habitat Environmental Education Center. Over **2,500 students** participated in hands-on Land Lab experiences, while **650 total enrollments** were recorded across all Habitat programs.

people attended the third annual EcoFest, which expanded to 62 vendors and added a dedicated Kids Zone in 2024.





RECREATION

The Recreation team delivered comprehensive programming for adults, youth and families, achieving nearly 15,000 total program enrollments across diverse offerings. Over 350,000 patrons visited the wide-ranging recreation facilities, including the Kettering Recreation Complex, Adventure Reef Water Park, Kettering Ice Arena, Kettering Fitness & Wellness Center and Charles I. Lathrem Senior Center.

The annual **Giving Tree** program continued to demonstrate community generosity, serving **510 children** with assistance from **13 volunteers** who logged over **85 hours** making the program a success.

Free and reduced programming remained a priority, highlighted by **Go 4th!** at Delco Park and the **Mayor's Tree Lighting + Santa Paws** at Lincoln Park. Monthly **Free Friday** fitness classes continued at the KRC, inviting the community to participate at no cost.

CHARLES I. LATHREM SENIOR CENTER

The Charles I. Lathrem Senior Center continued to serve as a vital hub for Kettering's seniors, offering essential services, programs and social opportunities.

In 2024, the center welcomed more than **24,000 visitors** and sold **1,504 passes** to community members seeking regular access to senior programming and amenities. More than **4,600 people** enrolled in adult and senior programs at the Senior Center.

FITNESS AND WELLNESS

The Kettering Recreation Complex (KRC) and Kettering Fitness and Wellness Center (KFWC) had nearly 180,000 visits to their facilities throughout 2024. The fitness team continued to offer popular virtual programming, with 1,218 people joining group exercise classes via ZOOM. Personal training services remained highly sought after, with the program averaging over 70 clients per week. The department also launched an exciting fitness partnership with Kettering College, which created 125 new pass holders and expanded access to wellness programming.





488

patrons were recognized for utilizing the fitness facilities more than 125 times.

SPORTS

The sports programming continued to evolve and expand, offering enhanced opportunities for youth and adults throughout Kettering.

This year, Kettering Youth Basketball (KYB) saw a 10% growth with 612 kids enrolled, supported by 88 dedicated coaches who contributed 1,250 volunteer hours to make the program successful. Youth soccer programming at Delco Park achieved record enrollments across all age groups, with 590 participants enjoying improved facilities and expanded opportunities.

Three first-time programs launched successfully: a **Pickleball Tournament** at the J.F. Kennedy Park courts drew **46 teams**, while both the **Dodgeball Tournament** at the KRC and the **Kickball League** at Delco Park reached **maximum capacity** with **8 teams** each.

Additional programming continued to show strong enrollment numbers. Youth volleyball reached maximum capacity in both spring and fall seasons with 100 participants each, while adult volleyball attracted 33 participants in spring and 26 in fall. Adult basketball also achieved full enrollment with 32 participants in both spring and fall sessions.



SPECIAL EVENTS

We delivered an outstanding array of special events throughout 2024, bringing the community together for memorable experiences across all seasons. These events showcased our commitment to providing free and accessible programming that celebrates our diverse community.

Go 4th! at Delco Park featured an expanded celebration with double the food trucks, bounce houses and entertainment, culminating in spectacular fireworks and the first drone show in the Miami Valley. The event drew an estimated **60,000 people**.

Holiday programming remained popular with families, including Easter Egg Hunts (540 participants), Santapalooza (105 participants) and the Mayor's Tree Lighting + Santa Paws at Lincoln Park Civic Commons. The Little Sweetheart Dance welcomed 104 participants, while Kids Day at the Park entertained 900 attendees with activities and entertainment. The Holiday Arts & Crafts Fair at KRC welcomed 110 vendors and over 2,000 shoppers.

Other notable events included the Kettering Community Garage Sale with 1,500 participants and Touch a Truck featuring 25 vehicles, 30 vendors and 2,000 participants. Active Aging Week featured 17 programs with 340 participants, while our pet-focused events Wag-O-Ween (175 dogs) and Canine Cannonball (136 dogs) also were well attended. Highlights from our arts programming include two signature events: Art on the Commons and Art on the Playground.













OUTREACH

Social media and Google Ad marketing campaigns targeting programs, events, recruiting and fitness helped grow participation numbers and raise awareness. The biggest impact was seen in fitness, where pass sales jumped past pre-Covid levels to set record highs by the end of 2024.

The Communications and Engagement Team supported a variety of PRCA events, including the Community Block Party, Go 4th!, three Community Hot Dog Roasts, National Night Out, the grand opening of Gentile Nature Park and Mayor's Tree Lighting.

AWARDS

PRCA earned exceptional recognition in 2024, receiving multiple Ohio Parks and Recreation Association (OPRA) Awards of Excellence. **EcoFest** captured first place in the Environmental & Interpretive Programs category, while **TreeFest** and **Tree Love** earned second place in the same category. **Gentile Nature Park** was honored with second place in the Capital Improvement category.

Additionally, Kettering earned its 42nd consecutive TreeCity USA Award and a third Growth Award in the last four years.

ACCESSIBILITY, INCLUSION AND OPPORTUNITY

Parks, Recreation and Cultural Arts and the City of Kettering remain committed to accessibility, inclusion and creating opportunities to reach all Kettering residents. PRCA works closely with the City of Kettering's Compliance and Inclusion Manager to educate staff on working with all individuals, including offering program modifications as requested by patrons with disabilities. Over the next several years, our goals include reaching new participants who may not be aware of our inclusivity mission, and advocate for accessibility within our programs and facilities.

In 2024, PRCA offered the following:

- The annual Giving Tree program served 510 children in 2024, thanks to the generosity of our community. 13 volunteers logged over 85 hours while assisting with the program.
- PRCA staff and volunteers continued partnering with AARP to provide free tax preparation services to seniors, completing 957 returns and logging 2,377 volunteer hours.
- The CIL transportation program provided 4,202 rides to seniors for medical appointments, shopping, and other essential destinations, covering 34,000 miles.
- The Kettering Recreation Complex and Kettering Fitness and Wellness Center continued hosting Free Friday fitness classes monthly, and Rosewood Arts Center offered free drop-in studio access for specialized creative work.


- Environmental education programs welcomed participants of all abilities, with over 2,500 Kettering School District students participating in inclusive Land Lab programs.
- Rosewood Arts Center continued hosting the United Rehabilitation Services of Greater Dayton Academy Vocational Training Program, a transitional job training program for individuals of all ages and abilities.
- Instructors and staff continued working closely with participants requiring modifications across dance, camps and other recreational activities.
- Several community members learned basic water skills during the free World's Largest Swim Lesson event.
- Rosewood's free Art on the Playground festival provided inclusive arts experiences for families.




FINANCIAL STATEMENT

PRCA revenues continued to increase in 2024, as program enrollments, fitness memberships, rentals and more returned to pre-pandemic levels. The department's capital improvement projects (CIP) included the Rosewood Arts Center renovation with support from the Cultural Facilities Fund administered by the Ohio Facilities Construction Commission and the pickleball courts project with support from the Kettering Parks Foundation.


2024 Total PRCA Income \$3,791,548




2024 Budgeted Income \$3,659,000




2024 Total PRCA Expenses \$12,274,853




2024 Budgeted Expenditures \$12,990,371
