DIRECTOR'S LETTER



Dear friends,

2019 was definitely a whirlwind year, and the Kettering Parks, Recreation and Cultural Arts Department (PRCA) achieved a lot of success through creative programming, strong facility operations and unique one-time events. The amazing department staff identifies innovative solutions to create successful experiences for all of

our cherished customers and the numerous volunteers that support our Advisory Boards and programs.

By the numbers, PRCA's programs touch many lives in the community. 2,226 classes were offered through the year providing positive experiences for 31,965 youth and adults. Fraze Pavilion, the region's best location for summer music, hosted 115,840 guests at over 36 ticketed events. The PRCA personal training staff conducted over 5,400 sessions at both the Kettering Recreation Complex and Kettering Fitness and Wellness Center facilities. Our Parks staff managed 6,157 athletic field and court reservations serving over 2,221 children participating in sports activities.

PRCA also had some notable new programs introduced and or completed in 2019. The Environmental Education Division established Kettering's first Archery program. Through the support of Cabela's Outdoor Fund and the Ohio Department of Wildlife, our department was able to purchase new equipment to support introductory archery programs. The first three sessions of classes were sold out with a waiting list. The new Archery program is an excellent example of the department's partnerships with private foundations to support our expanding environmental education programs.

Bee Ambitious was a 2019 public art mosaic project that covered 11 sidewalks in the Haverstick neighborhood. It was created by artist Jes McMillan to provide outdoor play space. McMillan led four community workshops where 372 participants created all of the mosaic tiles used in the sidewalk play spaces. *Bee Ambitious* received the first place award for outstanding achievement from the Ohio Parks and Recreation Association 2019 Award of Excellence in the Cultural Arts category.

PRCA's 2019 Annual Report reflects the broad community reach that touched thousands of people this past year through the amazing programs, services and facility offerings. Thank you, Kettering; your support of and investment in the PRCA Department makes Kettering our community to call home.

AQUATICS

The aquatics offerings at the Kettering Recreation Complex include an indoor 25-meter pool open year-round, sauna, steam room, whirlpool, and 3-acre outdoor Adventure Reef Water Park open annually from Memorial Day to Labor Day. In 2019, the aquatics offerings served over 85,000 guests by offering water-based fun and learning for people of all ages and swim abilities.

ARTS EDUCATION

Arts education is the core of Rosewood Arts Centre, with 466 class offerings and 64 artists from the region hired to teach and provide creative activities to the Rosewood community in 2019.

ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION

The environmental education program includes the Land Lab Nature Program with the Kettering City Schools and year-round classes, workshops and camps at Habitat Environmental Education Center.

FRAZE PAVILION

Fraze Pavilion is southwestern Ohio's premiere neighborhood outdoor entertainment venue. In addition to a season of special performances, Fraze hosted several festivals and community events, including the annual Kettering Block Party!


FITNESS AND WELLNESS





ICE ARENA

The Kettering Ice Arena is home to a nationally recognized Learn to Skate USA Program with offerings for any age, skill level and ability. In addition to lessons, skaters can also enjoy a variety of opportunities such as adult skates, youth and homeschool skates, open skates and even drop in stick times where guests can hone their hockey skills.

PARKS

The Parks Division oversees 21 parks throughout the city, including basketball, volleyball, tennis and pickleball courts, playgrounds, fishing ponds, and much more. In 2019, Parks dedicated over 7,700 hours to mowing parks, medians and facility grounds!

ROSEWOOD GALLERY

Kettering's professional exhibition space, Rosewood Gallery, featured regional and national artists in a wide range of media. In 2019, the gallery hosted eight solo exhibitions and four juried exhibitions.






