## MATTERS OF INTEREST TO COUNCILMEMBERS

Councilmember Duncan asked about the public upcoming summer swim dates.

Roger Carroll, Town Treasurer/Finance Director, stated that the Del Oro Pool will be open to the public every Friday in June and July.

#### TOWN MANAGER REPORT

Sean Rabé pointed out that as of March 1st the Town employed Sarah Comstock, the Community Engagement Librarian, and three part-time assistants.

#### LOOMIS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE AND LIBRARY UPDATE

Jenny Knisley stated the following:

- they are working on the new Discover Loomis guide that will be done in time for State of the Town on April 3, 2019
- tomorrow they are going to a joint chamber meeting with Auburn, Rocklin, Roseville, Lincoln and Loomis
- the Loomis Community Yard sale will be May 4th and the first Friday Night Family Fest will be May 10th

#### Sarah Comstock stated the following:

- we have 3 new part-time employees at the library
- they finalized their strategic plan that will go to the Library Board
- the Summer Reading program will be starting June 8th and will last until July 21st
- they will also be showing movies once a week at the library

All items on the agenda will be open for public comment before final action is taken. Speakers are requested to restrict comments to the item as it appears on the agenda and stay within a three-minute time limit. The Mayor has the discretion of limiting the total discussion time for an item.

<u>Written Material Introduced Into the Record</u>: Citizens wishing to introduce written material into the record at the public hearing on any item are requested to <u>provide a copy of the written material to the Town Clerk</u>.

**PUBLIC COMMENT:** This time is reserved for those in the audience who wish to address the Town Council on subjects that are not on the Agenda. The audience should be aware that the Council may not discuss details or vote on non-agenda items. Your concerns may be referred to staff or placed on the next available agenda.

Roger Smith, Wells Avenue, stated the following:

- he asked to have on the future agenda items access to Interstate 80 from King Road and to keep it on as a continued item

- there is another larger development coming in on Sierra College Boulevard, 400 to 500 homes, and he is pleased that the town wrote a comment letter on this

Eva Marshall, Kathy Way, stated that on some of the planning paperwork there is a discrepancy on the appeal process date, whether it is 8 or 10 days.

Miguel Ucovich, Craig Court, asked Council to form a committee to meet with Caltrans and our Congressman to move forward and get a definitive answer on the Interstate 80 and King Road access.

William Quenneville, Horseshoe Bar Road, stated that speeding on Horseshoe Bar Road is a real issue and there are not enough deputies on the road.

16. Minor Use Permit Appeal

**Public comment:** 

#16-16 Minor Use Permit Appeal – Golden Spikes Baseball Condition of Approval #2: Close all bay doors during batting baseball practice by 5:30 p.m. and any other times that may result in noise exceeding 55 dBA Ldn on adjacent residential properties to the East. Front doors shall remain closed at all times. 3344 Swetzer Court, Loomis, CA APN. 044-220-057 Recommended action: Conduct public hearing and receive public input; and approve Resolution #19-\_\_ determining that Golden Spikes Baseball meets the definition outlined in the Town of Loomis Municipal Code Section 13.80.020, Limited Industrial Zone (ILT), of a "Health/fitness facility" as an indoor use and in conjunction with Town of Loomis General Plan that states no outdoor activity or storage areas are allowed adjacent to residential uses with no noise-producing activities and that all doors shall remain closed at all times.

Mary Beth Van Hoorhis, Town Planner, stated Golden Spikes Baseball requested to continue the meeting to April 9, 2019 due to a conflict in schedules.

17. Two Year Extension of Time Request Vesting Tentative Subdivision Map – The Grove
On January 9, 2019 the project applicant, Mandarich Development (Prestige Homes Loomis, LP), submitted a request for a two-year extension of "The Grove" vesting Subdivision Map #16-10, 9.8 acres on Humphrey Road (APN, 044-021-008)

Recommended action: Conduct a public hearing and receive public input; and adopt Resolution #19-\_\_ approving a two (2) year extension of time for "The Grove" Vesting Tentative Subdivision Map #16-10, for APN 044-021-008, originally approved May 9, 2017.

- they have to do biological studies in the spring and the fall

### 19. Referendum Petitions

On January 8, 2019, the Town Council approved a suite of documents that together constituted the Town's approval of the Village at Loomis development project (the "Village Project"). On February 20, 2019, referendum petitions against Ordinances 275 and 276, which constitute portions of the Village Project approvals, were certified to contain at least the minimum number of valid signatures to meet legal requirements. The referendum petitions were examined by the Town Attorney and their forms were determined to be in substantial compliance with legal requirements. Having substantially complied in form and met all signature requirements, the petitions satisfied the legal standards for certification of sufficiency.

**Recommended action:** Review and consider the options; referendum against Ordinances 275 and 276 have been certified as sufficient; the Council is required to reconsider the Ordinances and there are two options:

- 1. Repeal the ordinances in their entirety, and refrain from enacting the same ordinance again for one year; or
- Submit the ordinances to voters. This submission may be either:
  - a. At the next regular municipal election not less than 88 days from the Town Council's order for an election, in this instance November 10, 2020; or
  - At a special election not less than 88 days from the Town Council's order for election.

#### **Public comment:**

Todd Lowell, the developer for The Village at Loomis, stated he supports submitting the ordinances to the voters in an election on June 18, 2019.

Jackie Pitts Euer, King Road, asked if arguments opposing the Village at Loomis will be given plenty of time.

Jeff Mitchell, Town Attorney, pointed out that the timeline is set by the Election Code.

Sheryl Hadley, Laird Street, reminded Council of the number of names opposing the ordinances.

William Quenneville stated concerns with confusing voters on yes and no issues.

Pamela Blake, Angelo Drive, supports going to a special election.

Miguel Ucovich, Craig Court, supports going to a special election.

Andrea Pickens, Newcastle, stated June, 18, 2019 is Del Oro's last day of school and asked for an alternative date.

Jenny Knisley is in favor of a special election.

Gordon Medd, Superintendent of Loomis School District, pointed out that the last day of school was June 5th or 6th, the first week in June, and supports going to a special election.

Susan Dobies, Arcadia Avenue, supports going to a special election.

Jeff Mitchell stated the following:

- zoning code changes must be done by an ordinance
- the general plan can be amended by resolution
- you need both general plan and zoning to line up in order for any development project to go forward

Michael Morris supports going to a special election.

Kyle Black, David Avenue, asked council to look at how many signed the petitions and take that to heart when writing an argument on the ballot.

Jim Gilbert, Myrtle Drive, stated he is on the board for the Loomis Senior Center and asked if there could be small houses and lots for seniors in the Village at Loomis.

Paula Lanterman, David Avenue, asked if the vote will be based on the developer's existing plan or will there be more changes made?

Following further discussion on the matter, a motion was made to go to a special election on June 18, 2019. On motion by Councilmember Morillas, seconded by Councilmember Baker and passed by the following roll call vote:
