Amending the 2017-2018 Budget to Incorporate a List of Project Funded by SB-1; Road

Repair and Accountability Act

#### Recommendation

Adopt a resolution authorizing the Town Manager to amend the Fiscal Year 2017-2018 Budget to designate and appropriate SB-1 funding for Fiscal Year 2017-2018 to the 2017 CIP Road Maintenance Project- Brace Road Asphalt Overlay, thus ensuring eligibility for State of California Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account revenues.

#### **Issue Statement and Discussion**

On April 6, 2017, State Senate Bill 1 (SB-1), also known as the Road Repair and Accountability Act (RMRA) of 2017, was signed into a law by Governor Brown on April 28, 2017. SB-1 establishes the RMRP to address deferred maintenance on the state highway systems and local street and road systems. The bill provides that funds shall be used for road maintenance and rehabilitation, safety projects, railroad grade separations, complete street components or traffic control devices.

The RMRP is anticipated to receive approximately \$5.2 billion annually once all new revenues take effect. The revenues will be phased-in over several years as follows:

- A 12-cent per gallon increase to the gasoline excise tax effective November 1, 2017.
- 20-cent per gallon increase to the diesel fuel excise tax effective November 1, 2017.
- Vehicle registration tax called the "Transportation Improvement Fee" with rate based on value of the motor vehicle effective January 1, 2018.
- A new \$ 100 vehicle registration tax on zero emissions (ZEV) vehicle of model year 2020 or later effective July 1, 2021.
- An annual rate increase of these taxes beginning on July 1, 2020, except for ZEV fees which take
  effect on July 1, 2021.

SB-1 specifies the annual allocation of funds for a number of specific transportation programs listed in the bill. The remaining RMRA revenues, estimated to reach \$2.9 billion annually, will be split 50/50 between state highways, local street, maintenance and rehabilitation. This bill continuously appropriates the RMRA revenues to cities and counties using the same formula that applies to the existing "Gas Tax Swap" of 2010.

SB-1, also eliminates the annual adjustment required by the "Gas Tax Swap" of 2010, and replaces it by re-establishing the Price Base Tax (PBET) at the original rate of \$0.18 cents per gallon. This change stabilizes the tax and increases revenues beginning for FY 2017-2018.

The Town of Loomis currently receives about \$140,000 per year from the Highway User Tax Acct (HUTA). Now with SB-1, the Town will get about \$113,000 more annually the first year is partial year, however, so the Town is expected to receive about \$37,810 of SB-1 funds.

SB-1 required that all projects proposing to use SB-1 fund are named in the budget and acknowledged by resolution to be considered for funding. 2017 CIP Road Maintenance Project -Brace Road asphalt overlay, from Sierra College Boulevard to Horseshoe Bar Road, has been identified to be designated for SB-1 funding in Fiscal Year 2017-2018. The cost to rehabilitate this road is approximately \$550,000. All SB-1 funding for this year will be added to other funding sources for this project. The project is intended to maintain and improve the quality of the roadway and ensure that the Town's local roadway network continues to meet the needs of the community.

#### CEQA Requirements

No environmental review is required for this action. Each individual project will undergo its own environmental review. The proposed projects are contained within the Town's existing right-of-way.

### Financial and/or Policy Implications

There is not a direct fiscal impact, since the SB-1 funding was already anticipated in the Transportation Reserves revenues. Projects funded from SB-1 in the future fiscal years will be recognized and appropriated as part of future budgets. Staff will continue to pursue grant opportunities as well.

A RESOLUTION OF THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF LOOMIS AUTHORIZING THE TOWN MANAGER TO AMEND THE FISCAL YEAR 2017-218 BUDGET TO DESIGNATE AND APPROPRIATE FUNDING FROM THE ROAD REPAIR AND ACCOUNTABILITY ACT (SB-1) FOR FISCAL YEAR 2017-2018 TO THE 2017 CIP ROAD MAINTENANCE PROJECT-BRACE ROAD ASPHALT OVERLAY.

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 1 (SB-1), the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017 (Chapter 5, Statutes of 2017) was signed into law by the Governor on April 28, 2017 to address the significant multi-modal transportation funding shortfall statewide; and

WHEREAS, SB-1 includes accountability and transparency provisions that will ensure the residents of the Town are aware of the projects proposed for funding in our community and which projects have been completed each fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, the Town must include a list of all projects proposed to receive funding for the Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account (RMRA), created by SB-1, in the Town budget which must include a description and the location of each proposed project, a proposed schedule for the project's completion and the estimated useful life of the improvement; and

WHEREAS, the Town is estimated to receive \$37,810 in RMRA funding in Fiscal Year 2017-2018 (FY 2017-18); and

WHEREAS, the Town has identified the 2017 CIP Road Maintenance Project-Brace Road asphalt overlay from Sierra College Boulevard to Horseshoe Bar Road, which is already included in the FY 2017-18 Budget, as a project for applying FY 2017-18 SB-1 revenues; and

**NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED** that the Town Council of the Town of Loomis does hereby authorizes the Town Manager to amend the FY 2017-18 Budget to appropriate SB-1 funds for the 2017 CIP Road Maintenance Project-Brace Road Asphalt Overlay. The estimated useful lifetime of the project is 10 – 15 years and the anticipated year of construction is summer of 2018.
