MATTERS OF INTEREST TO COUNCILMEMBERS/FUTURE AGENDA ITEMS

Councilmember Calvert stated the following:

- she asked to have on next month's agenda, discussion on donations and the amounts that are available for schools
- there are some schools that need a little extra money to fund some field trips and special projects

Councilmember Ucovich asked the Finance Director if he could give a report on the next agenda on projections for the next couple of years as far as revenues and expenditures.

Councilmember Scherer stated that SACOG is releasing the new Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) methodology and preliminary numbers and he would like that put on the next agenda for discussion next month.

Councilmember Liss stated the following:

- there will be a retirement party for Perry Beck on September 28th
- the Priority Negative Declaration is coming up for review on September 16th
- Placer Sustain has developed an energy fair that will be held at the train Depot on September 20th from 5 to 8 p.m.

All items on the agenda will be open for public comment before final action is taken. Speakers are requested to restrict comments to the item as it appears on the agenda and stay within a five-minute time limit. The Mayor has the discretion of limiting the total discussion time for an item.

Written Material Introduced Into the Record: Citizens wishing to introduce written material into the record at the public hearing on any item are requested to provide a copy of the written material to the Town Clerk prior to the public hearing date so that the material may be distributed to the Town Council prior to the public hearing.

PUBLIC COMMENT: This time is reserved for those in the audience who wish to address the Town Council on subjects that are not on the Agenda. The audience should be aware that the Council may not discuss details or vote on non-agenda items. Your concerns may be referred to staff or placed on the next available agenda. Please **note that comments from the public will also be taken on any item on the agenda. The time allotted to each speaker may be limited to five minutes or less**, at the discretion of the Mayor.

There was no public comment.

CONSENT ITEMS FORWARDED

1. Council Minutes – 8/9/11, 8/19/11 APPROVE

Councilmember Liss asked (regarding 8/9/11 minutes) that under item 7 where he stated comments, he asked that the following be included: "On the advice of the Town Attorney he is able to proceed to vote on the project."

No public comment.

A motion was made to approve the minutes as amended. On motion by Councilmember Scherer, seconded by Councilmember Liss and passed by voice vote.

11. 2011 Summer Swim Program RECEIVE AND FILE
 An update on the Town sponsored Summer Swim program at Del Oro High School pool.

Councilmember Ucovich pointed out the following:

- the Town made money this year on the swimming lessons
- open swimming and the snack bar brought in about \$1000
- Council needs to make a decision by February if we want to pursue this program again next year
- he suggested having Councilmember Scherer meet with the Placer Unified High School Board to see if they could lower the fee for the rental of the pool next year

Councilmember Scherer said he would.

No public comment.

BUSINESS

13. Content, Creation and Distribution Expo Update
 Peter Oakes, Loomis resident, will give an update on the Content, Creation and Distribution project that he is organizing for September 16 and 17, 2011 in Loomis
Recommended action: Hear presentation and give direction to staff if needed.
Public comment:

Perry Beck, Town Manager, stated that Peter Oakes was not able to attend but CCD Expo should be open for business on September 16th as planned.

No public comment.

14. Animal Keeping Code Revisions
 Council is requested to give specific direction to the Planning Commission as to what is desired to be done with the animal keeping regulations in the Town Zoning Code and a draft ordinance can be brought forward in October
Recommended action: Discuss and give direction.
Public comment:

Sonja Cupler, 5630 Tudor Way, asked how much money the Town has spent on this item?

Perry Beck noted in the staff report it indicates that it is probably around 10,000 to 15,000 dollars.

Kathleen Geil, 3455 Humphrey Road, stated the following:

- this has been going on for almost two years and she is glad there is some resolution coming
- she would like to clarify what she had in her letter
- she has seven neighbors touching her property, Ms. Walden has six neighbors touching her property, and the third large parcel has seven neighbors touching the property
- the three large properties have plenty of land to stay within the setbacks and not infringe on the neighbors, regarding animal keeping

Hazel Hineley, 3443 Barker Road, stated the following:

- we have a zoning ordinance and a general plan that we can go by for the standards in the Town
- she asked why we have to do something new for these people
- two neighbors are not able to resolve their issues
- the person with too many animals needs to be told to get rid of some and conform to the current zoning ordinance or be fined
- any other problem between them should be between the two neighbors and not the local government
- as a taxpayer she does not want 10,000 to 15,000 tax dollars spent on something like this

Cynthia Walden, 3467 Humphrey Road, stated the following:

- she has spent a lot of money in public records requests relating to the animal keeping
- points out that a structure in the flood zone puts many at risk
- she would have probably agreed had the Town Manager not have put a time frame and a deadline on the animals

Councilmember Scherer pointed out the following:

- the conditional use permit cost is not consistent with the values of the community and needs to be addressed
- there are concerns about a legal non-conforming use
- eliminating the animals is not a solution to the problem
- the direction for the Planning Commission was to look at the larger lots and amend the code to reflect the larger lots in smaller zoning

Perry Beck, Town Manager, stated the following:

- the Planning Commission recommended changing the code to allow a few more chickens on larger lots
- Ms. Walden's permit fee was waived

Councilmember Calvert questioned if there was a grandfather issue on the zoning that was in place before the Town incorporated.

Councilmember Ucovich suggested the following:

- people get attached to their animals,
- he suggested having a non-conforming use permit to be able to have a certain number of animals at this time, and when they die not to replace them
- he doesn't want to change the ordinance

Councilmember Liss stated the following:

- the advance of funds was discussed as one option
- the intent was to send this back to staff to address the fee issue as not being consistent with the values
- large lot sizes were to be addressed
- he would like a flexible low cost system under some kind of non-conforming use, or administrative, that doesn't require a lot of work for staff to have to administer it
- there should be no health or safety impacts to the neighbors
- he would like Planning Commission to give some recommendations on this issue and staff could look into what the other cities are doing
- animals are important for Loomis and animal keeping is important for the lifestyle that we enjoy

Councilmember Scherer pointed out that there needs to be a finding that there is a health or safety condition when there is following-up on a complaint.

Mayor Morillas suggested getting comparisons from other rural cities our size.

Staff has been given direction.

15. **Life House Church Project Impacts On Loomis**

Life House Church is a project in Placer County located along Del Mar Road just off of Sierra College Boulevard that may have impacts on Loomis

Recommended action: Identify possible impacts that Special Counsel, Don Mooney, should address in comments on the life House Church project

Public comment:

No public comment.

Councilmember Scherer stated the following:

- this project entails 100,000 square feet of building on our border
- he would like our County Supervisor to meet with us and see what role he is going to play in protecting the people he represents

Councilmember Ucovich stated the following:

- he sits on the LAFCO Board as an alternate
- Loomis is the only city in Placer County that doesn't have a sphere of influence
- we need to look into the possibility of getting a sphere of influence in order to get some control on what is coming in around us

Councilmember Liss stated the following:

- we also have the Orchard at Penryn project on our boarder, at the intersection of Penryn and Taylor Road
- citizens are organizing to go against the impact of 150 apartment units
- he agrees with looking into a sphere of influence for protection from impacts for our residents
- one of the issues for Special Counsel, Don Mooney, would be the impact on wildlife (burrowing owls)
- in other comment letters we have submitted on the Rocklin Projects there is a more comprehensive list of other related environmental and wildlife issues and asked staff to look to see if there is any similar environmental issues

Councilmember Scherer stated it was important to protect the wetlands along Antelope Creek.

Direction has been given.

16. Swetzer and Rippey Business Park Signs

Council asked to discuss the business park signs that were being considered last year and during the Chamber business walk in July

Recommended action: Discuss and give direction.

Public comment:

Councilmember Ucovich stated the following:

- he suggested having a sign with more empty space below so when new businesses come in they can be added
- there is no more retail on Rippey Road so we will only need a sign for Swetzer Road
- the signs on Swetzer Road should be up to the individual businesses, they can see a sample that we have than get together and pay for a sign

Councilmember Calvert suggested having more general signs with names like: sheds, nurseries, breweries, etc.

Eldon Lewis, owner of Sierra Stair on Swetzer, stated the following:

- when he brought this up a year ago, he was asking for the blue and white directional signs off the freeway
- the sign was to direct people from the freeway through town to King Road and then Swetzer Road
- he didn't care about a monument sign, just directional signs

Nancy Beck, 6304 David Avenue, stated the following:

- it's important that people coming off the freeway find the businesses they are looking for
- asking for directional signs should not be unreasonable
- regarding the Blue Goose and High Hand, they are historical buildings and should have their names on the signs
- regarding signs for the businesses, the names should be removable for businesses that are no longer there

Jean Wilson, 4301 Barton Road, stated the following:

- suggested moving forward now with the blue and white directional signs so people can find their way to the businesses on Swetzer Road
- the monument signs are not as critical

Councilmember Liss suggested the following:

- putting up the blue and white directional signs and adding the Swetzer Road Business Park
- the color on the existing signs are already fading and suggested looking at something that will last longer than a year
- we should ask the Chamber or the Mayor to send a letter to the businesses to subscribe to be on a monument sign for their business court and the businesses pay for it

Councilmember Calvert would like Blue Anchor Park added to the directional signs.

Councilmember Scherer stated the following:

- the staff report showing the directional signs and cost is exactly what was asked for
- we should take off Rippey Road and add the Blue Anchor Park
- he suggested having a survey for the businesses to see if they want an additional sign program on Swetzer Road

Following further discussion on the matter, a motion was made to authorize staff to order and place the business park directional signs at the five locations, using the signs proposed with the amendment adding Blue Anchor Park and removing Rippey Road, with the additional funds (\$275) coming out of reserves, and direct staff to refer the monument signs to come back at a later date. On motion by Councilmember Scherer, seconded by Councilmember Liss and passed by voice vote.

Councilmember Ucovich asked if Ingram Signs could use a different blue paint on the signs that would last longer.

17. Blue Anchor Park Planning

Councilmember Ucovich wanted an update as to what has been done at Blue Anchor Park and what is yet to be done.

Recommended action: Discuss and give direction.

Public comment:

Janet Thew, 5572 St. Francis Circle, stated the following:

- there is an alternative for the grass issue, Delta Blue Grass has a series of native blend sods
- she expounded on the native bentgrass, it is a sod, and is extremely drought tolerant
- the contractor should be required to bring in better soil prep (top soil/compost)
- the park is a central area and should be a show place where we can set a good example by saving water and less maintenance

Tom Seth, Mareta Lane, stated the following:

- this is the poorest example of workmanship he has ever seen
- the plants were wrong, the concrete surface was not done correctly, the light fixture was done incorrectly, rocks were put in the play area
- a lot of money was paid for all of these mistakes and sloppy work

Jean Wilson stated the following:

- she thanked Councilmember Ucovich for asking for the report on the work that has been done at the Blue Anchor Park
- they should have put in a lot more plants, they switched plants and put in one gallon plants instead of five gallon plants
- the contractor needs to correct what has been done wrong

Hazel Hine, 3443 Barker Road, stated the following:

- she has 55 years of gardening experience
- most of the plants put in should have been planted in higher elevation or in the shade
- there is no mulch put in to help with the drainage
- there needs to be more landscaping to cool the concrete and asphalt at the park
- she volunteered to help if the Town needs it

Nancy Beck, 6304 David Avenue, stated the following:

- she agrees with Janet Thew, to use Bentgrass
- there are several young mothers with strollers that enjoy walking in the park regularly and have said that the buffalo grass is not children friendly

Council agreed to have Councilmember Ucovich and Planning Commissioner Thew report back to staff on what type of grass needs to replace the buffalo grass that was planted.

Following further discussion on the matter, a motion was made to direct staff to not release funds until Council has signed off on completion of the punch list. On motion by Councilmember Scherer, seconded by Councilmember Ucovich and passed by voice vote.
