AEROBIC SYSTEMS REMINDER

If your home has an aerobic septic system, you are required by Collin County to have routine maintenance performed at least three times a year. The company performing the maintenance is required to report to the County within 14 days of inspection or maintenance. EARTH DAY

Small steps can reap big rewards when enough people are taking those steps together. That is the basic premise of

Earth Day, celebrated around the world on April, 22. Pollution and waste negatively impact all of us. What can each of us do to make a difference? There are many things, and a number of them are quite simple.

- Choosing local native plants for your landscaping and garden can save water. These plants thrive on the normal rainfall of our region. See <u>www.txsmartscape.com</u> for more information.
- Rather than using chemical-based pesticides to keep the wild critters from eating your landscape or garden plants, try natural remedies such as cayenne pepper or commercially produced organic solutions such as Liquid Fence or Nature's Guide Garlic Pepper Tea.
- Water plants differently according to what they need. Check with local nurseries for advice.
- Use soaker hoses or trickle irrigation systems for trees and shrubs.
- Sweep outside porches, walks, patios etc. instead of using a water hose.
- Buy permanent items instead of disposables (i.e permanent coffee filters instead of paper).
- Buy frequently used items in bulk to save on packaging.
- Reuse or repurpose items whenever possible. Pass along unused items such as leftover paints to others to use.
- Repair all leaks. A leaky toilet can waste as much as 200 gallons of water per day.
- Participate in community recycling programs.

HAPPY BIRTHDAY, BEN!

Lucas Volunteer Fire Department

Benjamin Franklin was born 300 years ago on January 17,1706. We have all heard about his many inventions and accomplishments, but did you know that he can also likely be called the first volunteer fireman?

Franklin is credited with founding Philadelphia's (and possibly America's) first organized fire department. After noting how men of all ranks and professions rushed to help fight fires, Franklin suggested a "Club or Society of active Men belonging to each Fire Engine; whose Business is to attend all Fires with it whenever they happen."

Under Franklin's leadership, a group of thirty men came together to form the Union Fire Company on December 7, 1736. Their equipment included "leather buckets, with strong bags and baskets (for packing and transporting goods), which were to be brought to every fire. The blaze battlers met monthly to talk about fire prevention and fire-fighting methods. Thanks to the matchless leadership of Benjamin Franklin, the dire fear of fires expired in Philadelphia, which became one of the safest cities in the world in terms of fire damage.

The Lucas Volunteer Fire Department looks to the past for a lineage of firefighting service, but we are also looking ahead to determine the future needs of the citizens of Lucas. The similarities between the Union Fire Company and the Lucas VFD are strong, including the cross section of abilities and ages in the membership, as well as a strong commitment to the community.

Our pool of talent includes career firefighters, automobile technicians, software programmers and safety professionals. Salesman, heavy equipment operators, and management types enhance the ranks of our members. The membership includes volunteers of all ages.

Whereas our firefighting forefathers used buckets and hand pumps, we have some of the best and most up to date equipment available. Like our ancestors, the membership meets regularly to train and retain the skills necessary to be a first class department. Meetings are held on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of each month.

New schools, increasing population and heavier traffic are new challenges faced by the department but because of past and present leadership, the Lucas Volunteer Fire Department stands ready to protect and serve the citizens of our community.

Anyone who desires to be part of the continuing lineage of volunteer firefighting is welcome to submit an application or attend one of the regularly scheduled training meetings at the fire station.
