COLLIN COUNTY LIVESTOCK REGISTRATION



Owners of livestock can register their livestock with the Collin County Sheriff's Office Dispatch by providing the location, brand information, markings, and a contact number for the owner, including home, cell, or other numbers where the owner may be reached. This will enable owners of stray livestock to avoid the cost of animals being impounded should they get out and wander onto the roadway. Information can be forwarded to the Sheriff's Office at 972-547-5167. Tell the dispatch personnel that you would like to provide owner contact information to be used should your livestock ever stray off your property.

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BURN BAN ISSUED

Due to the continuing drought conditions, effective 6/13 Collin County Commissioners' Court issued a ban on all outdoor burning for all parts of unincorporated areas of Collin County. City of Lucas follows the County lead and is also prohibiting all outdoor burning. On June 14th, the County also banned the discharge of all fireworks by individuals. (City of Lucas already has a permanent ban on fireworks.) Professional fireworks shows are exempted from this ban.

WATER BILL CHANGE

You may have noticed by now that your latest water bill appears to be for a longer billing period than usual. This is actually not the case. In the past the billing period was always shown as being from the 28th to the 28th. In reality, the meters are read much earlier in the month, around the 15th, and the change you see this month is the first step in changing the bills to read from the 15th to the 15th. The bill you just received still charges for only your normal monthly usage for around 30 days. The next bill, and those thereafter, will show the correct billing dates of the 15th to the 15th. To determine your actual monthly usage, add two zeros to the number shown under the USAGE column of your water bill. For example, if the number shown is 145, then your usage for the month was 14,500 gallons. If you have any questions about your water bill, call City Hall at 972-727-8999 and ask to speak with Delta.

WATER WISE BEHAVIOR WILL PREVENT WATER WOES

A golf-course green lawn is usually the envy of your neighbors. This year it might invoke your neighbor's wrath and a fine from municipal court.

We are in the second year of a drought with no relief in sight. A drought in this region over 50 years ago lasted for 5 years, and weather forecasters are predicting this one could last another year if not more. Most cities in the region recently enacted Stage 3 water restrictions after North Texas Municipal Water District (NTMWD) mandated it June 1, 2006. The City of Lucas enacted a Stage 3 Drought Contingency plan on May 22 to comply with that mandate. The restrictions include:

No watering with sprinklers or irrigation systems between 10:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. and only once per week on your designated trash day. Exceptions: foundations, new plantings (less than 1 year old) and established trees may be watered by handheld hose, soaker hose or drip irrigation up to 1 hour on any day.

No new pool permits will be issued. Pools may not be drained and refilled, but may add water to maintain pool levels.

No new landscaping allowed.

No hosing of paved areas, buildings or windows.

No washing or rinsing of vehicles.

No use of water to allow runoff or waste.

No operation of outdoor ornamental fountains if they use treated water.

Penalties for failure to comply could result in a fine of up to \$2,000 for each offense.

In addition, Council is considering imposing an additional surcharge of \$2.50 per gallon of water on top of the established rate for every gallon over 15,000 per household. Those outside the city limits will pay an additional \$3.50 surcharge per gallon over that amount.

These restrictions are necessary to conserve the rapidly shrinking water in Lake Lavon. The lake is down by 10' and still dropping. It is possible that NTMWD will declare Stage 4 restrictions before long. Outside irrigation will be completely prohibited at that point in order to further conserve our water supply needed for essential use.

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to ensure that we don't run out of water for necessities. If everyone will substantially curtail their water use and participate in the conversation, we may delay or avoid the severity and problems that will come with Stage 4. If the drought continues for several years, we could all be facing water rationing.

The City is investigating various methods of reporting violators and issuing citations, which may include hiring additional personnel for that purpose. We also encourage citizens to report violations they observe to City Hall. NTMWD mandates that we reduce overall water consumption by 5% in Stage 3 and 10% in Stage 4. Possible repercussions for not doing so could include restricting the amount of water made available to Lucas, as well as doubling our water rates. Please do your part to conserve our tax dollars and our precious water.

WATER CONSERVATION TIPS

There are a number of no or low cost ways that each of us can help cut down on water consumption. Some of these are as follows:

- Run your dishwasher only with a full load. Many dishwashers do not require pre-rinsing of dishes. Check your manufacturer's instructions.
- Adjust your washing machine's water level for the size of the load.
- After turning on your hot water faucet, run the cooler water that first comes out into watering containers for use on your potted plants.
- Don't leave the water running while brushing teeth.
- Take quick showers rather than long baths.
- Check all faucets, water line connections, and toilets for leaks. To check for toilet leaks, add a few drops of food coloring to the tank. If any of the color appears in the bowl, the toilet needs adjustments or repair.
- Set your lawnmower blade to cut grass at a height of 3 inches. This helps shade the soil, reduces water evaporation, and also allows the roots to grow deeper.
- Don't over water house or garden plants. Watering only to their individual needs will not only save water, you will also have healthier plants.

Under no circumstances should children be allowed to us their scooters, go-carts, pocket bikes, etc. on public roads Additionally, as a matter of safety, unsupervised younger children should never be allowed to operate their bicycles on public streets.

This is not just a matter of potentially breaking the law ar having to pay a hefty fine. It is a matter of keeping our streets safe for all our citizens. Using common sense and supervising your kids at all times can help avert a tragic accident that would impact our entire community.
