RECYCLING PROGRAM CHANGES

Instead of 2 levels of service (with bags or without bags) there will now be only one level of service available. Once their current supply of clear bags are used up, participating residents are asked to switch to the clear blue bags members would call residents to check on them periodically, which may be purchased at Kroger, Albertsons, Brookshires, City Hall, or delivered to you on an as-needed basis by Barnes Waste Disposal with a bill to follow. You may also use paper grocery sacks or cardboard boxes (except in steady rain conditions.)

> The monthly cost, beginning with June, will be \$3.35 per month billed in 6 month increments (\$20.10) each June and December (pro-rated if started mid-term.)

As a reminder, DO NOT put recycling bags or recyclables inside a refuse container. The recycling driver will not check inside the container, and all containers will be emptied by the regular refuse driver into the other trash. The recyclables should be put out by 7:00AM the day of pickup. Collection is on the first and third Friday of each month. For any questions, call Barnes Waste Disposal at 972-396-1139.

Meat and potatoes?

Meat? The supermarket meat counter contains a variety of 2004 City of Lucas Comprehensive Plan regarding the supcuts; but it's virtually all the same. Angus and Hereford account for 60%, and 40% comes from 40 other breeds. Eighty percent of our ham and bacon come from three breeds of pigs, 7 breeds account for the remaining 20%. Only 2 varieties of chicken (out of 75 varieties) account for 97% of sales; their 23 week life span is a corporate secret Potatoes? Eight species of potatoes can grow edible tubers; nearly 100 varieties from these eight species can be grown in the US. But, over 80% of our potatoes come from 6 of the 100 varieties. One variety (Russet Burbank) produces 60% of our harvest (McDonalds uses only Russet Burbank's). What we think is coming from the farm is, of course, coming from corporations that control the process from seed stock to stove. Variety in meat and potatoes harvested on the family farm is advertising and packaging. Under the date stamped cellophane wrap of an apparent endless variety of meat and potatoes is food for thought.
