Fireworks Prohibited In Lucas



Summer means picnics, barbecues, and fireworks displays, especially around the Fourth of July. However, the possession, storage, sale, handling, and use of fireworks is prohibited within the City of Lucas and within 5,000 feet of its borders.

The Fourth of July is one of the busiest days of the year for emergency services, and most calls are for injuries and fires caused by people using illegal fireworks. Too often our firefighters care for painful and disfiguring firecracker injuries that happen to the eyes, hands, head, and face. This time of year is also perfect for the misuse of fireworks to ignite a large wildfire putting homes and lives in danger. There has been a tremendous amount of vegetation growth in Lucas due to all the rain received this spring. As the days become longer and hotter, much of this vegetation will dry out and become a good source of fuel for possible wildfires.

This Fourth of July our local law enforcement and fire department will be on the lookout for violators. Remember, the safest way to enjoy fireworks this Fourth of July is to attend a public display conducted by trained professionals.



Did you know that as a City of Lucas resident, you are required to maintain your property to the pavement. Why? This helps keep Lucas beautiful and helps sustain property values. It is also required by City ordinance.

You may also hear the

land near the pavement referred to as right-of-way or an easement. The Lucas City Code requires that property owners keep the right-of-way and easements clear of any obstructions that would be a hazard to vehicles or pedestrians. That includes obstructions like weeds, tall grass, trees, shrubs or other vegetation more than 12 inches in height. One reason our city looks so beautiful is that our citizens go beyond that requirement and maintain the right-of-way as an extension of their lawn.

To have a beautiful City with country charm and low taxes takes a concerted effort on everyone's part to keep Lucas beautiful. During the summer months, City staff will be proactively addressing property that is not being properly maintained. So please maintain your property and the right-of-way and easements adjacent to it to avoid a visit from the Code Enforcement Officer.

Many people will be firing up their grills throughout the summer. With grilling season set to be in full force, take time to review a few safety tips from the U.S. Fire Administration to protect yourself and your guests from a fire or burn injury:

- Only use your grill outside
- Keep your grill away from siding and deck rails
- Keep a three-foot safe zone around your grill to keep kids and pets safe
- Clean your grill after each use to remove grease, which can start a fire
- Place the coals from your grill in a metal can with a lid once they have cooled
- Open your gas grill before lighting
- Keep an eye on your grill, fire pit, or patio torches.

Summer 2016 Scheduled Street Maintenance

The City Council has identified Ingram Lane, Lewis Lane, Snider Lane, and Stinson Road as streets scheduled for milling and paving improvements this summer using \$571,040 of the 2015-2016 street maintenance budget. The City Council will also consider adding Estelle Lane and Moonlight Trail once the City's contractor, APAC submits a schedule.

Typically, a roadway reclamation is completed in six to seven days in six steps: 1) milled/pulverized, 2) re-milled while adding with 5% cement, 3) compacted with roller machines, 4) allowed to settle for three days, 5) overlaid with three-inches of hot mix asphalt, and 6) the surface is finished with tire machines.

Level up of certain areas where the pavement drops off is also needed along Graham Lane, Christian Lane, Lakeview Drive, and Wendy Lane. Funds in the amount of \$14,800 have been allocated for this work. The Wendy Lane culvert construction and design was completed this fiscal year at a cost of \$164,160. The total Street Maintenance Budget for the current fiscal year is \$750,000.

White Rock Creek Bridge Almost Complete

Last August the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) started construction of the new, wider White Rock Creek Bridge along Country Club Road. Accelerated Critical Path, Inc. (ACP) was the contractor selected for the construction of the 0.526-mile, \$1,800,000 roadway and bridge project. Along with replacing the 20-foot wide and 100-foot long existing bridge with a new 46-foot wide and 140-foot long new bridge, TxDOT will be improving and widening the shoulders north of the bridge to Rock Ridge Road. Many driveway culverts will be replaced and safety end treatments installed in this project as part of the shoulder improvements. ACP is planning a June/July traffic switch from the old bridge to the new bridge. Once this is done, the remaining elements of the new bridge can be completed in the area that currently conflicts with the old bridge. TxDOT estimates project completion by the end of this year.



With the Texas heat, the summer months can be potentially dangerous for our pets. Here are some helpful tips to keep your pets safe and comfortable this summer.

Never leave your pets in a parked car:

On a warm day, temperatures inside a vehicle can rise quickly to dangerous levels. On an 85-degree day, the temperature inside a car with the windows opened slightly can reach 102 degrees within 10 minutes. After 30 minutes, the temperature will reach 120 degrees.

Limit exercise on hot days:

Adjust the intensity and duration of exercise in accordance with the temperature. On very hot days, limit exercise to early morning or evening hours. Be aware that asphalt can damage your dogs paws. If the air temperature is 77 degrees, the asphalt temperature is 125 degrees and can cause skin destruction in 60 seconds. Be sure to carry water to keep your dog hydrated.

Provide ample shade and water:

Any time your pet is outside, make sure it has protection from the heat and sun and plenty of fresh, cold water. Tree shade and tarps are ideal because they don't obstruct air flow. A doghouse does not provide relief from heat. In fact, a doghouse makes the heat worse.
