With my withdrawal, Mr. Sanders will become your new Mayor when my term expires. I feel confident that the Mayor's office will be in good hands under Bob's leadership.

TRAFFIC LAW: Passing Stopped Emergency Vehicles

Upon approaching a stationary authorized emergency vehicle using visual signals, unless directed by a police officer, you must a) vacate the lane closest to the emergency vehicle if there are 2 or more lanes traveling in the direction of the emergency vehicle, or b) slow to a speed not to exceed 20 mph less than the posted speed limit or to 5 mph for posted speed limits less than 25 mph. Violation of this traffic law is a misdemeanor .

CODE VIOLATION NOTIFICATION UPDATE

The various codes in effect in Lucas were created to protect the safety of the residents, insure proper storm water flow, and to keep Lucas beautiful and maintain home values. Codes are created by the city council and enacted by ordinance.

To improve our code violation notification, we have instituted a new, 4-step process.

- During routine driving throughout the city, should the code enforcement personnel observe a violation, a letter will be sent to the resident and landowner informing them of the violation and asking them to correct the situation. The landowner and resident should contact the code enforcement department if they have any questions.
- The property will be inspected 10 days later. If the violation has not been corrected, a second letter will be sent requiring resolution within 10 days.
- 3) The property will be re-inspected 10 days after the second letter was sent. If the violation has not been corrected, a third letter will be sent requiring resolution within another 10 days (14 days for junk vehicles). Failure to comply will result in a citation being issued.
- 4) A final inspection will be made 10 days (14 days for junk vehicles) after the third letter is sent. If the code violation has not be corrected, a citation to appear in court will be given at that time. If the resident is not at home to receive the citation, a certified letter will be mailed to their home.

Please do not hesitate to contact the code enforcement department if you have any questions concerning a code violation. A list of frequently asked questions and their answers will soon be posted to the city's website to help you learn more about our code and its enforcement.

HOME RULE CHARTER UPDATE

"Becoming a home rule municipality will allow Lucas residents to have more of a voice in their local government", Robert Hagar, City Attorney, explained, "right now it's the Texas State Legislature that dictates what the of town of Lucas can do." Our Home Rule Charter Commission will be providing a detailed update in the next newsletter. More details about this commission and its progress are available on the city's website.
