City of Lucas Fire-Rescue Adds Three New Full-time Firefighter/Paramedics

The City of Lucas Fire-Rescue is very pleased to announce three new full-time employees. From left to right, Scott Wheless, Aaron Alderdice, and Ian Evans began their new positions as firefighter/paramedics in November. Aaron, Scott, and Ian were all volunteer emergency responders for the department previously.



Scott Wheless is a certified paramedic and a certified firefighter. He has been a Lucas Fire-Rescue volunteer since July 2011 and has 2 years additional experience in EMS. Scott is a fire academy instructor and a skills instructor for Emergency Medical Training Services where he teaches EMTs and paramedics.

Aaron Alderdice is a certified paramedic. He has been a Lucas Fire-Rescue volunteer since January 2015 and has 10 years additional experience in EMS. Aaron is also a certified public accountant, which he now practices on his days off from the fire station.

Ian Evans is a certified paramedic and a certified firefighter. He has been a Lucas Fire-Rescue volunteer since December 2011 and has 2 years additional experience in EMS. Ian continues to work for MedStar, which is the exclusive emergency healthcare provider to Fort Worth and 14 other Tarrant County cities. Blondy Jhune Bridges Project



The existing narrow two lane bridges on Blondy Jhune Road are no longer sufficient to handle Lucas traffic. In January of this year, an engineering consultant was hired to design new wider two lane bridges with room for a trail crossing similar to the Winningkoff Road bridge. One of the many joys of driving Lucas roads is the tree canopy shading the country lanes. The City Council after hearing from many of the residents made it clear to staff and the engineer to avoid the trees and keep the country feel.

A third bridge has been added to the project to avoid direct damage to the 48-inch, 250-year-old pecan tree next to the eastern bridge. Staff is planning to have an arborist on board to trim the tree at the proper time during the winter. Before the construction begins, a six-foot fence will be installed around the pecan tree to keep the contractor away from it.

The new roadway bridges with added trail room will be 40 feet wide. existing bridges are only 26 feet wide. The widening has a direct impact on 25+/- trees that will be removed to bridges rebuild the and elements. Staff will mark these trees with orange ribbons and paint before removal in January prior to the contractor starting the bridge construction. trunks are being saved and stored at city hall until a respectful use of the wood can be determined.

The bridge project is anticipated to start in March 2016 and last eight to ten months.

Neighborhood Connector Street Project



There are four consulting engineering firms working on various segments of the Neighborhood Connector Street Project. The firms are as follows:

> Metropolitan Infrastructure, PLLC (MI); Birkhoff, Hendricks & Carter, LLP (Birkoff); KCI Technologies, Inc. (KCI); and BW2 Engineers, Inc. (BW2)

The purpose of obtaining the schematic designs and costs for these projects is to determine how to fund these projects and how to sequence the construction. Staff's goal is to have the best set of numbers and estimates possible to aid the City Council in the financing discussions in January and February 2016. Based on the direction from the

City Council, staff is focusing design efforts and cost estimating on the following projects:

- **BLONDY JHUNE BRIDGE DESIGN** The bid plan set was advertised in the Wylie News newspaper on November 18 and 25 and December 2. The bid opening is planned for December 17, 2015 at 2:10 pm at City Hall. At that time, staff will have the bid costs from the various construction companies for the Blondy Jhune bridges. The bid award will be on the agenda for the January 7, 2016, City Council meeting. Construction is anticipated to start in February and last for about 10 months.
- **BLONDY JHUNE ROAD** MI is working on the design and is planning to have an engineer's estimate of cost ready for this project in January 2016.
- WINNINGKOFF ROAD Birkhoff is reviewing some of the boring and traffic data and the engineer's estimate should be ready in December 2015.
- SNIDER LANE FLOODPLAIN CROSSING KCI is preparing a phase one proposal for the schematic designs of the Snider Lane bridge and the roadway between Shady Lane and Natha Court. The bridge is on land owned by the United States and controlled by the Army Corp of Engineers. The bridge and adjacent roadway will need to be raised 12 to 16 feet to clear the floodplain.
- STINSON ROAD FLOODPLAIN CROSSING BW2 did some preliminary work on this project in 2012 and is preparing a proposal to complete the schematic design of the Stinson Road bridge and approximately 1,500 feet of Stinson Road. They have already done most of the preliminary work for this bridge in 2012. During the work completed in 2012, BW2 anticipated the need to raise the bridge and roadway eight feet to clear the floodplain.

While Forest Grove Road, Snider Lane, and Stinson Road are still part of the Neighborhood Connector Street Project, the design and cost estimating of these roads will be considered at a future date.

Eagle Scout Service Project Donated to Fire Department

With their newly built facility, they were in need of an outside seating area. The four forest green aluminum benches and picnic table were custom built for this well deserving group of firefighters. Engraved plaques with the firefighters names and shift were attached to each bench. An emblem was created that depicts the logo of the Fire Rescue Department and was placed in the center of their table. Repurposed fire hose was incorporated into the design as armrests for the benches. Landon's project was presented to the firefighters at the Frank H. Hamlin Fire Station on November 21, 2015.
