# **Background Information**

### Agenda Item 3C:

At the June 6, 2019, City Council meeting, staff brought forward a proposal to replace the damaged culvert at the intersection of East Lucas Road and Cedar Bend Trail. Due to recent storms, the culvert under Cedar Bend Trail separated causing the road to washout and lose structural stability. Staff barricaded the road for safety reasons. The estimate that came in for the project from Four Star Excavating was the best estimate with the lowest cost.

#### Agenda Item 3D:

The City applied for project funding from TxDOT's Safe Routes to School (SRTS) program in the amount of \$2,533,725 for a 4.6 mile, 10-foot wide shared use path (SUP) for Phase 1 that will connect to a future trail at Angel Parkway and Estates Parkway. The trail will go east along Estates Parkway to Country Club Road, and form a loop south to West Lucas Road, west to Ingram Road, and north, back to Estates Parkway. Phase 1 is the first of a two-phase unification trail in the City's Trails Master Plan that will include rest areas with benches and bike racks and will directly connect to four schools. Staff met with the TxDOT District Coordinator to discuss the proposed SRTS project and was informed that the project would be more likely to move forward quickly if the City agreed to pay for the engineering portion of the project. Staff is

### **MINUTES**

#### Call to Order

Mayor Olk called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

#### **City Councilmembers Present:**

#### **Staff Present:**

Mayor Olk determined that a quorum was present. Everyone was reminded to silence their cell phones and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

# Citizen Input

#### 1. Citizen Input.

Bob Streiff, 1730 Winningkoff spoke regarding the removal of the stop sign at Winningkoff and Blondy Jhune Road noting that speeding vehicles had increased since the stop sign was removed creating a dangerous intersection. Mr. Streiff stated that the yield sign put in its place was not doing enough to slow down vehicles and requested that the stop sign be reinstated.

John Ballis, 1820 Winningkoff stated that he would like an item placed on a future agenda so that the stop sign at the Winningkoff/Blondy Jhune intersection could be discussed further and stated that the intersection was dangerous. Mr. Ballis also discussed the construction traffic currently on Blondy Jhune and noted that a concrete truck had used his driveway to turn around and damaged his driveway.

Mayor Olk stated that the contractor was responsible for any damages caused and if he would discuss the issue further with the City Engineer, the City could determine which contractor was responsible and make the necessary repairs.

Michele Sullivan, 1730 Winningkoff stated that she was concerned about the increased speed in the neighborhood since the stop sign at Winningkoff and Blondy Jhune had been removed and the safety in the neighborhood. Ms. Sullivan also noted that construction vehicles had broken off tree branches while using her driveway.

Mayor Olk asked that the City Manager conduct a traffic and speed study at the corner of Winningkoff and Blondy Jhune to determine traffic patterns since the stop sign was removed and bring that information back to the City Council as an agenda item for further discussion.

# **Community Interest**

#### 2. Items of Community Interest.

Discuss pending legislation that is being considered by the 86th Legislature and provide guidance to City Staff and City Attorney.

City Attorney Joe Gorfida stated that HB 281 regarding lobbying activities did not pass and that the City was compliant with HB 252 regarding permit fees.

The City Council discussed the deregulation of plumbers and if amendments were needed to the City's Code of Ordinances. Mayor Olk noted that the Building Officials Association of Texas was working with the NCTCOG to regulate this at a regional level.

Mr. Gorfida stated that HB 2439 regarding building materials had not been signed by the Governor. The bill would prohibit cities from regulating building materials and masonry requirements which also included architectural materials.

Mayor Olk noted the following items of community interest:

- Prayers for the City of Virginia Beach for lives lost during a recent shooting
- 75th Anniversary of D-Day
- Summer clean up and electronic recycling event scheduled for Saturday, June 15 from 8:00 am to Noon

Mayor Olk noted that he met with Mayor Lessner of Fairview regarding the McKinney Airport expansion and flight patterns and they will be scheduling a meeting with the Mayor of McKinney to discuss the airport expansion in greater detail.

Councilmember Millsap stated that Mike Goddard had been named the finalist for the Lovejoy ISD Superintendent position and he believed would be a good addition to the school district and was very community oriented.

Councilmember Fisher noted that TxDOT would be holding a meeting to discuss the Bait Shop intersection of W. Lucas Road and Southview on June 18 from 6-9pm at Lovejoy Elementary.

#### MOTION:

A motion was made by Mayor Pro Tem Peele, seconded by Councilmember Fisher to approve the Consent Agenda as presented. The motion passed unanimously by a 7 to 0 vote.

# Regular Agenda

#### 4. Update from the Technology Committee regarding planning and communication efforts to improve internet service throughout the City.

Paul Rathgeb, Chairman of the Technology Committee gave a presentation discussing how the committee was attempting to identify internet problems throughout the City, brainstorm possible solutions, determine gaps throughout the City and propose recommended changes. He discussed the speed test that had been developed that would allow homeowners to access the website, speed.test.lucastexas.us enter their address and it would capture their internet provider and internet speed. Mr. Rathgeb stated that the information captured would be utilized for mapping speeds throughout Lucas and show where problem areas existed.

Mr. Rathgeb stated that information regarding the speed test would be advertised in the Lucas Leader, the City's website and word of mouth.

Mr. Rathgeb discussed with the City Council how to entice providers to the Lucas area as well as analysis of the information gathered.

This item was for discussion purposes only, no formal action was taken.

#### 5. Consider removing the road humps on Forestview Drive and Gold Dust Trail.

City Engineer Stanton Foerster discussed with the Council the steps needed in order to determine what the problems were in the area, if it was related to cut through traffic or speeding. He noted that a speed study was done during the Blondy Jhune bridge construction project, but at no other time had a speed study been conducted in the area. He also noted that the current signage and speed humps do not comply with any traffic calming device regulations.

Mayor Pro Tem Peele discussed the increased cut through traffic in neighborhoods due to the West Lucas Road/Southview intersection congestion and believed the speed humps should remain.

Councilmember Millsap stated that the speed humps were not solving the problem of cut through traffic or speeding and created slower response times for the ambulance and fire engine as well as creating a concern when carrying a patient in the ambulance.

Chief Stephens stated that the delay in response time for the ambulance and fire engine was 6-10 seconds.

Jeffry Coulson, 242 Forestview, stated that he had seen traffic and speeds increase as more development occurs in the area. He stated that removing the speed humps was a safety concern for the area, and he had not seen any traffic control efforts from the Sheriff's office. Mr. Coulson stated that he was opposed to having the speed humps removed.

**3** | P a g e City Council Tracey Norris, 241 Forestview, noted that with area construction, traffic would increase in their neighborhood over the next 18 months. She stated that the speed humps were effective as drivers do slow down for the speed humps and was opposed to having the speed humps removed.

Mike Fisher, 252 Forestview stated that the speed humps do slow drivers down and some type of device was needed in the neighborhood to slow traffic.

Laura Howard, 262 Estelle stated that the speeding traffic puts their children at risk and was not in favor of having the speed humps removed without an alternative being offered.

Mayor Olk noted a response was received from Kevin Patterson, 211 Estelle, that he was in opposition to removal of the speed humps but did not want to speak.

Ken Patterson, 232 Estelle stated that the Council has discussed removing the speed humps but provided no alternatives for a solution. Mr. Patterson stated that the neighborhoods have no sidewalk and residents must walk in the street area. He also asked if the City had data on the number of dispatched emergency vehicles to the area and stated he was opposed to the road humps being removed without any alternatives being proposed.

Michelle Sullivan, 1730 Winningkoff said that she was forced to drive through the neighborhood due to construction in other areas and suggested additional signage be put in place regarding surveillance and request additional sheriff's deputies monitor the area.

Mr. Ballis, 1820 Winningkoff stated that the speed humps were installed as part of the construction of the neighborhood. He asked that Council think outside the box to find a solution.

Mayor Olk stated that there had been recent enforcement in the Huntwick area and several tickets had been written. The Council has concerns about traffic in the area, but also had concerns related to fire-rescue response times and transporting patients in the ambulance. Mayor Olk stated that he was considering leaving the road humps in place until construction was completed.

Councilmember Millsap suggested conducting a traffic study of the volume of vehicles and speed on Forestview, Winningkoff and Gold Dust. He also requested the Deputy increase their patrols in the area and review what kind of impact their presence has on speed and remove the speed humps for a period of time. Councilmember Millsap suggested the speed humps could be re-installed if needed and according to regulation, but that a traffic study was needed.

Councilmember Baney stated that he agreed a traffic study needed to be conducted, but the road humps remain in place until another solution is determined.

Councilmember Duke stated that there was no reason to conduct a study until construction in the area was complete.

Councilmember Lawrence stated that speed humps do slow traffic and they should remain in place until a study was conducted and a solution determined.

Mayor Pro Tem Peele stated that she was not in favor of removing the speed humps and was not in favor of a traffic study in the Huntwick area, but a study should be conducted elsewhere throughout the city where there was a known speeding problem. Mayor Pro Tem Peele noted that she would like to have increased patrols from the Deputy in this area.

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Councilmember Fisher stated that a majority of the residents within the neighborhood are opposed to having the speed humps removed, and removing the humps is a safety concern for the neighborhood. Councilmember Fisher stated that another type of traffic calming device was needed before the speed humps were removed.

City Engineer Stanton Foerster discussed how speed humps were rated and discussed how traffic volumes and cut through traffic increases when school was in session.

- **MOTION:** A motion was made by Mayor Olk, seconded by Councilmember Fisher to conduct a traffic study that determines traffic volumes and speed conducted twice during the year, once while school was in session. The motion passed by a 6 to 1 vote with Mayor Pro Tem Peele voting in opposition.
- 6. Review Articles VIII and IX of the City Charter and provide direction to the City Attorney regarding any proposed amendments to be considered as part of a Charter update.

City Attorney Joe Gorfida had no recommended changes to Article VIII and recommend Article IX, Section 9.01 be amended to include salaries of city officers to the following statement:

request adoption of an ordinance (except one appropriating money, levying a tax, issuing bonds, zoning, or related to salaries of city officers).

There was no formal action taken on this item.

7. Provide update regarding fireworks patrol conducted over the July 4<sup>th</sup> holidays in 2017 and 2018 and give direction to staff regarding continued efforts of the fireworks patrol and citing illegal use of fireworks.

Assistant Fire Chief Lance Gant gave a presentation regarding fireworks patrols over the July 4<sup>th</sup> holiday during 2017 and 2018 noting that staff had averaged 175 overtime hours in 2017 and 55 hours in 2018. Fourteen warning letters were issued in 2017 and 10 in 2018. Assistant Chief Gant stated that they were able to purchase radios that enhanced the efficiency of communicating with staff members and discussed upcoming planning efforts for 2019 patrols. Assistant Chief Gant noted that staff would be patrolling on July 4, 5 and 6<sup>th</sup>. He also discussed the difficulty associated with issuing tickets due to the violation of discharging fireworks had to be observed by the staff member.

Development Services Director Joe Hilbourn discussed with the Council how a citizen could file a complaint in court, but they would have had to observe the violation. Mr. Hilbourn also noted that staff could not take a picture from a resident and submit that to court on their behalf.

Mayor Olk noted that staff would do their best to protect the citizens of Lucas with the resources available.

8. Consider a temporary solution to the under-road structure damage at the intersection of Cedar Bend and East Lucas Road and provide direction to City Staff.

5 | Page City Council June 6, 2019 Development Services Director Joe Hilbourn gave a presentation stating that during recent storms the culvert under Cedar Bend separated causing the road to lose structural stability. TxDOT has stated that they would include repairing the culvert with similar materials as part of their drainage study project related to intersection improvements in the area. Mr. Hilbourn stated that staff is recommending a temporary repair to reopen the road as soon as possible and let TxDOT take care of studying the drainage and designing the drainage for the area.

Mayor Pro Tem Peele asked if the temporary repair would allow fire truck access. Mr. Hilbourn stated that it would.

The City Council was in agreement to move forward with the temporary repair and allow TxDOT to take care of studying the drainage and designing the drainage for the area.

9. Consider the evaluation and possible revision of the City's benchmark cities to serve as a resource to generate comparable data regarding employee compensation.

City Manager Joni Clarke discussed with the Council the criteria used to identify potential benchmark cities, such as staffing levels, population, average market value, property tax rate, property tax revenue and average valuation. Ms. Clarke stated that information from cities was used in the Dallas/Fort Worth area, Austin, Houston and San Antonio.

Mayor Olk suggested that two different categories of benchmark cities be used; one group to compare director-level positions, such as the City Manager, City Engineer, City Secretary, Fire Chief, Finance Director, Development Services Director and City Engineer, which would be using comparable cities throughout the State, and another category that would focus on staff member positions comparative to local cities in the metroplex area.

Mayor Pro Tem Peele suggested sales tax revenue also be used as part of the comparison.

The City Council discussed selecting the following cities as benchmark cities for Director-level positions:

- Alamo Heights
- Fair Oaks Ranch
- Fairview
- Horseshoe Bay
- Lago Vista
- Lakeway
- Mont Belvieu

The Council also discussed adding the following four cities to the above list to be evaluated:

- Athens
- Decatur
- Granite Shoals
- Meadowlakes

#### 10. Provide direction to staff regarding the placement of a new sign at the fire station.

Fire Chief Ted Stephens discussed the current sign location noting that due to landscaping, signage was not easily seen from Country Club and shared with the Council various locations where the sign could be located.

The City Council was in agreement to locate the sign south of the driveway for better visibility.







- **Section 2.** To the extent of any irreconcilable conflict with the provisions of this ordinance and other ordinances of the City of Lucas governing the use and development of the Property and which are not expressly amended by this ordinance, the provisions of this ordinance shall be controlling.
- **Section 3**. That all ordinances of the City of Lucas in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance shall be, and same are hereby, repealed, provided, however, that all other provisions of said Ordinances are not in conflict herewith shall remain in full force and effect.
- **Section 4.** That should any word, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase or section of this Ordinance or of the City of Lucas Code of Ordinances, as amended hereby, be adjudged or held to be voided or unconstitutional, the same shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of said Ordinances or the City of Lucas Code of Ordinances, as amended hereby, which shall remain in full force and effect.
- **Section 5.** An offense committed before the effective date of the Ordinance is governed by prior law and the provisions of the City of Lucas Code of Ordinances in effect when the offense was committed and the former law is continued in effect for this purpose.
- **Section 6.** That any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions or terms of this Ordinance shall be subject to the same penalty as provided for in the Code of Ordinances, as amended, and upon conviction in the municipal court shall be punished by a fine not to exceed the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) for each offense, and each and every day such violation shall continue shall be deemed to constitute a separate offense.
- **Section 7.** That this Ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its passage and publication in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the City of Lucas, and it is accordingly so ordained

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

WHEREAS, prior to the offering, sale, and issuance of the Certificates, the appropriate officials of the City must review and approve the distribution of a "deemed final" preliminary official statement (the *Official Statement*) in order to comply with the requirements contained in 17 C.F.R. §240.15c2-12 (the *Securities and Exchange Commission Rule*); and

WHEREAS, based upon their review of the Official Statement, the appropriate officials of the City must find to the best of their knowledge and belief, after reasonable investigation, that the representations of facts pertaining to the City contained in the Official Statement are true and correct and that, except as disclosed in the Official Statement, there are no facts pertaining to the City that would adversely affect the issuance of the Certificates or the City's ability to pay the debt service requirements on the Certificates when due; and

WHEREAS, the City Council will comply with the requirements contained in the Securities and Exchange Commission Rule concerning the creation of a contractual obligation between the City and the proposed purchaser(s) of the Certificates (the *Purchasers*) to provide the Purchasers with an Official Statement in a time and manner that will enable the Purchasers to comply with the distribution requirements and continuing disclosure requirements contained in the Securities and Exchange Commission Rule; and

WHEREAS, the City Council authorizes the Mayor, City Manager, City Secretary, and the City Attorney, as appropriate, or their designees, to review, approve, and execute any document

or certificate in order to allow the City to comply with the requirements contained in the Securities and Exchange Commission Rule; and

WHEREAS, prior to the issuance of the Certificates, the City Council is required to publish notice of its intention to issue the Certificates in a newspaper of general circulation in the City, such notice stating (i) the time and place the City Council tentatively proposes to pass the ordinance authorizing the issuance of the Certificates, (ii) the maximum amount proposed to be issued, (iii) the purposes for which the Certificates are to be issued, (iv) and the manner in which the City Council proposes to pay the Certificates; and

WHEREAS, the City Council hereby finds and determines that such documents pertaining to the sale of the Certificates should be approved, and the City should proceed with the giving of notice of intention to issue the Certificates in the time, form, and manner provided by law; and

WHEREAS, the City Council hereby finds and determines that the adoption of this Resolution is in the best interests of the residents of the City; now, therefore,

The City Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to cause notice to be published of the City Council's intention to issue the Certificates in an amount not to exceed \$9,000,000 for the purpose of paying contractual obligations of the City to be incurred for making permanent public improvements and for other public purposes, to-wit: (1) constructing bridge improvement and street improvements (including utilities repair, replacement, and relocation), curbs, gutters, and sidewalk improvements, including drainage incidental thereto; (2) designing, constructing, acquiring, purchasing, renovating, equipping, enlarging, and improving the City's utility system; (3) the purchase of materials, supplies, equipment, machinery, landscaping, land, and rights-of-way for authorized needs and purposes relating to the aforementioned capital improvements; and (4) the payment of professional services related to the design, construction, project management, and financing of the aforementioned projects. The Certificates will be payable from the levy of an annual ad valorem tax, within the limitations prescribed by law, upon all taxable property within the City and additionally from a pledge of and lien on certain revenues derived from the operation of the City's utility system. The notice hereby approved and authorized to be published shall read substantially in the form and content of Exhibit A attached hereto, which notice is incorporated herein by reference as a part of this Resolution for all purposes.

SECTION 2. The City Secretary shall cause the notice described in Section 1 to be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the City, once a week for two consecutive weeks, the date of the first publication shall be at least thirty (30) days prior to the date stated therein for passage of the ordinance authorizing the issuance of the Certificates.

SECTION 3. The Mayor, City Manager, City Secretary, and the City Attorney, as appropriate, or their designees, are authorized to review and approve the Official Statement pertaining to the offering, sale, and issuance of the Certificates and to execute any document or certificate in order to comply with the requirements contained in the Securities and Exchange Commission Rule.

## **Agenda Item Request**

Consider the City's policy regarding the requirement of property owners to maintain private property, City easements and City right-of-way adjacent to public roadways and, specifically, discuss the trimming of trees including the canopy.

## **Background Information**

City staff has received a request from a citizen who resides on Snider Lane requesting that City staff trim the trees along the roadway including the tree canopy to a height of 14 feet along Snider Lane to Winningkoff Road and continue from Winningkoff Road to East Lucas Road to accommodate a recreational vehicle. City staff has also received a request from a citizen requesting similar service along Forest Grove Road.

The majority of City roadways do not have right-of-way but have a prescriptive easement that allows the City to maintain the roadway including drainage along the roadway, but the prescriptive easement would not extend to the trees that are located on private property.

In accordance with Code of Ordinance Section 8.01.001 Obstructions in right-of-way states:

(a) Duty of abutting property owners. All owners of real property abutting a public street or roadway within the city shall keep all rights-of-way or easements along, adjacent or contiguous to the public street or roadway clear of all obstructions that are a hazard to the operation of a motor vehicle or to pedestrians, including but not limited to weeds, tall grass, trees, shrubs or other vegetation more than eighteen (18) inches in height.

It has been the standard practice for City staff to trim trees that interfere with the safe passage of vehicles on public roadways or that impede the line of sight at intersections. The clearance needed for the tallest apparatus in the Fire-Rescue Department is 11 feet; however, some mutual aid cities have apparatus that need clearance of 13 feet and six inches.

Mrs. Himmelreich has expressed concern that her property is a flag-lot with a 25-foot strip for the driveway. Purchasing the right-of-way dedication would not only enable her to install a wider entrance and driveway but to install privacy trees.

The right-of-way dedication belongs to the City of Lucas and is in place for a future roadway connecting West Forest Grove Road to Orr Road. Dedicating the entire right-of-way to Mrs. Himmelreich would land lock Block 1, a single lot part of the Stonegate subdivision. If the right-of-way from the Lucas Creek Estates plat is dedicated to both Mrs. Himmelreich and Block 1 Stonegate, then the right-of-way dedicated by Stonegate for the Forest Grove Road extension/relocation should be dedicated to Block 1 Stonegate as well.



Thank you for your time and consideration. We look forward to hearing from you.





Section 253.008 and Chapter 272 of the Local Government Code provide the requirements that the City must follow for the sale, lease or transfer of land.

1. The City may sell real property either by sealed bids or public auction. (governed by Section 272.001)

#### a. Sealed Bids

- For sealed bids the City must first publish notice in the newspaper and include a description of the property, its location, and the procedure by which sealed bids to purchase the land or offers to exchange the land may be submitted.
- Notice must be published on two separate dates and the sale or exchange may not be made until after the 14<sup>th</sup> day after the date of the second publication.

#### b. Public Auction


- Must publish notice of the auction before the 20<sup>th</sup> day before the date the auction is held.
- Notice must be published once a week for three consecutive weeks before the date the auction is held in newspaper of general circulaiton.
- Notice to include description and location of property and the date, time and location at which the auction is to be held.

#### Exemptions to the bidding and auciton requirements.

- The land decribed herein may not be sold. Conveyed or exchanged for less than fair market value of the land or interst unless the conveyance, sale, or exchange is with one or more abutting property owners who own the underlying fee simple.
- Fair market value is determined by an appraisal obtained by the city.
- (1) narrow strips of land, or land that because of its shape, lack of access to public roads, or small area cannot be used independently under its current zoning or under applicable subdivision or other development control ordinances;
- (2) streets or alleys, owned in fee or used by easement;
- (3) land or a real property interest originally acquired for streets, rights-of-way, or easements that the political subdivision chooses to exchange for other land to be used for streets, rights-of-way, easements, or other public purposes, including transactions partly for cash;
- (4) land that the political subdivision wants to have developed by contract with an independent foundation;
- (5) a real property interest conveyed to a governmental entity that has the power of eminent domain;
- (6) a municipality's land that is located in a reinvestment zone designated as provided by law and that the municipality desires to have developed under a project plan adopted by the municipality for the zone; or
- (7) a property interest owned by a defense base development authority established under Chapter 378, Local Government Code, as added by Chapter 1221, Acts of the 76th Legislature, Regular Session, 1999.

- (c) The land or interests described by Subsections (b)(1) and (2) may be sold to:
- (1) abutting property owners in the same subdivision if the land has been subdivided; or
- (2) abutting property owners in proportion to their abutting ownership, and the division between owners must be made in an equitable manner.

## **Agenda Item Request**

Consider authorizing the City Manager to proceed with receiving a proposal from Lee Engineering to provide a two-phase traffic review: (1) data collection and (2) design and creation of solutions related to traffic calming with the Huntwick neighborhood and Winningkoff Road.

### **Background Information**

In 2016, Lee Engineering was selected as the preferred consulting engineer for traffic related studies. On Thursday, June 6th, City Engineer Stanton Foerster contacted Lee Engineering about the need for an origin/destination, speed, and volume data collection through the Huntwick neighborhood along Estelle Lane, Gold Dust Trail, and Forestview Drive.

The study area needs to be determined, such as whether Estelle Lane will be studied or just the portion on the Huntwick neighborhood. Typical speed studies place data collection every quarter mile. The Huntwick neighborhood is a slightly different study area.

Origin and destination (O-D) data collection can be achieved in various degrees of detail. The most detailed study is done by manual collection of license plate numbers and using the numbers to determine the ZIP Code associated with the vehicle registration.

The equipment for volume data collection is very similar to the equipment for speed data collection, but not all vehicles are accounted for in speed data collection. A minimum of four bargain data collection points are needed along the Estelle Lane collector connection.

Lee Engineering has proposed the following scope for the data collection and recommendations:

- Review existing traffic control devices in the neighborhood on West Estelle Lane, Winningkoff Road, Gold Dust Trail, and Forestview Drive.
- Review existing thoroughfare network and proposed thoroughfare plan to understand connectivity in the area.
- Identify capacity constraints in the network and the impacts on flows in the City and the neighborhood.
- Review existing construction projects and their impact on traffic flows in the City.
- Collect 24-hour Turning Movement Counts (TMC) at the intersection of Country Club Road at West Estelle Lane, Forestview Drive at Winningkoff Road, and Winningkoff Road at East Lucas Road.
- Review the 24-hour Turning Movement Counts (TMC). Determine goals of speed and volume counts and select up to eight locations on Forestview Drive, Gold Dust Trail,

West Estelle Lane, and Winningkoff Road. Also, select appropriate method for speed and volume counts (tubes, LIDAR, or pole mounted counter).

- Collect speed and volumes data at up to eight locations identified above.
- Based on the review of volumes and speed counts, determine if the O-D study should be conducted and identify goals of the O-D study.
- Collect O-D data with either license plates or Bluetooth on West Estelle Lane at Country Club Road and on Forestview Drive at Winningkoff Road.
- Review the volume, speed, and O-D data collected and identify any concerns related to speed and cut-through traffic in the neighborhood.
- If needed, propose traffic calming measures and associated costs.

## **Agenda Item Request**

Consider an update on the Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA), North Pump Station and Water Tower Project; and authorize the City Manager to enter into an agreement for the SCADA system.

### **Background Information**

On April 9, 2019, City staff received two bids for the North Pump Station and Water Tower Project. One bid was from Felix Construction Company in the amount of \$5,793,331, and the other bid was from Rey-Mar Construction in the amount of \$6,124,520. The budget for the project is \$2.8 million.

The plans were prepared by BW2 Engineers. They have had several discussions with the bidders, potential bidders, and subcontractors about extremely high bids. Based on these discussions, there was a consensus that the project is complicated and has too many elements compared to most water tower projects. According to the bidders, the possible two-year duration of the project also made bidding difficult. The contractors and subcontractors are extremely busy and simply cannot take on extra work without charging a premium.

On May 2, 2019, the City Council rejected all bids for the North Pump Station and Water Tower. Staff and BW2 Engineers have been reviewing the plans and split the project into three parts: (1) Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) computer system, (2) pump station, and (3) water tower.

City Engineer Stanton Foerster has interviewed two engineering firms to assist with the SCADA design and implementation. The SCADA design will update the software and improve communication with all locations around the City including the new pump station and water tower. This design work should proceed without delay once a consultant is selected.

BW2 Engineers has separated the construction plan into two main areas. The first area focuses on the new pump station and site improvements. The second area is specific to the water tower. The water tower construction cannot begin until the new pump station is operational.

The City budgeted \$2,800,000 for the North Pump Station Water Tower and Pump House project from 2017 Certificates of Obligation. As recommended by the consulting engineering firm BW2 Engineers, staff would like to separate the projects into three components as follows:

FY 2018-2019 Budget Elevated Water Tower (21-8210-490-125) \$2,850,120

Less: Encumbrance for BW2 Design (\$72,880)

Remaining in FY 2018-2019 Budget (21-8210-490-125) \$2,777,240

Less: SCADA Computer System Project (\$100,000)

(re-appropriation to account 21-8210-490-127)

The remaining balance in account 21-8210-490-125 Elevated Water Tower after re-appropriation to account 21-8210-490-127 SCADA Computer System Project \$2,677,240

Staff has set up an additional project account 21-8210-491-128 for the North Pump Station Project and will allocate cost and request additional funding when project costs become available.

Staff is concerned regarding the potential cost of this project and would like the City Council to consider putting the water projects that are identified as part of the 2019 capital water projects in the amount of \$1,449,217 on hold until bids are received for the North Pump Station and Water Tower projects in case the City needs additional funding.

#### Recommendation

Staff recommends the following proposed schedule:

#### SCADA (21-8210-490-127)

• July 2019 – Proceed with the SCADA design and implementation in late 2019 and early 2020.

#### North Pump Station (21-8210-491-128)

- July/August 2019 Advertise pump station construction plans.
- August/September 2019 Award construction contract for pump station construction.
- September/October 2019 Contractor receives the notice to proceed.
- May/June 2020 Pump station becomes operational.

## **Agenda Item Request**

Consider an update on the condition related to the Winningkoff, Snider and Stinson Bridges, identify the Snider Bridge replacement as a priority project, and postpone the Stinson Bridge design and construction work.

### **Background Information**

In previous City Council meetings, the City Council expressed an interest in the reconstruction of the Stinson Bridge using 2019 Certificates of Obligation funding. During 2017, the City installed water level devices to help notify staff when the water levels reach a level that would warrant monitoring and potential closure of roadways due to anticipated flooding by using gates to protect the traveling public at both the Stinson and Snider Bridges. Due to the opening of the Stinson Highland detention ponds, the need for the Stinson Bridge closures during heavy rain events has reduced greatly.

However, the City is experiencing ongoing challenges with Snider Bridge. In 2014, minor repairs were made to the Snider Bridge to prevent the undermining of the existing culverts. These minor repairs may not be sufficient to maintain the stability of the bridge. During rain events, it is common for staff to close the bridge. At times, the flooding is so substantial that staff cannot reach the gates because the water has already risen past the gates. There is difficulty in relocating the gates because the City does not have right-of-way or an easement that would allow the east gate to be located closer to Shady Lane. The removal of debris has become a challenge and often large trees are wedged against the bridge.

In addition, during the first part of June, a separation was noticed between the Winningkoff Bridge and the pavement to the north of the bridge.

City Engineer Stanton Foerster contacted Lakes Engineering to request a proposal for bridge inspections of the Winningkoff and Snider Bridges. From time to time, TxDOT will review the stability of the off-system bridges, but due to the pavement separation along Winningkoff Bridge and the repeated flooding of Snider Bridge, a more in-depth inspection is needed.

Based on the hazard and negative impact on the safety of the traveling public, staff recommends that the reconstruction of the Snider Bridge should be the highest engineering priority.

### **Budget/Financial Impact**

At the City Council meeting on April 4, 2019, the City Council identified the reconstruction of Stinson Road and the bridge from the Bristol Park development to Bentwater Drive as a capital project in the amount of \$4,920,000 for construction and design.

City Engineer Stanton Foerster has contacted Lakes Engineering to request a proposal for the inspection of the Snider and Winningkoff bridges. Staff anticipates the cost of these inspections to be approximately \$10,000 and the City will fund this work from account 11-6209-309 Professional Services in the Public Works/Engineering budget.

#### Recommendation

Staff recommends postponing the Stinson Bridge design and construction work and to identify the replacement of Snider Bridge as a priority engineering project.

### **Agenda Item Request**

Consider the evaluation and possible revision of the City's benchmark cities to serve as a resource to generate comparable data regarding employee compensation.

## **Background Information**

The City Council establishes benchmark cities to serve as a resource to generate comparable data regarding employee compensation. To retain a skilled workforce and to remain competitive in the market, the City Council will periodically authorize a compensation market study and implement market adjustments specific to positions that are deemed below acceptable market levels.

#### **Previous Comprehensive Market Survey**

On August 7, 2014, the City Council discussed the method and process used to conduct market surveys and criteria to be used to identify benchmark cities. The following cities were selected to serve as benchmark cities:

- Celina
- Fairview
- Fate
- Melissa
- Parker
- Prosper
- Sunnyvale
- Trophy Club

The City hired Wendi Delgado of Delgado Consulting to perform a comprehensive market salary survey for twenty-two positions and a benefits survey using the eight benchmark cities. A presentation was provided on February 5, 2015 (fiscal year 14/15).

A pay scale was also developed using market data accordingly:

- Minimum = 85% of Market Average
- Midpoint = 100% of Market Average
- Maximum = 115% of Market Average

To calculate the market, the high and low responses were eliminated, and the average was calculated using the remaining six responses. This number was used as the midpoint (100% of

market average). Market adjustments were implemented for nonexempt staff in fiscal year 14/15 (February 9, 2015) and market adjustments were processed for exempt staff in fiscal year 15/16 (October 8, 2015).

#### **Recent Market Salary Survey**

At the budget workshop held on July 19, 2018, a request was made to fund a compensation market study and this request was not funded.

A decision was made to conduct an in-house market compensation study based on the following factors:

- During a recent recruitment to fill a vacant Firefighter/Paramedic position, the City only received six applications.
- Over a five-year period, the City's Public Works Department has experience turnover ratios ranging from 12.5% to 37.5%

Staff conducted a salary range survey from six benchmark municipalities. The two benchmark municipalities that do not have an established salary range were not included in the survey (Sunnyvale and Parker). To establish the market, staff collected the minimum, midpoint and maximum for the salary ranges and the median was calculated using this salary range data.

The goal of this project was to use the pay ranges from benchmark cities to calculate the market level and then compare actual compensation levels by position in analyzing the City of Lucas employee compensation. Employees that were in their current position with the City for less than three years were compared to the minimum and employees that were in their current position with the City for three years or more were compared to the midpoint. To be recommended for a market adjustment, the compensation of a specific position would have to be greater than 10% below market.

The following five job positions in the City of Lucas were recommended for market adjustments:

Development Services Director Finance Director Fire Chief EMS Officer Fire Captain Firefighter/Paramedic

#### **Future Considerations**

At the January 17, 2019, City Council meeting, the City Council thought that it may be time to evaluate the City's benchmark cities. There are two approaches worth considering. The first

approach is to continue identifying benchmark cities. There is a variety of selection criteria that can be used to update our established benchmark cities.

- Per Capita Spending
- Property Tax and/or Sales Tax Revenue
- Population
- Home Rule Cities
- Geographical Area
- Staff Size
- Ad Valorem Taxable Value
- Median Household Income
- Median Cost of a House
- City Services Provided
- Perspective (Should the City choose benchmarks cities that are comparable today or fit the vision of where the City would like to be in a specific time period?)

The second approach would be to evaluate the labor market. A labor market is the market that the City of Lucas competes for employees. In determining the labor market, it can represent a variety of organizations and include diversity in size, geographic location and other criteria. In the past five years, the City has lost employees to the following organizations:

- Allen
- Celina
- Frisco (accepted position with Frisco and then returned to Lucas)
- Lewisville
- North Texas Municipal Water District
- Plano

With an assessment of the relative market data, the City could strive towards a specified market position. For example, the City would strive to position itself at a mid-level position at the 50<sup>th</sup> percentile. On average, 50% of the labor market will pay higher than the City of Lucas.

At the April 4, 2019, City Council meeting, City Manager Joni Clarke gave a presentation regarding the City's compensation system noting that the City provides for cost of living adjustments as well as merit compensation. Ms. Clarke discussed identifying benchmark cities, to provide compensation data for use in a future market study as some of the current benchmark cities did not provide an appropriate comparison to Lucas. Ms. Clarke also discussed how market data was calculated in previous studies that included eliminating the high and low responses, with the average used for the remaining responses, as well as the midpoint of the market average.

Ms. Clarke recommended the Council identify eight to twelve benchmark cities and their selection criteria such as population, property tax rate, geographical area, or staff size and direct City staff accordingly on how to proceed.

Mayor Olk suggested the following methodology be used:

- Choose approximately 8-12 benchmark cities that have similar employee size, job descriptions and population
- Use median for the calculation and see how it compares to the average calculation
- Review various positions with each budget cycle

#### Selection of Benchmark Cities

At the June 6, 2019, City Council meeting, the Council discussed preferences from the list of potential benchmark cities using staffing levels, property tax revenue, tax rate and average valuation. The Council suggested including sales tax revenue as part of the evaluation. Mayor Olk recommended selecting two different groups of benchmark cities; one group to compare Director-level positions which would be using comparable cities throughout the State and a different group for all other staff positions that would focus on the North Texas region.

The City Council discussed selecting the following cities as benchmark cities for Director-level positions:

- Alamo Heights
- Fair Oaks Ranch
- Fairview
- Horseshoe Bay
- Lago Vista
- Lakeway
- Mont Belvieu

The Council also discussed adding the following four cities to the above list to be evaluated:

- Athens
- Decatur
- Granite Shoals
- Meadowlakes

Mayor Olk recommended the below cities to be considered as potential benchmark cities for all other staff positions:

## **Budget/Financial Impact**

Staff would like to pursue an agreement with a municipal compensation specialist in the Dallas metropolitan area who would consider consulting work. Staff would conduct some of the research internally. The cost is undetermined at this point. The City of Lucas has 23 positions to evaluate that represents 38 employees.

#### Recommendation

- 1. Identify eight to twelve benchmark cities with agreed upon selection criteria and obtain actual compensation data to perform a comprehensive market study for fiscal year 19/20 on all 23 positions in the City.
- 2. Acquire the services of a consultant for fiscal year 19/20 comprehensive market study. Update pay plan compensation ranges using actual compensation data of benchmark cities and review the position classification as an integral part of the City's Pay Plan using compensable factors include items such as education, experience, supervision, technical skills, working conditions and fiscal responsibility and the overall structure of the organization. Update compensation data using in-house resources for subsequent years based on the strategy noted below (recommendation #3).
- 3. Beginning in fiscal year 20/21, the City Manager recommends a three-year review cycle for market compensation as part of the annual budget process. The following departments

Consider repairs to a vintage 1954 fire truck commonly referred to as "Streaker" for use during special events and amend the Fiscal Year 18/19 budget by appropriating \$118,495 to account 11-6212-232 Development Services Vehicle Maintenance from unrestricted General Fund Reserves.

### **Background Information**

The City owns a vintage 1949 fire truck that is commonly referred to as "Streaker." This truck has been in storage and not operational for at least twelve years.

At the November 3, 2016, City Council meeting, funds were allocated in the amount of \$5,000 to assist in making some repairs to "Streaker" so the truck could potentially be used during the Country Christmas event on December 2, 2016.

At the November 17, 2016, City Council meeting, Friends of the Lucas Fire-Rescue Board members Kathleen LoSapio and Paul Rathgeb stated that the Board was raising funds to be used towards the restoration of "Streaker" and had obtained an estimate in the amount of approximately \$8,000 for repairs; however, the estimate did not include engine work.

Fire Captain Ethan Carver discussed costs associated with repainting and making the vehicle drivable that were estimated between \$7,000 and \$12,000.

Mayor Olk directed staff to delay repair efforts to allow time for the Friends of the Lucas Fire-Rescue Board to obtain estimates and outline a timeline for restoration.

Fundraising and restoration efforts for "Streaker" have not gone as expected and the City Council added "Streaker" to the City Manager's Work Plan for Fiscal Year 18/19. The City's Vehicle Committee was tasked this fiscal year to obtain estimates to bring "Streaker" back to some level of service. City staff contacted approximately seven to ten vendors to assist in restoring "Streaker" and could only find one vendor interested in this project. Staff arranged for the transportation of "Streaker" to Armadillo Auto Restoration in Hamilton, Texas to complete an assessment.

Staff believes there were two vehicles: "Ole Streaker" and "New Streaker." Ole Streaker was a 1949 Fire Truck that was purchased in 1973. According to anecdotal information, New Streaker was purchase in the 1980s and is a 1954 fire truck which is the vehicle the City currently has in our possession. Staff believes that this truck was purchased from the City of Seagoville, Texas, on September 30, 1985, and has not been used by the City for at least twelve years. The condition is deteriorating from lack of use and maintenance.

The estimates to refurbish "Streaker" closely to its original condition, excluding mechanical work, are estimated at approximately \$118,495.

This project would require amending the Fiscal Year 18/19 budget by appropriating \$118,495 to account 11-6212-232 Development Services Vehicle Maintenance from unrestricted General Fund Reserves.

#### Recommendation

The City Manager and the Development Services Director/Chair of the Vehicle Committee does not support making the repairs to the 1954 Fire Truck. If the City Council does not fund the repairs, the vehicle should be sold so the vehicle does not continue to deteriorate and take up valuable storage area.

### Motion

I make a motion to approve/deny making repairs to a vintage 1954 fire truck commonly referred to as "Streaker" for use during special events and amend the Fiscal Year 18/19 budget by appropriating \$118,495 to account 11-6212-232 Development Services Vehicle Maintenance from unrestricted General Fund Reserves.



#### ARTICLE X

#### **Franchises**

## SECTION 10.01 Ordinance Granting Franchise

No grant to use the public right-of-way or property under ownership of the City shall be granted for a term of more than twenty (20) years from the date of the grant, renewal or extension of such franchise unless approved by citizens in accordance with this article. The City Council may, by a majority vote, seek approval from the voters by submitting all applications exceeding twenty (20) years to an election in accordance with State law. The prospective franchisee, not the City, shall fund the cost of said election.

## SECTION 10.02 Right of Regulation

In granting, amending, renewing and extending public service and utility franchises, the City reserves unto itself all the usual and customary rights, including, but not limited to, the following rights:

- (1) To repeal the franchise by ordinance for failure to begin construction or operation within the time prescribed, or for failure to comply with terms of the franchise;
- (2) To require all extensions of service within the City limits to become part of the aggregate property of the service and operate subject to all obligations and reserved rights contained in this Charter. Any such extension is considered part of the original grant and terminable at the same time and under the same conditions as the original grant;
- (3) To require expansion and extension of facilities and services and to require maintenance of existing facilities to provide adequate service at the highest level of efficiency and effectiveness;
- (4) To require reasonable standards of service and quality of product and prevent rate discrimination;
- (5) To impose reasonable regulations and restrictions to insure the safety and welfare of the public;
- (6) To examine and audit accounts and records and to require annual reports on local operations of the public service or utility;
- (7) To require the franchisee to restore, at franchisee's expense, all public or private property to a condition as good as or better than before disturbed by the franchisee for construction, repair or removal;

- (8) To require the franchisee to furnish to the City, from time to time within a reasonable time following request of the City, at franchisee's expense a general map outlining current location, character, size, length, depth, height and terminal of all facilities over and under property within the City and its extraterritorial jurisdiction; and
- (9) To require compensation, rent or franchise fees to be paid to the City as may be permitted by the laws of the State.

## **SECTION 10.03** Regulation of Rates

- (1) The City Council has the power to fix and regulate the rates and charges of all utilities and public services, consistent with State law.
- (2) Upon receiving written request from a utility or public service requesting a change in rates, or upon a recommendation from the City that rates for services provided by or owned by the City be changed, the City Council shall call a public hearing for consideration of the change.
- (3) The City, public service or utility must show the necessity for the change by any evidence required by the City Council, including but not limited to, the following:
  - (A) Cost of its investment for service to the City;
  - (B) Amount and character of expenses and revenues connected with rendering the service;
  - (C) Copies of any reports or returns filed with any state or federal regulatory agency within the last three (3) years; or
  - (D) Demonstration that the return on investment, if any, is within the state and federal limitations.
- (4) If not satisfied with the sufficiency of evidence, the City Council may hire rate consultants, auditors and attorneys to investigate and, if necessary, litigate requests for rate changes, the expense of which shall be reimbursed to the City by the franchisee.

## SECTION 10.04 Transfer of Franchise

No public service or utility franchise is transferable, except with the approval of the City Council. However, the franchisee real or personal property may pledge franchise assets as security for a valid debt or mortgage.

## SECTION 10.05 Franchise Value Not to be Allowed

Franchises granted by the City are of no value in fixing rates and charges for public services or utilities within the City and in determining just compensation to be paid by the City for property which the City may acquire by condemnation or otherwise.

#### ARTICLE XI

#### **Legal Provisions**

## SECTION 11.01 Notice of Claim

The City shall not be held liable on account of any claim for the death of any person or injuries to any person or damage to any property unless the person making such complaint or claiming such damages shall, within ninety (90) days after the time at which it is claimed such damages were inflicted upon such person or property, file with the City a written statement, under oath, stating the nature and character of such damages or injuries, the extent of the same, the place where same happened, the circumstances under which the same happened and the condition causing same, with a detailed statement of each item of damages and the amount thereof, giving a list of any witnesses known by affiant to have seen the accident.

## SECTION 11.02 Service of Process Against the City

All legal process against the City shall be served upon the City Secretary.

#### SECTION 11.03 Nepotism

No person within the second degree by affinity or within the third degree by consanguinity to a Councilmembers or the City Manager shall be employed by or contracted with the City. This shall not apply to the following:

- (1) Any person employed by the City prior to the person related in the above degree filing to run for elective office or being nominated for an appointment; or
- (2) Any person who is a seasonal employee or intern of the City.

## **SECTION 11.04** Construction of Terms

The construction of the provisions of this Charter shall comply with State law as amended.

## SECTION 11.05 Charter Deemed Public Act

This Charter must be deemed a public act and judicial notice shall be taken thereof in all courts.

## SECTION 11.06 Severability of Portions of Charter

If any provision of this Charter violates the Constitution of the United States, the Texas Constitution or any statues of the State, or if any court holds such provisions for naught for any reason, the remaining provisions shall not be affected thereby and shall continue in effect.

#### ARTICLE XII

### **Adoption of Charter**

#### **SECTION 12.01** Procedure

- (1) This Charter shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the City for adoption or rejection on May 10, 2008, at which election, if a majority of the qualified voters voting in such election shall vote in favor of the adoption of this Charter, it shall then immediately become the governing law of the City until amended or repealed.
- (2) It being impractical to submit this Charter by sections, it is hereby prescribed that the form of ballot to be used in such election shall be as follows, to-wit:

## FOR THE ADOPTION OF THE CHARTER AGAINST THE ADOPTION OF THE CHARTER

(3) The present City Council of the City shall call an election in accordance with the provisions of the general laws of the State governing such elections, and the same shall be conducted and the returns made and results declared as provided by the laws of the State governing municipal elections, and in case a majority of the votes cast at such election shall be in favor of the adoption of such Charter, then an official order shall be entered upon the records of said City by the City Council of Lucas declaring the same adopted, and the City Secretary shall record at length upon the records of the City, in a separate book to be kept in the City Secretary office for such purpose, such Charter as adopted, and such City Secretary shall furnish to the Mayor a copy of the Charter which copy of the Charter shall be forwarded by the Mayor as soon as practicable, to the Secretary of State under the seal of the City together with a certificate showing the approval of the qualified voters of such Charter.

## SECTION 12.02 Amendment of Charter

Amendments to this Charter may be framed and submitted to the qualified voters of the City as provided by the Texas Constitution and the laws of the State as presently enacted or hereafter amended; but no more often than once every two (2) years, as provided by the laws of the State.

## **SECTION 12.03 Council Review of Charter**

The City Council shall review the Charter at least once every five (5) years to determine whether any amendments are necessary.
