

We all love spending the long, sunny days of summer outdoors with our furry companions, but being overeager in hot weather can spell danger. To prevent your pet

from overheating, take these simple precautions provided by ASPCA experts:

- Visit the vet for a spring or early-summer checkup. Make sure your pets get tested for heartworm if they aren't on year-round preventative medication.
- Pets can get dehydrated quickly, so give them plenty of fresh, clean water when it's hot or humid outdoors. Make sure your pets have a shady place to get out of the sun, be careful not to over-exercise them, and keep them indoors when it's extremely hot.
- Know the symptoms of overheating in pets, which include excessive panting or difficulty breathing, increased heart and respiratory rate, drooling, mild weakness, stupor or even collapse. Symptoms can also include seizures, bloody diarrhea and vomit along with an elevated body temperature of over 104 degrees.
- Animals with flat faces, like Pugs and Persian cats, are more susceptible to heat stroke since they cannot pant as effectively. These pets, along with the elderly, the overweight, and those with heart or lung diseases, should be kept cool in airconditioned rooms as much as possible.
- Never leave your animals alone in a parked vehicle. Not only can it lead to fatal heat stroke, it is illegal in several states!
- Do not leave pets unsupervised around a pool—not all dogs are good swimmers. Introduce your pets to water gradually and make sure they wear flotation devices when on boats. Rinse your dog off after swimming to remove chlorine or salt from his fur, and try to keep your dog from drinking pool water, which contains chlorine and other chemicals.

- Open unscreened windows pose a real danger to pets, who often fall out of them. Keep all unscreened windows or doors in your home closed, and make sure adjustable screens are tightly secured.
- Feel free to trim longer hair on your dog, but never shave your dog: The layers of dogs' coats protect them from overheating and sunburn. Brushing cats more often than usual can prevent problems caused by excessive heat. And be sure that any sunscreen or insect repellent product you use on your pets is labeled specifically for use on animals.
- When the temperature is very high, don't let your dog linger on hot asphalt. Being so close to the ground, your pooch's body can heat up quickly, and sensitive paw pads can burn. Keep walks during these times to a minimum.
- Commonly used rodenticides and lawn and garden insecticides can be harmful to cats and dogs if ingested, so keep them out of reach. Keep citronella candles, tiki torch products and insect coils of out pets' reach as well. Call your veterinarian or the ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center at (888) 426-4435 if you suspect your animal has ingested a poisonous substance.
- Remember that food and drink commonly found at barbeques can be poisonous to pets. Keep alcoholic beverages away from pets, as they can cause intoxication, depression and comas. Similarly, remember that the snacks enjoyed by your human friends should not be a treat for your pet; any change of diet, even for one meal, may give your dog or cat severe digestive ailments. - Please leave pets at home when you head out to Fourth of July celebrations, and never use fireworks around pets. Exposure to lit fireworks can potentially result in severe burns or trauma, and even unused fireworks can contain hazardous materials. Many pets are also fearful of loud noises and can become lost, scared or disoriented, so it's best to keep your little guys safe from the noise in a quiet, sheltered and escape-proof area of your home.

State Warns that Distracted Driving Still A Problem

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and AT&T "It Can Wait" join efforts again and use virtual reality to illustrate the dangers of distracted driving. Approximately 1 in 5 crashes in Texas involves distracted driving, which continues to be a problem in the state, even after a state law banned texting and driving in 2017. "Our message is no longer just a public safety suggestion to urge Texans to avoid distraction while operating a vehicle – it is to remind them of the law that now forbids such activity," said TxDOT Executive Director James Bass. "One life lost is one too many and distracted driving is completely preventable."

The statewide texting while driving ban could be helping a little. According to recent data, the number of crashes involving distracted driving in Texas decreased by 6% when comparing the 12-month periods before and after the statewide texting-while-driving ban took effect on September 1, 2017. Then in 2018, TxDOT introduced the "Heads up, Texas" to address the new law with a new call to action. The 2019 campaign will kick off June 4 in San Antonio with the return of a 12-city, virtual reality experience tour in collaboration with AT&T *It Can Wait* to educate Texans about the dangers of driving while being distracted. Other campaign activities include social media and audio and video/television PSAs.

The "Heads up, Texas" campaign is a key component of #EndTheStreakTX, a broader word-of-mouth and social media effort that encourages drivers to make safer choices while behind the wheel. Since November 8, 2000, at least one person has died on Texas roadways every single day. #EndTheStreakTX asks all Texans to commit to driving safely to help end the streak of daily deaths on our roadways.

-NO-FIREWORKS ALLOWED

We want to remind everyone that the use of fireworks is illegal in the City of Lucas.

Fireworks can be very dangerous to our pets and the risk of fire from the use of fireworks is significant and presents a substantial risk to your home and our beautiful

trees. Discharging fireworks can also cause problems for our veterans and families with young children.

Using fireworks is prohibited by City ordinance in the City limits of Lucas. Law Enforcement, Citizens on Patrol, and Code Enforcement, Fire-Rescue personnel and City Staff will be out patrolling July 4th, July 5th, and July 6th. All violators will have their fireworks confiscated and may also receive a citation.

If you witness a person setting off fireworks in the City limits of Lucas, you should report the violation by calling 911 with the specific location. Discharging fireworks from a public roadway, public park, or U.S. Corp of Engineer property is also a violation of City ordinance and U.S. Corp 36 CFR 327.13(b) and a citation may be issued.

Thanking our Board of Adjustment By Mayor Pro Tem Kathleen Peele

A BIG thank you to our volunteer members of the Board of Adjustment. The volunteer members that serve on our Board of Adjustment provide a very important function in keeping Lucas the Collin County gem that it is. The Board consists of five voting members and two alternates appointed by the City Council.

The Board of Adjustment is a quasi-judicial body with jurisdiction to hear and to grant variances from the City's Zoning Ordinance and special exceptions to the terms of the Sign Ordinance. As zoning regulations cannot be written to address every possible situation that comes about from the use of property, the Board of Adjustment is granted the authority to allow minor exceptions to the City's zoning rules permitting a landowner to do what would otherwise generally be forbidden by the ordinance. Variances require a showing of either "practical difficulties" or "unnecessary hardship" depending on the type of variance being sought. The City's Board members receive training and are provided specific guidelines set by the State to assist them in making these important decisions that impact Lucas neighborhoods and the City at large.

Chris Bierman serves as Chairman of the Board of Adjustment. Chris, his wife Lori, and their 12 year old daughter Gianna moved to Lucas from Plano in 2010. They moved here for many of the same reasons most of us do: more space, country living, high quality schools and horses. The Bierman's have two horses – and barn cats. Daughter Gianna, who currently attends Willow Springs Middle School shows and competes in the Western Pleasure Class. The Bierman's have been deeply involved in 4-H and manage the Lone Star 4-H Horse Club. Prior to his appointment to the Board, Chris attended City Council meetings, read the City of Lucas Comprehensive plan and asked questions to learn about the innerworkings of the City. The advice he would give a new Board of Adjustment member is to keep in mind that decisions are about what is best for the City long-term and the impact requests may have on a neighbor, the neighborhood, and the City overall. Working together and adhering to a shared vision will keep Lucas the gem of Collin County.

Members of the Board of Adjustment include Brian Blythe, Ron Poteete, James Foster, and Tom Redman. Alternate members are Brenda Rizos and Michael Dunn. A HUGE thank you to our Board members for their volunteer time, talents, and education in filling this vital role for our City.

Technology Committee Update

The Technology Committee met on May 30 with the City Attorney to provide information on his experience in negotiating agreements regarding the implementation of network nodes and 5G. Mr. Gorfida indicated that 5G is the latest push by a lot of companies and that municipalities have to allow carriers in their right of way as passed by the legislature earlier last year. Ordinances have been passed that allow small cell sites and the City has adopted a design manual with rules that have to be followed. The design manual is consistent with many other cities in Texas. Agreements with internet service providers allow for the placement of small nodes at the base of light poles that are located in the City's right of way. The City would take over the light pole should the internet service provider leave. Currently, there have been no requests for this in the City of Lucas. Mr. Gorfida also indicated that if internet service providers are interested in coming to Lucas, amendments could be made to the ordinance, if needed.
