## Lovejoy Graduation Parade



In partnership with the City, Lovejoy ISD held a graduation parade to celebrate this year's graduating seniors from Lovejoy High School. The graduation ceremony and parade took place on Saturday, May 30, 2020. The parade started at Lovejoy High School and moved east on Estates Parkway, south on Ingram Lane, east on West Lucas Road, north on Country Club Road, and west on Estates Parkway returning to Lovejoy High School. Parade viewers cheered the graduates who drove through the parade route in their decorated vehicles. Lucas Fire-Rescue led the parade of 300 to 400 graduates who participated in their vehicles and were followed by the Fairview Police and their Bicycle Squad. Collin County deputies and Fairview police officers managed traffic control to ensure safety and reduced traffic congestion. The graduation parade was a special highlight for the graduating seniors who were unable to participate in normal school activities and events due to the COVID-19 pandemic. ### Zone 4 Thursday and Sunday

South and West of East Lucas Road

## Annual Drinking Water Report

Each year the City of Lucas and the North Texas Municipal Water District (NTMWD) produce a report to let our water customers know the condition and safety of our drinking water. The 2020 Annual Drinking Water Quality Report (Consumer Confidence Report) can be found on the City's website at the following link: <https://www.lucastexas.us/drinking-water-quality-report-ccr-latest/> after July 1, 2020. The source of drinking water used by the City of Lucas is purchased surface water from the NTMWD. The report describes the susceptibility and types of constituents that may contact your drinking water source based on human activities and natural conditions. The City of Lucas estimated that 43,303,000 gallons of water were unaccounted for during the 2019 calendar year. Unaccounted water use is attributed to leaks, hydrant flushing, water works maintenance, and fire-rescue operations. ## Call 911 Don't Delay Emergency Care

Determining when it's appropriate to call 911 can be challenging at any time, but with the ongoing coronavirus pandemic, people seem to be even more uncertain. The intense focus on COVID-19 leaves many wondering how to handle medical emergencies unrelated to the virus. National data on 911 calls show a 29% decrease in calls so far this year compared to the first four months last year. While there has been a drop nationwide in 911 calls, it is important to remember that medical emergencies haven't stopped for COVID-19 and treatment for these emergencies should not be delayed. This is especially true for people experiencing stroke or heart attack symptoms. Delaying treatment for either can be life-threatening or lead to more serious lifelong health problems.

Medical emergencies aren't always easy to identify. While physical injuries like severe cuts, burns or broken bones are obvious, stroke and heart attack symptoms can be confused with other less serious conditions.

Don't hesitate to seek emergency care and call 911 if you experience the following:

- Chest pain, pressure or tightness
- Trouble breathing or shortness of breath
- Confusion or change in mental state
- Numbness or weakness on one side
- Slurred speech
- Sudden speech changes
- Sudden trouble walking, loss of balance
- Sudden vision changes
- Severe stomach pain

Lucas Fire-Rescue and our local hospital partners are prepared to safely care for patients with medical emergencies with protective gear and disinfecting protocols in place. We urge residents not to jeopardize their health by avoiding calling for assistance. When you call 911, be prepared to answer the call-taker's questions, which may include:

- The location of the emergency, including the street address
- The phone number you are calling from
- The nature of the emergency
- Details about the emergency, such as a physical description of a person who may have committed a crime, a description of any fire that may be burning, or a description of injuries or symptoms being experienced by a person having a medical emergency

## What Is Illegal Dumping?

Illegal dumping is the improper disposal of waste at any location other than a permitted landfill or special facility. It is against the law and can pose serious threats to our rivers, creeks, and the environment. Illegal dumping typically happens in open areas such as fields, empty lots, abandoned industrial sites, along rural roads, in wooded areas, near creeks, lakes, and storm drains or other drainage inlets in neighborhoods. Dumping can include common household trash, construction debris, renovation materials, auto parts, tires, medical waste, furniture, appliances, and lawn materials such as grass clippings or tree branches. The cost of illegal dumping to our environment can be costly in many ways, not just monetary, and can include:

- Destroying land, degrading plants, animal habitats, and contaminated soil/water sources, such as lakes, creeks and drinking water supplies
- Dumped items can alter the normal drainage course of runoff and make areas more susceptible to flooding and erosion when waste blocks creeks, stormwater drains and gutters
- Dump sites attract further dumping and other criminal activities, such as graffiti and arson, as well as rodents, insects and other vermin that pose health risks
- Dump sites with scrap tires provide a breeding ground for mosquitos, leading to illnesses like West Nile Virus and Dengue Fever
- Reduces aesthetics of the land and deters people from visiting areas where there is frequent illegal dumping

The City of Lucas has spent significant funds and time removing and properly disposing of illegally dumped materials, and the community bears the cost of lower property values in that area. ## What's Legally Required When You Have a Septic System

### Maintenance Contracts

Maintenance contracts are required for aerobic septic systems and go into effect the day the system is approved. The original installation contract is good for two years from that date. Maintenance contracts must always be maintained. After two years, the owner is responsible to renew the contract, but not required to use the original installer. Renewals must be submitted to the Collin County Development Services Department 30 days prior to the expiration of the contract.

### Testing and Reporting

At a minimum, maintenance companies shall inspect a system three times per year. This shall be done at four-month intervals, and copies of the report shall be sent to the Collin County Development Services Department and to the homeowner.

### Chlorine

Chlorine must always be maintained in surface irrigation systems. Chlorine is present to destroy any waterborne diseases that may be present. The homeowner is responsible to make sure the system always has chlorine (even if your maintenance contract includes adding the chlorine). Approved chlorine tablets must be used, not swimming pool chlorine.

### Problems

If a problem arises with a unit after installation, contact the maintenance company immediately. If at any time a problem is not corrected or the company fails to provide the required maintenance, contact the Collin County Development Services Department.

### Altering the Aerobic Unit

Once an aerobic unit has been installed and inspected, it may not be altered (by the owner or a licensed installer) in ANY way. This includes moving or changing the spray of the sprinklers or connecting another residence to the system. If something needs to be altered, you must go to Collin County Development Services and apply for a Septic Repair/Upgrade Permit.

## Top Five Reasons Why You Should Not Use Fireworks



1. **THEY ARE ILLEGAL IN THE CITY OF LUCAS.**
2. **Likelihood of Injury** - No one is surprised to hear about an injury from a firework, but everyone is surprised if they get injured by one. Thousands of people are injured every year by sparklers and firecrackers, which many people would consider nearly harmless. Children aged 10-14 years are most likely to go to the emergency room from firework injuries; the second most likely group was adults between 20-24 years old. These injuries are typically burns to the hands or fingers, but burns and impact injuries to the head, neck and eye area are also common.
3. **Fire Risk** - Fireworks cause significant property loss and damage. Every year, fireworks cause approximately 18,500 fires. More fires are reported on July 4 than any other day of the year.
4. **Pollutants** - Fireworks create airborne microscopic toxins that can be harmful to the environment. Individuals with asthma or chemical sensitivities may experience negative effects from firework materials regardless of any specific chemical toxicity.
5. **Veterans, Pets, Livestock & Children** - When you are blasting off fireworks on your own schedule, it can be very frightening to veterans, kids and fur-kids and cause them to be anxious and sleepless. You might be depriving a baby (and their parents) an entire night of sleep while all the neighborhood dogs cry and cower. Consider the golden rule before subjecting your community to an unscheduled and illegal fireworks display.

All of the major safety organizations agree... If you are looking for fireworks safety tips the first thing you will find is the overwhelming recommendation *not* to use fireworks at home. Enjoy a professional display instead - they employ complete safety protocols and commercial-grade pyrotechnics for a superior show.

## Ask the Code Enforcement Officer Dogs at Large



Leash laws are a common requirement in most communities. Current laws are put in place for the protection of both people and the animals themselves. Individuals are less likely to be bitten and/or attacked by animals that are leashed or confined and closely supervised by their caretakers. In addition to concerns about human safety, dogs running at large could possibly be injured by cars, subjected to abuse, or get hurt by other animals.

Running at large statutes are also meant to reinforce responsible pet care. Securing a pet in a safe place or walking a dog on a leash will reduce the potential anguish and expense of losing a loved pet. Confinement must be humane for the animal as well as secure and safe. The law is intended to address concerns regarding safety as well as population control. It is important for individuals to take responsibility for dogs in their possession.

The City of Lucas defines an at large animal as an animal off the premises of the owner and is not on a leash under the immediate control of a person physically capable of restraining the animal or is not restrained securely within an enclosure capable of fully and totally securing the animal.
