#### **Agenda Item Request**

Consider the recommendation from the Technology Committee regarding internet service in the City of Lucas.

#### **Background Information**

The Technology Committee has been researching potential internet solutions and analyzing internet speed reports from the City's internet speed test. As part of the research, members of the Technology Committee and City staff traveled to Mont Belvieu, Texas, to discuss Mont Belvieu's municipally owned fiber network called MB Link. The purpose of the meeting was to understand the planning and implementation process of MB Link and to generate ideas to help improve internet service in the City of Lucas.

The Mont Belvieu meeting discussion included information regarding a broadband feasibility study that the City of Mont Belvieu pursued prior to planning and implementation of the fiber network. In 2015, the City of Mont Belvieu prepared a Request for Proposal (RFP) and eventually contracted with Magellan Advisors to develop the broadband feasibility study which cost \$40,000. Based on recommendations from the broadband feasibility study, the Mont Belvieu City Council approved Certificates of Obligation totaling \$14 million issued for 20 years to pursue the implementation of a municipally owned fiber network. The timeline for pursuing, developing, implementing and rollout of the fiber network took approximately five years.

Since the formation of the Technology Committee, the Committee has discussed the City's internet problems with multiple internet providers (e.g. AT&T, Frontier, Suddenlink, Grande Communications, Grayson Collin Communications, Rise Broadband) and the consensus is that the City's low density housing would not be an economical rate of return for providers. In order to identify a possible internet solution, the Technology Committee believes that a broadband feasibility study would help provide further insight on an internet solution best suited for the City. Technology Committee Chairman Paul Rathgeb will be present at the October 17, 2019, City Council meeting to give a recommendation to the Council regarding internet service solutions.

- A. Timelines and milestones associated with the Lucas Broadband project.
- B. Recent Broadband Project Review meeting and next phase of the planning process, include development of a financial model and feedback received from the City's Financial Advisor Mark McLiney with SAMCO and funding strategies.
- C. Submitting a grant application for the Public Works and Economic Adjustment Assistance Programs through the Economic Development Administration (EDA), U.S. Department of Commerce (DOC).
- D. The on-going role of the Technology Committee and City staffing to support the Lucas Broadband project.
- E. Review timetable options regarding a Bond Election.

#### **Background Information**

This item is being placed on the City Council agenda to provide an opportunity for the City Council to share any insight regarding the Lucas Broadband project and provide any direction necessary to Magellan Advisors, the City's Technology Committee, the City's Financial Advisors or City staff.

The Lucas City Council and the Technology Committee held a Broadband Project Review meeting with Magellan Advisors on May 27, 2020. The agenda included:

- 1. A Review of Mapping
- 2. Cost Summary
- 3. Network Architecture and Services
- 4. Grant Funding

The broadband network has two main design features. The first is the fiber network backbone that will encompass approximately 20.2 miles of fiber (Figure 1). The second component is the distribution network of approximately 87.7 miles of fiber that will run off the network backbone throughout the City (Figure 2).

The estimate cost is \$13,885,317 (\$2,547,277 for the fiber backbone and \$11,338,040 for the distribution network). Additional costs for equipment and working capital will be determined as part of the financial model.

There was a brief discussion regarding the grant application process to submit the Lucas Broadband project for the Public Works and Economic Adjustment Assistance Programs through the Economic Development Administration (EDA), a bureau within the U.S. Department of Commerce (DOC). The Federal CARES Act appropriated \$1.5 billion to the U.S. Department of Commerce's Economic Development Administration (EDA) to be used on economic development programs to help communities recover from the coronavirus pandemic. All cities are eligible for funding under the program, assuming a city applicant can adequately demonstrate to the EDA how its project prevents, prepares for, and responds to the coronavirus. The EDA CARES Act Recovery Assistance program includes grants for planning and technical assistance, capitalizing revolving loan funds for businesses, construction of infrastructure and other economic development projects, and innovation grants. The program offers 80% funding with 20% of local funding required with typical awards being between two to three million dollars. During a telephone conversation with a representative from EDA on May 29, the City was informed that obtaining funding may be difficult because moving forward with the project is dependent on voter approval.

The Technology Committee is a city-appointed committee. While it would be prohibited from advocating on behalf of the project, the committee can assist with the development of clear and concise information to assist Lucas citizens in understanding the costs and benefits of the project. Considering the importance of the project the City may need assistance with the management and oversight of the project, similar to what has been done with our road projects.

Council previously indicated funding for the project would need to be approved by the citizens through a bond election. Bond elections are limited to uniform election dates which are Tuesday, November 3, 2020 or Saturday, May 1, 2021. The key date for calling a bond election is adoption of an ordinance calling for the election. This must be done no more than 90 days and no less than 78 days prior to the election.

#### **Budget/Financial Impact**

The financial impact will be based on Magellan Advisors feasibility study. The estimate for the construction cost of an underground fiber backbone and fiber to the premise network is \$14 million. Additional costs will include equipment, working capital, staffing etc.

City staff is working with Magellan Advisors to identify problematic areas for underground fiber in the preliminary conceptual network design that may reduce construction costs. Magellan Advisors will be developing the financial model that will include a cash flow model and total costs for the construction, operation, and maintenance of a broadband network over a recommended time period.

#### **Agenda Item Request**

Discuss the City of Lucas Broadband Project including:

- A. Review the preliminary financial model prepared by Magellan Advisors.
- B. Receive and discuss information from the City's Financial Advisor Mark McLiney regarding funding strategies.
- C. Review and discuss the timetable regarding a bond election.

#### **Background and Financial Information**

Due to concerns raised by citizens about the lack of adequate and reliable internet service in Lucas, the City has made efforts to research solutions that would improve broadband. The City Council appointed residents to form the Technology Committee to provide recommendations on issues of community-wide interests relating to information technology and internet service. The Technology Committee has met and discussed with various internet providers regarding the lack of adequate internet service. The internet providers indicated that they are unwilling to improve or expand internet service due to low-density housing and large lots which would not be an economical rate of return.

In 2019, the City conducted an internet speed test survey to map internet speeds from household respondents. The internet speed test revealed that 61% (or 316 out of 514 households) of respondents reported having internet speed below 25 Mbps. The Federal Communications Commission considers an internet speed of 25 Mbps or less to be below the benchmark for adequate internet service. The Technology Committee explored the possibility of municipal broadband and recommended that the City pursue a broadband feasibility study. The City Council approved acquiring the services of Magellan Advisors who are currently preparing the broadband feasibility study which includes a conceptual network design and financial model.

This agenda item is to provide the City Council additional information about the Lucas Broadband project including a review and discussion of the preliminary costs and financial model prepared by Magellan Advisors. Magellan Advisors has scheduled a Zoom meeting on June 17, 2020 to review the preliminary financial model with City Council. An agenda item will be tentatively scheduled for the July 2, 2020 City Council meeting to obtain additional feedback from the City Council in order to finalize the financial model and feasibility study. Assistant to the City Manager Kent Souriyasak will collect any feedback from the City Council to provide to Magellan Advisors.

Magellan Advisors has completed the first phase of the feasibility study to determine the buildout cost for the fiber backbone and distribution network. The buildout cost has been adjusted in the pending financial model to represent the construction of 80% underground and 20% aerial fiber within city limits. The financial model will include additional costs for operations, equipment, and working capital.

Magellan Advisors is continuing work on the financial model that will include total costs for the construction, operation, and maintenance of a broadband network over a recommended time period. Magellan Advisors indicated that the primary factors to adjust the financial model are the uptake for internet service, rate structure, and cost structure for capital and operating expenses. Magellan Advisors will review details of the financial model with City Council at the June 17, 2020 meeting.

The broadband project would be similar to the City's water service and set up as a separate enterprise fund where it can be self-sustaining through the revenue generated by the customer base for the services provided. The City Council indicated funding for the project would need to be approved by the citizens through a bond election. Bond elections are limited to uniform election dates which are Tuesday, November 3, 2020 or Saturday, May 1, 2021. The key date for calling a bond election is the adoption of an ordinance which must be done no more than 90 days and no less than 78 days prior to either election date.

Possible funding sources for the broadband project would be through (1) bond funds, (2) federal grant(s), and (3) reserves. City staff is pursuing a grant from the Economic Development Administration (EDA), U.S. Department of Commerce (DOC) that may fund a portion of the broadband project if awarded. Reserves could be used or loaned with interest to the Technology Fund as a means of reducing the amount of debt funding.

Discussions with Magellan Advisors, SAMCO Capital Markets, and the Bond Counsel at Norton Rose Fulbright have occurred to discuss funding strategies, timelines, and gain insight on similar broadband projects at the Cities of Dayton and Mont Belvieu. The Bond Counsel indicated that the working capital funding is limited to 10% of the total project/bond amount, there is no anticipated impact on the City's bond rating, and the ad valorem tax base provides the underlying credit support in the event that the project does not perform as expected.


#### **Budget/Financial Impact**

#### **Agenda Item Request**

Discuss the City of Lucas Broadband Project including:

- A. Overview of the broadband feasibility draft study provided by Magellan Advisors.
- B. Discuss a potential bond election date.

#### **Background and Financial Information**

The broadband project would be similar to the City's water service and set up as a separate enterprise fund where it can be self-sustaining through the revenue generated by the customer base for the services provided. The Council indicated funding for the project would need to be approved by the citizens through a bond election. Bond elections are limited to uniform election dates which are Tuesday, November 3, 2020 or Saturday, May 1, 2021. The key date for calling a bond election is the adoption of an ordinance which must be done no more than 90 days and no less than 78 days prior to either election date.

City staff is currently pursuing a grant from the Economic Development Administration (EDA), U.S. Department of Commerce (DOC) that may fund a portion of the broadband project if awarded. However, the EDA has indicated that the City's broadband project may not be considered competitive compared to other ready-to-go projects if the project requires voter approval from the May 1, 2021 Bond Election.

Discussions with the City's Financial Advisors at SAMCO Capital and the Bond Counsel at Norton Rose Fulbright have occurred to discuss funding strategies, timelines, and gain insight on similar broadband projects at the Cities of Dayton and Mont Belvieu. The Bond Counsel indicated that (1) the working capital funding is limited to 10% of the total project/bond amount, (2) there is no anticipated impact on the City's bond rating, and (3) the ad valorem tax base provides the underlying credit support in the event that the project does not perform as expected. Possible funding sources for the broadband project would be through (1) bond funds, (2) federal grant(s), and (3) reserves. Reserves could be used or loaned with interest to the Technology Fund as a means of reducing the amount of debt funding.

#### **Recent Updates:**

Magellan Advisors is working on final updates to the financial model in order to complete the broadband feasibility study in July. The City Council has provided recommendations and feedback regarding the financial model during previous City Council meetings and review sessions with Magellan Advisors.



## City of Lucas Council Agenda Request July 16, 2020

Magellan Advisors recommended that buildout for the construction of a fiber network should be 80% underground and 20% aerial, which runs approximately 108 miles throughout city limits. The municipal fiber network would pass every residential household and business, and the internet service would be optional.

Below is a list of final updates to the financial model per recommendations from the City Council:

- Decrease in amount generated for reserve renewal and replacement in order to increase additional cash flow.
- Moving year-end contribution costs to the working capital line item to include interest as a possible interfund loan from the City.
- Reduction in indirect equipment and materials cost from contractors where the City could save money by directly purchasing and storing the equipment and materials.
- Additional financial model summary based on 45% uptake.
- Additional line in the financial model to show payback using free cash to pay back the interfund loans.
- Increase in building costs for a data center, offices, workspace, and storage.
- Increase in broadband personnel salaries to be considered competitive in the Dallas Fort-Worth metroplex market for positions that may be in-house or outsourced.
- An all-inclusive residential rate of \$115.00 for 1 GB and managed services.

#### **Agenda Item Request**

Discuss traveling to the City of Mont Belvieu to meet with City staff regarding the City's Fiber Internet network in efforts to research internet solutions; and consider utilizing funds for travel expenses from account 11-6100-307 City Council Training/Travel and account 11-6200-307 Administration Training/Travel.

#### **Background Information**

Assistant to the City Manager Kent Souriyasak reached out to the City of Mont Belvieu's Assistant City Manager, Scott Swigert, to discuss the City of Mont Belvieu's in-house Fiber Internet network known as "MB Link." "MB Link" is an optional public utility that provides Internet service for residents. Prior to the implementation of "MB Link," Mr. Swigert indicated that the City of Mont Belvieu faced challenges in encouraging Internet service providers to expand and improve services. Mr. Swigert shared that City staff attended the Broadband Communities Summit to connect with various Internet service providers and developers which led the City to consider planning and implementing an in-house Fiber Internet network.

"MB Link" is Texas' first municipally-owned fully Fiber-optic broadband network that offers subscribers internet service with up to one Gigabytes per second, a digital gateway with carrier-grade Wi-Fi, and a UPS (uninterruptible power supply) battery backup for the system. "MB Link" offers various standard rates and packages to residents and businesses with initial setup and installation fees. The City of Mont Belvieu employs technicians to perform the exterior and interior installations and City staff to monitor Internet security and network maintenance.

A meeting has been scheduled on Tuesday, August 20, 2019, from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. to meet with City of Mont Belvieu staff to discuss the implementation of "MB Link." Confirmed attendees include the City Manager Nathan Watkins, Assistant City Manager Scott Swigert, Broadband Network Engineer Dwight Thomas, and Communications and Marketing Director Brian Ligon. The meeting will take place in Mont Belvieu, Texas, and a tour of the City's facilities will be provided.

The City of Mont Belvieu is located approximately 32 miles east from the City of Houston. The one-way travel distance from the City of Lucas is approximately 300 miles and drive time is five hours. Due to the travel distance and scheduled meeting time, City staff recommends an overnight trip to the City of Mont Belvieu.

#### **Agenda Item Request**

Discuss the final broadband internet feasibility report and other matters related to the proposed broadband project for the City of Lucas.

#### **Background and Financial Information**

The broadband project would be similar to the City's water service and set up as a separate enterprise fund where it can be self-sustaining through the revenue generated by the customer base for the services provided. The Council indicated funding for the project would need to be approved by the citizens through a bond election. Bond elections are limited to uniform election dates which are Tuesday, November 3, 2020 or Saturday, May 1, 2021. The key date for calling a bond election is the adoption of an ordinance which must be done no more than 90 days and no less than 78 days prior to either election date.

City staff is currently pursuing a grant from the Economic Development Administration (EDA), U.S. Department of Commerce (DOC) that may fund a portion of the broadband project if awarded. However, the EDA has indicated that the City's broadband project may not be considered competitive compared to other ready-to-go projects if the project requires voter approval from the May 1, 2021 Bond Election.

Discussions with the City's Financial Advisors at SAMCO Capital and the Bond Counsel at Norton Rose Fulbright have occurred to discuss funding strategies, timelines, and gain insight on similar broadband projects at the Cities of Dayton and Mont Belvieu. The Bond Counsel has prepared a draft of the proposition language to be included on the ballot should the City Council call a date for the bond election.

The Bond Counsel indicated that (1) the working capital funding is limited to 10% of the total project/bond amount, (2) there is no anticipated impact on the City's bond rating, and (3) the ad valorem tax base provides the underlying credit support in the event that the project does not perform as expected. Possible funding sources for the broadband project would be through bond funds, federal grant(s), and reserves. Reserves could be used or loaned with interest to the Technology Fund as a means of reducing the amount of debt funding.


Magellan Advisors has completed the financial model and is recommending the 55% uptake model in the broadband feasibility study. The justification for recommending this model is based on the minimum uptake percentage and rate combination that can support a sustainable enterprise which includes generating positive free cash flow, paying off debt, and minimizing possible interfund loans from the City.

The 55% uptake requires 1,352 out of 2,458 residential households within city limits to become internet customers. Based on the Technology Committee's research and data from the internet speed test, the majority of households with inadequate internet service (defined by the Federal Communications Commission as below 25 Mbps) are located in areas north of West/East Lucas Road. Magellan Advisors has created a heat map of the City to identify areas with potential high take rates based on the internet speed test data.

Below is the heat map (shown with data of reported internet speeds below 25 Mbps) in comparison to the map of total residential households divided between north and south at West/East Lucas Road:

#### **Budget/Financial Impact**

Magellan Advisors has provided the below financial summary of the 55% uptake financial model which includes the estimated principal and interest cost of the broadband project. The Bond Counsel indicated the working capital funding is limited to 10% of the total project/bond amount. Magellan Advisors has estimated the cost of interfund loans from the City to cover projected year-end shortfalls where the model does not generate sufficient positive cash flow.

The City's Financial Advisor Mark McLiney at SAMCO Capital recommended a conservative interest rate of 3.25% to calculate financing estimates for the construction and implementation of a municipal fiber network.

#### **Agenda Item Request**

Consideration and approval of Ordinance 2020-08-00919 calling a Bond Election to be held in the City of Lucas, Texas to seek voter approval of the issuance of not more than \$19,190,000 of general obligation bonds to create a fiber optic broadband utility system; making provision for the conduct of a joint election; and resolving other matters incident and related to such election.

#### **Background Information**

Due to concerns raised by citizens about the lack of adequate and reliable internet service, the City Council appointed Lucas residents to form the Technology Committee which serves as an ad hoc committee in all matters relating to technology-related services of the City. The Technology Committee provided recommendations to the City Council and City Manager on issues of community-wide interests relating to information technology and internet services.

The City moved forward with acquiring the services of Magellan Advisors to conduct a broadband feasibility study which includes a conceptual network design and financial model. The purpose of the study is to determine if it is feasible for the City to implement and operate a sustainable broadband network to provide internet service to Lucas residents within city limits.

The following is a timeline of the City's efforts in researching internet solutions to date:

I move that the City Council adopt Ordinance 2020-08-00919 calling a Bond Election to be held in the City of Lucas, Texas to seek voter approval of the issuance of not more than \$19,190,000 of general obligation bonds to create a fiber optic broadband utility system; making provision for the conduct of a joint election; and resolving other matters incident and related to such election.

#### Ordinance 2020-08-00919

AN ORDINANCE CALLING A BOND ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF LUCAS, TEXAS TO SEEK VOTER APPROVAL OF THE ISSUANCE OF NOT MORE THAN \$19,190,000 OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS TO CREATE A FIBER OPTIC BROADBAND UTILITY SYSTEM; MAKING PROVISION FOR THE CONDUCT OF A JOINT ELECTION; AND RESOLVING OTHER MATTERS INCIDENT AND RELATED TO SUCH ELECTION

WHEREAS, the City Council (the *Council*) of the CITY OF LUCAS, TEXAS (the *City*), located in Collin County, Texas (the *County*), hereby finds and determines that an election should be held to determine whether the Council shall be authorized to issue general obligation bonds of the City in the amount and for the purposes hereinafter identified (the *Election*); and

WHEREAS, the City will contract with the Elections Administrator (the *Administrator*) of the County to conduct all aspects of the Election; and

WHEREAS, the Election will be held jointly with other political subdivisions (such other political subdivisions, collectively, the *Participants*) for whom the County is also conducting their elections, as provided pursuant to the provisions of one or more joint election agreements or contracts among the City, the County, and the Participants, entered into in accordance with the provisions of Section 271.002, as amended, Texas Election Code, or other applicable law, pursuant to which the County will conduct all aspects of the Election on the City's behalf;

WHEREAS, the Council hereby finds and determines that the necessity to construct various capital improvements within the City necessitates that it is in the public interest to call and hold the Election at the earliest possible date to authorize the issuance of general obligation bonds for the purposes hereinafter identified; and

WHEREAS, the Council hereby finds and determines that the actions hereinbefore described are in the best interests of the residents of the City; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LUCAS, TEXAS THAT:

SECTION 1. The Election shall be held in the CITY OF LUCAS, TEXAS on the 3rd day of November, 2020 (*Election Day*), which is a uniform election date under the Texas Election Code, as amended, and is not less than 78 days nor more than 90 days from the date of the adoption of this ordinance (the *Ordinance*), for the purpose of submitting the following proposition to the qualified voters of the City:

#### PROPOSITION B

"Shall the City Council of the City of Lucas, Texas be authorized to issue and sell one or more series of general obligation bonds of the City in the aggregate principal amount of not more than \$19,190,000 for the purpose of making permanent public improvements or other public purposes, to wit: creation of a utility system by designing, acquiring, constructing, purchasing, renovating, enlarging, improving, installing, and equipping fiber optic cable to provide broadband internet service and related facilities within the City, and the purchase of materials, supplies, equipment, machinery, landscaping, land, easements, rights-of-way, and other real property interests necessary therefor or incidental thereto, such bonds to mature serially or otherwise (not more than 20 years from their date) in accordance with law; and any issue or series of said bonds to bear interest at such rate or rates (fixed, floating, variable or otherwise) as may be determined within the discretion of the City Council, provided that such rate of interest shall not exceed the maximum rate per annum authorized by law at the time of the issuance of any issue or series of said bonds; and shall the City Council of the City be authorized to levy and pledge, and cause to be assessed and collected, annual ad valorem taxes, within the limitations prescribed by law, on all taxable property in said City sufficient to pay the annual interest and provide a sinking fund to pay the bonds at maturity and the cost of any credit agreements executed in connection with the bonds?"

SECTION 2. One or more City election precincts are hereby established for the purpose of holding the Election, and one or more polling places are hereby designated for holding the Election in the City election precincts as identified in Exhibit A to this Ordinance (which is incorporated herein by reference for all purposes). At least 79 days prior to Election Day, or as soon thereafter as is reasonably practicable, the City, acting through the Mayor, the City Manager, or the designee thereof, in coordination with the Administrator, or the designee thereof, as necessary or desirable, will appoint the Presiding Judges, Alternate Presiding Judges, Election Clerks, and all other election officials for the Election, together with any other necessary changes to election practices and procedures and can correct, modify, or change the Exhibits to this Ordinance based upon the final locations and times agreed upon by the Administrator, the City, and the Participants to the extent permitted by applicable law.

- A. The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two resident qualified voters of the County to act as clerks in order to properly conduct the Election. To the extent required by the Texas Election Code, as amended, or other applicable law, the appointment of these clerks must include a person fluent in the Spanish language to serve as a clerk to render oral aid in the Spanish language to any voter desiring such aid at the polls on Election Day. If the Presiding Judge appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall serve as one of the clerks. In the absence of the Presiding Judge, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall perform the duties of the Presiding Judge of the election precinct.
  - B. On Election Day, the polls shall be open as designated on Exhibit A.

The County participates in the Countywide Polling Place Program under Section 43.007, as amended, Texas Election Code, meaning that any City voter can vote in the Election at any polling place identified in Exhibit A.

C. The main early voting location is designated in Exhibit B to this Ordinance (which is hereby incorporated herein by reference for all purposes). The individual named as the Early Voting Clerk as designated in Exhibit B is hereby appointed as the Early Voting Clerk to conduct such early voting in the Election. The Early Voting Clerk shall appoint the Deputy Early Voting Clerks. This main early voting location shall remain open to permit early voting on the days and at the times as stated in Exhibit B. Early voting shall commence as provided on Exhibit B and continue through the date set forth on Exhibit B, all as provided by the provisions of the Texas Election Code, as amended.

Additionally, permanent and/or temporary branch offices for early voting by personal appearance may be established and maintained in accordance with the Texas Election Code. In the event such permanent and/or temporary branch locations are established, information regarding the locations, dates, and hours of operation for early voting at these offices shall be determined by the Administrator, as identified in Exhibit B hereto.

An Early Voting Ballot Board is hereby established for the purpose of processing early voting results. The individual designated in Exhibit B as the Presiding Judge of the Early Voting Ballot Board is hereby appointed the Presiding Judge of the Early Voting Ballot Board. The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two resident qualified voters of the City to serve as members of the Early Voting Ballot Board.

SECTION 3. Electronic voting machines may be used in holding and conducting the Election on Election Day; provided, however, in the event the use of such electronic voting machines is not practicable, the Election may be conducted on Election Day by the use of paper ballots (except as otherwise provided in this section). Electronic voting machines or paper ballots may be used for early voting by personal appearance (except as otherwise provided in this section). Pursuant to Section 61.012, as amended, Texas Election Code, the City shall provide at least one accessible voting system in each polling place used in the Election. Such voting system shall comply with State and federal laws establishing the requirement for voting systems that permit voters with physical disabilities to cast a secret ballot. Any legally permissible voting method may be used for early voting and Election Day voting by personal appearance. Certain early voting may be conducted by mail.

SECTION 4: The City is authorized to utilize a Central Counting Station (the *Station*) as provided by Section 127.001, *et seq.*, as amended, Texas Election Code. The Administrator, or the designee thereof, is hereby appointed as the Manager of the Station, who will establish a written plan for the orderly operation of the Station in accordance with the provisions of the Texas Election Code. The Council hereby authorizes the Administrator, or the designee thereof, to appoint the Presiding Judge of the Station, the Tabulation Supervisor, and the Programmer for the Station and may appoint Station clerks as needed or desirable. The Administrator will publish (or cause to be published) notice and conduct testing on the automatic tabulation equipment relating to the Station and conduct instruction for the officials and clerks for the Station in accordance with the provisions of the Texas Election Code.

SECTION 5. The official ballot shall be prepared in accordance with the Texas Election Code, as amended, so as to permit voters to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid proposition which shall appear on the ballot substantially as follows:

#### PROPOSITION B

"THE ISSUANCE OF NOT TO EXCEED \$19,190,000 OF CITY OF LUCAS, TEXAS GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS FOR A FIBER OPTIC CABLE UTILITY SYSTEM TO PROVIDE BROADBAND INTERNET SERVICE, AND THE LEVYING OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

SECTION 6. All resident qualified voters of the City shall be permitted to vote at the Election, and on Election Day, such voters shall vote at the designated polling places. The Election shall be held and conducted in accordance with the provisions of the Texas Election Code, as amended, Chapters 1251 and 1331, as amended, Texas Government Code, and as may be required by any other law. To the extent required by law, all materials and proceedings relating to the Election shall be printed in both English and Spanish.

SECTION 7. Notice of election, including a Spanish translation thereof, shall be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City, the first of these publications to appear in such newspaper not more than 30 days, and not less than 14 days, prior to Election Day. Moreover, a substantial copy of this Ordinance and the voter information attached as Exhibit C, including a Spanish translation thereof, shall be posted (i) at City Hall not less than 25 days prior to Election Day; (ii) at three additional public places within the City not less than 25 days prior to Election Day, (iii) in a prominent location at each polling place on Election Day and during early voting, and (iv) in a prominent location on the City's internet website not less than 25 days prior to Election Day. A sample ballot shall be posted on the City's internet website not less than 25 days prior to Election Day.

SECTION 8. As required by and in accordance with Section 3.009(b)(5) and (7) through (9) of the Texas Election Code, the City, as of its fiscal year beginning October 1, 2019, had outstanding an aggregate principal amount of debt equal to \$25,045,000; the aggregate amount of the interest owed on such City debt obligations, through respective maturity, totaled \$6,892,237; and the City levied an ad valorem debt service tax rate for its outstanding debt obligations of \$0.1187 per \$100 of taxable assessed valuation. Based on the bond market conditions on the date of the Council's adoption of this Ordinance, the maximum interest rate for any series of bonds authorized at the Election is 3.25% (expressed as a net effective interest rate applicable to any such series of bonds). The bonds that are the subject of this Election shall mature serially or otherwise overall a specified number of years (not more than 20 years from their date), as preserved by applicable Texas law, though the City estimates that, based on current bond market conditions, such bonds will amortize over a 20-year period from their respective date of issue.

The foregoing estimated maximum net effective interest rate and amortization period are only estimates, provided for Texas statutory compliance; they do not serve as a cap on the per annum interest rate at which any series of bonds authorized at the Election may be sold, or the amortization period for bonds that are the subject of this Election.

SECTION 9. The Council authorizes the Mayor, the City Manager, or their respective designee, to negotiate and enter into one or more joint election agreements and/or similar contracts or agreements with the County, acting by and through the Administrator, and any Participants if desired or required to comply with applicable law, as permitted and in accordance with the provisions of the Texas Election Code, as amended. In addition, the City authorizes the Mayor, the City Manager, or their respective designee of either of such parties to make such technical modifications to this Ordinance that are necessary for compliance with applicable Texas or federal law or to carry out the intent of the Council, as evidenced herein. To the extent that any duty or obligation of the City, in general, or any City official, in particular, is properly delegated to the County pursuant to a joint election agreement, then the County's carrying out those duties and obligations on the City's behalf pursuant to the terms of such joint election agreement shall be binding upon the City and are hereby determined by the Council to be evidence of the City's compliance with the provisions of applicable Texas law concerning the Election relative to the same. By incorporating all essential terms necessary for a joint election agreement, this Ordinance is intended to satisfy Section 271.002(d) of the Texas Election Code, as amended, without further action of the City Council. To the extent needed or desirable, the Administrator is hereby appointed joint custodian of voted ballots for the purposes of Section 31.096, as amended, Texas Election Code.

SECTION 10. The recitals contained in the preamble hereof are hereby found to be true, and such recitals are hereby made a part of this Ordinance for all purposes and are adopted as a part of the judgment and findings of the Council.

<u>SECTION 11.</u> All ordinances and resolutions, or parts thereof, which are in conflict or inconsistent with any provision of this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict, and the provisions of this Ordinance shall be and remain controlling as to the matters ordained herein.

<u>SECTION 12.</u> This Ordinance shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas and the United States of America.

SECTION 13. It is officially found, determined, and declared that the meeting at which this Ordinance is adopted was open to the public and public notice of the time, place, and subject matter of the public business to be considered at such meeting, including this Ordinance, was given, all as required by Chapter 551, as amended, Texas Government Code.

SECTION 14. If any provision of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall be held to be invalid, the remainder of this Ordinance and the application of such provision to other persons and circumstances shall nevertheless be valid, and this Council hereby declares that this Ordinance would have been enacted without such invalid provision.

SECTION 15. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 1201.028, as amended, Texas Government Code, this Ordinance shall be effective immediately upon adoption, notwithstanding any provision in the City's Home Rule Charter to the contrary concerning a multiple reading requirement for the adoption of ordinances.
