



CITY OF MADEIRA BEACH, JOHN'S PASS SAND ISSUES - DREDGING REQUEST

The City of Madeira Beach has been requesting Federal and State of Florida assistance to continue to enhance our economic vitality and tourism-related activities specifically in and around the John's Pass Boardwalk and Village dining and entertainment district:

 DREDGING OF JOHN'S PASS – remove sand constantly accumulating and clogging the north side of the John's Pass inlet and the northern shoal and utilize the removed sand for beach renourishment along other Pinellas beaches.

The unwanted addition of a significant amount of sand at the inlet has led to localized flooding damaging infrastructure, threatening public safety, and costing the City of Madeira Beach valuable tourism dollars. Additionally, the same amount of water traveling through a narrower inlet has increased the threats from the increased power of the currents posing significant public risks to recreational swimmers and commercial boaters.

Over the years, other nearby beach communities have received millions in county, state, and federal funds for beach renourishment/restoration and maintenance, while Madeira Beach has not. The City of Madeira Beach respectfully requests equal funding opportunities and distribution to allow for the much-needed dredging.

Early on in its existence, Madeira Beach had the foresight to install strategically placed beach groins to help mitigate the movement of sand and resulting beach erosion that has plagued other beach communities. Dear Sir or Madam:

This letter is to seek the assistance from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in stopping the accretion of sand at the John's Pass inlet from the Gulf of Mexico located in the City of Madeira Beach, Florida. This project will have two main goals:

- Understanding the cause of the sedimentation along the north side of the channel and developing optimal mitigation strategies.
- 2. Ensure the sustainability of future dredging project.

Early on in its existence, Madeira Beach had the foresight to install strategically placed beach groins to help mitigate the movement of sand and resulting beach erosion that has plagued other beach communities. Now, time and mother nature have taken their toll on these vital barriers to the point where more sand has flowed south and is slowly choking off the inlet to John's Pass.

These increasingly clogged stormwater outfalls now result in localized flooding that damages infrastructure, threatens public safety and costs the City of Madeira Beach valuable tourism dollars. In addition, with the same amount of water traveling through a narrower inlet, the ever-increasing currents are posing a significant public safety risk.

The unwanted addition of sand at the inlet has led to people using this area as a recreational beach destination for swimming. This poses two significant risks; swimmers being forced against concrete bridge support structures and swimmers being pulled out into the Gulf of Mexico by the increased power of the currents. We have received several reports of children having to be rescued after being caught in these currents.

The importance of these issues are outlined in the Florida DEP/Pinellas County inlet management study of John's Pass performed by the University of South Florida Coastal Research Laboratory in 2015. They can be further verified by reviewing the Florida DEP's Final Order Adopting the John's Pass Inlet Management Plan issued in January, 2018.



Johns Pass has been the home to a large fishing fleet since the late 1940s and today our fishing fleet and tourism area has grown exponentially. Johns Pass village is one of the top tourism destinations in our county which is the most densely populated county in the state that has on average over 15 million visitors annually. While Johns Pass village averages over 1 million visitors annually. These Johns Pass village visitor numbers do not include the many more that utilize John's pass water ways to access the Gulf of Mexico annually from other areas. Johns Pass is the last bascule bridge left in our county allowing access to the Gulf of Mexico and its channel is closing in with sand.

Federally permitted for hire vessels take countless private recreational anglers fishing annually. Our business alone averages between 110,000 to 120,000 passengers annually. However, we only represent 5 of the federal permits around our local area. According to the Gulf of Mexico fishery management council briefing book documents for the January council meeting there are a total of 15 federal permits in madeira beach and 21 in St Pete and all the Madeira beach permits transverse Johns Pass and most of the St. Pete permits also use Johns Pass for Gulf of Mexico access.

Commercially, nearly half of the red grouper landed in the Gulf of Mexico is harvested out of Johns pass with three of the top five home ports all using Johns Pass main channel for their access to this Gulf of Mexico fishery. Madeira beach, Redington shores and largo vessels all travel south to utilize the fish houses along the intercostal and then transverse Johns Pass to access the Gulf of Mexico. During 2019 out of the 15.2 million visitors to Pinellas over 30% of the guests visited Madeira beach community (VSPC 2019 annual report

The city of Madeira Beach derives nearly 70% of their tax income from Johns Pass village parking fees and other business driven income to the city. Just one of these waterfront businesses represents nearly a little more than 10% of those Johns Pass visitors annually. If the waterfront is lost due to water access being restricted the City of Madeira beach would be severely impacted in it's ability to collect revenue.

During 2019 Madeira beach was in the top 3 destinations either 2nd or 3rd for every visitor profile outside those who visited the county for arts and culture. Boating represents 21% of Top activities for visitors to our county who stated their primary motivation for visiting our area was visiting our beaches (VSPC 2019 annual report

There are a total of 1164 commercial vessels registered in Pinellas County; 56,695 boats overall and Johns Pass is the ONLY bascule bridge allowing access to the gulf of Mexico. (Pinellas county website fun facts about Pinellas county http://www.pinellascounty.org/facts.htm)

Out of the 8.7 million lbs of grouper landings in 2014 nearly 5.2 million lbs were landed in Pinellas county a majority of this if not all comes through Johns Pass (https://gulfcouncil.org/wp-content/uploads/Community-Analysis-II.pdf)
