5. Approval of the October 2022 Treasurer's Reports

Mayor Johnson presented the Treasurer's Report in Mayor Kennedy's absence. October 2022's opening balance was \$1,672.59. After receiving a \$100.00 assessment fee from the Town of Belleair Shore and a disbursement of \$266.67 to Digital Eel, the ending balance for the month was \$1,506.02.

Mayor Johnson announced that the Forward Pinellas Board invited the BIG C Representatives to a Workshop scheduled on December 14, 2022. He will attend the workshop. He added that he is the incoming BIG C Representative on the Board in place of Mayor Kennedy, who has completed her term.

7. New Business

• Consideration of the Tentative 2023 BIG C Meeting Schedule (Revised)

The revised tentative BIG C meeting schedule for 2023 was presented. Any scheduling or venue changes that may develop in the future will be addressed as necessary.

• Guest Speaker Scott Dudley, Executive Director, Florida League of Mayors – What Happened? Understanding the Impacts of the 2022 Elections and What It Means for the 2023 Session.

Mr. Dudley gave his presentation on the 2022 Midterm General Election impacts touching on the following events:

- Typical off-year dynamics including off-year elections, the economy, voter registration, party enthusiasm, campaign money, quality of candidates, reapportionment, and unknown factors.
- Factors not anticipated were negative effect of election denialism, "Trumpism", abortion, youth vote, and candidate quality.
- Factors that impacted Florida included voters moving to areas of the same party majority choice, election denialism, abortion, money, and the former president.
- The numbers for the Hispanic Community show that voter registration is down.
- Mr. Dudley provided percentages of Democrat and Republicans seats currently in the U.S. and Florida House and Senate.
- He mentioned the subject of unfunded mandates that imposes a cost or takes away revenue from a local government.

Mr. Dudley concluded his presentation with a brief question and answer session.

Conversation ensued regarding open primaries, governor's veto power with unfunded mandates, home-based businesses and zoning, vacation rentals, and citizens meeting state and local representatives to voice concerns over issues such as short-term rentals.

8. Old Business

Many people ask what the BIG C does. Mayor Queen provided the following BIG C accomplishments over the last 20 years:

- Worked with the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) to reduce the speed limit on Gulf Boulevard from 40 to 35 miles an hour.
- Worked with FDOT to establish consistent crosswalks on Gulf Boulevard.
- Lobbied against oil drilling off the coast of our beaches.
- Work with the Army Corps of Engineers for beach renourishments for 20 years.
- Worked with the state on the Horizon oil spill in the Gulf and reparations to businesses lost as a result.
- Worked with Clearwater Marine Aquarium on turtle protection.
- Opposed Florida legislation of short-term rentals and Home Rule erosion.
- Supported waterborne transportation in the beaches in the Bay Area.
- Established the hurricane re-entry program with the Pinellas County County Sheriff's Office.
- Worked with Pinellas County on red tide and fish kills.
- Obtained \$70 million over a 15-year program for Gulf Boulevard Beautification and undergrounding utilities.

1981- ShippingChannel completed





Seagrass Recovery

COVERAGE ESTIMATES FROM 2014, 2016, AND 2018 INCLUDED MORE THAN 40,000 ACRES OF SEAGRASS, A GOAL IDENTIFIED IN THE HABITAT MASTER PLAN. HOWEVER, BETWEEN 2018 AND 2020, SEAGRASSES THROUGHOUT TAMPA BAY DECLINED BY 13%, OR 5,411 ACRES, TO AN ESTIMATED 35,241 ACRES (PROVISIONAL DATA PROVIDED BY SWFWMD).







Any fishable trap during open season that lacks at least three of the following: buoy, line, current trap tag, and/or current commercial saltwater products license




