New DORA intended to boost downtown

The City of Miamisburg is joining ranks with several other communities in the region to establish a specific outdoor area in which possession and consumption of alcoholic beverages will be permitted in public spaces.

These districts are being created under Ohio law and are known as Designated Outdoor Refreshment Areas (DORA). Miamisburg's DORA, approved by the Ohio Board of Liquor Control and City Council, will be located in the downtown district (see map below). It is expected to take effect in June.

"A DORA is really an economic development tool, and we believe it has the potential in Miamisburg to bring increased activity and vitality to our downtown district," City Manager Keith Johnson said. "The past year has

provided some unique challenges for many businesses, and it's clear that more and more local governments are looking at this as a way to assist."

The application to create a local DORA was submitted to City Council by the Miamisburg Merchants Association, and a public meeting was held March 30 prior to City Council approval. Approximately 50 citizens attended the meeting to learn details and share opinions about the concept. A recording of that meeting can be seen on local government access TV and online at mvcc.net.

Johnson emphasizes that the City is committed to implementing the DORA in a safe and responsible way, in conjunction with downtown stakeholders. He also said there have



been no significant public safety issues reported by other communities in the region that have DORAs in place.

The following are the guidelines under which Miamisburg's version will operate:

 The DORA will be in effect Thursdays (4 to 9 p.m.), Fridays (4 to 11 p.m.), Saturdays (noon to 11 p.m.) and Sundays (4 to 9 p.m.). The City has the flexibility to adjust these periods at any time.

Mound Business Park: A community partner



One of the priorities for Mound Business Park (MBP) officials is for the site to be of use and service to the community. Over the years, MBP has opened its doors to countless local organizations, providing a unique space for various uses such as training.

Starting in 2019 Mound began a partnership with the Miami Valley Fire District, which serves Miamisburg and Miami Township. Today, this partnership continues with plans to expand in 2021.

For example, last year the Fire District used Mound property—parking lots and roads—for driver training, enabling firefighter/ paramedics to simulate real-life road conditions in a

private, controlled environment.

"With the space that the Mound graciously provided, we were able to set up driving courses with cones to practice our skills," said Miami Valley Fire District Battalion Chief Jim Baber.

This year Baber is piloting a project that will expand the District's presence at Mound. Several large storage containers already located at the site (pictured at left) will be transformed into a two-story building with windows for simulation training. Eventually, Baber plans to invite other local and regional fire and police departments to also make use of the space.

"This space will give us 365-day access to training, plus it will reduce costs by keeping our personnel right here in town for continuing education," he said. "The Mound has been great to give us this area to use, and we really appreciate it."

Fire District advises on health & safety



The Miami Valley Fire
District would like to
provide important safety
guidelines for the summer
season. The following
can help citizens maintain
personal health and safety

while outdoors:

Sun Safety

- Be alert for the symptoms of heat illness: fainting, dizziness, headache, nausea, rapid pulse, skin and body temperature of 104 degrees or more.
- If suffering from heat illness, rest in a cool place and sip cool, non-alcoholic beverages.
- To avoid losing salt and water when sitting in the sun or sunbathing, replenish with fluids often and avoid beverages

- with alcohol or caffeine. Keep the skin moist and cool.
- Wear loose-fitting clothing, a hat and waterproof sunscreen when working outdoors in the sun.
- If you take prescription drugs, check with your doctor before sunbathing.

Water Safety

- Small children should wear life jackets during recreational boating or at dockside.
- Make sure the pool or lake is deep enough before diving into the water.
- Avoid swimming beyond your ability or in rough water.
- Do not consume alcoholic beverages when swimming or boating.

- Never swim alone or leave small children unattended near the water.
- Be cautious of strong currents when swimming in the ocean.
- Fence all home pools.
- · Learn CPR.

Stay safe while biking this summer

Bicycling is a great way to enjoy the outdoors during the summer, while also getting good exercise. Of course, Miamisburg is a bike-friendly community featuring the regional trail that travels along the Great Miami River adjacent to downtown.

The Miamisburg Police Department encourages bicyclists to always follow safe practices and offers the following tips:

- Bicycles on the road have the same rights and responsibilities as motorized vehicles. Bicyclists should drive in the same direction as traffic, obey street signs and road markings and utilize hand signals.
- Wear a helmet that properly fits your head.
- Ride a bike that fits your stature and has working brakes.
 Check that your tires are properly



inflated. If riding in dim light, wear clothing that makes you more visible to others (reflective/light in color).

- Avoid using a cell phone for any reason or listening to music while riding to prevent distractions from the road. Remain alert and watch for road hazards or unexpected driver movements.
- Be careful of pedestrians on the sidewalk and wary of the sidewalk ending or crossing the street at the sidewalk. Cars may not expect to see bicyclists on sidewalks.
- When crossing a street, cross only at intersections. Never dash out from between parked cars to cross a street or enter a roadway.

Anyone with questions about bicycling or bicycle safety can stop by the Police Department in the Miamisburg Civic Center to speak with a member of the bike team. Information is also available on the Department Facebook page.

The Police Department's bike unit consists of six specially equipped Haro bicycles, one sergeant and five officers who are trained and certified through the International Police Mountain Bike Association (IPMBA). Yard waste and other collection reminders

Residents are encouraged to use environmentally-friendly practices to minimize the volume of yard waste sent to landfills. Composting, mulching with leaves and the use of mulching lawn mowers can all help reduce yard waste significantly.

Yard waste includes materials such as grass clippings, thatch, leaves, flower and vegetable trimmings and brush. If you must dispose of these materials, please review the following guidelines:

- Yard waste is collected along with regular refuse and must be properly contained and bundled.
- Bundled brush should not measure more than four feet long and two feet wide.
- Bagged yard waste should not exceed 60 pounds in weight.
- Grass clippings and leaves should never be placed in the road, storm sewers or waterways.

Bulk collection

Bulk items continue to be collected by Rumpke along with regular trash. Pick-up should be scheduled one week in advance by calling the City's Public Works Department at 847-6635. Mattresses and upholstered items are required to be wrapped and sealed in plastic. Residents may use their own sheet plastic and tape or garbage bags for this purpose or purchase bulk bags at the Civic Center or Municipal Service Center.

Battery recycling

The City is now offering household battery recycling for residents. Batteries contain corrosive materials and heavy metals that can contaminate the soil and water supply. Recycling these materials helps divert them from landfills. Look for the battery recycling receptacles located in the Civic Center, Community Center and Service Center lobbies.

Financial assistance

Residents may apply for a reduction in the City's \$12 monthly fee for waste collection and disposal. Eligibility for financial assistance is based on published U.S. poverty levels and the applicant's federal adjusted gross income for the most recent tax year. Applications can be obtained in the Administrative offices in the Miamisburg Civic Center.

Also, please remember that the green containers provided by Rumpke are exclusively for recycling materials and should NOT be used for household trash, or they will be confiscated by Rumpke.

Preparing for State Rte. 725/I-75 improvements



planned improvement project at the intersection of State Rte. 725 and I-75 in Miamisburg.

This 2023 project will include interchange modifications, pedestrian and safety improvements and traffic signal upgrades along a section of the SR725 corridor, including the Byers Road signal. As a key project stakeholder, City staff

and the City's traffic consultants have engaged with ODOT in discussions over coordination timings and flow of traffic through this area.

ODOT will provide approximately \$3.7 million in funding from its Safety Program for this project. As the feasibility study nears completion and a preferred design alternative is identified, ODOT has entered into the public participation phase of the process. Ninth Street bridge

Preparation continues for the planned rehabilitation of the bridge near Beachler Field. Engineering design is nearly complete, and the project is on track for a start in early 2022. Work will include replacement of the bridge top box beams, asphalt and sidewalks. The project is being funded in part by a \$546,000 grant from the ODOT Municipal Bridge Program.

Planning a block party or garage sale?

Block parties and garage sales are popular summertime events. If you have either of these in your plans, please adhere to the following guidelines:

Block parties

A request form should be submitted to the City Manager's Office at least two weeks in advance of the event. If approved, the Miamisburg Police Department and Miami Valley Fire District will be notified, and the Public Works Department will deliver barricades to the ends of the affected street on the Friday before the party. Organizers can place the barricades in an appropriate location to deter traffic and keep attendees and motorists safe. Streets may not be blocked off for parties at individual residences. To obtain a request form, call 847-6456 or download from the

City Manager's Office page on the City's website.

Garage sales

- Hours of operation are limited to 8 a.m. to sundown for no more than three consecutive days.
- Non-illuminated advertising signs may be posted only on the property where the sale is located, or in the yard of neighbors (with their permission). Public bulletin boards at busy retail outlets like Kroger also give good exposure.
- No more than three sales are permitted per residence in any calendar year.
- Sale of food or beverages is prohibited.

Street banners

There are three high-traffic locations used to hang over-the-road promotional banners. These locations at Heincke Road, Central Avenue and Main Street are available for community use. A copy of the banner policy and an application can also be obtained online from the City Manager's page on the City website.

New utility payment options coming

To provide residents with additional payment options and more convenience, the City is implementing a new electronic billing and payment solution that is expected to be fully implemented this fall.

Online account access and payments have been available for several years, but the new service will also enable utility customers to pay with electronic check or a credit/debit card or even pay by phone or text message. The pay-by-phone option will be available 24/7 and is a quick

alternative for residents who may not be interested in going online.

Features of the online payment portal include an "At a Glance" dashboard, the ability to schedule one-time or automatic payments, secure storage of payment information and registration for receiving email and/or text billing reminders. Paperless billing will continue to be available. Creating an account is recommended to access all the features, but this is not required to only view and

pay bills online.

An activation date for this improved service will be communicated on upcoming utility bills and the City's website and social media pages.

Income tax

Quarterly estimated income tax payments for the remainder of 2021 are due June 15, September 15 and January 15. All forms are available at ci.miamisburg.oh.us. *

- The only alcoholic beverages carried or consumed outdoors MUST be purchased from participating businesses in special DORA-marked cups. Only one beverage is permitted per cup per use.
- When a cup leaves a participating establishment, it cannot come back into that business or taken into another participating bar or restaurant.
- The DORA boundaries will be marked by signage, and all cups must used and disposed of within those boundaries.

Did you know?

There are approximately 60 DORAs in Ohio.

Participating establishments will display window stickers and be governed by existing liquor license requirements as they pertain to overserving, serving to minors, etc. Other downtown businesses can choose to have stickers that specify whether or not alcohol is permitted in their business.

The city manager has the authority to adjust any of the regulations of the DORA, except that the boundaries cannot be expanded arbitrarily. A working committee that includes merchants will be evaluating results and making recommendations moving forward.

Be a good neighbor!

- By codified ordinance, dog walkers in Miamisburg are required to clean-up behind their pets "in a sanitary manner" while walking in public areas or on the private property of others. There are pet waste stations throughout the community to assist with this chore.
- Miamisburg residents who own boats, recreational vehicles or commercial vehicles are reminded to follow the codes governing on-street and off-street parking. Questions may be directed to Code Enforcement at 847-6532. *
