To provide residents with additional payment options and more convenience, the City is implementing a new electronic billing and payment solution.

Online account access and payments have been available for several years, but now residents can choose to pay with electronic check or a credit/debit card and, additionally, gain the ability to pay by phone or text message. The new pay-by-phone option is available 24/7 and is a quick alternative for residents who may not be interested in going online.

Features of the online payment portal include an "At a Glance" dashboard, the ability to schedule one-time or automatic payments, secure storage of payment information and registration for receiving email and/or text billing reminders. Paperless billing will continue to be available. Creating an account is recommended to access all the features, but it is not required to only view and pay bills online.


Winker's All Star path through MSBG

Regional Dispatch Center thriving at Mound



In addition to the 15 commercial tenants located at the Mound Business Park, the site continues to be home to the Montgomery County Regional Dispatch Center (RDC). Under the direction of the Montgomery County Sheriff, the RDC moved to Mound in 2009 with a long-term lease, and the County purchased the property in 2018. Today, it operates from the third and fourth floors of the facility and employs approximately 90 people, dispatching police and fire/ EMS calls for Miamisburg, Miami Township, Dayton and most of the County.

"The Mound was chosen by our governing board as the best and most cost-efficient location when the Regional

Dispatch Center was being developed back in 2007-08, " said Montgomery County Sheriff's Office Capt. Jay Wheeler. "Miamisburg is a great community that has welcomed our operation."

In addition to being a sound economic option, the elevation of the property is an asset for the radio tower and system used for dispatching. It also has built-in safety advantages.

"This location was built to withstand natural and man-made disasters, which ensures that we could provide service under adverse circumstances," Capt. Wheeler said. "There is also a great view of the surrounding area."

With room to grow, the Regional Dispatch Center is well-equipped to provide services for additional communities in the future. In addition, there are plans to welcome Montgomery County Emergency Management to the second floor of the building later this year.

Police Dept. warns against drowsy driving

Drowsy driving may seem like a minor issue—after all, who isn't occasionally a little sleepy on their way to work or at the end of long drive?—but research indicates that it is extremely common and can be just as dangerous as driving drunk.

Is drowsy driving really that dangerous?

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration estimates that in 2017 there were 91,000 crashes related to drowsy driving and in 2019 there were 697 deaths related to drowsy driving crashes. As disturbing as those numbers are, the American Academy of Sleep Education (AASE) believes they are severely underestimated and puts the number of drowsy driving crashes at 328,000 per year, with 6,400 of those leading to death.

The Center for Disease Control (CDC) claims that approximately one of every 25 surveyed drivers age 18 and older admitted to falling asleep at the wheel in the previous 30 days. And, even if a driver never actually falls asleep, drowsiness reduces attentiveness, slows reaction time, and impacts decision-making ability. CDC studies have also shown that the cognitive impairment of fatigue and its impact on driving performance closely mimics the impairment caused by consuming alcohol.

How to prevent drowsy driving?

Common signs of drowsy driving include difficulty keeping eyes open, missing road signs and/or turns, drifting out of the travel lane and being unable to remember driving the previous few miles. The AASE says simply that getting 7-9 hours of sleep nightly is the best way to avoid the problem altogether.

The Miamisburg Police Department strongly urges motorists who find themselves becoming drowsy to pull off the road to a safe location or switch drivers! And just as someone may call for a ride if they have had too much to drink, the same should be

Curbside leaf collection begins October 25

The Public Works Department will begin leaf collection on Monday, Oct. 25 and continue through Dec. 22. Residents having leaves after this date are encouraged to use composting or mulching as disposal methods. Although it is less environmentally friendly, leaves also may be bagged at that time and placed out with regular refuse for weekly collection.

Crews will once again use the zone collection system in which the City is divided into five collection zones. All leaf crews begin in Zone 1 and remain there until every street is passed once. Crews then move numerically through the remaining zones and work extended hours as needed during heavy collection periods.

A map of the zones is provided at right. Residents who wish to check which zone crews are working can call the City's Public Works Hotline 24-hours-a-day at 847-6454. To assist crews, please follow these guidelines:

- Rake leaves into the street gutters or as close as possible to the roadway, but be careful not to place them inside or on top of catch basins.
- Bagged leaves will not be dumped or collected by leaf collection crews.
- Since leaf pickup creates a fine dust in the air, plan to wash cars or hang laundry outdoors AFTER collection has occurred in your neighborhood.
- Make sure leaves to be collected are not under, between or around parked cars.

- Rake leaves as they fall, so they are ready for pickup when crews arrive.
- Keep grass clippings, tree branches and brush separated from leaves. Materials other than leaves clog the vacuum units and will not be collected. *

Development Report

- The City has approved a plan for construction of a new Kroger Marketplace store. The new 130,000-square-foot building will be built immediately north of the existing Kroger store on Heincke Road and include a new Kroger fueling center on the site. The existing Kroger will remain open during construction. Once the new Marketplace is open, Kroger will demolish the existing store and create additional parking. Construction is expected to begin late this year.
- Work continues on the new nursing facility located along State Rte.
 725 across from Kettering Health Miamisburg (formerly Sycamore Medical Center). This is a joint project between CareSpring and Kettering Health that is scheduled for completion in early 2022. The new
 99 beds of nursing care will replace existing nursing beds located on the Miamisburg campus and free

New prisoner transport van

The Police Department this summer took delivery on a new prisoner transport van. The 2020 Ford Transit XL 350 replaced a model that had been in service nearly 25 years.

The Department primarily uses a van to transport defendants to and from the Montgomery County Jail for proceedings in the Miamisburg Municipal Court. It up space for the hospital to provide additional medical services within existing buildings.

- Construction has begun on the Post-Acute Medical (PAM) facility at the southeast corner of the intersection of Alexandersville Road and Crosspointe Drive. This two-story, 74,640-square-foot building will provide care to people who no longer need full-time hospital care after surgery or injuries but are not quite ready to be sent home. PAM currently operates 40 beds at Kettering Health Miamisburg, which will be moved into the new facility upon completion.
- Homes are being constructed at a rapid pace in the new Aberdeen subdivision near the intersection of Medlar and Miamisburg-Springboro roads. As of the end of July, the City had issued approximately 40 permits for new homes. ★

will also be used to supplement the existing police fleet when needed and provide support with traffic control and special events.

The new vehicle can accommodate up to 12 individuals in three separate compartments. This interior unit is called a Havis module, and each seat provides a safety belt and strap handles for passengers. The new van also includes several upgrades from the previous model, such as emergency lights and siren, video monitoring and recording, laptop computer and added safety features. It was outfitted by the K.E. Rose Co.

Income Tax Update

Third quarter estimated income tax payments to the City are due Sept. 15. The State of Ohio requires that estimated municipal taxes be paid if the anticipated annual tax liability is \$200 or more.

For residents still planning to submit 2020 returns on extension, filing is now available online. After logging into your online account, select Individual E-File, enter W-2 information and upload copies of your W-2(s) and federal Form 1040.
