## City launching two major park projects in 2023

The City of Miamisburg will begin projects next spring to transform two of its signature parks.

City Council has approved the funding and concepts for improvements to Riverfront Park downtown and Sycamore Trails Park off Heincke Road. Planning is underway on both.

Since early 2022, the City's Parks and Recreation Department has been working with The Kleinger's Group of West Chester to update the master plan for all Miamisburg parks, including the aforementioned Riverfront and Sycamore Trails facilities. The updated plan for these popular parks now emphasizes realistic and vibrant recreation concepts that can be implemented in the near term.

"City Council and I recognize how much the community values our park space and facilities," Mayor Michelle Collins said. "I'm pleased that we're able to invest in these significant upgrades to continue growing and expanding the recreational opportunities for citizens."

#### **Riverfront Park**

The Riverfront Park concept plan features an outdoor amphitheater with sloped seating tiers that can accommodate approximately 1,000 spectators and a spacious lawn that will serve as passive park space, but also can host events and vendors. To the south, the park will include inclusive play space with a playground, natural play elements, traditional family-style games and shade areas. The plan also includes two levy overlooks where people can sit and enjoy views of the Great Miami River.

Importantly, there will be increased parking. Two lots that bookend the park to the north and south will add approximately 30 parking spots. In addition, the removal of Miami Avenue

will make available nearly 90 spots for special events that are unavailable in the current makeup of the park.

These improvements are estimated to cost approximately \$4.7 million and will be included in the City's 2023 Capital Improvement Plan. Completion of the final design and construction document will continue through February, when staff is expected to begin the contractor selection phase and proceed into construction. The project timeline for construction is still being finalized, but the City hopes to have the new Riverfront Park fully complete prior to May 2024.

According to Parks and Recreation Director Ryan Davis, the City hopes to execute construction in a single phase in order to limit its impacts to only one event season.

"Our hope for 2023 is to not cancel any traditional events, although it's likely that they will be modified and/or relocated

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to allow for construction."

Staff will be in communication with event organizers over the next few months to determine and finalize plans for the year. As that process evolves, residents are encouraged to check PlayMiamisburg. com/events for up-to-date information.

#### Sycamore Trails Park

To many residents, Sycamore Trails is simply the secluded natural space accessed from Heincke Road. In reality, it's much more.

There are 90-plus acres on this site that also include a disc golf course and hiking trails, as well as the adjacent Sycamore Trails Aquatic Center and the park on Maue Road that offers basketball and tennis courts, a playground and a shelter. A redesign of the site to connect all three parts was first developed in the mid-1990s, and the current plan builds on that idea. It calls for the transitioning of the Heincke Road entrance near State Rte. 725 to a pedestrian-only/bike access path and

construction of a new internal road to connect the park sections. New entrances to the park will be from Heincke Road near the Aquatic Center and from Maue Road next to the current basketball court.

In addition to the roadway improvements, the new park master plan includes several amenity upgrades. In the northern part of the park, there will be updated playgrounds, a new shelter/restroom structure and environmental education components. In the southern section, new tennis, basketball and pickleball courts will be featured, with additional child-focused activity/obstacle course-themed play and an adult fitness component. There will be new walking paths, a rejuvenated hiking trail and additional parking throughout. Some impacts to the current disc golf course are anticipated, but these will likely be limited to relocation of various holes.

Sycamore Trails improvements are estimated to cost approximately \$4.8

million and will be included in the City's 2023 and 2024 Capital Improvement Plans. Completion of the design and construction documents will take place late summer 2023 with planned construction to follow in the late fall. Work is expected to take 18-24 months to complete.

"Residents can expect to see updated, revitalized signature parks that will bring new life to this community," Davis said. "These projects represent City Council's desire to enhance the quality of life for Miamisburg residents and, as studies show, a well-maintained and vibrant park system is one of the reasons this remains a great community to live and work."

## Holiday safety guidelines from Fire District



The traditional holiday season is a time for family gatherings and celebrations. However, citizens should be aware that these parties, dinners and events increase the risk of fire-related emergencies in the home.

For example, more than 500 fires occur nationwide during the holiday week due to the ignition of Christmas trees. An estimated \$11 million of property loss occurs as a result of these fires, not to mention the sorrow and emotional distress experienced by family members.

The following safety tips are provided by the Miami Valley Fire District to keep the holidays safe and enjoyable for local families this holiday season.

- Be sure all candles are kept away from decorations and other combustible materials. Make sure they are extinguished before retiring for the evening.
- Never leave children unattended in a room with lit candles.
- Do not display lighted candles in windows or near exits in case of the need to escape from the home.
- Never use candles to decorate a Christmas tree.

- Use only Underwriters Laboratory approved decorative lights.
- Do not overload electrical outlets and always unplug lights before leaving home or retiring for the evening.
- Never put electrical lights on a metal Christmas tree.
- When installing outside lights with a ladder, make sure it is properly footed and attended by another person.
- Choose a fresh Christmas tree.
- Use a Christmas tree stand specifically designed to prevent tip-over.
- Place the Christmas tree well away from heat sources and exits.
- Keep live Christmas trees watered.
- Do not burn fires in fireplaces where stockings are mounted or hung.
- When using extension cords, do not place them under rugs, carpets, furniture or across doorways.
- Make sure extension cords used outdoors are intended for outdoor use.
- Unplug and do not use any extension cord that is hot to the touch.

 Do not use any extension cord that has frayed/exposed wiring or a loose plug.

The Miami Valley Fire District would like everyone in the community to have a safe, enjoyable and stress-free holiday season. #### **Election results**

Voters in the Miami Valley Fire District approved a ballot issue in November that will enable the District to operate financially independent of the City of Miamisburg and Miami Township. Issue 9 was approved by a 58-42 percent margin. As a result of this passage, existing fire levies in the City and Township will be discontinued in 2023.

## Police Dept. urges identity theft protection

Identity theft has emerged as a significant consumer concern in today's world, and people should be mindful of the dangers.

Identity theft is the fraudulent acquisition and use of a person's private identifying information, usually for financial gain. The Federal Trade Commission reports that it received 1.4 million complaints of identity theft in 2020 – a 2,920 percent increase from 2019. No matter how careful citizens may be, their personal information is "out there" and the odds of becoming a victim are growing. However, there are some easy steps people can take to reduce the expense and inconvenience of becoming an identity theft victim.

• Monitor your credit score - There are a

number of ways to do this, from paid subscription services to simply having your score run occasionally. Some banks and credit cards also offer credit monitoring as a perk. Any time you see your score take an unexpected dip—even if the cause is not something criminal—it is always a good idea to try and figure out why what is happening.

Freeze your credit - This simple step
prevents anyone from taking out an
unauthorized loan or credit card in your
name, and it is not nearly as complicated
as it sounds. It's easy to do online,
and you can temporarily "unfreeze"
everything in only a few minutes if you
need a legitimate credit check.

• Read your credit card and bank statements - A practice on the rise is for credit card thieves to charge a compromised card just a few dollars every month with the hope that the cardholder won't notice. This activity can continue for years. Be quick to investigate any suspicious charges—even if it's only a dollar or two—and don't be afraid to ask your provider for a new card if you notice something you are not comfortable with.

## Know the local Snow Emergency Routes

If the upcoming winter season is typical, there are sure to be times when driving conditions are dicey.

By ordinance, the City has the authority to declare a snow emergency "when the (city) manager has reason to believe that snow or ice has accumulated or will accumulate in such quantities as to endanger the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the City...." The purpose of this declaration is to provide adequate passageways for snowplows by

temporarily eliminating parking along certain streets designated as Snow Emergency Routes. In these instances, vehicles must be removed from the street within two hours and remain off the street until the snow emergency is lifted.

The list of streets designated as Snow Emergency Routes, which receive priority plowing status, is listed at left.

## Future project planning



The preparation of engineering design plans continues for the S. Riverview Avenue roadway improvements scheduled to begin next fall. This \$2.0 million project is being paid by funds from the federal American Rescue Plan Act and is part of the Miamisburg C.A.R.E.S. neighborhood enhancement initiative west of the Great Miami River.

The design is 60 percent complete and includes layout of a new two-lane roadway and sidewalk connections between Lower Miamisburg Road and W. Linden Avenue. Two new storm drainage culverts will replace two broken down structures underneath the roadway at the north end of the project. Additional roadside catch basins and storm drainage piping will help alleviate long-time flooding of the roadway area. Plans detailing work adjacent to individual properties along the corridor are being developed to create highway easements

and resident work agreements for the project.

Early next year, individual plans will be available to residents identifying construction limits for driveway and sidewalk tie-ins, along with frontage grading and restoration. For more information, please contact the Engineering Department at 847-6531 or engineer@ cityofmiamisburg.com.

#### I-75/State Rte. 725

In 2021 the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) identified a diverging diamond interchange (DDI) as the preferred design alternate for planned safety improvements at the busy intersection of I-75 and State Rte. 725. Engineering design is now 80 percent complete with preparation of final right-of-way plans and detailed construction drawings remaining.

This project will feature that new DDI ramp design, along with upgraded traffic signals between the SR 725 intersections at Byers Road and Mall Woods Drive/Prestige Plaza and new sidewalk from Byers to State Rte. 741.

ODOT approval and certification of final project drawings is planned in 2023. Construction is expected to begin in spring of 2024. ★

## Snow is coming: Helpful hints for wintertime



Equipment has been prepared and 3,000 tons of road salt are on hand.

While the City is wellprepared to provide snow and ice control

service on local roadways this winter, assistance from motorists and residents is also necessary to ensure an effective level of service and maintain safe conditions. Please note the following information from the Public Works Department:

#### Salt brine use continues

Salt brine is used in an anti-icing procedure that prevents or weakens the chemical bond that forms between the roadway and ice or snow. Prior to an anticipated severe weather event, the liquid brine is applied on primary roads, hills, bridges and select side streets. City crews will continue to use brine this winter when weather

conditions allow.

#### On-street parking

Residents are asked to please move parked cars off the street while snow and ice control efforts are underway. When streets and cul-de-sacs are clear of vehicles, snowplow operators are able to efficiently and safely remove snow and ice from curb to curb. Assistance is very much appreciated.

#### Shoveling snow

When clearing snow from driveways, residents are urged to shovel snow to the right side of the drive when facing toward the street. This practice will minimize the amount of snow that remains at the end of the driveway after snowplows pass by. Remember that during heavy snow events, the snowplow driver will first make one pass through your street just to open it up for emergency vehicles. Once the driver has done the first pass on each street on his route, he returns to each street and clears it curb to curb. Residents may want to wait to shovel their driveway until the driver completes that street.

Residents are not permitted to throw or blow snow from driveways or walks into the roadway. This practice is a safety hazard, a violation of City ordinance and hampers efforts to control snow and ice.

#### Safe driving

- Avoid driving during snow and ice events, unless absolutely necessary.
- Allow more time for trips.
- Avoid fast starts and stops while driving on hazardous roadways.
- Slow down. Increase following distance.
- Yield right-of-way to snowplows/ salt spreaders.
- Watch for icy patches on bridges, overpasses and shaded areas. \*

#### Did you know?

Not all roadways within Miamisburg are maintained by City crews. Many roads are maintained by other governmental entities or private contractors. Examples include:

- State Routes
- Condo/Apt Complexes
- Mobile Home Park Streets
- Newly Constructed Streets (not yet formally accepted by the City)

## Additional funding for home rehab program

The City of Miamisburg has been awarded an additional \$50,000 in Community Development Block Grant funds from Montgomery County in order to continue the Owner-Occupied Home Rehabilitation Program for residents. Combined with a \$25,000 match from the City, these funds will be available to continue assisting low-income households with the repair or replacement of essential home systems or add handicap-accessible elements to a residence.

After a two-year hiatus, this valuable

program returned in 2022. To date, over 25 local households have received assistance from the program, with another 40 on a wait list to access these funds. An application for an additional \$100,000 from Montgomery County is pending.

"Continued investment in the community's housing stock ensures our neighborhoods remain healthy and vibrant," City Planner Andrew Rodney said. "We would like to thank our partner agency, CountyCorp, for their assistance in executing this important program."
