18	City Council convened its Work Session for June 19, 2024 at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall with Mayor Messer presiding.		
19 20 21	ROLL CALL Mayor Messer noted that the roll call was held in the previously held Public Hearing and that all members were present. Mayor Messer gave special recognition to the significance of the Juneteenth holiday and its importance to the country. LEGISLATION FOR CONSIDERATION THIS EVENING

Mr. Riblet explained that, if approved, this Resolution would authorize a labor agreement with the Montgomery Firefighters IAFF Local 4391 ("IAFF") from April 1, 2024 through March 31, 2027. He added that he was very pleased with the efficient process of negotiations this year and attributed it to the positive culture and full staff at the fire department.

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Mayor Messer assigned the legislation to Mr. Suer.

Mayor Messer stated that as Ms. Gray had just presented the Tax Budget in the previously held Public Hearing, that the legislation would be added to the July 10 Business Session for consideration.

An Ordinance To Amend Appropriations For Current Expenses And Other Expenditures Of The City Of Montgomery, State Of Ohio, During The Fiscal Year Ending December 31, 2024

Mayor Messer assigned the legislation to Mr. Suer.

Ms. Gray explained that it is necessary for City Council to amend the 2024 Appropriation Ordinance to accommodate the transfer of cash and increased expenditures for the Montgomery Road at Vintage Club Boulevard Signal Improvements project. She added that the effect of the supplemental appropriations is to increase appropriations to accommodate the transfer of cash from the Vintage Club TIF Fund (Fund 331) to the Vintage Club Capital Construction Fund (Fund 463) in the amount of \$241,000 and the subsequent appropriation of a not to exceed expenditure in Vintage Club Capital Construction Fund (Fund 463) in the amount of \$241,000.

Mayor Messer stated that the legislation would be added to the July 10 Business Session for consideration. He added that it is requested that the second and third reading be suspended with passage of the Ordinance requested that evening.

A Resolution Authorizing Internet Auction of Surplus Personal Property Through Govdeals.com

Mayor Messer assigned the legislation to Mr. Dobrozsi.

 Chief Crowell explained that this is an annual Resolution that, if approved, will designate GovDeals.com as internet auction agents for the disposal of surplus property for the period of August 1, 2024 through July 31, 2025. Ohio law authorizes the City to dispose of surplus and abandoned personal property through internet auction. Section 50.02 of the Code of Ordinances sets forth a procedure for the sale and disposition of lost, abandoned, stolen, seized, or forfeited property ("Surplus Property") through internet auction agents.

Mayor Messer stated that the legislation would be added to the July 10 Business Session for consideration.

A Resolution Accepting a Bid and Authorizing the City Manager to enter into an Agreement with Sunesis Construction Company for the Huntersknoll Court Drainage Improvement Project

Mayor Messer assigned the legislation to Mr. Margolis.

 Mr. Heitkamp explained that, if approved, this Resolution will authorize a contract with Sunesis Construction Company to install new storm sewer to replace inadequately sized storm sewers and drainage swales with the intent of reducing/eliminating roadway, structure, and property flooding across five residential properties on Huntersknoll Court and Deerfield Road. Staff requests the project to be approved at \$451,300, which is the amount of the base bid and a 10% contingency.

Mrs. Mills-Reynolds asked if the City was given any assurance from the residents to hold the City harmless in case of severe flooding that the improvement project would not handle.

Mr. Heitkamp replied that there was no formal release other than the Easement Agreement that was presented to the residents. He explained that the drainage improvements would allow for a larger flow of water and that he did not anticipate issues with extreme flooding.

- Mr. Suer stated that this project was reminiscent of the Jolain Drive drainage improvements and asked Mr. 109
- Heitkamp how those improvements have improved the situation at those properties. 110

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Mr. Heitkamp replied that those drainage improvements were working well. He stated that since that job was 112 completed in 2018 that he has not had contact with any of the residents which he feels is a good sign. 113

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Mr. Suer stated that he felt this project would be just as successful. 115

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Mr. Margolis asked if the project would be going through the yards of the residents.

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119 Mr. Heitkamp replied that it would and explained the area of the project.

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121 Mr. Margolis asked if there were issued on the north side of Huntersknoll Court.

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123 Mr. Heitkamp stated that there were in the past, but when the Church of the Savior installed a detention basin it 124 relieved a lot of the flooding on the north side.

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126 Mayor Messer commented on the disparity between the low and high bid amounts.

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Mr. Heitkamp replied that this type of project is not a typical project in that the work is not efficient. The 128 129 contractors have to work in and around any structures and landscaping on the properties as well as manipulate their equipment in tight places. He stated that often causes bids to be inflated. He added that the positive thing is 130 that the work can be completed in a short time and is a good job for contractors who are filling their schedules 131 between summer and larger jobs.

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Mayor Messer stated that the legislation would be added to the July 10 Business Session for consideration. 138

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A Resolution Accepting a Bid and Authorizing the City Manager to enter into an Agreement with Bansal Construction, Inc. to complete the Montgomery Road and Vintage Club Boulevard Traffic Signal **Improvements Project**

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Mayor Messer assigned the legislation to Mr. Margolis.

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Mr. Heitkamp explained that, if approved, this Resolution will authorize a contract with Bansal Construction, Inc. 146 to improve the traffic signal located on Montgomery Road at Vintage Club Boulevard by removing the existing 147 span wire system and replacing it with a black decorative mast arm system with illuminated street name signs, along 148 149 with other upgrades. Staff requests the project be approved in the amount of \$241,000, which is the amount of the 150 base bid and a 10% contingency.

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152 Mr. Margolis asked Mr. Heitkamp how many span wire signals were left.

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154 Mr. Heitkamp replied around six or seven.

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156 Mrs. Mills-Reynolds asked when an anticipated installation date would be.

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158 Mr. Heitkamp replied that it depended on the delivery of the mast arm, but he anticipated in the fall.

- She thanked staff for the wonderful additions at the pool and for also managing the adult swim time.

Mr. Dobrozsi

Mr. Dobrozsi reported on the following:

- He attended an OKI meeting where they discussed transportation needs for seniors and those with disabilities.
- The Sister Cities Commission continues planning for Bastille Day. He stated that they now have 15-16 restaurants and four sponsors.
- The Arts Commission has confirmed all dates and entertainment for the Live at the Uni series.
- Government Affairs met and approved surplus to go to GovDeals for auction; the theme for the 2026 Montgomery Calendar was discussed and then interviews were held for the vacant seat on the Arts Commission.
