LEADING IN MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS BY CHRIS DOBROZSI

Happy Spring 2024 to all. I hope everyone had a wonderful winter season and you were able to enjoy the few snow events we had – nothing is more beautiful than pure white snow blanketing the barren trees and landscape. With April upon us, my family and I cherish the warm weather and the ability to be outdoors to celebrate what we all have in common - a love for this City and a desire to gather and celebrate family and friends at the numerous community-building events we have here in the City.

The magic of the great community we call Montgomery, "a community where people care about one another and feel they belong together," is created when the City convenes the residents to establish a personal connection. That connection leads us to care for one another to stay united.

That is what makes Montgomery unique.

This caring for one another led the City to recognize that while we were providing the basic services to our residents, as all cities do, we could do more to address the mental health needs of our residents. This came to the forefront as the 2020 pandemic lingered on. To that end, Montgomery City Council and City Staff committed to being change agents in de-stigmatizing mental illness and increasing awareness, advocacy and education of mental health and wellbeing. This is a non-traditional role for government, but Montgomery has always been a leader in municipal governance, and mental health awareness is more important than ever.

To symbolize this commitment, the City chose the bluebird as the symbol of the initiative as this bird symbolizes hope, love and renewal in many cultures. Even in the harshest climates, when bluebirds have a scarcity of food, they will manage to sing cheerfully. It is a sign that you should never lose faith, even in your darkest hours. You must hold to the belief that it will be alright in the end.

In a short two-year period, this commitment has delivered results!

We have conducted numerous community forums including:

- Mental Health overview by the National Alliance of Mental Illness (NAMI)
- Suicide Prevention provided by the organization 1N5
- Depression/Anxiety
- Montgomery Police Critical Incident Training (CIT)
- Anxiety/Depression in Youth provided by the Affinity Center
- Dementia a three-part series provided by the Alzheimer's Association
- Our first annual Mental Health Fair was a success with our host partner, Twin Lakes
- 2023 was capped off with an incredible presentation from Kevin Hines sharing his story of attempting suicide by jumping from the Golden Gate Bridge in San Fransisco his story of survival and hope is truly remarkable

What's next:

- Soon you'll be hearing about our newest team member in Montgomery. Asha, a therapy dog, will be joining our staff to provide support services and will be a benefit to our community.
- Our second annual Mental Health Fair will take place on Saturday, April 6 at Twin Lakes from 9:00 a.m. 11:30 a.m.
- The City will be announcing a new software application that will pair those who are in need of mental health services with therapists and counselors who are committed to helping others.

In closing, I'm so proud to live in this incredible community and for our Council and Staff to recognize the tremendous opportunity we have to connect people who are struggling with mental health - and for the many resources that are available to assist them through difficult times. Working together – we can all make a difference.

OWN A SMALL PIECE OF MONTGOMERY HISTORY

The City of Montgomery is offering residents a chance to buy old street signs. The signs are only sold at City Hall starting Monday, April 15. The signs, which come in various sizes, are sold as is and on a first-come, first-served basis. The conditions range from good to poor. Each sign is \$25.

STREET RESURFACING PROGRAM TO BEGIN THIS SPRING

The City awarded the 2024 street resurfacing program to John R. Jurgensen Company. This year's program includes 4.6 centerline miles of public roadway. The following streets will be completed:

- Shadowhill Way (Windhaven Court to Lakewater Drive)
- Lakewater Drive
- Valleystream Drive
- Deerfield Road (Montgomery Road to Hartford Hill Lane)
- Hartford Hill Lane
- Kenilworth Lane
- Huntersknoll Court
- Ivygate Lane
- Schoolhouse Lane (Montgomery Road to west terminus)
- Old Farm Court
- Oldtown Court
- Tollgate Lane
- Knollbrook Terrace
- Shelldale Way
- Jolain Drive (Knollbrook Terrace to Tollgate Lane)
- Remington Road (Montgomery Road to east corporation limit)
- Cooper Road (Montgomery Road to east corporation limit)

- Main Street (1-lane width between Cooper Road and #9526 Main Street)
- Hartfield Place

The work entails complete milling and asphalt resurfacing, along with "spot" curb replacement and storm drainage inlet repairs. Construction is anticipated to begin in April and most streets will be complete by August (Huntersknoll Court and portions of Deerfield Road might be resurfaced later in the year).

You may be asking: Why isn't the section of Montgomery Road getting resurfaced in front of Bethesda North Hospital?

Montgomery Road between Pfeiffer Road and Weller Road has not been included in our annual resurfacing program for the past few years, and again this year, as it is scheduled to be resurfaced in Fall of 2025. Montgomery Road, being a state route, is eligible for state funding through the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT). ODOT has agreed to pay 80%, or roughly \$450,000, of the resurfacing cost as part of their Fiscal Year 2026 budget, which begins in Fall of 2025.

As a reminder, Montgomery tax returns are due by **April 15, 2024**, unless you have filed for a Federal Extension. The City of Montgomery partnered with the Regional Income Tax Agency (RITA) beginning in October 2023. Montgomery families can begin registering for Safety Village on Monday, April 8, at montgomeryohio.gov.

Safety Village is a one-week summer safety camp for children entering kindergarten in the fall. Students will learn basic pedestrian and traffic safety rules, personal safety, school bus, and fire safety.

Safety Village is held at Montgomery Elementary in three one-week sessions.

June 3-7 • June 10-14 • June 17-21

Each week offers morning classes from 9:00 a.m. to noon or afternoon classes from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m.

Registration for non-residents begins Monday, April 22. There is a \$25 fee for non-residents.



SWAIM GOLF COURSE

In the early 1930's the 224 acre farm located at the corner of Cooper and Zig Zag roads was developed into a golf course. The owners hired Indianapolis golf course architect Bill Diddle, who is known as one of America's great golf architects to design the course. The first nine holes were built, then a second and a third were added. The course also included a clubhouse and restaurant and bar called "The 19th Hole".

The course was closed and altered in 1965 when I-71 was routed along the western edge and when Cross County Highway was constructed the Cooper Road "back nine" section was sold for a housing development called Village Green.



The golf course ceased operations in 1976 when it was sold to developers who built the 176 lot subdivision, Swaim Fields. The adjacent Swaim Park was also originally part of the golf course and Todd Pond was the water hazard at the 18th hole.







TORNADO PREPAREDNESS AND RESPONSE SAFETY CHECKLIST

Being prepared for a tornado is essential for the safety of individuals and communities. This checklist serves as a guide to help you plan and respond effectively during a tornado.

Before a Tornado

VI 1. Stay Informed:

- Monitor weather updates through local news, weather apps, or a NOAA Weather Radio.
- Be aware of tornado watches and warnings issued by authorities.

2.Create an Emergency Plan:

- Identify a designated safe room or storm shelter in vour home, preferably in a basement or an interior room on the lowest floor.
- · Ensure all family members are familiar with the emergency plan and know where to go during a tornado.

3.Emergency Supplies:

• Prepare an emergency kit with essential supplies, including water, non-perishable food, a flashlight, batteries, a first aid kit, and important documents.

✓ 4.Practice Tornado Drills:

- Conduct regular tornado drills with your family to ensure everyone knows the emergency procedures.
- Include practicing how to take shelter guickly and safely.

During a Tornado

✓ 1. Take Shelter Immediately:

- Move to the designated safe room or storm shelter.
- Avoid windows and doors. Protect yourself from flying debris by taking cover under a sturdy piece of furniture.

🟹 2. Stay Informed:

- Keep a battery-powered weather radio or smartphone to receive updates during the tornado.
- Do not leave the shelter until authorities declare it safe to do so.

After a Tornado

1. Check for Injuries:

• Attend to any injuries promptly. Call for emergency medical assistance if needed.

2.Assess Damage:

• Be cautious when inspecting your property for damage. Watch for downed power lines and unstable structures.

3.Contact Loved Ones:

 Inform family and friends of your safety. Use text messages or social media to avoid overloading communication networks.

4.Follow Official Instructions:

- Listen to local authorities for information on community resources, shelters, and evacuation routes.
- Adhere to safety guidelines provided by emergency services.

✓ 5.Document Damage:

 Take photos or videos of the damage to assist with insurance claims.

By following this tornado preparedness and response safety checklist, you increase your chances of staying safe and minimizing the impact of a tornado on your life and property. Regular practice and staying informed are key elements in enhancing tornado readiness.

METHANE EMISSIONS: A GLOBAL CONCERN

Methane, a powerful greenhouse gas, contributes significantly to climate change. While it only lasts in the atmosphere for a shorter period than carbon dioxide, its

Potential Sources in Community

- Waste: Decomposing organic matter in landfills and improperly sorted waste generate methane.
- **Agriculture:** Livestock, particularly cows, release methane through their digestive processes.
- **Energy:** Leaks in natural gas infrastructure, from pipelines to homes.
- Other sources: Wastewater treatment plants, industrial processes.

How to Identify the Sources

SMELL: Methane has swampy, earthy, or rotten egg-like smell. Pay attention to unusual smells around your home, farm, or community, especially near:

- Landfills: If you live near a landfill, be extra vigilant for methane odors.
- Natural gas infrastructure: Sniff around gas meters, pipelines, and appliances for leaks.
- Wastewater treatment plants: Notice any unusual smells emanating from nearby plants.
- Agricultural areas: Methane from livestock manure can be noticeable near farms.

SIGHT: Look for signs of potential sources:

- Visible leaks: Check gas appliances and meter connections for bubbles or hissing sounds.
- **Livestock:** Large numbers of cattle and their manure storage areas.
- **Food waste:** Composting piles or improperly discarded food waste.

heat-trapping potential is 25 times greater. Understanding and minimizing methane emissions is crucial in combating climate change.



REPORT LEAKS

REDUCE WASTE ENERGY EFFICIENT WORK TOGETHER

Action Steps

Report leaks: Immediately report suspected gas leaks to your utility company. Contact local authorities for other potential sources like landfills or wastewater facilities.

Reduce waste: Compost food scraps, recycle, and minimize organic waste going to landfills.

Be energy efficient: Regularly maintain gas appliances and choose energy-efficient models when replacing them.

Remember to stay informed: Every effort counts! By working together, residents can play a significant role in reducing methane emissions and contributing to a cleaner environment.

Additional Tips

- Download leak detection apps for smartphones to help pinpoint gas leaks around your home.
- Participate in community clean-up events to address improper waste disposal in your neighborhood.
- Local businesses consider adopting sustainable practices like reducing food waste and utilizing clean energy sources.

By implementing these measures, residents can proactively identify and prevent methane emissions, creating a healthier and more sustainable community for everyone.



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BACKYARD POOL SAFETY REMINDERS

Summertime is just around the corner and having a backyard pool can be a great way to beat the heat! However, drowning is the leading cause of injury-related death in young children 1-4 years old. According to the Center for Disease Control, the following are some things you can do to prevent drowning in your backyard pool:

- Ensure everyone has basic swim skills and water safety awareness.
- Use life jackets as directed (U.S. Coast Guard approved).
- Know how to recognize and respond to a swimmer in distress and how to perform CPR.
- Provide continuous and close supervision to swimmers.
- Prevent access to the water when the pool is not in use. o Install and maintain barriers such as four-sided fencing. o Use lock/alarms for windows and doors.
