

# WHAT YOU SHOULD EXPECT FROM ME, YOUR LOCAL GOVERNMENT REPRESENTATIVE

I am honored to be serving another term on Montgomery City Council. I am encouraged that many have trust in me to serve their interests with the governance of the City of Montgomery. Elected officials in small cities play a pivotal role in shaping the community's present and future. #### CITY RECEIVES AED DONATION FOR SWAIM PARK

The City of Montgomery would like to thank the Realtors with Heart and Project Heart ReStart.

REALTORS with Heart, a committee of the REALTOR Alliance of Greater Cincinnati, donated an Automated External Defibrillator or AED to Swaim Park. The Realtors with Heart's mission is to make Greater Cincinnati more heart-safe through CPR/AED Training, AED Placement, and Advocacy.

An Automated External Defibrillator, or AED, is used to deliver an electric shock to the heart and stop fibrillation. The sooner one is used following cardiac arrest, the more likely it will convert the heart's rhythm. An AED is very easy to use and should be used as soon as possible on any person who is receiving CPR. Turn on the AED, then follow the voice prompts from the AED. It will tell you exactly what to do until emergency responders arrive.

Realtors with Heart previously donated two AEDs to Montgomery. Those devices are at Dulle Park and the Recreation Annex.



# LEARN CPR WITH THE MONTGOMERY FIRE DEPARTMENT

Each second following sudden cardiac arrest is critical. That's why it's so important to take quick action. The Montgomery Fire Department offers quarterly classes to teach CPR.

# JOIN US FOR A HISTORIC WALKING TOUR TO CELEBRATE NATIONAL HISTORIC PRESERVATION MONTH

The month of May is designated as National Historic Preservation month. The National Trust for Historic Preservation established this event in 1973 and it is celebrated every year by cities, historical societies, preservation groups and various civic organizations throughout the country. Founded in 1795 by settlers from Montgomery, New York, the city has a rich history that has been preserved to create a strong sense of place. The downtown historic district is appreciated throughout the region and its unique character draws visitors to the restaurants, shops and services.

To preserve the city's cultural heritage, the Montgomery Landmarks Commission was established in 1976 by a group of citizens. The Commission has identified 32 Landmarks to commemorate the city's historical





beginnings. In addition, six of these buildings are also listed on the National Register of Historic Places. These Landmarks will be preserved for future generations as a tribute to Montgomery's past. The Commission also works to ensure new construction and development is architecturally cohesive with the historic district.

# MAY IS STROKE AWARENESS MONTH

## DO YOU KNOW THE SIGNS?

A stroke occurs when the blood supply to part of your brain is interrupted or reduced, preventing brain tissue from getting oxygen and nutrients. Brain cells begin to die in minutes. A stroke is a medical emergency, and prompt treatment is crucial. Early action can reduce brain damage and other complications. Effective treatments can also help prevent disability from stroke.

#### **Symptoms**

If you or someone you're with may be having a stroke, pay particular attention to the time the symptoms began. Some treatment options are most effective when given soon after a stroke begins.

#### Signs and symptoms of stroke include:

- Trouble speaking and understanding what others are saying. You may experience confusion, slur your words or have difficulty understanding speech.
- Paralysis or numbness of the face, arm or leg. You may develop sudden numbness, weakness or paralysis in your face, arm or leg. This often affects just one side of your body. Try to raise both your arms over your head at the same time. If one arm begins to fall, you may be having a stroke. Also, one side of your mouth may droop when you try to smile.
- Problems seeing in one or both eyes. You may suddenly have blurred or blackened vision in one or both eyes, or you may see double.
- Headache. A sudden, severe headache, which may be accompanied by vomiting, dizziness or altered consciousness, may indicate that you're having a stroke.
- Trouble walking. You may stumble or lose your balance. You may also have sudden dizziness or a loss of coordination.

# STROKE WARNING SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS ACE DROOPING RM WEAKNESS PEECH DIFFICULTY IME TO CALL

Seek immediate medical attention if you notice any signs or symptoms of a stroke, even if they seem to come and go or they disappear completely. Think "FAST" and do the following:

- Face. Ask the person to smile. Does one side of the face droop?
- Arms. Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift downward? Or is one arm unable to rise?
- **Speech.** Ask the person to repeat a simple phrase. Is his or her speech slurred or strange?
- Time. If you observe any of these signs, call 911 or emergency medical help immediately.

Call 911 or your local emergency number right away. Don't wait to see if symptoms stop. Every minute counts. The longer a stroke goes untreated, the greater the potential for brain damage and disability.

This year, the tour features a garden filled with native species of plants, a garden with hydrangeas in a charming setting, homeowners who built a pond in their yard during the COVID lockdown, and another garden filled with a thousand annuals. The Commission also features a pollinator garden and a permanent bed at Swaim Park.

Anyone attending the tour will sign in at Swaim Park and pick up a map to drive to each garden location. Enjoy the gardens at your own pace.

# NON-NATIVE INVASIVE PLANT SPECIES IN MONTGOMERY

With Spring in full bloom, there has been a lot of attention paid to "Invasive Plant Species," which are non-native plants that can spread unchecked because they lack local natural deterrents to keep them in balance with other native species. Most non-native plants have been introduced for erosion control, landscaping, culinary and medicinal use, wildlife foods, and by accident.

Some common invasive species in Montgomery include: Honeysuckle, Callery Pear, Garlic Mustard, Lesser Celandine (looks like Dandelion), and Poison Hemlock (harmful to humans and looks like Queen Ann's Lace).



"Invasive plants compete with and often crowd out native ones, leading to decreased biodiversity, poorer habitats for wildlife and lower water quality, among other issues. According to the U.S. Forest Service, 'invasive species have contributed to the decline of 42% of U.S. endangered and threatened species.""

The ORF website shows pictures and provides detailed methods for controlling invasive species on your property. The Ohio Department of Natural Resources website (https:// ohiodnr.gov/discover-and-learn/ plants-trees/invasive-plants) also features pictures and descriptions of the habitats of these plants along with other useful information.

Should you find these plants on your property and they are getting out of control, deteriorating with age, and/or you want them removed for environmental reasons, consider removing and replacing them with hardy native plants. Local nurseries, landscapers, and the internet are all good resources for replacing invasive plants.

## **CROSSWALK SAFETY TIPS**

We want everyone to be safe while walking in the City of Montgomery. There are many paths and sidewalks for everyone to enjoy, but at some point, on your journey, you may need to use a crosswalk.

Here are some safety tips for crosswalks that will help make it safer.

- Whenever possible, use a marked crosswalk that has a signal.
- · Wear bright and reflective clothing, especially after dusk.
- Do not assume that being in a crosswalk will protect you from an accident.
- Stop at the curb and look left, right, and left again for vehicles. Stopping at the curb alerts drivers that you intend to cross.
- Watch out for vehicles that are turning at an intersection.
- Do not step off the curb if there is a vehicle approaching close to you. By law, vehicles must be given sufficient time to stop for a pedestrian. This means that if a vehicle is within a certain distance, it may not be able to stop in time, so it's best to wait until it's safe to cross. Make eye contact with drivers before crossing, and never assume they see you or that they are paying attention.
- Do not look at your phone while you are crossing the street.
