Grant Darbyshire, a Montgomery resident who graduated Summa Cum Laude from Sycamore High School and is a Student-Athlete with honors at the University of Kentucky will share his personal story of his own suicide attempt and survival.

Don Scalf, a Cincinnati Police Officer, will share his journey that includes a suicide attempt, survival, and treatment. Don will also talk about how police officers struggle with the situations they face every day.

Nancy Eigel-Miller, 1N5 Founder and Executive Director. In 2008, Nancy lost her husband, Jim, to suicide. Determined to prevent others from facing the same pain and loss her family did, Nancy created 1N5 a few years after Jim's death, following two fund-raising walks in the community. 1N5 focuses on stigma reduction, community engagement

and outreach, education and programming, measurement and data, and policy and advocacy. 1N5 has raised over \$2 million for mental health and suicide prevention programs to serve 85 high schools, 72 community partners, and six universities.

Dr. Tracy Cummings, a 2023 Cincy Best Doc in the Child & Adolescent Psychiatry category, serves as the Chief of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and Medical Director, Adolescent PHP for the Lindner Center of HOPE. As a staff psychiatrist for Lindner Center of HOPE, Dr. Cummings specializes in the assessment and treatment of children through emerging adulthood and has vast experience working with individuals and families coping with severe and chronic psychiatric issues.



TEEN DRIVING TIPS

Now more than ever, talking with your teen driver about the dangers of driving and how to mitigate some risks is essential. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), 2,514 people were killed in crashes involving a teenage driver in 2022. Teen drivers have a higher rate of fatal crashes, mainly because of their immaturity and lack of experience.

IMPAIRED DRIVING Parents should talk to their teen drivers about the dangers of drugs and alcohol. Teens are more likely than anyone else to be killed in an alcohol-related crash.

DISTRACTED DRIVING One in three teens admits to texting while driving. The NHTSA says dialing a phone number while driving increases a teen driver's risk of a crash by six times, and texting while driving increases the risk by 23 times.

Many teens are also distracted by the addition of passengers in the vehicle. Teen drivers are two and a half times more likely to engage in risky behaviors when driving with a teenage friend. Research shows that the risk of a deadly crash increases in direct relation to the number of teenagers in the car.

SPEEDING Speeding and seat belt usage are critical safety issues for teen drivers. In 2022, speeding was a factor in 30% of the deadly crashes involving a teen driver. In the same year, 50% of teen drivers who died were unbuckled, and nine out of 10 of the passengers who died were also unbuckled.

DROWSY DRIVING Lastly, talk to your teen drivers about drowsy driving. NHTSA found that drowsy driving claimed 693 lives in one year, and some studies suggest drowsiness may have been involved in more than 10–20 percent of fatal or injury crashes. Make sure your teen drivers are getting adequate sleep at night.

WHAT CAN YOU DO? Parents setting a good example on the roads is critical for teen drivers. Do not speed and keep your eyes on the road and your hands on the steering wheel. Remember that your children learn by watching you drive. Make sure you set aside time to practice driving with them. Practice makes perfect!





REUSE IS REBIRTH



Next time you drive through Higginsport, Ohio, it may seem familiar. If not, peek into Colonel Higgins Park. The playset is from Montgomery.

About two years ago, the Higginsport playground was taped off and closed for safety, even though it looked solid. A ten-year-old Higginsport girl would have none of this. She went to the Village Council and asked for the playground to be repaired. Quite simply, the Village of 213 didn't have the money. An easy end to the story, right?

Nope! That little girl read that Montgomery was replacing its Swaim Park Playground and asked what was going to happen to the old playground. I put her in touch with the City of Montgomery since Montgomery sells its surplus equipment to other cities. There were a few hurdles for the little girl to climb, though.

While Montgomery would provide the playground at a nominal cost, Higginsport had to provide transportation and installation costs. Estimates were that this would cost about \$2000. The little girl decided to raise the money herself, with the Police Chief tracking the money. She parked a table in front of the Antique Bar and Grill and sold lemonade, energy drinks, and bracelets to anyone passing by. She organized a yoga in the park class and



even offered a split-the-pot plank contest. Eventually, she raised the \$2000, and Higginsport volunteers came to Montgomery and dismantled the playset. They took the playset back to Higginsport to store it for the winter.

In May 2024, volunteers completed the playground

installation, with a ribboncutting ceremony to come soon. But that little girl's efforts sparked the spirit of change in Higginsport. In 2023 the community applied for and received a grant to improve Kayak access to the Ohio River. Coinciding with the completion of the playground, the community received a state of Ohio \$6,000,000



+ grant to redevelop the ballfields. Above and beyond the recreation-related changes, volunteers cleaned the basketball courts, cleanup days were started, a new Mayor was elected, and the community recently added six pallets of planters throughout the community.

In summary, surplus Montgomery equipment and the determination of a 10-year-old inspired rebirth of a small town in rural Ohio.



DID YOU KNOW?

Parrott's General Store used to stand on the southwest corner of Montgomery and Cooper Roads. It was one of two general stores that served Montgomery during the late 1800's into the turn of the century. Parrott's General Store was owned and operated by Richard Parrott, who lived next door with his wife and eight children. Parrott Alley, which connects the public parking lot on Shelly Lane to Montgomery Road, is named after the family. The store was also the site of Montgomery's first telephone in 1897.

Today, the site is the location of Neuilly Plaisance Plaza and Montgomery Commons, which includes numerous businesses, the Corner Pub, Z Place, The Parlor Hair Salon, Your World Consignment Boutique, to name a few.

ENJOY THE QUIET OF JOHNSON NATURE PRESERVE


Take a break from your everyday hustle and bustle and enjoy the quiet beauty of Johnson Nature Preserve. The .35-mile-long paver walkway provides easy access to all and invites park visitors to come in and enjoy nature. Flower beds with native plants and cedar log benches allow for peaceful enjoyment of the local wildlife and natural setting in this valley of trees. The pergola provides just enough shelter for a small group discussion.

After the 1999 tornado, the recovery plan was to enhance the powerful natural reforestation process by leaving much of the fallen timber in place to provide stabilization of slopes, an enhanced wildlife habitat, and organic content to the soil of the forest floor. The City is monitoring the recovery and natural reforestation process. The recovery plan resulted in returning the Johnson Nature Preserve to an urban forest and point of community pride as well as an area for recreation, enjoyment, and study.
