TRAFFIC BY RON MESSER

What seven letter word strikes terror in the hearts of drivers? TRAFFIC. I, like many of us, have experienced this terror. Even here in our great city, where we received an overall 97% satisfaction rating in our last residents' survey, traffic was one of the top four things that was singled out for improvement. Here are just a few of the traffic comments.

"Traffic congestion in the downtown area during morning and evening rush hours."

"Traffic congestion: Montgomery Road in the downtown area is a prime example."

"Traffic is the most significant problem. Traffic lights specifically need to be timed."

"Traffic in the downtown area. The traffic gets backed up regularly, and the addition of new businesses and residences risk making it significantly worse."

Your input was received and acted upon. We have since built and are using 2 roundabouts that are not only proven to reduce serious accidents, but also reduce exhaust pollution by moving traffic more efficiently, thus reducing delay. However, we still have the challenge of moving over 29,000 vehicles per day on Montgomery Road. Many of us have been in a situation where we have been sitting, for what seems like an eternity, either on Montgomery Road, or a side street, when there is little or no traffic in the direction that has the green light.

To meet this challenge, city council has approved and included in the budget the implementation of smart traffic lights and systems that utilize the latest technology on real time traffic data collection and then programs the signal to maximize traffic flow efficiency. These ITS (intelligent traffic systems) have been tested and implemented in several cities in the U.S. One of the best examples is in Pittsburgh where over 200 smart signals were added resulting in a 26% decrease in traffic flow time, a 21% decrease in exhaust emissions, and a 41% decrease in wait times at intersections.

We are in the process of implementing our ITS by adding 12 smart traffic signals that identifies traffic, then uses a sophisticated algorithm to calculate and set a timing pattern. This pattern is also communicated to the other traffic signals so they can in turn adjust their timing to optimize flow. This is truly technology at its best, and it's forward thinking with the potential to communicate to smart vehicles and electronic devices that are projected for the future.

We are currently fine tuning our new smart traffic lights and expect them to be operational and adapting / learning before the end of this year. There will still be a high volume of traffic on Montgomery Road, but we heard you and we are working to improve with some of the best technology and expertise available.

In the meantime, always remember to buckle-up and drive safely.



CITY TO CONDUCT LIMITED FALL CURBSIDE BRUSH PICK-UP

The Montgomery Public Works Department will collect brush and limbs over a five-week period starting on September 9. Each pick-up week is determined by the regular trash collection schedule. Please place brush at the curb on the Sunday evening of your collection week.

GUIDELINES

- Any material placed curbside after the chipper crew passes will not be picked up.
- Our crew will not pick up brush with nails, metal, stones, or excessive dirt.

- Vines and branches with thorns will not be picked up.
- Limbs may be of any length and between 1/2 inch and 8 inches in diameter. Place shorter branches, twigs, and clippings in yard waste bags or cans for Rumpke to pick up
- Place brush and limbs in small piles along the curb with the "cut" ends toward the street. Do not create large stacks with cut ends going in different directions
- Brush piles that are tied into bundles or are tangled will not be picked up.
- Do not place stumps, root balls, and logs out for curbside brush collection. These may be placed out for Rumpke waste collection on your regularly scheduled day. Each item cannot weigh more than 60 lbs

CITY SEEKS YOUR INPUT ON HOPEWELL CEMETERY

For decades, Hopewell Cemetery has been chosen as the final resting place for many in our Montgomery and surrounding communities. Hopewell Cemetery encompasses eleven acres and has over 6,000 graves. The sale of grave sites has always provided a revenue stream to assist the city in the overall maintenance and operations of the cemetery. However, fewer than forty grave sites are available for purchase, and that revenue stream will be gone.

City Administration began working with KZF Architects to research alternative burial options at Hopewell Cemetery that will create a new revenue stream essential to maintaining and operating the cemetery. One option is adding a columbarium to include cremation niches tastefully constructed within the cemetery.

RECYCLING TIP

HOW TO RECYCLE PLASTIC CLAMSHELL CONTAINERS

Please do not put plastic clamshell containers in your Rumpke Recycling Bin. Rumpke does not have a vender who is able to recycle these plastics. So, they are sorted out and placed back on a truck headed for the landfill.

The good news is that there are two ways you can recycle your clamshell containers:

1. The Cincinnati Recycling and Reuse Hub (cincinnatirecyclingandreusehub.org) accepts all rigid #1-#7 and "no-number" plastics (including clamshell containers),



- sorted by number. The address is 911 Evans Street, Cincinnati, Ohio, 45204. Open Thursday 12-6 p.m. and Saturday 10 a.m.-2 p.m.
- 2. You can also drop off articles at the Symmes Safety Center on the first Saturday of the month 10 a.m.-noon at 8871 Weekly Lane, 45249. They accept all items the "Hub" collects for free. The Symmes Safety Center is located just north of The City of Montgomery.

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



When an emergency strikes and you aren't prepared, some of your basic needs may not be met. Any information that is available regarding preparing for disaster responses places the responsibility on the individual to be capable of being self-sustaining for a minimum of three days. Local governments plan to be self-sufficient for at least three days as the State and Federal Governments have instructed local governments that additional support for the community will take 72 hours once a disaster declaration is recognized.

The role of local government in a disaster is twofold: response and recovery. Response includes acts performed by police, fire, and public works personnel that deal with the rescue of individuals, maintaining law and order, opening roadways, and securing areas that are not safe. Additionally, considerations for food, water, shelter, and providing coordinated communications is a role of local government with private sector partners such as the American Red Cross.

Recovery efforts focus on rebuilding the infrastructure once the direct dangers of the disaster have passed. The recovery phase may take months to years to complete. During both the response and recovery phases, the local government must track all expenditures of labor and materials for reporting to state and federal authorities to determine if a disaster qualifies for federal loans and grants that can assist during the recovery phase. Additionally, local government works to return the community back to its pre-disaster status as normal operations continue in the community regardless of the response and recovery of the disaster.

The role of the citizen is to plan ahead for a disaster by creating a plan of how they can be self-sufficient for a minimum of three days or longer. This plan should be an "all-hazards" plan that can adapt to warm or cold weather, sheltering in place or evacuation if so ordered, etc., to name a few possible situations to consider. Food, water, batteries, a transistor radio, flashlights, medications, and other personal necessities should be readily available to sustain your family. An electrical generator should be considered, especially if someone in your home has special needs requiring a constant supply of electricity. Additionally, part of your plan should involve checking on family and neighbors to ensure their well-being and safety. The US Department of Homeland Security has provided an excellent source of information on how you can prepare. Ready.gov provides good general information as well as considerations for the elderly and for pets.

The City of Montgomery has a working disaster plan that has served the community well in several situations.

The "all-hazard" approach to the disaster plan makes the plan adaptable to many different possible scenarios and is the recognized approach to disaster planning. City Staff have trained in the National Incident Management System provided by the federal government and works closely with other communities and the Hamilton County Emergency Management Agency. The City staff annually participates in an exercise that tests the disaster plan. All this assists the City in being prepared to handle emergencies and disasters as needed. Please do your part and take the time to plan and gather the needed supplies required during an emergency. It will help you and your family.

SCHOOL IS BACK IN SESSION, WATCH FOR SCHOOL BUSES ON THE ROAD

The relaxed days of summer are over, and school is back in session. This means increased traffic on the roads, including school buses. In Ohio, it's important to remember that drivers in both directions are required to stop at least 10 feet from the front or rear of a stopped school bus that is picking up or dropping off passengers.

Stopping for a school bus

- Yellow flashing lights on a school bus mean slow down, and the bus is preparing to stop. Students are likely waiting to get on the bus or ready to exit the bus.
- · Red flashing lights mean stop. Vehicles should stop at least 10 to 20 feet behind the school bus as children are getting on or off. Stay stopped until the red lights stop flashing and the bus begins moving.



When to stop on the roadway for a school bus

- · Drivers must stop in both directions on a two-lane road.
- On a road with fewer than four lanes, all traffic approaching a stopped school bus from either direction must stop at least 10 feet from the front or rear of the bus and remain stopped until the bus begins to move or the bus driver signals motorists to proceed.
- · On a road with four lanes or more, traffic proceeding in the same direction as the school bus must stop.
