## MONTGOMERY EMPLOYEES CREATE INNOVATIVE SOLUTIONS TO BUILD COMMUNITY

With summer in the rearview mirror, I find the beautiful colors and smells of fall to be a warm welcome to us all as every day brings us one day closer to the end of these trying times. Whether you are battling issues with employment, mental/physical health, financial stability, or educating your children – every day brings a new challenge causing us to rise up, overcome, and ultimately make us stronger.

As I reflect back six long months ago to the beginning of the pandemic in early March, our Montgomery employees were challenged with how to continue providing services safely to the residents, businesses, and visitors of the City. When faced with this adversity, they had two distinct options – 1) live by fear and provide only the minimal services needed until the pandemic was over, or 2) lean in, innovate and continue to deliver the superior services to which we all are accustomed, in a safe environment.

I hope that everyone can agree that our dedicated city employees chose option #2. Doing nothing was not an option. I witnessed firsthand as these best-in-class employees overcame the many restrictions on operations mandated by COVID-19. Not only did they continue services, but in many respects, enhance them as well. Some of these innovative solutions include:

- The Police Department switched to 12-hour shifts separating their staff in the event someone contracts COVID-19.
- The Fire Department worked diligently to ensure there were adequate supplies of Personal Protective Equipment for staff.
- Our Public Works staff worked to keep our parks and park restrooms open for our community.
- Our Community Development Department transitioned to an electronic permit application submission system.
- The Finance staff established a new digital platform, assisting and providing guidance to everyone filing their tax returns.
- Staff provided helpful and inspirational messages via our City website and social media platforms.

- Independence Day Reverse Parade – understanding the need for our community to interact safely, our City Team carefully planned and implemented the reverse parade in collaboration with Sycamore Schools. Approximately 1,000 cars participated in this event that was so unique, Fox News highlighted it in a national news story.
- Montgomery Pool – a summertime tradition for many residents, made opening the pool a must for our community. The City Team instituted a reservation system to limit the number of guests to ensure a safe environment for all.
- Virtual Recreation, Rec To Go Kits, Chalk Your Walk Contest, Drive-In Movie Night, Virtual July 3rd BAMSO Concert, Top Dog Contest – the list goes on and on.

These programs and countless other operational changes were not an easy choice, but the only choice for our dedicated Montgomery employees. During these challenging times, bringing our residents together was more critical than ever to build the Montgomery Community – a community where residents care for one another and believe we are stronger together.

The next time you interact with any of these valued employees in the Police, Fire, or Public Works Departments, or within City Hall, I ask that you please thank them for their service to the City and building our community – one service or event at a time.

I wish you all well and look forward to the return of all community events in 2021.

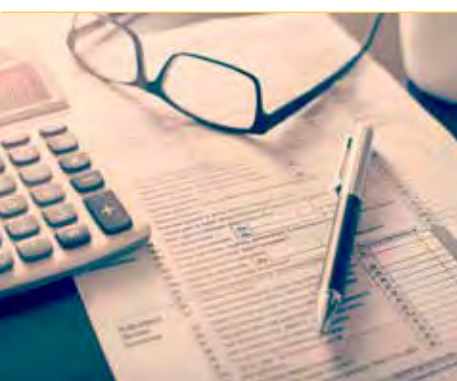

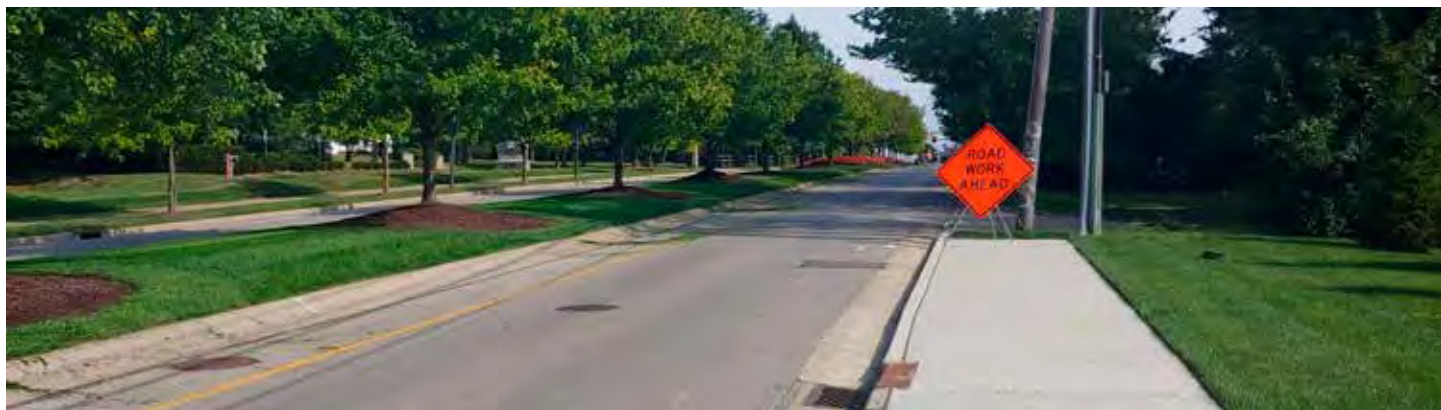


## MONTGOMERY ROAD SIDEWALK ADDITION UNDERWAY

The Montgomery Road Sidewalk, Phase 2 Project has been approved and awarded to WG Stang, LLC, and construction is underway. The project consists of a sidewalk addition to the east side of Montgomery Road from Radabaugh Drive south to the City's Safety Center, a distance of 1/2 mile. This new sidewalk will be an excellent addition to the pedestrian connectivity for residents and businesses on the east side of Montgomery Road, providing increased pedestrian accessibility up and down the Montgomery Road corridor. Construction of the

sidewalk is anticipated to be completed by mid- to late-November. Eighty percent (80%) of the construction cost of the sidewalk is being funded by a grant received from the Ohio-Kentucky-Indiana Council of Governments and the Ohio Department of Transportation.

## TEMPORARY SIGNS REGULATED FOR HEIGHT AND DISTANCE

Montgomery residents are reminded that the City has zoning regulations in place that govern the size and location for which temporary signs may be displayed on residential lots.

Temporary signs such as garage sale signs, political signs, and real estate signs are permitted individually up to four square feet in size and four feet in height. They must be located behind the sidewalk or 13' behind the curb if there is not a sidewalk.

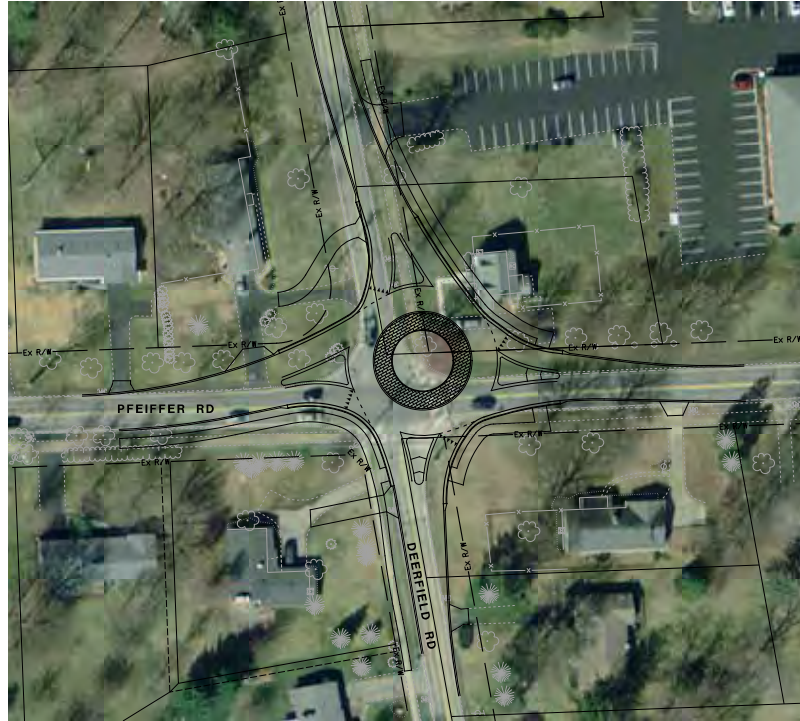


## CITY TO HOST OPEN HOUSE FOR THE PFEIFFER ROAD AND DEERFIELD ROAD ROUNDABOUT PROJECT

The City of Montgomery will host an open house on Tuesday, October 20, from 5:00 p.m. until 7:00 p.m. at Terwilliger Lodge in Dulle Park, located at 10530 Deerfield Road. The open house will provide an opportunity for residents to review and provide input on the replacement of a four-way stop with a single-lane modern roundabout at the intersection of Pfeiffer Road and Deerfield Road. The purpose of implementing a roundabout at this location is to improve traffic flow, air quality, and safety.

Attendees will have a chance to learn about the proposed roundabout, pedestrian accommodations, and other design considerations while also providing feedback to the City and the design consultant, Strand Associates. The City was successful in obtaining a Highway Safety Improvement Program grant for engineering and right-of-way acquisition and a Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality grant for construction through the Ohio-Kentucky-Indiana Council of Governments and the Ohio Department of Transportation. Construction of the project is scheduled for the summer of 2022.

## UNLIMITED YARD WASTE COLLECTION STARTS NOV. 2

Unlimited Yard Waste Collection will begin on Monday, Nov. 2, and will end on Dec. 18, 2020. Also, the City will provide collections during the first three Saturdays in January to coincide with the Christmas tree and wreath collection.

### Guidelines

- Place leaves in regular 30-gallon trash cans, paper leaf bags, or yard waste totes (available through Rumpke).
- 30-gallon yard waste cans/totes have a 75 lb weight limit. Once temperatures fall below freezing, all waste **must** go into bags as the moisture causes the cans/totes to freeze.
- Loosely place yard waste in trash cans or paper yard waste bags. Label yard waste totes as yard waste. Yard waste placed in unmarked totes will **NOT** be picked up.
- Place yard waste on the opposite side of the driveway from the trash and leave the lids off the cans. No plastic bags will be picked up.
- Bundle brush in 4-foot by 2-foot bundles fastened with cotton twine. The weight limit is 50 lb.
- Cut limbs into 4-foot lengths and no larger than 6 inches in diameter.
- Place all limbs in a can or a bundle. Limbs should not reach more than 1 foot above the height of the can.

If there is a schedule change, a CodeRed telephone message may be delivered.

*During unlimited collection, yard waste stickers are not required.*

## FIRE PREVENTION WEEK IS OCTOBER 4 – 10.

The observance of Fire Prevention Week will look very different this year due to the ongoing pandemic. While many of the normal events will be delayed until a later date, please consider the following safety points provided by the National Fire Prevention Association (NFPA).

### Cooking

- Cooking is the leading cause of home fires and home fire injuries. Thanksgiving is the leading day for fires involving cooking equipment.
- The leading cause of fires in the kitchen is unattended cooking.
- Stay in the kitchen when you are cooking.
- If you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly.
- Always keep a lid nearby when cooking. If a small grease fire starts, slide the lid over the pan and turn off the burner. Leave the pan covered until it's cool.
- Keep anything that can catch fire away from your stovetop.
- Loose clothing can hang down onto stove burners and catch fire. Wear short, close-fitting, or tightly rolled sleeves when cooking.
- Have a “kid-free zone” of at least 3 feet around the stove.



### Smoke Alarms

- Smoke alarms detect and alert people to early stages of a fire. Smoke alarms can mean the difference between life and death in a fire.
- Working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in a home fire by half.
- Install smoke alarms in every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of the home, including the basement.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month using the test button.
- Make sure everyone in the home understands the sound of the smoke alarm and knows how to respond.

### Home Fire Escape Planning and Practice

- Draw a map of each level of the home, showing all doors and windows.
- Go to each room and identify the two ways out.
- Make sure someone will help children, older adults, and people with disabilities wake up and get out.
- Teach children how to escape on their own in case you cannot help them.
- Establish a meeting place outside and away from the home where everyone can meet after exiting.
- Have properly installed and maintained smoke alarms.
- Use the smoke alarm test button to start a drill.
- Practice what to do in case there is smoke: Get low and go. Get out fast.
- Practice using different ways out and closing doors behind you as you leave.
- Never go back for people, pets, or things.
- Call 9-1-1 from a cell phone or a neighbor's phone.

### Heating

- Heating equipment is one of the leading causes of home fires during the winter months.
- Space heaters are the type of equipment most often involved in home heating equipment fires.
- All heaters need space. Keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet away from heating equipment.
- Have a 3-foot “kid-free zone” around open fires and space heaters.
- Purchase and use only portable space heaters listed by a qualified testing laboratory.
- Maintain heating equipment and chimneys by having them cleaned and inspected by a qualified professional at least once a year.

## MONTGOMERY POLICE OFFER HELPFUL HALLOWEEN REMINDERS

Halloween hasn't ghosted us yet. It's still on the calendar, and Halloween candy and costumes are hitting store shelves. But we are still in the middle of a pandemic, and so it shouldn't be a surprise that Halloween trick-or-treating will look different this year. As little ghosts and goblins make their annual visits to the front doors of neighbors and friends, the Montgomery Police offer some friendly safety tips to make for a fun and safe evening.

Currently, Halloween Trick or Treat is scheduled for October 31 from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m., rain or shine. This event is subject to change or cancellation depending on future orders from the State of Ohio or County Board of Health.

### Covid-19 Safety Tips:

- Wear a mask.
- Ditch the traditional communal Halloween candy bowl. Set up a decorated table and hand out individual bags or cups of prewrapped candy.
- Carry hand sanitizer and use in between houses.
- Keep groups small with close family and friends.
- Avoid big parties and indoor events.

### General Safety Tips:

- Welcome trick-or-treaters by turning on exterior lights.
- Remove objects from the yard that might present a safety hazard.
- Hide the canine friends who may want to welcome the visitors.
- Drive slowly - little creatures may suddenly cross the roadway unexpectedly.
- Contact the Montgomery Police Department at 513-985-1600 to report anything suspicious.

### Making Safe Costumes:

- Check that costumes are flame-retardant, so little ones are not in danger near candle-lit jack-o-lanterns and other fire hazards.
- Keep costumes short to prevent trips, falls, and other bumps in the night.
- The brighter, the better and consider reflective tape on the costumes.

### Preparing ghosts and goblins for their tricks and treats:

- Make sure older kids go out with friends, and parents should know their route. An adult should accompany younger children.
- Avoid unlit houses and remind children about not getting into a stranger's car.
- Carry flashlights if trick-or-treating after dark.

### Eating the Treats:

- Kids need to know not to eat their treats until they get home, and a parent checks over their candy.
- Check out all treats at home in a well-lit area.
- Eat ONLY unopened candies and other treats in original wrappers. Be cautious of fruit and homemade goodies. Inspect thoroughly.

Montgomery Police cruisers with lit overhead lights will be in the neighborhoods.

Participant safety and well-being are our top priorities. Staff have been working to make necessary modifications to classes and are implementing updated health and safety protocols.
