the effective date of HB 49 from January 21 until February 24, 2018. He learned just prior to the meeting that the

Judge has denied the preliminary injunction to continue the stay of HB 49. He stated that there are other municipalities that are prepared to file appeals. If any of these appeals are granted a stay, then that stay would be effective throughout the State. Since the City relies substantially on income tax revenues to support the General Fund, he stated that it is better to mitigate our risk by enacting the Ordinance to amend our City Income Tax Code. He stated that if any provision of HB 49 is found to be unconstitutional or is stayed or enjoined, then the enactment of these Code sections will similarly be stayed. In the event there is a long-term stay, the City can revisit and repeal the Ordinance after such date.

Pending Legislation

An Ordinance Dedicating Real Property on Montgomery Road at the Safety Center for Public Use

Mr. Margolis stated that this would be the second reading of this Ordinance and asked if there were any updates.

Mr. Donnellon replied there were none.

New Legislation

An Ordinance to Amend Appropriations for Current Expenses and Other Expenditures of The City of Montgomery, State of Ohio, During the Fiscal Year Ending December 31, 2018

Ms. Smiddy explained that, if approved, this Ordinance will amend the 2018 Annual Appropriation Ordinance to reflect changes in the initial budget requests as the result of an unforeseen grant received by the State of Ohio for police department training and for design services provided by Strand and Associates for various improvements as part of the reconstruction of the Ronald Reagan Highway and Montgomery Road Interchange. It is requested that the 2018 budget be amended in the amount of \$8,000 from the unappropriated Law Enforcement Assistance Fund to account 220.000.5300 Law Enforcement Assistance Fund-Training and \$735,632 from the unappropriated Downtown Improvement Fund to 480.000.5401 Downtown Improvement Fund-Special Projects.

Mr. Riblet reminded the Committee that a Resolution was passed in May of 2017 for the agreement with Strand Associates, however it was found later that the cost was not appropriated in the 2018 budget.

ADMINISTRATION REPORT

 Mr. Riblet, city manager, gave the following report:

• The Law and Safety and Financial Planning Committees will meet on Monday, March 5 at 3:30 and 4:30 p.m., respectively. The Planning, Zoning and Landmarks Committee has cancelled their meeting for the month of March.

The City Council Business Session is scheduled for March 7 at 7:00 p.m.

 • The Park and Recreation, Government Affairs and Public Works Committees have cancelled their meetings for the month of March.

 The Planning Commission met on Monday evening to consider proposed text amendments to the Land Usage Code regarding signs and telecommunications. The Planning Commission voted to recommend approval of the proposed text amendments to the sign code and tabled the proposed telecommunications amendments. Mr. Riblet stated that staff would like to request a public hearing on April 4, prior to the City Council Business Session at 6:00 p.m., to consider recommendations from the Planning Commission regarding medical marijuana, the Old Montgomery Gateway District regulations, fencing in the front yard and the sign code. Mr. Riblet also indicated that there are scheduled Volunteer Walk of Fame inductions that same evening during the Business Session and recommended the Business Session begin as normally scheduled at 7:00 p.m. to allow the inductees and their families time to arrive.

City Council agreed to holding the Public Hearing on April 4 to begin at 6:00 p.m.

As part of the public outreach for the round-about project, Staff has identified two potential dates in May
to host an open house at Terwilliger Lodge and would like to discuss the potential dates with City Council
for consideration. Those potential dates include Wednesday, May 16 or Thursday, May 17.

City Council agreed to holding the Open House on May 16.

- The Montgomery Fire Levy Committee held their first meeting during the evening of February 19. The committee of nine members worked on their organizational structure, confirmed the filing of their group with the Hamilton County Board of Elections, and created areas of responsibilities for the members. They began their fund-raising program this week and have scheduled meetings and activities through the beginning of May.
- The initial collective bargaining session between the City and the International Association of Fire Fighters (IAFF) was last Friday, February 16. Additional sessions are scheduled for March 14 and 15.
- The next Montgomery Citizens Leadership Academy (MCLA) session will be held at Public Works starting at 5:45 p.m. The public works team will discuss "Innovative Solutions to Parks, Recreation and Public Works" and the session will feature an adult touch-a-truck and an interactive, table-top exercise on snow plowing methods. The barbeque dinner will be prepared by the public works team as well.

LAW DIRECTOR REPORT

Mr. Donnellon reported to City Council that a Developers Meeting will be held this week on the Vintage Club North project and that staff feels there will be a positive outcome in which to bring an update to City Council at the March 7 meeting.

CITY COUNCIL REPORTS

Mr. Cappel reported that the Environmental Advisory Commission held their monthly cardboard recycling collection on Saturday, February 17. He reported that collections were good despite the wintery weather.

Mrs. Bissmeyer reported that she has scheduled a meeting with residents John and Marcy Molander to discuss the roundabout project and tear downs.

Mrs. Harbison reported that the Arts Commission held their monthly meeting at which time they held their election of officers. She stated that following members were elected to the following positions: Greg Leader as Chair, Barbara Lindsey as Vice Chair, and Andrews Stephens as Secretary.

Mrs. Harbison reported that the Government Affairs Committee met and discussed adding Active Shooter Training to the annual Boards and Commission Training. This training was set for Thursday, May 3. The addition of the active shooter training will be included and the training time will be extended to allow for the additional information.
