City Council convened in Council Chambers at 7:04 p.m. for the Business Session with Mayor Dobrozsi presiding.

### ROLL CALL

Mayor Dobrozsi asked for a motion to dispense with the roll call since everyone was in attendance.

Mr. Margolis moved to dispense with the roll call. Mr. Cappel seconded. City Council unanimously agreed.

Mayor Dobrozsi asked for a moment of silence in remembrance of the tragic shootings in Dayton, Ohio and El Paso, Texas.

### SPECIAL PRESENTATION

<u>Joel and Kathy Sorger</u>, 7830 <u>Hartford Hill Lane</u> were in attendance to accept a Certificate of Appreciation as the winners of the Beautification and Tree Commission's Spring Seasons of Beauty Winner.

City Council thanked the Sorger's for their hard work in not only making their own home beautiful but for helping the city to be a place of beauty as well.

<u>Carol Suer</u> was presented with a Certificate of Appreciation and gift in honor of her years of service on the Environmental Advisory Commission.

City Council thanked Mrs. Suer for her years of service as a volunteer and also a dear friend to the City.

# **GUESTS AND RESIDENTS**

Toni Lehmkuhl, 9853 Knollbrook Terrace-Mrs. Lehmkuhl explained to City Council that she was in attendance to discuss the property at 7900 Mitchell Farm Lane, a new home that has been in construction for almost two years. She explained that Ireland May Builders have owned the home for almost four years, two of which it sat vacant. She explained that they have poorly maintained the vacant home and have broken various codes during construction. She stated at two times, the City placed stop orders on the construction until such time it was brought into compliance. She explained that on July 30 there was a very heavy period of rainfall that fell within 30 minutes. She stated that two trucks of City employees arrived to clean up the flash flooding of silt that came from the site. She stated the silt made it impassible for some vehicles to navigate through. She stated she was concerned for the workers safety as there was heavy lightening strikes during this time. She stated that she felt the City Building Department needs to come up with a better way of dealing with builders who defy codes. She stated she felt that stiffer fines are needed as well as larger bonds requested with the submission of building permits. She stated that builders need to be held accountable. She thanked City Council for allowing her to speak.

Steve Silverman, 7504 Golf Green Drive-Mr. Silverman stated that he wanted to support Mrs. Lehmkuhl's comments regarding holding contractors accountable. He stated that there was a tear down located right behind his property and that the dirt is piled up 20 feet beyond the flag on the property. He stated that one of his neighbors stated to him that they would like to see neighbors notified before construction on a home begins.

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Mr. Silverman stated that as a Council candidate, he will campaign on a tree restoration program like the City of Atlanta, where contractors or homeowners are required to pay for specific tree installation.

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# An Ordinance Authorizing an Agreement Between the City of Montgomery And the Board of Hamilton County Commissioners Relative to The Improvement of Montgomery Road

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Mr. Cappel moved to read the Ordinance by title only. Mr. Margolis seconded. City Council unanimously agreed.

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Mr. Cappel read the title and moved for passage of the second reading. Mr. Margolis seconded.

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Mr. Cappel explained that information has been previously supplied on this Ordinance that, if approved, would authorize an agreement between the City of Montgomery and the Board of Hamilton County Commissioners for Municipal Road Funds (MRF) to the City of Montgomery in the amount of \$300,000 to assist with construction costs associated with repaying and storm water modifications to portions of Montgomery Road associated with the Roundabout Project.

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> Mayor Dobrozsi stated that for the following legislation related to the Montgomery Quarter Tax Increment Financing incentive districts, he would recuse himself due to past, present and future development relationships. He asked Vice Mayor Roesch to run the meeting sand removed himself from the dais during the discussion and voting process.

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Vice Mayor Roesch explained that items B, C, and D will be explained by Law Director Donnellon at one time and then voted on separately.

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Mr. Donnellon explained these three related pieces of legislation establish the Tax Incentive Financing Districts in The Montgomery Quarter from which we would collect the payments in lieu of taxes equivalent to what the real estate taxes would be. He stated that we are able to use the funds to develop the project and pay bonds which would be paid off over a period of time. He stated that the legislation as a whole authorizes the Tax Incentive Agreement with Sycamore Schools and the projections for the school compensation in all Phases looks to be \$20-25MM. He added that the County is entitled to compensation in the Incentive Districts and those two pieces of legislation authorize the City to accept the separate Compensation Agreement with the County. The negotiated Compensation Agreement with the County provides a one-time payment due 45 days after the legislation becomes effective, and as a result the County waives any compensation to which they may be entitled to receive by statute through either Incentive District. He explained that by approving these Ordinances approval is given to the City Manager to sign those agreements.

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He explained that the first piece of legislation creates The Montgomery Quarter Commercial District, which encompasses almost 16 acres. He stated that this district is the largest portion of the area and will include the commercial office buildings, retail/restaurants, and a small section of for rent apartments.

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Mr. Donnellon further explained that the second two pieces of legislation create two different Incentive Districts. Incentive Districts typically include residential properties and are authorized under a separate section of the Revised Code. These two Districts will encompass what has been defined as the For Sale residential properties, being two separate 24-unit buildings. He stated that this area is being divided into two separate Districts as there are two separate reimbursement rates to the schools based upon what is defined as Phase I and Phase II of the development. The first Incentive District is qualified as Phase I of the development and there is a compensation rate equal to 10% of the revenues generated plus a portion of the accumulated excess. The second District provides compensation to the schools at a flat 5% throughout the 30-year term.

He stated that Council has asked to consider waiving the second and third readings of these Ordinances so they will take effect 30 days after approval.

<u>Steve Silverman, 7504 Golf Green Drive</u>-Mr. Silverman asked Mr. Donnellon for clarification if Sycamore meant township or school district.

Mr. Donnellon replied that it is Sycamore School District who will be receiving the compensation and not the township. He explained that Sycamore Schools will receive \$25 million in lieu of the property taxes that typically would be collected under their levy structure. He explained that the City also obtained an agreement with the Schools that future levies will be taxed at their full rate on the value of the property as its improved and stated that our projections are based on current values.

Mr. Silverman stated that previously Mr. Donnellon had stated there were three projects on rolling averages of 30 years.

Mr. Donnellon explained that there are multiple sites that will be developed within the project but there are three different districts because of the statute and how we have to structure those districts. The \$25 million is encompassing all three of those districts over that period of time.

Mr. Silverman restated there are three districts for the \$25 million compensation.

Mr. Donnellon stated that collectively, he was correct.

Mr. Silverman asked what the districts were.

Mr. Donnellon stated that there is a commercial district and two incentive districts. The two incentive districts encompass the two condominium buildings. The commercial district encompasses everything else in the project.

Steve Silverman, 7504 Golf Green-Mr. Silverman stated that based on the description of the three districts with the first being commercial and Phase I and Phase II for condominium sales, he felt they do not correspond to the Developers description. He stated that Phase I included commercial, retail and townhouses, but did not include condominiums and that Phase II has not been scoped out yet.

Mr. Donnellon replied to Mr. Silverman that he is confusing the definitions and categories. He explained that Phase I and Phase II is terminology that was used strictly to determine the compensation structure to Sycamore Schools. He stated that Stage I and Stage II is terminology to determine the development timeline. He explained that Stage I includes much of the commercial area, apartment buildings and one of the condominium buildings. Stage II is the future placeholder that, may not start until several years down the road, and would include another group of office buildings and another condominium building. This is the targeted vision of Stage I and Stage II for the development.

Mr. Silverman stated that at the Planning Commission, where they approved the general development plan, there was no specification for condominiums, it was only apartments and townhouses and asked if that was correct.

Ms. Roblero explained that the Incentive District has different boundaries than the general development plan before the Planning Commission and she could provide him with those boundaries.

Steve Silverman, 7504 Golf Green Drive-Mr. Silverman asked Mr. Donnellon to clarify that if Sycamore Schools were to waive property taxes in lieu of compensation would that apply to future levies.

Mr. Donnellon stated that the School is agreeing to mills and what it generates today and will accept compensation from that millage. He stated that it is less compensation than they would receive if the project was built out, but we cannot move forward without them waiving the millage. He stated that if the millage grows due to future levies, the increased mills would be taxed on the full value of the improvements of the property and would not be deferred. He added that the City thought this was fair.

Mr. Silverman asked Mr. Donnellon to explain the relationship between the upcoming School levy and the compensation agreement.

Vice Mayor asked Mr. Silverman if he was asking Mr. Donnellon to talk about the School District levy financing is as opposed to the development.

Mr. Silverman stated that the levy in November, if passed, would increase the mills and asked if that would apply to this project.

Mr. Donnellon stated that it would apply to the future value of the project. He stated they will collect as long as the levy is in place without discount. He stated once the value was added to the tax duplicate for the increased improvements the School would collect taxes directly on that at the millage that is passed from this day forward.

# **NEW LEGISLATION**

A Resolution Authorizing an Assessment for The Cutting of Noxious Weeds and Removal of Debris/Trash

Mr. Margolis moved to read the Resolution by title only. Mr. Cappel seconded. City Council unanimously agreed.

Mr. Margolis explained that information has been previously supplied on this Resolution that, if approved, would authorize an assessment for the cutting of noxious weeds at 10304 Kerrianna Drive. He explained that due to neglect by the owner of the property, the City has been forced to cut the grass in order to bring the property into compliance with our property maintenance code. The property is located next to the hotel on the entrance ramp to Interstate 71 southbound, with the single-family dwelling facing Kerrianna Drive. Only the portion adjacent to the parking lot of the hotel was cut. Section 302.11 provides that all weeds and plant growth in excess of 6 inches shall be cut and destroyed within five (5) days after service of a notice of violation. If the owner fails to comply with the notice

City Council Business Session Minutes August 7, 2019 Page 6 within the time allotted, the City may begin minor nuisance abatement. After providing the required notices, staff contracted with Cutters Property Maintenance to have the grass cut. The property at 10304 Kerrianna Drive has been cut on two occasions. The total cost of the cutting was \$450.The City now desires to assess a lien upon the property for the cost incurred by the City to cut the noxious weeds, and an additional administrative fee of \$25. The adoption of this Resolution will allow for the assessment to be included in the upcoming property tax bills that will be mailed in January.	
Mrs. Bissmeyer asked why we placed a lien on the property for this cost without just invoicing the resident.	
Mr. Donnellon explained that it is a process provided by statute to ensure that the costs are paid.	
Ms. Roblero explained that the property owner has not maintained this portion of his property for two years. She stated that this type of assessment doesn't typically get cited to Mayors Court, but this has been an ongoing dispute with the resident. She stated that the resident is scheduled to appear in Mayors Court on Tuesday, August 13.

# A Resolution Establishing City Contributions to Employee Health Savings Account and Health Reimbursement Accounts

This Resolution also provides for Health Reimbursement Accounts for employees who, as a result of being enrolled in Medicare, are no longer eligible for a Health Savings Account. The City's contribution to employees' Health Savings Accounts is recommended to be continued at \$1050 for a family plan and \$750 for a single plan for the twelve-month period of September 1, 2019 through August 31, 2020. In addition to the base City incentive contribution, it is recommended that the City continue to match the employee's contribution to his/her Health Savings Account in an amount up to \$700 for employees with family plans and up to \$500 for employees with single plans. It is also recommended that Health Reimbursement Accounts be established for qualifying employees in amounts of \$1050 for a family plan and \$750 for a single plan for the twelve-month period of September 1, 2019 through August 31, 2020. Employees cannot make contributions to Health Reimbursement Accounts (HRA's); therefore, no matching employer contribution is recommended for HRA's.

- The Government Affairs Committee of Council will meet on Monday, August 12 at 4:30 p.m. The Parks and Recreation and Public Works Committees of Council have cancelled their meetings for the month of August.
- Chief Wright is attending the Fire Rescue International Conference in Atlanta, GA this week. He serves as
  the Ohio representative to the Great Lakes Division of the International Fire Chiefs Association, which will
  be meeting during the conference.
- Chief Wright shared with the Law and Safety Committee on Monday, August 5 that Mr. Harold Thomas has extended his generosity to the City once again, donating \$15,000 for the purchase of a Lucas 3 Chest Compression System. You will remember that Mr. Thomas donated the funds to purchase the new Braun Ambulance and is the benefactor of The Thomas Comprehensive Care Center at Bethesda North.
- Mr. Riblet stated that Mr. Vanderhorst has been working on several versions of new email signature lines. The new designs incorporate the new brand logo and colors as well as highlight the Top Workplace accreditation. He thanked Mr. Vanderhorst for creating several versions and narrowing feedback to produce a new, refreshed template that reflects our new look.
- Mr. Heitkamp has been notified that a portion of Remington Road located in Indian Hill will be closed for four weeks due to a GCWW water main project. Once he receives the final information we'll begin sharing on social media, etc.
- Fred A. Nemann Company is complete with the sidewalk project on Kennedy Lane with the exception of a new home currently under construction. They will return within the next month or two to complete this segment of the sidewalk once the house is complete.
- Rack & Ballauer is continuing construction of the 2019 Resurfacing Program. They have been replacing curb and rebuilding catch basins on Cooper Road this week and are scheduled to begin milling and asphalt resurfacing work in The Winds subdivision next week.
- Ford Development will begin construction of the Montgomery Road watermain replacement project on Monday, August 12. This work was originally scheduled to take place in June/July; however, materials became unavailable after GCWW had a contract issue with the supplier. Work will begin at the south end of the project adjacent to Hartfield Place and is expected to take 3-4 weeks.
- Mr. Riblet signed a contract with KZF Design for the master planning and concept designs for Hopewell Cemetery in the amount of \$18,000. He stated that staff are excited to begin the process of long-term planning for the cemetery and feel that KZF will do a great job in capturing our vision for the cemetery.

- Staff recently received word from our workers' compensation third party administrator, CompManagement, that the City will be receiving a \$119,396.78 premium rebate sometime in October. This rebate represents approximately 88% of our annual premium of \$150,000 and is the result of the Bureau of Workers' Compensation "Billion Dollar Back" program designed to rebate premium dollars to many Ohio employers.
- Mr. Riblet stated it is anticipated that the second round of patrol officer interviews will be concluded by mid-August. As part of the patrol officer hiring process, extensive background investigations will be conducted prior to any conditional offers of employment. There are currently two open positions to fill.
- The Healthcare Benefits Committee has met several times to review proposals from various insurance carriers and will be presenting its recommendations to City Council at the August 21 Work Session. Due to our group's experience over the past 12 months, we are anticipating a rate increase for group medical insurance. We have not experienced an increase for group medical insurance since the 2016 plan year. (In 2014 and 2015 we renewed with a decrease in rates for group medical insurance.)
- In anticipation of the Smokin' Irish barbecue Mr. Donnellon has indicated that either 10/11 or 10/18 would be good dates for him. Would Council like to check their schedules to see what date works for you. This year the event would be held at Public Works as Terwilliger Lodge was already booked. The date of October 18 was selected as the date to hold the annual barbecue sponsored by Mr. Donnellon.
- Thanks to our partnership with the Montgomery Farmers' Market, the Montgomery Quarter Roundabout Communications Team, consisting of Faith Lynch, Tracy Roblero and Mike Rogers, will be demonstrating the use of the roundabout this Saturday morning at the Farmers' Market with the re-appearance of the Roundabout Races, which debuted at Bastille Day, and also appeared at the Touch A Truck Event.
- Mr. Riblet state that he was pleased to announce that Jane Hohn has been selected as Citizen of the Year by the Rotary Club of Northeast Cincinnati. A ceremony and dinner to honor Jane and other award winners will be held on Thursday, October 17 at the Cooper Creek Event Center in Blue Ash. He reminded Council and staff that Mrs. Harbison was a past Citizen of the Year recipient in 2016. He added that if anyone was interested in attending, to please let Ms. Gaylor know.
- Mr. Riblet extended birthday wishes to Mrs. Harbison, Ms. Roesch and Mr. Heitkamp whom all celebrate their birthdays in the month of August.
