

SURVEY SHOWS WIDE CITIZEN SATISFACTION WITH CITY

A comprehensive survey of Montgomery households conducted by the Institute for Policy Research of the University of Cincinnati has revealed that a vast majority of residents are satisfied with their quality of life in the City of Montgomery. Nearly 1,000 households responded to the survey.

The survey, conducted earlier this spring, revealed that an overall 97% of residents are either "very satisfied" or "satisfied" with the quality of life in the community.

When asked to rank the importance of City services, safety services topped the list, with 88% of the respondents listing Fire and EMS highest on their "extremely important" list. Police protection was close behind at 79%.

In all categories, a majority of residents gave "very satisfied" or "satisfied" ratings to every City service. Services such as trash collection and recycling, snow and ice removal, Police, Fire and EMS, street maintenance, and beautification were rated at 90% or higher. Services such as recreation, yard waste collection, brush collection, and property maintenance enforcement were close behind.

The survey also found that key communications tools such as the Montgomery Bulletin continue to be useful but recorded growing familiarity and use with the Montgomery website.

Results from the survey will be the basis of strategic planning efforts in 2021. Additionally, the City will report back periodically through this newsletter and the website on service enhancements and new projects resulting from citizen input and suggestions in the comprehensive survey effort.

TECHNOLOGY AND TAXES

2020 was a productive filing year for the Tax Office. Staff utilized a secure email portal which was used by more than 500 taxpayers to submit tax information guickly and securely. In February of 2021, staff implemented Authority Tax Connect, an E-File and E-Pay service enabling taxpayers a convenient and secure way to file and pay their city taxes online. Approximately 600 taxpayers utilized the Authority Tax Connect application to remit their annual return.

THE ROUNDABOUT IS ALMOST HERE, WHAT PEDESTRIANS NEED TO KNOW

While much of the focus is on the rules of the road for driving in the new roundabout at Montgomery Road and Ronald Reagan Cross County Highway, there are a few things pedestrians should know once the project is complete.

Pedestrians will be able to walk north and south along Montgomery Road on the east side of



the roundabout. There will not be a sidewalk through the roundabout area on the west side of Montgomery Road. If you are beginning your walk from the west side of Montgomery Road, you will need to proceed either north or south to the closest traffic signal and cross Montgomery Road to the east side at the signalized intersection. On the north side, this will be at the new traffic signal being installed at the Montgomery Road/Main Street "split", and on the south side this would be at the traffic signal at Kennedy Lane. There will only be one crosswalk adjacent to the roundabout, which will be located across the east leg of the roundabout intersection which is the future road into the Montgomery Quarter development.

Roundabout construction is expected to be completed next month.

MONTGOMERY POLICE ADD E-BIKE FOR THE BIKE PATROL



This year the Montgomery Police Department added the latest tool in bike patrol technology with the addition of an E-Bike or electric bike. All bike patrol officers are specially trained through a rigorous International Police Mountain Bike Association (IPMBA) training which focuses on police officer usage of bicycles to assist with various patrol responsibilities.

An electric bike still uses the officer's pedal power; however, each push of the pedal gets a power assist from the bike. The new Trek bike has 4 different power levels and still has the standard gear shifts like regular bikes. Depending on the power level used, the E-Bike can last an entire patrol shift and beyond on a single charge. Montgomery's hills are easily traversed on the E-Bike which greatly increases the patrol potential. The E-Bike can reach speeds between 25-30 MPH.

Our Bike Patrol gives officers the opportunity to be much more approachable and interactive with residents, children, and business owners. Bikes can go where cars cannot so you will see officers on bikes within our many parks. You

may see officers on bikes during the nighttime hours as well as they offer an excellent covert opportunity to target problem crime areas such as thefts from vehicles within our neighborhoods. Often criminals look out for the marked police cars in the area but are caught off guard when an officer on a bicycle rolls up on them. Bike Patrol officers still respond to normal calls for service and are never far from their patrol cruiser.

So, look out for our officers out there and feel free to stop them for a friendly chat. Word on the street is they like patrolling the neighborhoods that have ice cold lemonade stands!

MONTGOMERY FIRE DEPARTMENT OFFERING FIRST AID/CPR CLASSES

The Montgomery Fire Department offers quarterly American Heart Association HeartSaver First Aid/CPR certification classes. The next class is scheduled for July 10 from 10:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m. There is a nominal fee of \$30 - CPR only, \$35 - CPR/ First Aid to cover the cost of materials. CPR: a Lifelong Skill

CPR, (cardio-pulmonary resuscitation) is an important skill that everyone should learn. You do not need to be a medical professional to know or use CPR. The Montgomery Fire Department offers quarterly classes to teach the lifesaving skill.



You never know when you may need this skill to save someone you love or to be a hero to a stranger.

Knowing CPR empowers by standers to help someone in a life-threatening situation. For parents, this skill comes into play with children younger than five who tend to put small objects in their mouths, which can lead to choking. Choking is a leading cause of death in this age group and knowing what to do and how to perform CPR allows you to act quickly.

Also, situations may arise when someone's breathing, or heart has stopped. In the summer, working in the heat increases the chances of this happening. It is the same in the winter when the body is stressed doing strenuous activities like shoveling snow. Immediate action with CPR is the most effective way to save that individual, as an ambulance may not arrive for several minutes. Providing CPR could mean the difference between life and death for someone who is unconscious.

First Aid Classes: Responding with Care and Knowledge

The City of Montgomery Fire Department offers basic First Aid training, and encourages babysitters, parents, coaches, and all adults to consider first aid certification. First aid training provides tools to ease suffering, prevent further injury, and prolong life. It can be as simple as easing the pain of a bee sting to calming someone who is having trouble breathing.

First Aid classes prepare people to respond and prioritize care in smart, effective, and safe ways that can really make a significant difference to an injured or sick person.

The City of Montgomery Fire Department is certified to teach both important courses using the standards and criteria of the American Heart Association.



SAFELY CONTROLLING INSECTS - BY EAC CHAIR MARK LASKOVICS

Now that we are in the middle of Cicada-Summer 2021 we need to be aware of how to properly control pests. Whenever using or having insecticides applied, please remember that most of these chemicals act as neurotoxins to both insects and other animals. The use of pesticides should be limited and well controlled to protect both beneficial insects and other animals in and around your yard. Here are some key points to control insects:

- Employ good pest prevention practices by limiting or removing sources of food, water and shelter for insects.
- Attract birds and other beneficial insects to your yard. These will naturally keep insect pests in check and be entertaining to watch.1
- When applying pesticides, do very localized application by using traps or spraying locally around foundations.² Fogging should only be used in an enclosed environment where the pesticide is well controlled and exposure to humans or pets is avoided for the recommended amount of time for the fog to settle and penetrate.
- For yard-wide infestation of grubs, consider natural treatments such as Milky Spore or beneficial nematode treatments.3 These natural treatments are much safer than pesticides and effectively control grubs.
- Plants that repel insects there are several plants that repel insects, including mosquitos.4 These should be

considered in place of wide-spread pesticide use... and they brighten up your yard as well! As far as repellants go, it is always better to use a localized repellant rather than widespread application of insecticides.

Please remember, over use of insecticides is hazardous to our environment and to those around us. Over-spraying and fogging destroy beneficial insects, weakens our natural habitat, and is an annoyance to our neighbors. A little forethought, creativity, experimentation and tolerance can go a long way to protecting our environment and preserving the harmony of nature.

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE STANDARDS PROTECT PUBLIC WELFARE AND PROPERTY VALUES

For the protection of public health, safety, and general welfare of citizens, local governments use zoning and property maintenance regulations to help manage real estate in their jurisdictions. The City of Montgomery has established and enforces a property maintenance code to promote and protect the public health, safety, convenience, comfort, prosperity, and general welfare of the community. The code also serves to protect and promote property values within the City. Nearly every city has adopted a property maintenance code and property owners expect a city to protect the value of their property from the negative consequences of surrounding development. In Montgomery, property owners maintain their land to high standards, which has increased property values and improved the quality of life in the community. Montgomery officials are committed to continually work to maintain this standard through enforcement of City codes. Some of the more visible regulations include:

- Home repair and maintenance standards
- Maintenance standards for accessory buildings and structures
- Driveway and sidewalk maintenance for public safety
- Length of grass and landscaping requirements
- Maintenance standards for exterior open spaces

Overall, local government plays an important role in protecting the value of each home and maintaining the overall appearance of Montgomery as a community. WATER SAFETY TIPS

What do surfing, fishing, water skiing, and swimming have in common? They are all lots of fun... and they all take place in, on, or around the water! Water activities are a great way to stay cool and have a good time with your friends or your family. Take along these tips — and your common sense — to get wet, make waves, and have a blast!

Top Ten Tips

- DO learn to swim. If you enjoy water activities, being a strong swimmer is a must.
- DO take a friend along. Even though you may be a good swimmer, you never know when you may need help. Having friends around is safer and more fun!
- DO know your limits. Watch out for the "too's" too tired, too cold, too far from safety, too much sun, or too much hard activity.
- DO swim in supervised areas only and follow all signs and warnings.
- DO wear a life jacket when boating, jet skiing, water skiing, rafting, or fishing.
- DO stay alert to currents. They can change quickly! If you get caught in a strong current, do not fight it. Swim parallel to the shore until you have passed through it. Near piers, jetties (lines of big rocks), small dams, and docks, the current gets unpredictable and could knock you around. If you find it hard to move around, head to shore. Learn to recognize and watch for dangerous waves and signs of rip currents — water that is a weird color, really choppy, foamy, or filled with debris.
- DO keep an eye on the weather. If you spot bad weather (dark clouds, lightning), pack up and take the fun inside.
- DON'T mess around in the water. Pushing or dunking your friends can get easily out of hand.
- DON'T dive into shallow water. If you don't know how deep the water is, don't dive.
- DON'T float where you can't swim. Keep checking to see if the water is too deep, or if you are too far away from the shore or the poolside.


