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KROGER GETS A FACELIFT

Have you been wondering what is going on at the Kroger on Montgomery Road? Kroger is upgrading the façade of the building to include a new entry and vestibule, as well as a refresh of the materials. The interior of the building will also be upgraded with more self-checkout lanes, additional space for Kroger Click-List, and an overall refresh of



the interior. The project is expected to be completed by Winter 2022. The changes are designed to provide a welcoming experience to meet the needs of their customers today and for years to come.

DID YOU KNOW?

The Montgomery Square Shopping Center first opened in 1966. The shopping center was part of the 141 acre Montgomery Heights community plan, which included 256 residential lots, three acres of business along Montgomery Road and Montgomery Park. The original tenants of the shopping center included Kroger, Spreen's Pharmacy, The Beehive Card Shop, One-Hour Martinizing, Montgomery Square Barbershop, and Perkins Bakery. The shopping center was expanded in 1968, 1974, and 1983 and is now four times larger than the original plan. Many things have changed since this picture was taken in 1974; however, the Montgomery Square Shopping Center has remained a constant on Montgomery Road and is still anchored by Kroger. UNLIMITED YARD WASTE CONTINUES, AND HOLIDAY GREENERY PICK-UP BEGINS

The weekly unlimited yard waste pick-up continues through December 24. A special holiday greenery and unlimited yard waste pick-up will take place on the following three Saturdays:

- Saturday, January 8
- Saturday, January 15
- Saturday, January 22

Place Christmas trees, wreaths, and swags at the curb along with yard waste on Friday evening before the Saturday pick-up. Residents will not be required to use yard waste stickers.

Each item must be completely free of all plastic, flocking, tinsel and decorations. All yard waste must be placed in paper bags in the event of freezing temperatures.

As a reminder, regular yard waste collection will resume the first week in March.



COUNCIL MESSAGE

MONTGOMERY UNDERGROUND **BY MIKE CAPPEL**

Ready for Montgomery Underground? It is and will remain an important part of our community. But it's not the latest restaurant to be announced in the Quarter. It's not even as exciting as a clandestine group of citizens ready to step up when a crisis hits our city. In fact, for most of us, it's so boring, we ignore it, except when it fails. Yet Montgomery Underground is necessary for us to have a healthy and orderly society.

Beneath our streets, sidewalks, yards, and sometimes our houses lie a matrix of laterals, tanks, pipes, mains, tubes, wires, sensors, meters, and cables. These connections provide us with potable water, gas, electricity, phone, TV, internet, alarm systems, traffic control, and even treat and remove our waste. This network is one of the true treasures of our community, even though much of it isn't owned by the City of Montgomery.

Property owners own their lines from their building to the connection in the right of way and are generally responsible for maintaining the private service lines. Two municipal water systems serve Montgomery: Cincinnati and Indian Hill.

Sewer service is provided by the Metropolitan Sewer District of Greater Cincinnati through a mixture of combined and sanitary sewers. At the same time, a few residents and businesses may still have septic tanks, grease interceptors, or other private treatment systems. The City of Montgomery provides storm sewers to remove stormwater from public properties and conveys stormwater to Waters of the State. Duke Energy brings gas and electricity from producers we choose to our homes, and for those with solar panels buys electric back. A host of competing companies provide phone, internet, alarm, and TV services. Some intersections also have traffic sensors buried in the drive to help control traffic lights when a car arrives.

Montgomery recently embarked on a program to upgrade the storm sewers in our community by replacing and relining some pipes, upgrading storm inlets during street repaving, and partnering with residents to upgrade storm sewers in certain areas. And Montgomery continues to upgrade fire hydrants during street repaving as well. During the Montgomery Strategic Planning process, there was significant discussion on ensuring that Montgomery Underground continues to meet the needs of our growing community.

CITY PARTNERS WITH ATTORNEY GENERAL'S OFFICE FOR DEBT COLLECTION

Beginning in January, the City of Montgomery will be partnering with the Ohio Attorney General Collections Enforcement Office (AGO). At no cost to the City, the AGO will provide collection services for past-due taxes, penalties, and fines, which have become difficult to collect efficiently.

The Attorney General's Office has the authority, by law, to collect debt owed to the State of Ohio for state agencies, institutions, public universities, hospitals, and local government entities. If necessary, the AGO may withhold Federal and State tax refunds to settle debts.

When a balance due to the City becomes delinquent by 45 days or more, the account may be certified to the Attorney General's Office for collection. Once certified, collection costs and interest are automatically imposed by law and will be charged to the debtor. Once delinquent accounts have been certified to the Collections Enforcement Office, all responses, inquiries, and payments should be directed to the Ohio Attorney General Enforcement Office. The City cannot respond to inquiries from individual taxpayers regarding collection efforts.

HOLIDAY SAFETY TIPS

The holiday season is here, and many residents will be traveling to celebrate with friends and family. Others will also be shopping and hosting family gatherings. The Montgomery Police Department would like to remind all residents that while you are busy shopping and wrapping gifts, grinches are trying to steal your holiday joy. Help keep criminals at bay during the holidays by following these safety tips:

- Make sure all windows and doors are locked, including your vehicle.
- Keep valuables and presents out of sight from prying eyes.
- Use lockboxes to receive packages or have them shipped to secure lockers.
- Mail cards with gifts or checks at the US Post Office.
- Make sure all entrances to your home are well lit.
- Use caution when there is a stranger at your door, and don't allow them in your home if you have any suspicions.
- Investigate any charity before donating.
- Ask a neighbor to watch your house and pick up mail and newspapers or stop them from being delivered while gone.
- Contact the Montgomery Police Department and ask to have your residence placed on the 'Vacation Check' list.
- Use timers for lights, stereos, and televisions.
- Be careful when setting out trash not to advertise new expensive toys. Break down boxes and place them in bags or trash cans.
- Take photos of new items you may receive, and document the makes, models, and serial numbers.

If you see anything suspicious, please report it immediately to the Montgomery Police Department so that we can investigate the matter before a crime occurs. Please stay safe, and we wish you all a safe holiday season.

It's fun to decorate for the winter holidays, but holiday decorations can increase your risk for a home fire. As you deck the halls this season, be fire smart.

HOLIDAY FIRE SAFETY TIPS:

Did you know this holiday fire safety statistic? Per the American Red Cross, holiday fires cause approximately \$554 million in damages and injure 2,200 people every year.

You can help to keep your family safe and avoid holiday fire damage if you follow these **10-holiday fire safety tips**:

- 1. Install smoke and carbon monoxide detectors; change the batteries every year.
- 2. Get fireplaces inspected before using and use a fireplace screen.
- **3.** Never burn wrapping paper, boxes, or other trash in your fireplace.
- 4. Don't leave a fire unattended; put the fire out before going to bed.
- 5. Candles are beautiful, but make sure they are in stable and secure holders and keep them away from combustible materials and small children. Never leave candles unattended.
- 6. If you have a real Christmas tree, put it in a stable stand and water daily. A dried tree is more susceptible to fire. Keep the tree away from heat sources that could dry it out. Most trees dry out after just two weeks, so don't leave your tree up long past the holidays.
- 7. Check holiday lights for cracked or broken bulbs, frayed wires, and loose plugs. Don't use lights that aren't safe.
- 8. Use lights approved by testing labs like Underwriters Laboratory (UL) or Factory Mutual (FM).
- 9. Use lights only in their designated areas; never use "indoor only" lights outdoors.
- **10.** If your smoke, fire, or carbon monoxide detectors go off, get everyone outside and call 911. Don't try to solve the problem yourself.

Following these holiday fire safety tips will help to ensure that you enjoy a safer holiday season.

The exterior of this traditional home was recently updated with neutral tones and accented with black flower boxes. The homeowner installed a drip irrigation system through each box so that the summer plantings of deep pink Impatiens and both purple and green sweet potato vines would last long into the fall. The flower beds were meticulously manicured with both mulch and stone and highlighted by a feature row of Quick Fire Hydrangea whose blooms turned a deep rosy pink in the fall and leaves that turned gold and burgundy.

The home was also a show-stopper during Halloween. The front yard featured a ghost, zombie, skeletal dogs, spider and spider web, hand-carved pumpkins, and a 20-foot tall Grim Reaper encased in fog. Eerie lighting and music also greeted the many Halloween visitors.
