GUESTS AND RESIDENTS

Dr. Sandy Osher, 10430 Grandoaks Lane- Dr. Osher stated he has lived in the city for 25 years. He read a letter that was addressed to City Council regarding front yard trapping of animals being done by neighbors in the daylight hours. He explained that he also has seen and heard injured animals who have been struck with pellet or "BB" guns and it is very upsetting to see. He asked City Council to consider an Ordinance banning front yard trapping, use of arrows and BBs to catch or kill animals.

An Ordinance Accepting Dedicated Streets Within The City

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Mr. Dobrozsi moved to read the Ordinance by title only. Mr. Messer seconded. City Council unanimously agreed.

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Mr. Dobrozsi read the title and moved for passage of the first reading of the Ordinance. Mrs. Naiman seconded.

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Mr. Dobrozsi explained that information has been previously supplied on this legislation that, if approved, would formally accept various streets within the City of Montgomery which have been dedicated for public use but had never been properly accepted. Several years ago, the City updated the Hamilton County records to reflect various streets within the City which had been dedicated on the various subdivision plats. However, the Developer had not followed through to have the streets accepted after construction was complete. This legislation will provide Hamilton County with the authorization to update the necessary parcels on the county plats as public improvements.

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ADMINISTRATION REPORT

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Mr. Riblet reported the following items:

• City Council Work Session is scheduled for Wednesday, September 21 at 7:00 p.m.

• As a reminder, the Parks and Recreation and Public Works Committees are scheduled to meet on Monday, September 12 at 3:30 and 5:30 respectively.

• The pool season ended on Labor Day. There were 25,488 check ins at the pool this season which is 677 more as compared to 2021. 816 pool memberships were sold this season which is 97 more as compared to 2019 and a whopping 149 more as compared to 2021.

• This week, Matthew Vanderhorst is attending the National Association of Government Web Professionals (NAGW) Conference, of which Matthew serves as a Board Member, in Little Rock, AR. The information presented provides insight into some of the best work in government.

• On Friday, September 9, it is anticipated that Congressman Steve Chabot will visit the Police Department. A few months ago, staff submitted a Congressionally Directed Spending grant application in which his office supported. The Funding Bill has currently passed the House, is anticipated to be passed by the Senate and then signed by the President.

• Mr. Riblet pointed out the Annual Comprehensive Financial Report for 2021 were placed at the Council Members desks.

• Mr. Riblet reported that he signed two separate contracts with JK Meurer, Inc.

o The annual curb replacement program in an amount of \$48,000 and includes work in Terwilligers Run, The Winds and on Knollbrook Terrace.

o The annual sidewalk replacement program in an amount of \$18,750 and includes several sites in the N/E and S/W portions of the city.

Hiring Updates

 Patrol Officer – Conditional job offers have been extended to three candidates who are now completing post offer screening steps – background check, polygraph exam, psychological evaluation, physical exam and drug screen.

• Police Sergeant – The Civil Service Commission will meet September 12 to certify the eligible list for the Police Sergeant position classification.

• Finance Director – Advertising for this position started this week.

• Firefighter/Paramedic – the written exam and agility test portions of the Civil Service testing process will be conducted on September 12. Eight candidates have signed up for the testing. There are five new firefighter/paramedic positions to be filled.

• The Diversity and Inclusion Commission is hosting a "Know Your Neighbor" community education presentation on Thursday, September 8 at 6:00 p.m. at Terwilliger Lodge. Priya Viswalingam will talk about Indian culture and Hinduism. She will cover topics such as culture, demographics, values,

languages, art, and food. Over 40 are registered to attend and registration is still open on the city's website for anyone who wishes to attend.

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• As a reminder the 2023 Budget Review meeting is scheduled for Thursday, September 15 at 5:30 p.m. The 2023 – 2027 Operating and Capital Budget Books, along with the transmittal letter will be in your mailbox here at City Hall by the end of business on Friday. A tremendous amount of work was done by our department heads in working with their staffs to put together their requests. Thanks to the Finance staff for the significant work, they have done and special thanks to Chris Bigham for coming in near the end of our process and working to put the final touches on the budget.
