

STREET RESURFACING PROGRAM BEGINS THIS SPRING

The City awarded the 2022 street resurfacing program to JK Meurer Corporation. This year's program includes 2.73 centerline miles of public roadway. The following streets will be completed:

- Shadowhill Way (Creeknoll Ct to Windhaven Ct)
- Deershadow Lane
- · Laurelview Drive
- Cedarview Drive
- Weller Road (#8699 to E. Kemper Rd)
- Kennedy Lane (#7370 to terminus)
- Zig Zag Road (Cooper Rd to Windzag Ln)

The work includes complete milling and asphalt resurfacing, along with "spot" curb replacement and storm drainage inlet repairs.

Construction is expected to begin in April or May and completed by mid-summer.

Arbor Day Foundation 50th Anniversary

Arbor Day, the nation's tree planting holiday, was first celebrated in 1872. The Arbor Day Foundation was created 100 years later in 1972 to carry out its mission year-round. The most common date for the state observance is the last Friday in April - National Arbor Day - but several state Arbor Days are at other times to coincide with the best tree-planting weather, from January and February in the south to May in the far north.

COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH DISCUSSION BEGINS MAY 12

In November of 2021, residents were asked to participate in a mental health awareness survey conducted through the City website. Feedback received from this survey conveyed an overwhelming response that mental health is very important to our residents. Some of the topics of interest from those who completed the survey include:

- Depression
- Anxiety
- · Youth depression and anxiety
- Supporting loved ones
- Suicide prevention
- · Where and how to get help
- Stress
- Substance abuse/ addiction

- Alternative treatment
- How first responders handle mental health incidents
- ADHD
- PTSD
- Dementia
- Cognitive/Brain health
- Executive Function Disorder

Based on this information, the City has planned community sessions to bring awareness to mental health issues and to destigmatize having conversations about them.

The first community session will be held on Thursday, May 12 at Terwilliger Lodge at 7:00 p.m. It will feature Julia Saldanha, Director of Programs of the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) of Southwest Ohio.

This first session will bring awareness of mental illness by identifying signs and symptoms of an illness. Hear a personal story and message of hope from a NAMI participant and receive resources for support and treatment.

Julia Saldanha is in her fourth year as Director of Programs at NAMI Southwest Ohio. Mental health challenges have touched Julia closely in her personal and professional life. IMPORTANT TAX INFORMATION

As many individuals have been navigating the new world of remote work, some changes to your local withholding may be necessary.

Ohio's municipal income tax is withheld from employee paychecks and paid to the municipality where the employee's principal place of work is located. The employee's principal place of work is ordinarily in the municipality where the employer is located; however, since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, employees have increasingly spent time working from remote locations- and it appears that this trend will continue in some way for the foreseeable future.

If you will be working remotely, please ask your payroll administrator to begin withholding Montgomery City tax from your wages. Tax Office staff members are available to assist your employer with setting up an active tax account for withholding liabilities.

Before filing 2021 Montgomery returns, please note these reminders:

- The filing due date is Monday, April 18. A federal extension will extend the Montgomery filing date to October 15.
- E-file and E-pay services are available on our website at www.montgomeryohio.gov, along with tax forms and complete instructions. The Tax Office offers free assistance with preparing City returns. To take advantage of this service, please bring a copy of your federal return and all W-2 forms to City Hall.
- Taxpayers are required, by law, to submit copies of all W-2 forms, pages 1 and 2 of the Federal 1040 form and Federal Schedule 1 (if applicable). Any applicable Federal Schedules C, E, F, and Form 4797 must also be submitted.

MONTGOMERY POLICE SGT. MIKE PLAATJE RETIRES

Sgt. Mike Plaatje has been a Montgomery Police Officer for 33 years. He will put on his Montgomery uniform and gun belt for the last time in April before starting his retirement.

"It's a bittersweet day. I look back fondly on the friends I've made. I'd like to thank the Montgomery Community for their constant support," said Plaatje. "It's been refreshing to get friendly waves from citizens while on patrol. Montgomery City Council and especially the late Gerri Harbison have always been supportive of the Police Department."

Plaatje is also a Montgomery resident.

"I fell in love with Montgomery soon after I began working here." Plaatie said. "The first opportunity I had, my wife Marilyn and I bought a house in Montgomery with plans to raise our family here."

A lot has changed since Plaatje's first day on the job in April 1989. The Police Department operated out of the current City Hall, sharing the building with the City administration.

"We carried .357 magnum six-shooter handguns and 12-gauge shotguns in our Chevy Caprice cruisers. Cell phones didn't exist, and the internet hadn't been born yet," said Plaatje. "There were no center landscaped medians along Montgomery Road. New businesses have since replaced the Elm Cris Motel, a vacant drive-in, Perkins, Pizza Hut, and Frisch's."

While businesses have changed, Plaatje says a few things remain constant, including the family atmosphere among staff and the support of City Council.

"I'd like to thank my brothers and sisters within the police and fire departments, both past and present. Not many outsiders truly understand the first responder's internal and external challenges," said Plaatje. "The family atmosphere and unwavering support of each other have

> made this journey a pleasure. I started as the new guy with badge #29, and now I'm the old guy as we are going on to badge #63. As I pass the torch to a new generation of police officers, I am confident that we as residents and the City as a whole are in good hands. The standard of excellence has been set by past administrations and will continue under this administration."



CONSIDER SOLAR ENERGY

Now is the time to invest in Solar! Solar technology continues to improve, and installation costs are declining. Prices have fallen 11% over the last five years.[1]

Why go solar?

- Put the poison help number, 1-800-222-1222, near every home telephone and save it on your cell phone. The line is open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.
- Store all medicines and household products up and away and out of sight where a child cannot reach them.
- When you are taking or giving medicines or are using household products:
 - Do not put your next dose on the counter or table where children can reach them.
 - · Secure the child safety cap completely every time you use a medicine.

• Do not leave medicines or household products out. As soon as you are done with them, put them away.

Be aware of any drugs that guests may bring into your home. Ask guests to store drugs where children cannot find them.

Call 911 if you have a poison emergency and the victim has collapsed or is not breathing. If the victim is awake and alert, dial 1-800-222-1222.

CURBSIDE BRUSH PICK-UP BEGINS


The Montgomery Public Works Department will provide a curbside bulk brush collection over five weeks beginning April 4. The regular trash collection schedule determines each pick-up week.


