Flowers will be provided to plant throughout the city in the morning from 9-11 am.

Each Saturday, the Montgomery Farmer's Market in the parking lot of Montgomery Elementary is kicking off its season on May 7. In addition to the expected vegetables, you can expect delicious pastries, artisan cheeses, and coffees.

Also, on May 7, Soirée en Blanc will take place in Pioneer Park. The city will provide the tables and chairs with white linens as well as live entertainment and a glass of bubbly. You come dressed in white with your dinner and table settings. It will be a refined social event in the tradition of Diner en Blanc, honoring our relationship with Neuilly-Plaisance, France. We will again have the BAMSO concert on July 3, followed by the patriotic parade and festival in Montgomery Park on July 4. If you have not been to one of our BAMSO concerts. 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# ANNUAL MONTGOMERY PHOTO CONTEST WINNERS



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# BETHESDA NORTH HOSPITAL **8TH FLOOR APPROVED**

The Planning Commission approved a Final Development Site Plan to construct an additional story onto the 300 Tower of the main hospital. The approximate 33,000 square foot floor will provide 44 private patient rooms designed to meet updated standards for patient and family accommodations related to Oncology Med-Surgical Care. The construction will require the temporary relocation of the emergency helipad at the corner of Montgomery Road and Radabaugh Drive for approximately six months.

Construction is slated to begin in late spring. The project will also update the exterior of the hospital tower with modernized metal panels installed from the 5th to 8th floor on the northwest facade, as well as tan paneling only on the 8th floor of the southeast side.

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## **BICYCLE LAWS 101**

Summer is just around the corner, and the weather is getting warmer, which means more bicyclists on our roads. The Montgomery Police Department is reminding residents about laws that apply to bicyclists.


The Ohio Revised Code defines bicyclists riding on the road as vehicles, which means bicycles must obey all the same laws as a car, including traffic signals, yield, and stop signs. Bicyclists should also ride on the right side of the road unless it is unsafe. For instance, the bike rider is swerving to avoid a pothole or parked cars.

The Ohio Revised Code does not require bicyclists to wear helmets; however, they are strongly recommended. Helmets have been proven to reduce head injuries by 48% (source National Library of Medicine).

Bicycles can be ridden side by side in a single lane of travel, but it is not always safe. Remember to use hand signals when turning or stopping, so other vehicles know your intentions. In Montgomery, bicycles can be ridden on sidewalks because they are designated as shared-use paths. The bicyclist must yield the right-of-way to pedestrians and announce before overtaking them. When bicyclists encounter an intersection with a crosswalk, they must dismount and walk the bike through the crosswalk. If a bicyclist rides through the crosswalk, they could be cited if an accident occurs.

Electric bicycles have also become more prevalent in our community. There are three classes of e-bikes. Classes 1 and 2 e-bikes can be ridden anywhere a bike can be ridden. Class 3 e-bicycles can only be ridden in the road because of their excessive speeds. All

E-bicycles are required to have a working speedometer. Class 3 e-bicyclists are required to wear a helmet.

# SPRING SHREDDING EVENT - MARK YOUR CALENDAR!

The Environmental Advisory Commission will hold a free Document Shredding Event on Saturday, May 21 at the monthly cardboard recycling event. This event is held from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. at the Public Works Facility located at 7315 Cornell Road (across from Sycamore High School).

\*Please remove paper from notebooks and binders. Paper clips and staples DO NOT have to be removed. No binder clips please. CDs or DVDs cannot be shredded.

To serve everybody efficiently, there will be a maximum of 3 boxes (copy paper size or similar) per person in line, and you must be present. Volunteers will be available to assist.

Materials will be shredded onsite.



#### STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

Stormwater management plays an important role in reducing the chance of flooding inside your home. Homeowners should be aware of the drainage system on their property to ensure that it is properly functioning. Most residential lots utilize a swale system to move water away from and around the home. Below are some key factors to understanding your drainage system.

#### **Drainage swales:**


 Are shallow-sided, sloped ditches designed to carry surface run-off from a property, towards the nearest street, catch basin or storm water retention basin.

- Are typically located along common property lines and sometimes at the back of a lot.
- Should be graded and maintained in accordance with the approved lot grading plan.
- Swales must be unobstructed and free draining. Residents are encouraged not to place sheds, landscaping or any other object in a drainage swale.
- Do not plant trees in a swale, as over time, a large tree can impact drainage.
- Keep fences at least six inches above the bottom of a swale to allow water and small debris to pass under it.

#### There are generally two types of lot drainage:

#### 1. Rear-to-front drainage

- The rear lot line is the high point on the lot.
- Surface water on the property is drained to side yard swales along the common lot line and out the front of the property toward the street.



#### 2. Split drainage to a rear yard swale

- The highest elevation is set near the midpoint on the property.
- Surface drainage then flows to the street and to the rear lot line onto a rear yard swale.



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## HELP YOUR COMMUNITY CONTROL MOSQUITOES

From the buzz in your ear to the itchy welt on your arm, mosquitoes aren't just annoying; they can be dangerous to your health. Mosquito bites can cause skin irritation through an allergic reaction. They can also transmit serious diseases and viruses such as malaria, Dengue viruses, Zika, and West Nile virus, leading to disabling and potentially deadly effects.

We can help our community reduce the risks of mosquito-borne diseases by eliminating mosquito breeding grounds, public education, biological control, and insecticide applications.

- Once a week, empty and scrub, turn over, cover, or throw out items that hold water, such as tires, buckets, planters, toys, pools, birdbaths, flowerpots, or trash containers.
- · Empty and change the water in birdbaths, fountains, wading pools, rain barrels, and potted plant trays at least once a week to destroy potential mosquito habitats.
- · Check for water-holding containers both indoors and outdoors.
- Use screens on windows and doors and make sure they are in good working condition. Repair holes in screens to keep mosquitoes outdoors.

- · Cover all gaps in walls, doors, and windows to prevent mosquitoes from entering.
- Clean rain gutters to allow water to flow freely.
- Don't leave garbage can lids lying upside down. Be sure water does not collect in the bottom of garbage cans.
- Check for trapped water in plastic or canvas tarps used to cover boats, pools, etc. Arrange the tarp to drain the water.
- Remove pet food and water dishes that are not being used.
- · Keep swimming pool water treated and circulating.
