





MONTGOMERY UNVEILS GERRI HARBISON STATUE

At the Independence Day Festival in July, the City of Montgomery unveiled a life-sized bronze statue of former Mayor and Council Member Gerri Harbison. The sculpture features Gerri sitting on a bench overlooking a baseball field and City Hall.

Gerri spent her life serving the City she loved. Gerri died unexpectedly in January 2021. She started her service to Montgomery as a member of its Bicentennial Commission in 1994. Gerri also volunteered on several city boards and commissions. She was elected to Montgomery City Council in 1999. Gerri served as Mayor from 2005 to 2011. She supervised the City's annual Fourth of July festival for 25 years.

Sculptor Tom Tsuchiya of Blue Ash created the sculpture. City officials, business leaders, and residents raised money for the statue.


WHEN TO STOP FOR A SCHOOL BUS

With the first day of school quickly approaching, we need to begin thinking about the safety of our children as they venture back to school. According to the American School Bus Council, students are 70 times more likely to get to school safely if they take the school bus instead of traveling by car. That's because of the school bus design, safety features, and laws protecting children from other drivers. Our children's most significant risk is not while riding the bus but walking to or from one. The laws clearly establish driver responsibilities and stiff penalties for violations of the laws.

Ohio Revised Code section 4511.75 states that a driver in either direction must stop at least 10 feet from the front or rear of a stopped school bus that is discharging or receiving passengers, with or without flashing lights or an extended stop sign.

ALL drivers must stop when the roadway has three or less traffic lanes. These lanes do not include a dual turn lane like we have in the Montgomery Business District. When a roadway has four or more traffic lanes, only vehicles approaching the rear of the bus are required to stop. Drivers who violate the law and put our children at risk could be issued a summons to appear in court. Drivers could be fined up to \$500 with the potential for a one-year driver's license suspension.

Please help us keep our children safe by reviewing the laws with every driver in your household.

YOU CAN STOP RUMPKE TRUCK FIRES!

Since January, Rumpke reports 60 fires in their trucks and facilities caused by discarded combustible materials, primarily batteries. These fires disrupt service, add to air pollution, and risk injury to Rumpke workers, their trucks, and the public. The damage caused by these fires is significant and inevitably gets passed on to Rumpke customers through higher service fees. Rumpke does not accept batteries because they don't have a safe way to collect and process the material.

According to easyship.com, Lithium-Ion Batteries are hazardous if they are improperly packaged for shipping because:

- They are highly flammable and can cause fires if improperly packaged
- They react sensitively to environmental factors
- There is a higher chance of their short-circuiting.

This is why the United States Postal Service (USPS) requires special packaging and documentation when shipping Lithium-ion Batteries, and the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) does not allow Lithium-Ion batteries to be placed in checked baggage.

Keeping the above in mind, imagine the safety risk that is created when batteries are thrown into a trash or recycling bin. All trash and recycling materials are transported by compactor trucks, which mix and compress everything they collect, including batteries and any chemicals and flammable materials. This "dangerous cocktail" is then transported to a Rumpke processing facility, where it is dumped and sorted. Batteries are subjected to the same rough handling as other collected trash, creating a high risk that a battery could easily ignite and burn the collection truck or processing facility.

Please do not dispose of batteries in the trash or recycling bin. Instead, take them to be recycled at a responsible site. Hamilton County Solid Waste District keeps a list on its website at www.hcdoes.org/265/batteries.

Additionally, on the 3rd Saturday in September, Montgomery offers a One-Stop-Drop at the Public Works Facility, including a drop-off area for AAA, AA, C, D, and 9V batteries. These batteries will be taken to a site where they are recycled responsibly.

TREE HEALTH FOCUS: SPRUCE TREES

Rhizosphaera needle cast is the most common disease of spruce trees, including Colorado blue spruce, white spruce, Oriental spruce, and occasionally Norway spruce and red spruce. Healthy spruce will retain its needles for 5 to 7 years; however, spruce infected with Rhizosphaera needle cast may only hold the current year's needles. Mild temperatures and prolonged wet needles can lead to the disease. Needles on interior branches in the lower canopy are most infected first, because airflow is limited, and shade is more prevalent.

When infected, needles on the tree turn purple to brown and begin to drop. When the disease becomes well established in the tree's lower canopy, the disease spreads upwards in successive years, killing off the branches.

When branches in the lower canopy decline or die, it is important to prune out the infected branches.

In addition, should a chemical control of the disease be required, the application should be made in the spring, as the disease infects newly emerging spruce needles.

10 SIMPLE TIPS TO PREVENT A FALL

Simple changes can be made in and around your home to help prevent falls and eliminate tripping hazards.

1. Remove scatter rugs

Remove throw rugs throughout the home that are easy to trip over. Make sure it has a no-slip bottom.

2. Declutter

When you've lived in a place for several years, you can collect a lot of clutter, which can become a fall risk. Remove items, such as stacks of books or boxes, that you may trip over and cause you to fall.

3. Keep pathways clear

Clear pathways of trip hazards—such as clutter, power cords, or extra furniture—so that it's easier to move around. This includes hallways as well as the route around your bed.

4. Fix uneven surfaces

As people age, vision changes may mean their depth perception isn't as good as before, and they may not see the details of walking surfaces. Fix uneven walkways and steps inside and outside the home to help prevent falls.

5. Lights

Good lighting is important to illuminate pathways and surfaces inside and outside the home. Open curtains or blinds to let in natural light. Add extra lighting, such as nightlights in hallways or light strips on steps. Consider motion-sensor lighting inside or outside.

6. Bathroom

Install a higher toilet or a seat extender, which are better for people with arthritis or knee problems. Other fall-prevention changes include using nonslip rugs, adding a shower chair, and installing grab bars near the shower, tub and toilet.

7. Steps

Add a railing along stairs—or on both sides of steps—to help navigate inside or outside your home. Consider building a ramp that leads to the front or back door.

8. Furniture

Decrease the amount of furniture throughout your home, so there are fewer obstacles. If you can afford it, replace sharp-edged furniture with pieces that have soft, rounded edges to reduce the risk of injury should you fall.

9. Check your vision

Since poor eyesight can lead to falls, older adults should get an eye exam yearly. You may need glasses, have an age-related condition like cataracts, or need to update your eyeglass prescription.

10. Strengthen muscles

Age-related muscle weakness and deteriorating balance also can contribute to falls. Take brisk walks for 30 minutes three times a week to strengthen your leg muscles. Before walking, do some light stretches, such as easy bends and knee flexes while holding onto a chair. Exercise can help improve your balance.

DID YOU KNOW?

The Montgomery Drive-in opened in 1939 and was one of the county's earliest drive-in theaters with one of the area's widest screens. The drive-in was a popular community gathering place and events were also held at the drive-in, such as weddings and Easter services. A large fire damaged the drive-in in the summer of 1948, but the theater continued to operate until it closed in 1971. The property was sold after another fire damaged the property in the fall of 1975. Today, the site is the location of Columbia Chevrolet at 9750 Montgomery Road.
