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DRUG ADDICTION AWARENESS BY RON MESSER

More than 107,000 Americans died from drug overdoses in 2021. That is more than gun deaths (49,000) and vehicle deaths (43,000) combined. It's a staggering number that was up 15% from 2020, and it's on pace to far eclipse that number this year. Yet the news media seems to pay a lot more attention to guns and traffic fatalities. However, recently we have seen a few articles in newspapers and on television that warn us that the worst may be yet to come due to illicit fentanyl spreading across our country.

In addition to the ongoing opioid crisis, the DEA reports a dramatic increase in counterfeit pills laced with fentanyl flooding our communities. Often, these pills target teens or young adults who buy them illegally, hoping to relieve anxiety and depression. Sometimes, they believe they are purchasing Adderall with hopes of increasing concentration. Dr. Nora Volkow, director of the National Institute on Drug Abuse, called the latest numbers of fake pills "truly staggering."

So, what's being done closer to home in Hamilton County to prevent and treat this problem? We are fortunate to have many local officials, medical and mental health professionals, educators, clergy, business leaders, and first responders that are active members of the Hamilton County Addiction Response Coalition (HCARC). County Commissioner Denise Driehaus is the Executive Chair. Its goal is to address the drug trafficking, abuse, and addiction problem by focusing on four areas: prevention, treatment, interdiction, and harm reduction. Last year 454 people died of drug overdoses in Hamilton County, down from 570 in 2017. However, there is still a long way to go, especially with the recent influx of fentanyl. As stated on the HCARC website, "Addiction doesn't discriminate. It affects all kinds of people, from all kinds of backgrounds, from every neighborhood across our country."

Within Hamilton County, the City of Montgomery is a bright spot. Our Police Chief, John Crowell, is actively linked with the Hamilton County coalition. His latest report, from data we are able to obtain, lists six overdose incidents in our city over the last five years, with only one being a Montgomery resident. That's outstanding, considering we have a major hospital and interstate highways within our boundaries.

What can you do as a family or individual?

- · Lock or secure all of your prescription medicines.
- Drop off your expired or unused prescription medicines at the Montgomery Safety Center.
- · Seek help if you or someone you suspect are abusing drugs or at risk. Call the HCARC at 513-281-7880 if you have questions or need help. Call 988 for a mental health condition.
- Be aware that some illegal drugs may be laced with fentanyl or other harmful substances.
- Discuss drug abuse and awareness with your children. Educate them on the harmful effects of drugs and how to avoid them.
- Drop off unwanted medication on National Prescription Drug Take Back Day - More information on page 11.

Let's continue to keep Montgomery safe, aware, and proactive in this crisis.

UNLIMITED YARD WASTE COLLECTION STARTS OCT. 31

Unlimited Yard Waste Collection begins Monday, October 31, and ends on December 23, 2022. The City will also provide collections during the first three Saturdays in January to coincide with the Christmas tree and greenery collection.

Guidelines

- Place leaves in regular 30-gallon trash cans, paper leaf bags, or yard waste toters (available through Rumpke).
- 30-gallon yard waste cans/totes have a 75 lb. weight limit. Once temperatures fall below freezing, all waste must go into bags as the moisture causes the cans/ toters to freeze.
- Loosely place yard waste in trash cans or paper yard waste bags. Label yard waste toters as yard waste. Yard waste placed in unmarked toters will NOT be picked up.
- Place yard waste on the opposite side of the driveway from trash and leave the lids off the cans. Plastic bags will NOT be picked up.

- Bundle brush in 4-foot by 2-foot bundles fastened with cotton twine. The weight limit is 50 lbs.
- Cut limbs into 4-foot lengths and no larger than 6 inches in diameter.
- Place all limbs in a can or a bundle. Limbs should not reach more than 1 foot above the height of the can.

During unlimited collection, yard waste stickers are not required.

CONSTRUCTION OF THE VILLAGE AT THE VINTAGE CLUB CONTINUES

Construction of The Village at The Vintage Club on the northern end of Montgomery has kicked into high gear. The Vintage Club is a planned development and mixed-use project located on approximately 68 acres with frontage along Montgomery Road north of I-275. The first building of The Wicks, consisting of 13 luxury boutique condominiums, is complete and fully occupied. The second building is currently under construction and is expected to be completed in the first quarter of 2023. As a reminder, Montgomery tax returns are due October 15, 2022 for those who filed for an extension. Tax Office staff is available for questions or assistance with preparing returns. You may visit the Tax Office in person, or tax documents can be submitted in advance either by mail, drop-off or through the secure portal on the Tax Office

page on our website at www.montgomeryohio.gov. Please be sure to include a copy of your Federal extension form to avoid late filing penalties. OCTOBER IS FIRE PREVENTION MONTH

October 9th through October 15th marks the 100th anniversary of Fire Prevention Week. This year's campaign, "Fire won't wait. Plan your escape™", works to educate everyone about simple but important actions they can take to keep themselves and those around them safe from home fires.

Today's homes burn faster than ever. You may have as little as two minutes (or even less time) to safely escape a home fire from the time the smoke alarm sounds. Your ability to get out of a home during a fire depends on early warning from smoke alarms and advance planning.

Home Fire Escape Planning and Practicing

It is important for everyone to plan and practice a home fire escape. Everyone needs to be prepared in advance, so that they know what to do when the smoke alarm sounds. Given that every home is different, every home fire escape plan will also be different.

Have a plan for everyone in the home. Children, older adults, and people with disabilities may need assistance to wake up and get out. Make sure that someone will help them!

Smoke Alarms

Smoke alarms sense smoke well before you can, alerting you to danger. Smoke alarms need to be in every bedroom, outside of the sleeping areas (like a hallway), and on each level (including the basement) of your home. Do not put smoke alarms in your kitchen or bathrooms.

Choose an alarm that is listed with a testing laboratory, meaning it has met certain standards for protection.

For the best protection, use combination smoke and carbon monoxide alarms that are interconnected throughout the home. These can be installed by a qualified electrician, so that when one sounds, they all sound. This ensures you can hear the alarm no matter where in your home the alarm originates.

The Montgomery Fire Department has a limited number of smoke detectors available. Call Julee at 513-985-1633 to see if you qualify for a free smoke detector installed in vour home.

OHIO'S PERMITLESS CARRY LAW

Ohio recently passed Senate Bill 215, which allows citizens to carry a handgun concealed without a license in Ohio.


- Permits will be optional: Ohio will still offer licenses/permits to anyone who wants one, but they are no longer mandatory. Those who obtain a license won't be legally required to carry their license with them.
- Law applies to "qualifying" adults: The rules for concealed carry in Ohio without a license are the same as concealed carry with a license. That is, you must be at least 21, not be charged with or convicted of a felony (or prohibited from possessing a firearm for any other reason under state or federal law), and meet other qualifications set forth by
- the Ohio Attorney General. Having a sealed criminal record cannot disqualify you.
- Law applies in Ohio only: Ohio's concealed carry law applies only in Ohio. Residents must obey the firearm laws of other states when crossing state lines, which could mean a concealed license is required.

TEMPORARY SIGNS REGULATED FOR HEIGHT, DISTANCE

Montgomery residents are reminded that the City has zoning regulations in place that govern the size and location for which temporary signs may be displayed on residential lots.

Temporary signs such as garage sale signs, political signs and real estate signs are permitted individually up to four square feet in size and four feet in height and must be located behind the sidewalk or 13' behind the curb if there is not a sidewalk.

The City of Montgomery Police Department, partnering with the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), will conduct a National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day on Saturday, October 29, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at the Montgomery Community Pool parking lot at 8075 Hopewell Road.

The DEA is again sponsoring a national campaign to remove expired, unused, or unwanted controlled substances from home medicine cabinets. Montgomery Police and the DEA will provide a venue for Montgomery residents who want to dispose of unwanted prescription drugs.

Tablets, capsules, and all other solid dosage forms will be collected. Intravenous solutions, injectables, and syringes will not be accepted. This is a free service, and drop-offs are anonymous.
