

I hope the City of Montgomery can help you get into the holiday spirit! We have quite a few events to add to your calendar if you are looking for some holiday cheer. On Saturday, December 3, we are kicking off the season with the annual lighting of the holiday tree at the Holiday in the Village event. The next day is the Kindel Memorial holiday concert at Summit City Church. On December 11, we are hosting the final 2022 Live at the Uni with Mandy Gaines singing holiday tunes, and finally, on December 15, No Promises will be singing a cappella at The Good Shepherd Church.

City staff does a fantastic job getting all these events together and transforming our streets into a winter wonderland. They could not do this without the help of you, who volunteer your time to our City year after year.

One group I'd like to highlight is the Montgomery Woman's Club. They were established in 1952 and have been actively making Montgomery a better place for the last 70 years. They opened the first library in Montgomery in a member's home before the Cincinnati Public library opened in Blue Ash. They collaborated with the City to establish Montgomery Park, worked to restore the Universalist Church, and presented the Town Hall Lecture Series for 56 years. Over the years, The Montgomery Woman's Club donated over 1.7 million dollars to educational projects in the Sycamore School District and volunteered countless hours serving on boards, commissions, and beautifying our City. In addition to doing work that benefits our City, they support the USO, Matthew 25 Ministries, and victims of domestic violence, to name a few. They just held their first fundraiser in November and are actively looking to expand their membership. They meet monthly at Terwilliger Lodge in Dulle Park. If you can find time to get involved in a longstanding organization, please check out their website at montgomerywomansclub.org to ensure they can continue helping Montgomery for another 70 years.

We have had a transformative year in Montgomery, most notably at the Montgomery Quarter. Please watch for events welcoming everyone to our new space and tie it to our historic downtown.



CITY SEEKS APPLICANTS FOR SERVICE AND ENGAGEMENT GRANT

The City of Montgomery is seeking applications for the Service and Engagement Grant. This grant is open to all not-for-profit and local service organizations with innovative ideas and the skills necessary to execute creative community projects benefiting or engaging the citizens of Montgomery.

Applications that provide a beneficial service, project, or event that engages or improves Montgomery residents' quality of life will be considered. Special consideration will be given to applications that promote community wellness, such as mental health, healthy eating, and healthy living.

A maximum of \$2,500 may be awarded to any one applicant. Past grant recipients include the Montgomery Farmers' Market, Operation Give Back, Honor Flight Tri-State, and Sycamore Junior High.

UNLIMITED YARD WASTE CONTINUES, AND HOLIDAY GREENERY PICKUP BEGINS

The weekly unlimited yard waste pickup continues through December 23. Yard waste pickup resumes on January 7, when it's collected along with holiday greenery. Christmas trees, wreaths, and swags can be placed at the curb along with yard waste. Residents are not required to have a yard waste sticker attached to them. Please place all waste at the curb on Friday evening before the Saturday pickup.

Rumpke will collect all greenery and any remaining yard waste on one of the following three Saturday dates:

Saturday, January 7 | Saturday, January 14 | Saturday, January 21

Each item must be completely free of all plastic, flocking, tinsel, and decorations. All yard waste must be placed in bags in the event of snow due to freezing.

As a reminder, regular yard waste collection will resume the first week in March.



CITY TO MARK 40TH ANNIVERSARY OF PLANE CRASH WITH NEW PODCAST

The City of Montgomery will remember the 40th anniversary of the plane crash that killed four FBI agents and two others with a new podcast about the tragedy.

On December 16, 1982, FBI agents Robert Conners, Terry Hereford, Mike Lynch, and Charles Ellington were flying to Lunken Airport with convicted bank embezzler Carl Henry Johnson and his representative when their small plane crashed near Cooper and Main Street. Johnson claimed he hid stolen money in the area and promised agents he would lead them to the missing cash. No one has ever reported finding the money.

In the new podcast, Lost Heroes, Missing Money, witnesses, firefighters, and family members explain the events of the tragedy.



QUARTERLY TAX ESTIMATES DUE

The Montgomery tax statements for the 4th quarter will be mailed early this month, with a due date of January 15, 2023. Please remember that quarterly estimated payments are mandated by State of Ohio law for any taxpayer with a liability of \$200.00 or greater, after credits.

Remember - an extension of time to file is not an extension of time to pay. Quarterly estimate payments are due April 15, June 15. September 15. and January 15. and must be remitted even if the tax return has not yet been filed. An underpayment penalty could be charged if estimated taxes are not paid timely.

KEEP YOUR HOME SAFE DURING THE HOLIDAYS

The holiday season is here! For many, that means searching for the perfect gifts, decking the halls, and having fun with family and friends. While enjoying the season, beware that a crook may be watching your home.

- Lock doors at home. Keep your house or apartment locked even when you are home.
- Keep landscaping trimmed. Bushes can obscure your front door and give a thief a place to hide. Also, use exterior lighting.
- Get to know your neighbors. Neighbors are often the first to notice a problem and getting to know each other can enhance safety.
- Verify the identity of any "strangers" who come to your home. Solicitors' permits are required in Montgomery, and solicitors should have the permit on hand. Any cold call seller or appointment setter should trigger a call to police for verification.
- Do not provide personal, banking, or credit card information to people you don't know. If you get a phone call or email asking for personal information, hang up or delete it.

If you are traveling for the holidays, don't post pictures on social media while you are gone. Montgomery Police will keep an extra eye on your home while you are away. To register for the Home Vacation Checks, go to montgomeryohio.gov.

STORM WATER MANAGEMENT AT THE NEW MONTGOMERY QUARTER, MORE THAN MEETS THE EYE

It is amazing to see this 21-acre mixed-use development for shopping, dining, working, and living rising from the remnants of two old auto dealerships. In addition, the Montgomery Road and Cross County Highway interchange has been truly transformed with the completion of a large traffic roundabout.

Importantly, the construction of such a project presented an opportunity to completely renovate this large area's stormwater drainage infrastructure. Where once stormwater just ran off from the car lots and dealerships into nearby creeks, with no detention or filtration of debris, this new development mitigates those issues. You cannot see these underground features, but they are a large part of the development.

For example, there is a massive underground stormwater storage vault that captures the stormwater runoff. It measures 140' long X 48' wide X 11' deep, almost the capacity of an Olympic size swimming pool! It slowly discharges the runoff and has the capacity to mitigate a 100-year storm event.

It does that while also filtering the sediments, trash/litter, and residues (oil, etc.) that wash into our storm sewers. This prevents erosion, flooding, and pollution in Sycamore Creek, which eventually drains to the Little Miami River.

Also, the Montgomery Road and Cross County Highway roundabout has been built with an underground Water Quality Structure to handle stormwater. It is equipped with an oil baffle, separation screen, and solids storage sump.

It, too, is fairly large, measuring 9'-6" in diameter and 20' deep, with a detention capacity of 19,000 gallons, all buried underground. Runoff from this structure is piped under the roundabout and Montgomery Quarter and drains into Sycamore Creek.

When you do get the chance to visit Montgomery Quarter, take a moment to think about the changes you can't see that improve our environment and quality of life in Montgomery.

Progress continues at Phase I of the mixed-use Montgomery Quarter at the southern gateway to Historic Montgomery. The development team of Brandicorp, Never Properties and Jeffery R. Anderson Real Estate. Inc. is working to bring this premier \$150 million mixed-use development project to life. With construction continuing, residents have a lot of questions about what is happening at Montgomery Quarter, so here are some answers to your most frequently asked questions.

What tenants are open at Montgomery Quarter? Fifth Third Private Bank, which offers wealth-management services, is open on the third floor of the central office building and Hellman Clothiers is open in the retail space along Roosa Street.

- What restaurants are coming to the Quarter and when will they open?
 Three restaurants are signed and working on tenant finishes. Bru Burger will open its third Greater Cincinnati location at Montgomery Quarter in February of 2023. Livery, a Latin restaurant featuring empanadas, tacos, skirt steak, yucca fries and many other dishes, is targeted to open in March of 2023. Kozue, which will feature sushi, ramen noodles and other Japanese cuisine is targeted to open in March 2023 as well. The development team is working on a lease for another restaurant that will hopefully be announced soon.
- What brand is the hotel? The development team has secured The Tapestry by Hilton brand for the boutique hotel, which will be named The Rambler Hotel. The boutique hotel will feature multiple event spaces, a uniquely designed lobby bar named Sidecar and luxury guest rooms.
- When will the hotel start construction? Building permits for the hotel have been submitted and construction is projected to begin in March of 2023. The hotel is targeted to open in July of 2024.
- When will the apartments be complete? Construction is going strong on the apartments, which are scheduled to be complete in June of 2023. Pre-leasing of the apartments will begin in January when the model is complete.
- Is there a park in the project? Montgomery Quarter includes a new public park in the center of the development, which will be programed with events such as festivals, concerts, yoga, and other gatherings.

The new mixed-use neighborhood will complement the Heritage District, provide vitality to the area, and will serve as a spectacular gateway into the city that will enhance the entire community for current and future residents, businesses, and visitors. CANDLE SAFETY

Candles may be pretty to look at, but they are a cause of home fires — and home fire deaths. Remember, a candle is an open flame, which means that it can easily ignite anything that can burn.

Candle with Care

- Blow out all candles when you leave the room or go to bed. Avoid the use of candles in the bedroom and other areas where people may fall asleep.
- Keep candles at least one foot away from anything that can burn.
- Use candle holders that are sturdy and will not tip over easily.
- Put candle holders on an uncluttered surface.
- Light candles carefully. Keep your hair and any loose clothing away from the flame.
- Do not burn a candle all the way down put it out before it gets too close to the holder or container.
- Never use a candle if medical oxygen is used in the home.
- Have flashlights and battery-powered lighting ready to use during a power outage. Never use candles.
- Keep matches and lighters up high and out of children's reach in a locked cabinet.
- Never leave a child alone in a room with a burning candle.

Candle Fire Facts

- December is the peak month for home candle fires.
- More than one-third of home candle fires started in the bedroom.
- Three of every five candle fires start when things that can burn are too close to the candle.

Think about using flameless candles in your home. They look and smell like real candles.






KINDEL MEMORIAL **HOLIDAY CONCERT**




PICK UP A HISTORIC LANDMARK ORNAMENT **FOR YOUR HOME**
