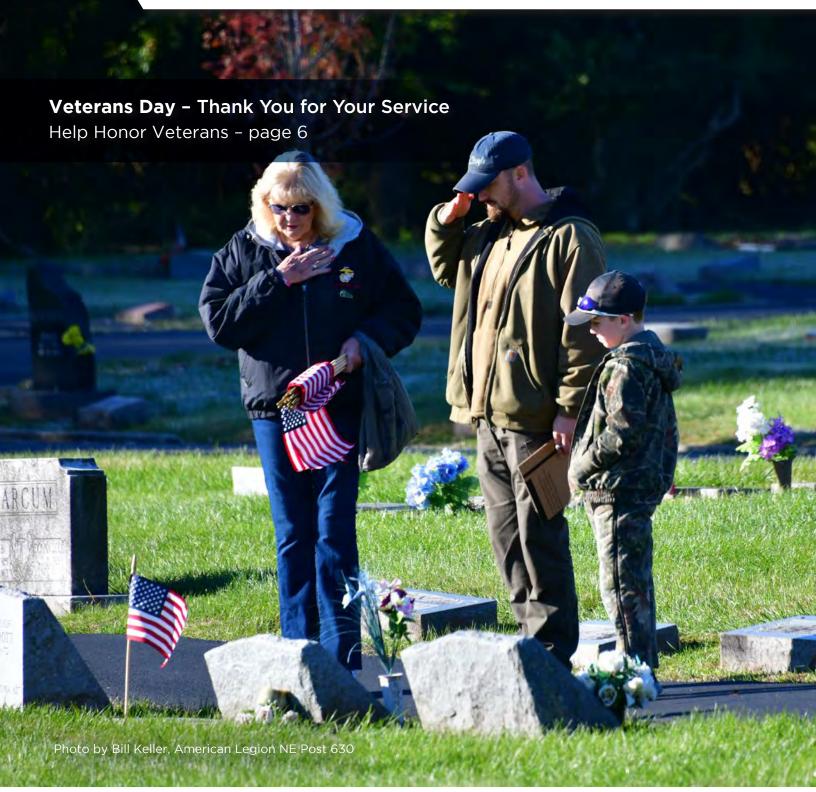

PRESERVING RELATIONSHIPS IN POLARIZED TIMES BY CRAIG MARGOLIS

I am a modern-day citizen of Montgomery. I crave diversity, whether I am walking into a fast-food restaurant and ordering a meal "my way" or acquiring news to satisfy my curiosity of the world around me.

I do not think I am unique, yet I hear stories of coworkers, family members or even spouses getting into intense arguments about government policy or put succinctly politics in general because the other, holds a view opposite their own.

That is a startling statement today, where disagreements produce cries of "you are the enemy" or even that your viewpoint is not valid. We Americans are much more politically divided than at any point in the last two decades according to such esteemed pollsters as PEW Research.

Partisan animosity has increased, which at times makes it difficult to have a conversation without it evolving into a shouting match. Have we collectively lost the ability to be civil, understanding, and even compassionate with friends and our fellow residents? Your City Council would like to offer an alternate way to engage those conversations.

City Council along with the City of Montgomery Diversity and Inclusion Commission will be embarking on a journey, learning how to have difficult conversations, while remaining civil and respectful. We will be partnering with a citizen led group called Braver Angels.

As discovered in post-workshop surveys, among 1,800 participants in workshops directed by Braver Angels found that about 79% of the participants felt that they better understood "the experiences, feelings,

and beliefs of those on the other side," and that they, in turn, felt better understood. About 75% of participants felt less angry and less estranged toward those on the other side following the workshops, and about 80% felt that they were "more able to start constructive conversations" with them (Braver Angels, 2018).

Montgomery government, while not able to solve every individual problem, is attempting to provide tools and roadmaps assisting residents with mental health issues, examples of how to embrace those who do not look like us, and now how to empathize with those who do not hold the same opinions as we do.

This is one of the tasks I am delighted to work on, to continue this long march of those who worked on council's past, to make our community a better place to live. To solve our myriad issues, we must continue the movement from the divisive to the civil.

I do not believe we can solve these types of issues unless we engage with you, our residents, unless we learn together that each and every one of use has a unique angle on our future path. Many times, there is no wrong way, there are simply better ways to solve a problem

Please join the journey with us to make this the year you have control of how you respond and interact to difficult conversations, engage with us together.

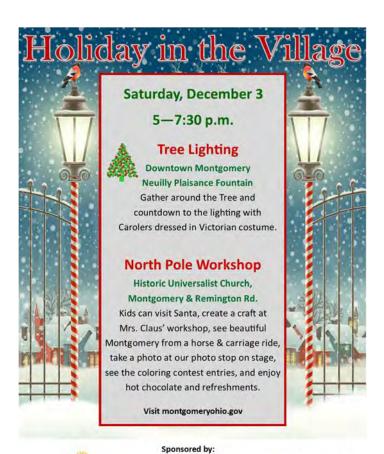
WELCOME MONTGOMERY'S NEW CUSTOMER SERVICE AND VOLUNTEER SPECIALIST

Work is well underway to construct the roundabout at the Pfeiffer Road and Deerfield Road intersection. So far this year, Duke Energy and Altafiber relocated overhead utilities. Duke Energy also installed a new gas main. While Barrett Paving installed a new Greater Cincinnati Water Works water main.

The remaining work this year by Barrett Paving includes installing storm drainage infrastructure and temporary pavement. Temporary pavement will be installed along the south side of Pfeiffer Road and on the west side of Deerfield Road, allowing both roads to have three lanes instead of two. The temporary lanes allow traffic to get through and work to get done simultaneously.

While Phase One is expected to be completed by the end of the year, Phase Two begins in the spring. The roundabout is expected to be completed in August.

As with most road construction projects, weather can play a factor in completing this project.

UNLIMITED YARD WASTE COLLECTION IS UNDERWAY

Unlimited Yard Waste Collection is going on from now until December 23, 2022. The City will also provide unlimited yard waste collections during the first three Saturdays in January to coincide with the Christmas tree and greenery collection.

Guidelines

- Place leaves in regular 30-gallon trash cans, paper leaf bags, or yard waste toters (available through Rumpke).
- 30-gallon vard waste cans/toters have a 75 lb. weight limit. Once temperatures fall below freezing, all waste **must** go into bags as the moisture causes the cans/toters to freeze.
- Loosely place yard waste in trash cans or paper yard waste bags. Label yard waste totes as yard waste. Yard waste placed in unmarked toters will NOT be picked up.
- Place yard waste on the opposite side of the driveway trash and leave the lids off the cans. Plastic bags will NOT be picked up.
- Bundle brush in 4-foot by 2-foot bundles fastened with cotton twine. The weight limit is 50 lbs.
- Cut limbs into 4-foot lengths and no larger than 6 inches in diameter.
- Place all limbs in a can or a bundle. Limbs should not reach more than 1 foot above the height of the can.

During unlimited collection, yard waste stickers are not required.

HOLIDAY COOKING SAFETY

People will gather for Thanksgiving to enjoy time with loved ones and a delicious holiday dinner. With cooking being the number one cause of home fires, here are some recommendations for fire safety:

- Install a smoke alarm near your kitchen, on each level of your home, near sleeping areas, and inside and outside bedrooms if you sleep with doors closed. Use the test button to check it each month. Replace all batteries at least once a year if your smoke alarm requires it.
- Don't wear loose clothing or sleeves that dangle while cooking.
- If you are frying or grilling food, never leave it unattended - stay in the kitchen. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- If you're simmering, baking, roasting or broiling food, check it regularly.

- Use a timer to remind yourself that the stove or oven is on.
- Keep kids and pets away from the cooking area. Make them stay at least three feet away from the stove.
- Keep anything that can catch fire pot holders, oven mitts, wooden utensils, paper or plastic bags, food packaging, towels or curtains - away from your stove, oven or any other appliance in the kitchen that generates heat.
- Clean cooking surfaces on a regular basis to prevent grease buildup.
- Always check the kitchen before going to bed or leaving the home to make sure all stoves, ovens, and small appliances are turned off.
- Consider purchasing a fire extinguisher to keep in your kitchen.

Personal Safety / Situational Awareness

- Actively look at your surroundings and listen to the environment. Limit smart phone screen use while walking and regularly look up from the phone while you are in public areas.
- Acknowledge unsafe physical environments. Avoid danger, try to stay in well-lit and well-traveled areas. Assess your surroundings and adjust your behavior to remain safe.
- Be assertive. Leave or remove yourself if you are uncomfortable in a particular place. Trust your instinct and avoid people or situations that trigger fear, hesitancy, or discomfort.
- Keep your hands or at least one hand free. Flinch and startle response are your first line of defense if attacked. If hands are occupied with phones, packages, or other items you have forfeited an initial response in an attack or even a brace when tripping or falling.
- Keep purses and bags close at hand. Don't leave them unattended in shopping carts and keep them close to avoid losing money, wallets, and valuables.

• Train. Yes TRAIN. Consider regular self-defense training. Definitely seek competent, regularly scheduled training if you intend to carry a weapon (chemical irritant, stun gun, firearm) for self-defense.

Property Safety for Vehicles

- Park safely. Park in well-lit areas and near foot or vehicle traffic, the more exposure your car has to people and lighting the less likely it is to be the target of a theft.
- Do not leave valuables unattended in your car. If you must leave something in your car, be sure to lock the car and keep items out of view, preferably in the trunk.
- Keep your car locked and NEVER leave the keys, or key fob starter in the car unattended. Use vehicle antitheft devices and alarms when your car is unattended.

Many of these "safety tips" are already in place and done without a lot of conscious thought. Stay safe. Trust instinct and judgement. Slow down and purposefully practice good judgement that may have lapsed because of busy lifestyle, hurried family obligations, or general frustration.

5. Stick to a budget

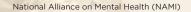
Don't try to buy happiness with an avalanche of gifts. Even if you can afford all the gifts, your presence is enough.
