

INSPIRATION FOR CHANGE BY MIKE CAPPEL

Once I became involved with Montgomery as a volunteer and later as a Council Member, I began to meet inspirational people and businesses everywhere. Perhaps I didn't recognize inspiration, but I found the Inspired within the ranks of Montgomery volunteers, staff, council and later in other communities, politicians and even amongst my fellow UC students. I continue to see inspired Facebook friends take lifestyle challenges and stick with them for long times.

About the time I started volunteering with Montgomery's Environmental Advisory Commission, I attended a regional environmental conference. This conference was different than other ones I had attended or presented at; the focus was preventing pollution instead of cleaning it up. One Springdale business was in attendance, and their presentation was very different than the others. This company's concept was that all their waste (wastewater, solid waste, air pollution, even time) was a measure of the inefficiencies in their processes. While other companies were proudly presenting the merits of their expensive, high efficiency lighting systems, the Springdale company showed off their new skylights installed during reroofing of the massive plant. Other companies showed their new wastewater treatment systems while the Springdale company showed their water reuse system - a little treatment and the water could be reused in product, i.e., no process wastewater!

If you visit some Montgomery facilities, you will see some similar technologies applied. The recently expanded and remodeled Public Works facility has skylights, a rainwater recovery/reuse system and even a windmill to aerate the stormwater retention pond. As Montgomery moves forward, financially sound, time tested or even innovative, environmentally friendly technologies can creep into our growing community.

Cycling back to how an individual can inspire, one of my friends has committed not to visit the grocery during 2023. She is foraging, growing food, buying directly from farms, and visiting markets, such as the soon to reopen Montgomery Farmer's Market. She inspired me to take the "One Trip" challenge: only take our trash (recycling excluded) to the curb one time this year. As I write this we are 9 weeks into the challenge and have taken out our recycling once, yet generated only about 2 inches of nonrecyclable trash. Like that inspirational business, careful purchases, repairing broken items, replacing packaged goods with minimally packaged goods, composting, recycling and sometimes just skipping an unneeded item is paying off.

Please label your swaps by providing the plant's name and sun or shade preference. Anyone who wants to take plants home should bring bags or containers to transport them.



FEDERAL GRANT LEADS TO **UPGRADED CAMERA/SECURITY SYSTEM**

In 2023 the City of Montgomery was awarded federal funding to significantly enhance the security and traffic camera system in the City. Currently, traffic cameras are installed at major intersections and several City facilities. These cameras have been instrumental in addressing property crimes and determining fault in traffic crashes. The new Federal grant provides funds to upgrade and supplement cameras at most signalized intersections, City owned facilities, and outdoor locations within our parks and rental lodges. Additionally, this system updates access control at City Hall, the Safety Center, Public Works, and rental facilities. The new access control system will remove the cumbersome process of issuing keys, thus streamlining the rental process and allowing authorized users access via a phone app, supplied code, or even remotely by City personnel.

It is important to note that the new system does not utilize speed cameras or redlight cameras.

STREET RESURFACING PROGRAM BEGINS THIS SPRING

The City awarded the 2023 street resurfacing program to Barrett Paving Materials, Inc. This year's program includes 2.0 centerline miles of public roadway. The following streets will be completed:

- · Southwind Drive
- Westwind Drive
- Trailwind Drive (Southwind Drive to east terminus)
- Windpoint Place
- Wingzag Lane (Zig Zag Road to Baywind Drive)
- Baywind Drive (Windzag Lane to Trailwind Drive)
- Treeheights Court
- Delray Drive (#9800 Delray Drive to Castleford Lane)
- Castleford Lane (Delray Drive to east terminus)
- Zig Zag Road (I-71 bridge to west corporation limit)
- · Windhaven Court



The work entails complete milling and asphalt resurfacing, along with "spot" curb replacement and storm drainage inlet repairs.

Construction is expected to start in late April or early May and be completed by August.



INVASIVE CALLERY PEAR TREES NO LONGER SOLD IN OHIO

The Callery pear trees in Montgomery's Heritage District, neighborhood areas, and highways are among the first to show their white blossoms each spring.

Originally imported from Asia in the early 1900s as an ornamental tree and to improve disease resistance in our native pear trees, it has evolved into an invasive species. As of January 7, 2023, it is now illegal to sell, grow or plant Callery pear plants in Ohio "because of its invasive qualities and likelihood to cause economic or environmental harm." There is no requirement to remove existing plants, but the Ohio Division of Natural Resources encourages control and removal in native forest ecosystems.

Callery pear (Pyrus Calleryana) cultivars include Bradford, Cleveland Select, Autumn Blaze, Chanticleer, and Whitehouse. They became popular as landscape plants because of their white spring flowers, good fall color, disease resistance, and ability to grow in poor soil conditions. The tree was also believed to be unable to reproduce by seed and sterile. However, numerous

cultivated varieties have been shown to be able to cross-pollinate with each other and produce viable fruit. Showy white flowers in the spring mature into small pears that are eaten and dispersed by birds. Even though birds consume the fruit, it has little insect and wildlife value compared to native plants. It can spread quickly and form such dense colonies that it outcompetes native plants and even honeysuckle. Trees have deep taproots that are difficult to remove, and seeds can survive for over ten years.

Ohio is the first state to take such action on Callery pear, with other states planning to do the same in the future. Some beneficial native trees are great landscape alternatives to Callery pear that can provide similar aesthetic attributes. Depending on growing site conditions, species like flowering dogwood, redbud, chokecherry, American plum, serviceberry, and black gum can be good alternatives.



APRIL IS NATIONAL DONATE LIFE MONTH

April is the month to celebrate those who have received transplants, to recognize those who continue to wait, to honor donors and donor families, and to thank registered donors for giving hope.

Will I receive an organ if I ever need one?

A national system matches available organs from the donor with people on the waiting list based on many factors, including: blood type, body size, how sick they are, distance from donor hospital and time on the list.

Who can be a donor?

People of all ages and medical histories should consider themselves potential deceased donors. Your medical condition at the time of death will determine what organs and tissue can be donated.

Living donors should be in good overall physical and mental health and older than 18 years of age. Some medical conditions could prevent an individual from being a living donor. Transplant programs complete a full patient evaluation to protect both living donor and recipient health and safety.

Is there a cost to be an organ, eye and tissue donor? There is no cost to the donor's family or estate

for donation. The donor family pays only for medical expenses before death and costs associated with funeral arrangements.

Why should I register my decision to be a donor?

The vast majority of Americans support donation as an opportunity to give life and health to others. Unfortunately, many people overlook the important step of registering as a donor. Donors are often people who die suddenly and unexpectedly. Their families are then faced with making the decision at a time of shock and grief. Registering relieves your family of this burden.

You can save up to 8 lives and heal the lives of more than 75 people. Your registration serves as a symbol of hope to patients waiting, and sharing it with your family lets them know your decision.

FREQUENTLY ASKED ENVIRONMENTAL QUESTIONS

In the spring and fall, the Montgomery Environmental Advisory Commission has a booth at the Montgomery Farmer's Market with information about local environmental services. Two of the most often-asked questions are:

Can plastic clamshell containers go into the Rumpke recycling bin?

Plastic clamshell fruit and salad containers are not accepted in Rumpke's Recycling Program. Place them in the waste bin. Currently, there is no outlet for recycling this type of plastic material. Rumpke



can only accept empty, clean plastic bottles, jugs, tubs, and cups, except for Solo Cups, which are not accepted in Rumpke Recycling. Many plastic products like bubble wrap, plastic overwraps from paper towels, cereal box liners, newspaper sleeves, plastic shipping envelopes, clean sandwich bags, and plastic grocery bags are not accepted in Rumpke recycling. However, these plastics can be brought to Kroger or Meijer and placed in recycling bins at their store entryways.

What composting options are available in Montgomery?

At this time there are three composting options available in Montgomery.

Backyard Composters: Backyard composters are available for you to buy online or at your favorite garden store for a one-time fee. To learn how to make your homemade backyard composter, purchase a compost bin from Hamilton County or information to get you started composting, go to www.hamiltoncountyr3source.org or www.hcdoes.org
