YES, BUDGETING CAN BE FUN! BY LEE ANN BISSMEYER

I just added one of my favorite city events to my calendar. No, it is not Bastille Day or the Holiday in the Village event; it is the annual 4-hour budget review meeting! I know many of you will think I am weird, but I really love this meeting.

It is vastly different from my days right out of college, when the Federal Government would literally spend every dollar in their budget to ensure they would receive at least the same amount the following year. One year I witnessed \$100,000 being spent at the last minute on new picture frames to replace perfectly good ones to drain down the account. This approach and waste of tax dollars makes me ill to this day!

I am extremely pleased to report that the City of Montgomery operates in a completely different manner. The entire process starts with the resident survey responses. Based on these responses, we have a blueprint of what direction we need to go and plan accordingly. Next, we devise a 5-year strategic plan that corresponds with a 5-year operating and capital budget. Each department forecasts at least five years out on what their department needs to operate and what they need to advance their portion of the strategic plan. We give power to each department to manage its budget accordingly while doing what is best for our Montgomery community. In my five years, almost every department has funds remaining in December. The City of Montgomery treats your tax dollars like their own family budget by not wasting hard-earned money. They know that this year's allocation will not negatively impact next year's request, and we will always ensure they have what they need to continue providing high-quality services reflective of our community. We do not play games with budgets like our big brother in Washington, DC.

For example, the Public Works Department may request funds for one year to replace playground equipment. They do not add in that same amount the following year because the need is no longer there. The beauty of having the detailed 5-year overview is that we can forecast, plan, and compare with other department needs, identify a need with plenty of time to look for and apply for applicable grant funding and leverage current and forecasted market conditions. The City also utilizes financial modeling software that allows staff to create a variety of scenarios based on financial decisions, so the City Council is fully aware of the potential impacts. Finally, we are so fortunate to have a plethora of volunteers that allows us to significantly keep our costs down, and we have one of the lowest income taxes in the county.

We meet at City Hall every September to review the proposed budget and 5-year forecast. All council members and city staff review their budget binders before the meeting. During the meeting, each department provides details and explanations of their budgets. This not only lets us all see when and why things are happening but allows for any overlap to be exposed and any cost savings between departments to be identified. The City's budget process is very methodical and a disciplined approach that has served the city very well for years. Our priority is to continue the successful stewardship of the City's resources while maintaining high-quality service delivery. I hope you agree that we do that.

The end of summer vacation comes too quickly for most of us. With vacations wrapping up and an influx of traffic, August brings a change in driving patterns and a return to school zone rules on the road.

6 Tips to Stay Safe on the Roads this School Year:

- 1. Avoid Distracted Driving. The potential for distraction is multiplied when the entire family travels in the car. Young drivers are prone to distracted driving, especially with the temptation of handheld technology. Keep the phone out of sight, and NEVER text while driving.
- 2. Respect the Big Yellow Bus. Imagine being in a large vehicle with 40 noisy 6th-graders. Put yourself in the bus driver's shoes. Do your part and make the driver's job easier. Yield when they are attempting to merge. Maintain a significant distance behind buses as they often make unexpected stops. Make sure children know never to walk behind buses.
- 3. Watch out for Pedestrians. Back-toschool season means kids walking to class and more bicycles on the road, especially in residential areas close to schools.

- 4. Wear Seat Belts. Seat belts save lives and help to prevent injuries. Make sure all children are correctly buckled in the proper car or booster seats. Additionally, secure pets in the back of the car.
- 5. Plan and Allow Extra Travel Time. With more vehicles on the roads, there is more potential for dangerous accidents. Be patient. Allow extra travel time just in case.
- 6. Be Wary of New Drivers. A new school year brings a surge of newly-licensed teen drivers on the roads, in addition to inexperienced college students with only a couple of years driving under their belt. Be mindful and cautious of new drivers.

While we normally associate the beginning of the school year with more traffic in school zone areas, it's also essential to keep in mind the increase in traffic on highways and roads. In

August, commute times typically rise due to commuting students and parents dropping off children at schools.

By exercising extra care and caution and keeping these facts in mind, we can keep ourselves and our families safe.

MONTGOMERY'S MOMENT - OUR FUTURE IS BRIGHT!

A comprehensive community plan uses a long-range vision to guide city leaders' decision-making regarding future development. It contains goals and objectives and directs how the community moves toward a unified

development vision. Our last comprehensive plan was updated in 2007, and a new update of priorities that reflect the ideals of citizens and city officials is needed as the economy, population, and housing have substantially changed since then.

The update will consist of three phases. The initial phase, called Explore, is currently underway and consists of information gathering and analysis by the city's consultant, Yard and Company. It also entails opportunities for city engagement, such as a visioning survey, pop-up events, and kick-off meetings.

The second phase, Test, will synthesize the community engagement results and propose draft growth goals and scenarios to identify preferred alternatives via public and stakeholder feedback.

The third and final phase, Build, will develop focus area recommendations with supporting graphics and deliver implementation steps in a final plan.

RENOVATIONS COMING TO SWAIM PARK PLAYGROUND!

City Staff and Parks and Recreation Commission members hosted a Swaim Park Playground Open House on March 24, 2022 at Swaim Lodge in Swaim Park to gather public input on the concept designs of the playground. Concept designs were shown on giant posters, and staff gathered public feedback. Staff also received and reviewed emails from residents who were unable to attend the Open House.

After months of planning, the designs have been completed and are ready for implementation!

Renovations will occur in two phases. The first phase is expected to happen in August-September when ADA-

accessible features will be installed. Including:

Cozy Dome - for children to have a less stimulating spot

Elevated Sand Table - to allow for easy roll-up access

Oodle Swing - where a child can transfer from a mobility device into the Oodle Swing


Accessible SuperScoop - to allow for easy roll-up access

Smart Play Loft Structure - for 2-5 year olds


Synthetic Turf will be in areas surrounding the features



When was the last time you checked to see if your immune system is up to date? Many diseases can be easily prevented by administering vaccines, and thus, protecting you from unseen viruses. Take the necessary precautions with a simple call to your doctor, and avoid potential harm while leading a healthy, happy life.

HOW TO OBSERVE NATIONAL IMMUNIZATION AWARENESS MONTH

Call your doctor

The only way to be absolutely certain about what vaccinations you've received is to gather your medical records. Contact your doctor and request your immunization records to determine whether or not you are up to date.

Encourage friends to do the same

Just because you feel healthy doesn't mean you don't need to be vaccinated. Unlike most medicines, which treat or cure diseases, vaccines prevent them. When you check your immunization records, encourage friends to do the same, and you can all make sure you are up to date.

Know your family history

A family medical history can reveal the history of disease in your family and help a doctor identify patterns that might be relevant to your own health. This will allow the doctor to be best informed about recommending vaccines for immunization.

SURVIVOR, STORYTELLER, AND FILMMAKER **KEVIN HINES IS COMING TO MONTGOMERY**

"I think that's really my biggest message: that whatever you're dealing with, don't keep it to yourself because it could kill you." Those are more than just words for Kevin Hines.

At 19, Hines tried taking his life by jumping from the Golden Gate Bridge. He says a sea lion helped him stay afloat before he was rescued. Hines is one of the few survivors of the 220-foot jump.

Today, after much work, Hines spends his days traveling the world, sharing his journey of what led him to the iconic bridge and now the road to mental wellness. Hines is bringing his message to the City of Montgomery on October 23.

"Anyone in your community should come see this event because you are going to learn how to balance struggle and strife with hope, healing, and recovery," said Hines.

Hines says his message is for anyone who is struggling or thriving.

"This is going to be entertaining, educational, absolutely hilarious," said Hines. "You are going to laugh. You're going to cry. You are going to find hope, and you are going to change your perspective."

PROTECT OUR RIVERS AND STREAMS

WATERSHED

Stormwater runoff eventually makes its way into the Little Miami and Ohio Rivers, which is the source of drinking water for millions of people! In addition to drinking water, these rivers and streams provide transportation, recreation, natural beauty, and habitat for many species of plants and animals.

The most common connection we have to our streams is the stormwater grates found along the curbs or roadside ditches of our streets. In Montgomery, most are marked with a small sign that says, "NO DUMPING -

LITTLE MIAMI WATERSHED, Hamilton County Storm Water District Hotline: 513-946-7000". The Hotline is a phone number you can call to report any waste dumped into the storm drain.

Keep in mind the following ways that you can protect our rivers and streams:

• Do not dispose of paints and thinners, chemicals and cleaners, oil, radiator fluid, herbicides, pesticides, etc. into storm sewers. Read and follow the disposal instructions on containers.

- Do not dispose of sewage from RV/bus holding tanks into storm sewers.
- Report spills (or evidence of them) on highways and into creeks and streams.
- · Report violations of dumping ASAP to the City of Montgomery Public Works Department at 513-792-8355.
