PEDESTRIAN BRIDGE PROJECT

The Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) is conducting a feasibility study evaluating options for replacing the pedestrian bridge that crosses over Ronald Reagan Cross County Highway (State Route 126), near the intersection with Interstate 71. This bridge directly connects Donjoy Drive in the Kenview Hills neighborhood and Sycamore Junior High School.

Public involvement is an important part of ODOT's project development process, and the input received will help guide the department's decisions. ODOT has created a virtual Public Open House to share information about the project and gather public feedback regarding

the alternatives under consideration. ODOT's virtual Public Open House ends September 10.



KEVIN HINES, MIRACLE SUICIDE SURVIVOR, IS COMING TO MONTGOMERY

Since Kevin tried to take his own life by jumping from the Golden Gate Bridge in 2000, he has traveled the world to stop others from doing the same thing.

Unlike most people who have jumped from the iconic bridge, Kevin survived. He says a sea lion helped keep him afloat before rescuers arrived. Kevin says things may have been different if one person had approached him that day on the bridge. He also says that we can all make a difference in someone else's life.

"One person can make a difference by being observant of people who are struggling and not just walking by them," Kevin said.

"Walking directly up to them and say 'hey you look like you are going through something is there anything that I can do to help'. You could be the catalyst to helping shepherd someone to surviving."

In the 23 years since that day, Kevin Hines has made it his mission to share his experience in hopes of helping others. Kevin has written a book *Cracked Not Broken: The Kevin Hines Story.* He's created a documentary film *Suicide: The Ripple Effect* and he's

also a motivational speaker who travels the world trying to prevent suicide. His message is simple: we all have pain in our lives, but we need to find ways to cope.

"Pain is universal, we are all going to go through it, if you haven't already," said Kevin. "I think that expressing pain and how to find triumph over that adversity and how to survive pain no matter how difficult, has related to a lot of people."

The City of Montgomery is proud to welcome Kevin Hines to our community.

"The greatest thing I've experienced after giving a keynote anywhere has been the many people that come up and say things like 'I was going to take my life today and now I am not'," said Kevin. "That has been the most wonderful experience. I give a message I'm a conduit. People take



the message they go home they do the work, and they are saving their own lives. But if we can spark that feeling in them to do something different. I give tools, tips and tricks and coping strategies to benefit brain health. They change their perspectives it is a wonderful thing."

"More people than ever before are dying by suicide. More children than ever before in human history are dying by suicide. This is an opportunity for parents, teachers, clinicians, and community members to come out to hear a message that will absolutely impact them and likely change their perspective if they are considering suicide."

CITY TO CONDUCT LIMITED FALL CURBSIDE BRUSH PICK-UP

The Montgomery Public Works Department will collect brush and limbs over a five-week period starting on **September 11**. Each pick-up week is determined by the regular trash collection schedule. **Please place brush at the curb on the Sunday evening of your collection week.**


GUIDELINES

- Any material placed curbside after the chipper crew passes will not be picked up.
- Our crew will not pick up brush with nails, metal, stones, or excessive dirt.
- Vines and branches with thorns will not be picked up.
- Limbs may be of any length and between 1/2 inch and 8 inches in diameter. Place shorter branches, twigs, and clippings in yard waste bags or cans for Rumpke to pick up
- Place brush and limbs in small piles along the curb with the "cut" ends toward the street. Do not create large stacks with cut ends going in different directions
- Brush piles that are tied into bundles or are tangled will not be picked up.

• Do not place stumps, root balls, and logs out for curbside brush collection. These may be placed out for Rumpke waste collection on your regularly scheduled day. Each item cannot weigh more than 60 lbs.



Alert Hamilton County is paired with Smart911, allowing you to create a Safety Profile of important family, medical, and personal information that can be shared with dispatchers & first responders during an emergency. 2. Build a Preparedness Kit.

Before a disaster, have essential elements stored away in a water-tight container that can be "Grab and Go," in the

event of an evacuation. Creating a kit does not have to be expensive or difficult, as most items you should include are already in your home! For a full list of items, please visit: www.ready.gov/kit.

3. Make a Plan. Discuss with the members of your household how you will communicate in the event of a disaster, where you will meet to reunite, and how you will receive emergency alerts and warnings. PLANTING TREES TODAY FOR A GREENER TOMORROW

"The best time to plant a tree was 20 years ago. The second-best time is now."

This Chinese proverb seems especially true this fall. After sweltering summer temperatures, we could use the cooling effect of more trees. And planting trees is something most of us in Montgomery can do. They add beauty to our homes while helping fight climate change. Here's how.

Trees help the Earth keep its cool

Trees do a lot of work for us humans. They:

- **Sequester carbon:** Trees absorb carbon dioxide from the air during photosynthesis. This process reduces the amount of greenhouse gases in the atmosphere.
- **Improve air quality:** Leaves filter pollutants and release oxygen, contributing to cleaner, healthier air for us to breathe.
- **Control erosion:** Tree roots anchor the soil, preventing erosion and protecting topsoil from being washed away by rainwater. The absorption of rainwater also reduces the risk of flooding.
- Provide habitat: Trees provide a home for wildlife, promoting biodiversity and enhancing the overall health of the ecosystem.

- Regulate outdoor temperatures: Trees cool the environment by providing shade and releasing water vapor through a process known as transpiration.
- Regulate indoor temperatures: By shading your home in summer and providing wind breaks in the winter, trees enable you to use less energy and lower your bills. Using less energy, in turn, lowers carbon emissions from power plants.

Fall is a perfect time for planting

Planting trees in the fall gives them an extra growing season before the stress of summer. Cool days, warm soil, and moderate rainfall help trees establish their root system before winter sets in. This root development ensures they are better prepared to flourish come spring. Plus, many garden centers discount trees in the fall, so you can save a bit of green while going green.

> Trees create a more sustainable, beautiful, and healthy environment for all. So grab your shovel and plant a few. You'll be contributing to the health and well-being of future generations.

FALL PROPERTY MAINTENANCE TIPS

Tree and Shrub Care

Fall is a great time to trim back trees and shrubs. Look for unstable or dead branches that may pose a danger, and take advantage of the fall brush pick up.

Gutters and Downspouts

Be sure to clean out gutters and downspouts of any leaves or debris. This is also a good time to inspect the gutters and downspouts for any damage.

Exterior Faucets

Help protect your pipes form freezing by shutting off water to exterior faucets and be sure to drain and store any outside hoses.

Seal Gaps

With colder weather nearing, be sure to walk the perimeter of your house and seal any gaps to help prevent critters from getting inside to keep warm.

Check Driveways and Walkways

Ensure all driveways and walkways are in good repair prior to the first snowfall to make shoveling a little easier. Also, now is a good time to make sure stairs and railings are in good shape.
